#### OF THE

### FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

#### THOMAS COUNTY, GA., October 17th, 1873.

The Florida Baptist Association this day convened with the Liberty Church, Brooks county, Georgia.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder W. W. Bostick, from the first verse of the third epistle general of John.

After an intermission of an hour the Association was called to order by Elder G. W. Hall, the former Moderator being absent, and S. M. Seruggs requested to act as Clerk.

Letters from churches were then called for, read, and names of messengers en-

The election of officers resulted as follows: Elder G. W. Hall, Moderator, S. M. Scruggs, Clerk.

Petitionary Letters were then called for, when Mt. Vernon Church responded by Letter and Messenger, and on motion, was received as a constituent of this body, and the right hand of fellowship extended to Messenger by the Moderator.

Correspondents being called for, Elders K. Chambers and H. B. McCallum, of the Santa Fee Association, Elder C. S. Gaulden, E. B. Carroll, C. R. & T. I. Denmark, C. D. Campbell, W. H. Bryant, Isaac Jessups and J. Scruggs, of Mercer-Association, presented themselves and were cordially invited to seats with us.

On motion, Elder J. G. McCall, corresponding editor of the FLORIDA BAPTIST, was invited to a seat with us.

Or motion, a general invitation to visiting brethren to seats was extended.

The Moderator appointed the following committees :

On Finance-Brethren R. Santh, J. A. Bently and Joshua Carroll.

On motion, a committee was appointed to elect delegates to the Florida Baptist State Convention.

On motion the regular order of business was suspended for the purpose of considering the action of some of our churches, who it is feared have departed from the faith once delivered to the saints, and a committee was appointed for that purpose.

On motion, adjourned to meet to morrow morning at 9 o'clock. Prayer by Elder K. Chambers.

#### SATURDAY, October 18th, 1873.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder C. D. Campbell. Minutes of yesterday read and adopted. The following report of special committee was read and adopted :

We, to whom was referred the supposed departure from the faith once delivered to the saints, of some of the churches composing this Association, and other churches established by your former Missionary (J. C. Gibson), beg leave to offer the following resolutions for your adoption:

First. We reaffirm the old Baptist doctrine, that Associations are only advisory, not Legislative bodies.

Second. That the Moderator appoint a committee of brethren to visit said churches, inquire into the matter, and it necessary labor with them; and that the expenses of the committee be paid by the Association.

The following report of special committee in reference to the death of Elder W. J. Blewitt, was read and adopted :

WHEREAS, It has pleased Almighty God, the Father of us all, to remove from his labors on earth to his rest in heaven, our much beloved Brother Elder W. J. Blewitt, so long associated with this body as a member and Moderator. "Ile rests from labors and his works do follow him," as is evidenced by numerous churches, constituents of this body, built up by the labors of our lamented brother, who a few years ago, to improve his health, removed to Texas, from whence his spirit took its flight upward to the mansions prepared for him, and not only for him, but also for all those who love our Lord Jesus Christ in truth and sincerity.

Your committee on deceased Ministers and Deacons beg have to submit the subjoined report: During the associational year an unusual number of our fel-low laborers have been taken to that "rest that remaineth for the people of God." While to us this is extremely afflictive to them we can but regard it as a great mercy in thus being taken from the evil to come; and while we mourn their loss, and are deprived of their sweet counsel and important labors, we will endeavor to cheerfully submit to this divine dispensation of our Father. Elder D. R. Mil-ton served the Concord Church acceptably for three years, and only resigned by

the stern decree of death. With the meager data before us we cannot speak def-inately of some of our brethren. We moreover insist on a more explicit notice of Brother C. N. Powell, Deacon of New Hope, who was a prominent Baptist and stood almost alone in his community as a Missionary Baptist when the denom-institut split

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee submit the following report:

1st. We would reaffirm the views of your last Association on the subject of Missions.

2nd. Your Committee feel that they, and the members of the churches in this and other Associations, are so far below the ideal standard of a true christian on the subject of Missions, that they hesitate to offer any resolutions, lest they should exist only on paper, and not at the same time be imbeded in the hearts of the brethren. Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, is our great teacher and ex-emplár. 'His mission to this world was to "seek and to save that which was lost." 'He gave the commission to the Church, "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," promising to be with his people in this great work of seeking and saving the lost sons of men, by His holy spirit, accompanying His word preached, and His providential courted of all the powers of heaven and carth and to favor the success of His gospel: He declared "as the Father had sent. me into the world, even so send I you into the world." 
