marks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without permission from the Association, nor more than once until every one desiring to speak shall have done so.

Article 10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourse that may be indulged in among the members, and request strict attention on the part of the audience.

Article 11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before open for debate.

Article 12. Every motion shall be reduced in writing if desired by any member of the Association.

Article 13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.

Article 14. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained unless to amend or referred to a committee, for the previous question or for adjournment.

Article 15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.

Article 16. A member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when substances will admit of a division.

Article 17. Motion and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.

Article 18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage, the first shall be for information and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

Article 19. The rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.

Article 20. The Association shall be opened and closed each day by the Moderator, or by some member.

Article 21. All questions shall be fairly stated in writing, and approved by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

Article 22. All Messengers are requested to remain during the whole session of the Association, and no member shall absent himself without he be execused by the Moderator.

ON TEMPERANCE

Your Committee on Temperance is glad to report that there is continued progress in the nation in the cause of prohibition and temperance Never before has the issue been such a burning one in many places. Over half of the states are now dry and others will soon follow. Prohibition does not always mean temperance but it is a long step toward it.

January Committee Committe

The U. S. Senate by a large majority passed the amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. The House will likely pass the same amendment this winter. As soon as thirty-six state legislatures ratify this action, the nation will be dry.

Many feel confident that the present law prohibiting the manufacture of liquor within the United States for the war period will be extended after the war, even should the amendment not have been adopted The Webb Law prohibiting the interstate shipment of liquor into dry territory has done much good.

The last session of the Florida Legislature passed every bill for prohibition presented to it. Had not local option been in the constitution, the state would have become dry as a result of some legislation. As it is, however, we must wait until November of next year to ratify the amendment proposed by the last legistature and thereby sweep from the state the legal sale of liquor.

Five counties have voted dry within the past three or four months. The number of wet counties is now only five or six. The quart-a-month law is causing much less liquor to be shipped into the dry counties. In places where there is strict enforcement of law, the blind tiger evils are much less.

The more strict enforcement of prohibitory laws and the higher price of liquor will cause more inclination to home-making of some kind of intoxicating liquor. The fact that one dollars worth of corn can be converted into ten quarts of some kind of liquor worth at least ten dollars offers some temptation to say the least.

We, therefore, recommend that the principles of temperance and law observance be practiced and

taught throughout the bounds of the Association and we feel that if all the forces of the Master do their part, liquor will have been banished from the state by an overwhelming vote of the people before this Association meets in October of next year.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We your committee beg leave to report as follows: We as a Christian Denomination must awake to the fact, that the day has arrived which demands an education. Education in our country is plain methods and practices is divided into two systems, State and Denominational.

In our State Colleges and public schools we find a very small number of Presidents, Professors and teachers to be devout Christians, by this the tendency of the State Colleges and public schools are not towards spiritual development, but after just the reverse.

The aims and purposes of the Denominational Colleges should be, and they usually are, to train the mind and with equal earnestness the spiritual to the end that all education may have its foundation in faith in God, loyalty to Christ and full belief in the Bible. The Denominational College that fails in any one of these particulars is disloyal to this purpose of true Christian education.

A man will say "I can send my child to the State College for less money and I mean to do so." God pity the father of our State who will ignore the higher and purer training of sons or daughters because it costs them a few more dollars to send them to Columbia College where our doctrine and faith is taught and practiced.

To bring this matter home to the Middle Florida Association Columbia College is the only Baptist school in Florida owned and controlled by the Baptists of Florida; it has a faculty able to teach young men and women to give them all that they need for preparation of life; it is founded upon the Bible and it is loyal to the doctrines, policy and practices of the Baptist Denomination.

In conclusion we urge that each messenger from the various churches of this Association as they return to the churches to ask their brethern to make a special contribution for the support of Columbia College. We especially urge the fathers and mothers of this Association to send their boys and girls to Columbia College.

We urge upon our people the support of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and advise young men who have finished their studies in Columbia College to pursue courses in the Seminary.

HOME MISSION

The main purpose of this Board, which was established in 1906, is to evangelize, and christianize the needy parts of our home land.

Our Board last year reported 37,724 baptisms, 22,945 of which were creditable to Home Missions, while the remainder were creditable to cooperative agencies.

Last year the receipts of the Board far all purposes was \$474,792 while the administrative costs were 22,638, or 4.7 per cent.

This suggests great economy, but we should not practice economy at the expense of efficiency.

There must always be a judicious expense in secular business to insure success, and the same rule holds good in religious work.

I would further recommend that each member of

the executive committee be required to visit the field at least once a year at different times and in different places.

MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

This will enlighten the Board, encourage the Missionary, and stimulate the people. I myself can abardly tell the good that I received from two visits 'or re member of the Committee. The great world's war is upon us.

We have 3,000,000 Baptists of the South from which to raise men and means. As a church we must raise and face the greatest crisis in the history of this country since the Revolution.

THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Your committee appointed to report upon the condition of the orphange in submitting our report beg to state that this beneficiary of the church is doing a great work in Florida, and that during the year it has cared for over one hundred children and that the usual amount of interest and cooperation has been manifested by friends and baptists throughout the state despite the crop condition and the great crisis that has confronted the nation during the past year.

We are gratified to report that with all these conditions confronting the management of the work that the institution has been run on a basis of about \$10.00 per child per month.

The orphanage and its mission we fear has not been fully understood and appreciated by some, but it is a source of pleasure for your committee to report that the faithfulness of Dr. Trice and his helpers in

the work, and the church could not secure a more efficient and faithful crops of workers; they deserve all the credit and praise that can be given them for their services.

During the year we find that close attention has been given to the spiritual condition of the child and that quite a few have joined the church with they are surrounded with the necessary religious teaching to fit them for the Master's use.

We also find that it will take about \$15,000 to properly care for the orphanage this year and to meet all the conditions that are likely to arise and to avoid turning away any that should be cared for, and we appeal to the brethern and this Association to be not lacking in giving support to one of the dearest institutions of the church.

ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our authority for doing Foreign Mission work is derived from the teachings of our Lord, when He commanded us to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Baptists are a Bible loving people, and therefore must be missionary and thereby scriptural, or they must perish from the face of the earth, while Baptists have not monopolized the missionary project, yet they have had a noble and leading part in the missionary achievements of the ages. William Carey of saintly memory is lovingly called the father of modern organized missions, And the time would fail me to tell of the Judsons, the Rices, the Taylors, the Yates. the Cloughs. the Graves, and a host of others, who through faith subdued Kingdoms, wrought righteousness. oftamed promises, out of weakness were made strong and turned to flight the armies of the alies.

In the Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond Va., Southern Raptists have a fine piece of machinery for carrying on missions to the ends of the earth. An active propaganda in behalf of world wide Missions is kept up among the churches by the Board, a vast amount of literature is sent out. Tracts may be had for the asking, Mission study classes are encouraged and organized. Funds are solicited, and through the board flows the stream of free will offerings that go to support the Missionaries, maintain christian schools, hospitals, dispensaries, medical missionaries, theological training school, and in fine to provide an equipment that is worthy of a Christ given commission to evangelize the world.

Southern Baptists are doing mission work in Africa, Argentina, Brazil, China, Italy, Japan and Mexico. We have sent out an evangelistic force of 307

men and women, and have on the fields 178 ordained natives, assisted by 631 unordained native helpers. The Board owns 79 homes for the missionaries. We have organized in Foreign lands 458 churches, 115 of which are self-supporting, with 992 outstations. These churches have a membership of 47,161. There are 226 houses of worship in the 668 Sunday Schools 31,575 scholars are taught the word of God. Baptists of Foreign lands contributed to the cause of Christ last year \$132,371,05, which averaged about \$2.80 per member.

Baptists in foreign lands are mightily advancing the Masters Kingdom through Christian schools and education. Our Missionaries are operating 15 kinder gartens with 415 pupils; 451 elementary schools with 11670 scholars; 23 middle schools with 1308 pupils; 2 colleges with 96 students; 10 normal and training schools with 298 pupils, 8 Theological schools with 257 students making a total of 485 schools with 13441 students. A very blessed work is being done by our medical missionaries, nurses and helpers, in the alleviation of suffering, in the treatment of disease and in the preaching of the Gospel to the patients. whose hearts have been made tender by the gracious ministries of the missionaries. From year to year God's blessing has wonderfully rested upon this work, and we gladly record the fact that last year 6347 men and women in foreign lands were buried with Christ in baptism.

Seeing what has been done, let us thank God and take courage, and let us press on to carry the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth. To this end we recommend.

1. That our pastors and churches pray for our Mission work at every service.

- 2. That our people subscribe for the mission magazine. Home and Foreign Fields.
- 3. That our pastors lead and our churches give systematically to all Missions.

REPORT ON STATE OF CHURCHES

Progress has been made during the year. A number have been added to the churches by letter and Experience. Some churches have experienced gracious Revivals, and the vision of Christian service enlarged.

The missionary spirit is slowly growing, but must be greatly enlarged if the churches are to carry out their Christ giving commission. In some churches contribution to missions and benevolent objects have been increased, notably those that have some form of systematic giving. Our pastors are sometimes lacking in missionary zeal in a broad vision in information, and in courageous leadership; while the churches are lacking in energy in the cooperative spirit in loyalty, and in consecration of themselves and their money to the Lord's cause. Both pastor and churches often put little in and get little out. Both should demand more and give more.

A better grouping of our churches so that one pastor could be centrally located, and serve nearby communities would greatly promote spiritual efficency a close brotherly spirit and a broad vision will wonderfully advance this end.

We are persuaded that our churches should better attend our union meetings, and engage in the work. Every church should be willing and ready to have a Bible Institute, for the institute is a fruitful developer

Let us this year make a more determined and far reaching effort to promote the Kingdom of Christ on earth.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK

Prepared for the Middle Florida Baptist Association,

There is perhaps no phase of our Church work that has advanced so rapidly, as that of the W. M. U. With only about twenty-eight years of history, as a band of organized workers, they have proven themselves pre-eminent in organization and have shown to the world womans place in the kingdom of God and the evangelization of the world.

In the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention there are fourteen thousand womans organizations, with approximately a quarter of a million members, who contributed more than five hundred thousand dollars last year to the uplift of humanity. According to the report on woman's work at the Florida Baptist Convention at Orlando last January, we have in Florida, five hundred organizations. Our contributions to all purposes last year amounted to approximately sixteen thousand dollars. This is gratifying indeed, yet there is room for improvement along all lines.

While the nations of earth are spending millions of dollars daily in the World War, it is a great time of opportunity for the Church. We need to unite our forces in prayer and consecration and in concentrated effort press the cause of our Lord on earth.
