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Article 1. We believe in one and only one, true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, God, the Father, God, the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

Article 2. We believe that the Holy Scripture, composed of both the Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice of God's people,

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of Sovereign, particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability,

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Christ, which is the consequence of faith in Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the word of God and the Holy Spirit.

Article 8. We believe that the saints are preserved by grace and persevere in grace and will never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of a New Testament church, that immersion is the only Scriptural Baptism, and believers are the only Scriptural subjects for Baptism, and none but baptised believers who are members of Missionary Baptist churches in good standing are entitled to partake in the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in the resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked dead, and that both will be judged according to the deeds done in the body.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are Divinely called, having been ordained by prayer and the imposition of the hands of a presbytery duly authorized by a Missionary Baptist church.

#### 类似 医海 阴病 音乐像似的语言 CONSTITUTION OF MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by Missionary Baptist churches, who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all pastors of churches in this Association.

Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twentyfive members or major fraction thereof. In no case shall any one church be entitled to more than five messengers.

Article 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time ... and place as may be selected by the body. If it should become necessary, the Executive Committee of the Association may change the time, or place of meeting, or both.

Article 6. Any church, in harmony with this Association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the union upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

Article 7. Any church wishing a letter of dismission shall make application therefor by letter.

Article 8. The officers of this Association shall be a moderator. an Assistant Moderator, who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the suffrage of the members present, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article 9. The Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of six members duly elected by the body, together with the officers of the Association as ex-officio members. This Committee shall foster all the interests of the Association, when the body is not in session. The Committee shall have authority to appoint or recommend to the State Board Missionaries, or Colporters, and to make appropriation to weak churches or destitutions, and to give such advice to the churches as may seem wise and necessary, and the Assistant Moderator shall be Ex-Officio Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Article 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which are adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis Tennessee, in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and co-operation.

Article 11. The Association shall recognize and respect the rights and independence of every church co-operating.

Article 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient.

## THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION RULES OF DECORUM

- the Martinian of the Book of Section 1987, the second of the 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision. AGG BANG COLORS
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the Chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, then he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. Not more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and when recognized by the Chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the Chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for de-liberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the minutes of the Association,
- 10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association. The second contact of the second contact of

#### An Appreciation

The Clerk of the Association hereby extends to all Pastors, church clerks and officers his heartiest thanks and appreciation for their splendid co-operation during the past ten years.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

We, your Committee, report as follows:

In the Forty-eighth Annual Report to the Florida Baptist Convention our State Board of Missions reported that Florida Baptists contributed to all Missions during the year \$244,138.01. This is a splendid record when we consider the many disasters that came to our people during the past year. Our Missionaries accomplished a great deal regardless of the difficulty that stood in our Board's way.

During the past year our Board assisted in the support of 74 Missionary Pastors in preaching the gospel to 104 churches and mission Stations. Our Board supports one full time Missionary in the territory of Lake Ockeechobee whose work has been a success.

These Missionary Pastors reported 893 baptisms, 742 received by letter and 56 by restoration. Collected for Missions, \$5,447.06, for church buildings, \$14,382.54. The Board spent on this phase of

our work \$18,500.18.

Our Board contributed to Field Workers of the following departments during the year, W. M. U. Department \$8,793.16, Sunday School Department \$7,536,31, B. Y. P. U. Department \$7,592.06. Splendid progress has been made in each of these Departments for which we praise God.

Our Children's Home at Arcadia received through our Board from the Co-operative Program \$6,550.80, Special Gifts through the Board to the Home \$3,306.62, Gifts sent direct to the Superintendent total \$19,848.70, Grand total for the year to the Home

\$29,706.12.

Florida Baptists gave to Foreign Missions last year only \$47, 473.38, to Home Missions only \$16,194.68, the Baptist Honor Day Gifts amounted to \$16,730.02 which is not included in the above Gifts.

Our Board was able to send to our New Orleans Hospital \$1,311.27, to aged ministers, or in some cases their widows, \$5,315.38. We put into our student work at Tallahassee and Gaines-

ville \$3,403.42.

Florida Baptists gave to South-wide Educational Institutions to make possible the training of our ministerial students and Missionaries \$10,505.79, Special Gifts to the Louisville Seminary by friends in the State amounted to \$5,778.90.

Our Board gave to the Layman's work which was instituted the

latter part of the year \$1,075.48.

Our Board raised for Storm Relief Work \$3,993.65, the Board borrowed \$4,000.00 which was added to this amount to assist churches that were torn to pieces by the hurricane last September.

We gave during the year to Stetson University to increase its endowment \$6,550.80. We assisted 19 ministerial and mission students at Stetson and in our training schools from our Student Loan Fund to the extent of \$2,620.32.

Our Board in the beginning of the year appropriated \$5,000,00 to the Baptist Witness. This was in order to assist the paper in

reaching our people with information concerning our work.

We probably did not raise as much Mission money this year as last but we thank God for His many blessings and for the sacrificial manner in which thousands of our people have supported our work. We earnestly and prayerfully plead with every Messenger present and each Church represented to get your Church enlisted in this great world wide program of winning the lost to Christ.

#### REPORT OF HOME MISSIONS

The great and deplorable misfortune which befell the Home Board and its work about one year ago is too well known among our people to need discussion in this report. It is sufficient to say that Southern Bactists will not allow the treachery of one man to cause them to default in their stewardship or to lessen their interest in the Kingdom of Christ, either in their own homeland or in the regions beyond.

#### A Generous Gift

While the year just passed has recorded the greatest calamity that ever befell the Home Mission Board or any other of our Baptist agencies, it has also recorded the greatest and most generous gift ever made to the Home Mission Board or to any other Southern Baptist mission enterprise. Mrs. George W. Bottoms, of Texarkana, Ark., adding to a gift of \$100,000 made by her and Mr. Bottoms in his lifetime, has just rounded out a gift which at the lowest estimate will amount to one-half million dollars for the erection and maintenance of our school in Havana, Cuba. More and more, Havana will be both a great commercial, intellectual and religious capital of Latin America, and this school will stand as a great and shining light whose rays will reach everyone of the Latin American people and will be the means of winning multiplied thousands to a saving knowledge of the grace of God.

#### Baptist Honor Day

The response of our people made on Baptist Honor Day on which was contributed about \$450,000 for the relief of the Board enabled the Board to close a remarkably good and successful year and to face the future with enlarging prospects and hopes.

#### New Personnel

At the recent session of the Southern Baptist Convention, at Memphis, Tenn., the Board was constituted of an almost entirely new personnel. This was done not through a lack of confidence in the brethren who have served on the Board for many years, but at their request. The new Board recently elected as Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. J. B. Lawrence, D. D., of Kansas City Missouri. Dr. Lawrence has accepted and entered upon the duties of his office. The several departments of the work are under the supervision of the following Superintendents: Department of Church Extension, Dr. A. J. Barton; Department of Direct and Independent Mission, Dr. J. W. Beagle; Department of Mountain Schools and Missions, Dr. J. W. O'Hara; Cuban Work, Dr. M. N. McCall.

Statistics are only a mortal category in which the invisible Spirit breathes its visible accomplishments. The Lord's true work cannot ever be tabulated—it can only be accounted in the growing rightcousness of a people. If the eight-odd years history of the Home Mis-

sions Board in dollars and cents received, lives touched, people strengthened, children educated, the sick healed, communities blessed, churches established, the nation's moral conscience quickened, and souls saved—if all this could be tabulated and set out shming like jewels in a crown so that every effort and item could be visualized—is there yet one among us who would arrest this phenomona of grace by withholding an offering? Is there one among us yet who will refuse to give as the Lord has prospered them so that this Temple may be completed before the Lord's return?

#### Conclusion

We do not burden this report with figures or statistics. As just said, the past Convention year, in slite of all difficulties, has been a good year, with large ach evements and with brightening outlook for the work of the Lord. The great work of this school has been such as to merit the approbation of all good Baptists. #### REPORT ON CRPHANAGE

Our Children's Home in Arcadia has cared for an average of One Hundred and Seventy-five Children during the last Associational year. Thirty-six children have left the Home during this time, The places vacated by these children have been quickly filled from the applications coming into the Home from children needing a place.

Those leaving the Home this year have left for various reasons, some have gone into the Homes of relatives who felt that they could sup ort them, some were half orphans who had been placed in the Home on a temporary contract to assist a parent in distress and were returned when the Larent was able to take care of them, but the large proportion of these children have left the Home to support themselves in different ways and vocations.

One boy left for the Earber's trade, one girl left a linotype operator, one boy a painter, three girls went into Hospitals for training for nurses, one girl in special training for Western Union Operator, one Stenographer, a boy specially trained in mechanics and

several others in various positions of self-support.

We are happy to report to our Association this class of work being done by our Home in Arcadia for our boys and girls. Not only does the Home support and care for the children, but they are giving them an opportunity to develop normally into self-supporting Christian citizens.

God has richly blessed our family in health. We have had but little sickness and no deaths. Thirty-six of the children have been converted the past year and united with the First Baptist Church

of Arcadia.

. We regret to report trying times at the Home in supporting our family of boys and girls. The Convention placed the Home on a definite Budget and the Home has been operating under this Budget each month. They have practiced rigid economy. For instance, they figure meals to cost ten cents per capita including donations sent in and what is raised on their Farm. This is small enough but when we figure thirty cents a day and almost ten dollars a month for just the meals for each child, and support one hundred and seventy-five children, you readily see the necessity of regular and large amounts of money going into the office of the Home to pay the monthly expenses.

A Committee of fifteen appointed by the Convention to recommend a plan for supporting our Home offered the following, which

was adopted.

"The Committee Recommends that ten per cent of the Budget receipts during the ensuing year for the Unified Program be given the Children's Home; that each Sunday School be requested to contribute its offering on the First Sunday in each month to the Home."

If the full amount of the Co-operative Program objective had been paid, the Home would have been able to pay all of their bills promptly. The Program is behind with the Home, however, for the ten months of the year \$8,192.49 so it can readily be seen we must depend upon the Sunday Schools in the State to support the Home with one Sunday's Collection each month.

We therefore recommend—First. That each School in the Association adopt the One Sunday's Collection a month plan, to help the Home. Second. That as many of our Churches and Church Members as can do so, send donations of food supplies to the Home from time to time to help support our Own Or han Children At

Our Association gave \$276.27 to the Home in 1928 and have given this year -

#### MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

The cause of Ministerial Relief is being promoted by the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Bapt'st Convention, Dallas, Texas. Dr. Thomas J. Watts is the Executive Secretary,

The Relief and Annuity Board is the agency of the Convention through which the contributions of the churches are distributed to approximately 1450 ministers, and widows and orphans of ministers.

During the past year relief benefits were raid to 1333 persons including 150 or han children who were indirectly aided, and Annuity benefits were paid to 110 ministers, widows and orphans. The current contributions of the churches were supplemented from the interest earnings on the Board's invested funds, and the total amount paid to beneficiaries was \$162,705.06. This was the largest

sum ever paid in any year by several thousands of dollars.

The contributions of the churches were less last year than the previous year by about \$20,000,00. The steady decrease in the contributions of the churches is making it more and more difficult for the Board to add new names to its roll of relief beneficiaries, while at the same time the Annuity Fund cannot safely increase its liabilities without running the risk of reduced benefits. The obligations of Southern Baptists to their disabled and aged ministers cannot be properly met until our people come to think of this work in terms commensurate with is real size. And not until we as a denomination "lay by in store" a great fund to be invested and compounded against the day of need will we ever meet that need in any worthy manner.

The Reserve Annuity Plan will always yield larger and surer results than the Relief Plan, which merely distributes the fluctuating contributions of the churches and the interest earnings on endowments month by month as they come in. Compound interest reduces the capital cost of ministerial relief by from 54 per cent to 65 per cent. Annuities for preachers, therefore, are not expensive when the reserve method of providing them has been followed.

We rejoice in the great success that has already come to the Relief and Annuity Board, yet the payment of \$1,300,000 (one million, three hundred thousand dollars) in benefits and the growth

in its resources from \$106,000,60 (one hundred and six thousand dollars and sixty cents) in 1919 t \$3,028,000 (three million and twenty-eight thousand dollars) in 1929 is only illustrative of what is possible for it to achieve, if only the Reserve Annuity Plan is pressed to its logical conclusion. Let it be remembered that the accumulations of the Board are in the nature of the case to be found on the Annuity side of its work, since the earnings of the Relief Fund have to be used month by month in paying the beneficiaries. Increased endowment is being diligently sought for both the Relief and the Annuity Funds, and that with some measure of success. The resources of the Board must be much larger if our ministers and their families are to be more adequately cared for.

Your Committee wish to call your attention to the fact that we must arrange to take care of the soldiers of the cross in their old age and their widows and orphans in misfortune. Most of them receive such small pay it is out of the question to expect them to

lay by in store for old age and misfortune.

Bro. W. G. Upchurch is our Field Secretary and is doing a great work. He has organized our men throughout the State where the churches have opened their doors and asked him to come.

A few of the things the Laymen's Missionary Movement seeks

Teach our men the needs of mission work and that the preacher alone is not a soul winner but is the duty of every Christian.

Training our men in Christian Leadership to take as much bur-

den as possible off of the preacher's shoulders.

Stewardship of time, talents and money, and that the tithe as a mission is the Lord's.

To apply business methods in our churches.

The kingdom work will not go forward as it ought till we men

get behind it as we ought.

Your Committee respectfully recommends to each church that they get in touch with Bro, W. G. Upchurch through our State Board of Missions and have him come and organize their men and conduct a men's study class for them,

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Your Committee on Temperance begs to submit the following

The New Testament word for temperance means self-control: Refraining from indulgence in alcoholic drinks is only one form of self-control, but this thas come to be the prevalent meaning of the word "temperance". This definition of temperance is in line with one recently given in a Men's Bible Class at Perry, to-wit: "Temperance is a wise, temperate and judicious use of the things that are good for us and total abstinence from the things that are harmful to us." Your Committee believes that these definitions of temperance are good and in agreement with the teachings of God's word, and yet we strongly suspect that there are members of Baptist churches within the bounds of this Association who are trying to persuade themselves that they are temperate if they do not drink whiskey to excess; that is to the point of drunkeness or intoxication. If this be so, it ought not so to be.

In our modern age, with the full light of medical, scientific and sociological research turned on, there should not be any doubt as to the harmful effects of alcohol, physical, mental, moral and social, upon those who use it. And yet we find many-some of them church members-who insist that there is no harm "in a little drink now and then." Such men may be sincere in this contention or they may be shaping their arguments to fit their appetite. We can not say. But we do know that it is an extremely dangerous posi-

tion to take.

In order to show clearly and emphatically the harmful results that follow drinking, permit us to quote from an address by Chauncy M. Depew, the great orator and statesman, and the most famous after-dinner speaker of his day. Mr. Depew lived to be upwards of ninety and died some time last year. He was a great railroad magnate, being a director in a number of the biggest railroad companies in America, and the address from which we quote was delivered before a body of railroad men. Mr. Depew said: "Twentyfive years ago I knew every man, woman and child in Peeksvill. It has been a study with me to mark the course of the boys, in every grade of life, who started with myself-to see what has become of them. Last fall I was up there and began to count them over, and the lesson was most instructive. Some of them became clerks, some merchants, manufacturers, lawyers or doctors. It is remarkable that every one of them that had drinking habits is now deadnot a single one of my age now living. Except a few who were
taken off by sickness, every one proved a wreck, and has wrecked
his family, and did it from rum and whiskey and no other cause.
Of those who were church-going eogle, who were steady, industrious and hard-working men, and frugal and thrifty, every one
without exception owns the house in which he lives, and has something laid by, the interest on which, with his house, would carry him
through many a rainy day. When a man becomes debased with
gambling, rum or drink, he seems to care for nothing; all his finer
feeli gs are stifled, and ruin only is his end."

Any of the older persons present to-day could, by thinking back over the associates of his or her childhood, du licate this testimony of Mr. Depew. It is the stery of strong drink succently told.

But you ask, "What about my rersonal liberty? Haven't I the right to drink if I want to do so?" This is the persistent war ery of these who would bring back the saloons if they could. They say that prohibition infringes on their "personal liberty". A weaker, more unchristian argument was never put forward. In law and in civilization the first consideration is not the individual but society. Therefore whatever injures society is not permitted. The greater our civilization, the more restricted become our liberties. We may enjoy civic liberty only as we are willing to sacrifice personal liberties.

This does not mean that we actually surrender anything. Each of us is asked to give up some little things and put them into the common fund which makes up the sum of all our comforts in a civilized community, but each of us draws out of that common fund much more than any of us put in.

We may exercise our personal liberty only in so far as we do not place additional burdens upon our neighbors, or upon the state.

No man has a right to drink if by so doing he poisons himself or makes himself an unfit member of society, compelling the state to cure him, support him when he is unable to take care of himself, lock him up when he is dangerous to be at large, bury him at public express when he is a corpse, and take care of his family when he is gone.

No normal man would prefer to live in a state of barbarism where every man does absolutely as he pleases without regard to the well-being of his neighbors. We would rather make some sacrifices which mean come aratively little to us in order that we,too, may make a contribution to the civilization which is bringing so much

comfort and happiness to all,

When the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution was adopted, many people fell into the error of taking it for granted that the war against alcohol had been won, and there was no need to fight any longer. Consequently, they ceased to emphasize the importance of teaching people, and especially our young people, the evils of alcohol. The modern demand for efficiency and the teaching in our public schools the evils of alcohol were two of the bigbest factors in creating a sentiment sufficiently strong to enable us to write the Eighteenth Amendment into our organic law. And, if we are to create a sentiment against the traffic in liquor sufficiently strong to enable us to secure enforcement of the liquor laws, we must keep up that campaign of education, for the effective enforcement of any law depends in large measure upon the support of public sentiment that enforcement officials will have to respect. Are we all doing our share in this all-important work? We may rest assured that the crooked politicians, a subsidized press, and

other enemies of prohibition are doing their best to break it down. We must continue the campaign of education. Education means more than agitation. The main task before us is to get people to see the physical, moral, intellectual, social and financial ruin that results from the use of and traffic in intoxicating liquors. Let us preach it from the pulpit, teach it in the Sunday Schools, in the B. Y. P. U., in the literary school, in the home, everywhere. Only in this way can we build up a public sentiment that will mean effective law enforcement. And may we add, here, that along with law enforcement we need law observance. If every professing Christian in America would voluntarily observe the Volstead Law, it would be a much easier matter to compel the others to obey the law.

We should not have nor express any doubt about the ultimate success of the Eighteenth Amendment. It is in our Constitution and it is there to stay. We think that the result in the last national election shows clearly the temper of the American people on this point. Twenty years ago neither of the two leading parties would have thought of making prohibition an issue in a political campaign, and when the prohibition party nominated a candidate for president half of the voters in the country would not know his name on election day; but in our last national election prohibition was the leading issue, and, what is more, it won. There were, no doubt, other factors in Mr. Smith's defeat, but there is no doubt that his avowed and open stand against prohibition did more than all else combined to bring about his defeat.

So the point that your committee would emphasize is that, while the ultimate success of prohibition is assured, we as a Christan people can hasten that success by a course of rigid law observance for ourselves and by working and praying to bring about such a healthy public sentiment in favor of law enforcement that enforcement officials, although venal and corrupt in principle, will

be afraid to go counter to that sentiment.

And let us remember that the whole world is looking at us. Your committee believes that when America is made dry in fact as well as in name, as it will be sooner or later, other nations will follow suit, and there will be an aggressive campaign to make the whole world dry. A greater responsibility never rested upon human beings than rests upon the Christians of America to-day.

How are we as Baptists meeting that responsibility?

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1929

Every State in the Southern Baptist Convention has had wonderful development in Sunday School work and growth in the past ten years. In that length of time there was an increase in enrollment of about Sixty Per Cent. The work yet to be done is appalling. Seven out of every ten Children and Youths in the United States, are not enrolled in any institution, offering systematic Moral & Religious instructions. Including our unreached Church members.

Our Baptist possibilities in the Southern Baptist Convention territory totals 5,903,677, Florida has about 38 per cent of her Church members enrolled in Sunday School.

Teacher training has had a large place in our Sunday School

work during the last ten years. From 1916 to 1928 there was an increase in the number of Scals and Diplomas from 850 to 23,087. 1929 bids fair to be our best year in every phase of our work.

Teachers training Associational Organizations, New Sunday School Buildings, Enlargement Campaigns, Assemblies, Large Training Schools, Classes in Rural Churches, Sunday School Conventions, Associational Conventions, New Sunday Schools and increase in Bartisms.

The total enrollment in the Sunday Schools of the Middle Florida Baptist Association for 1928, were 1,777. The enrollment for this year 1,464. Number of Schools reported were Twenty-One, Total reported this year 17. Number Diplomas reported last year 45. Number reported this year 28. Bartisms from Sunday Schools last year 161, Number reported this year 54.

#### REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Not unto us, but unto Him, be all the praise for his leading and blessing in the victories won during the past two years of Woman's Work. These glorious victories are a challenge to press on to yet worthier goals.

We feel that now is the psychological time to enlist every woman who is unenlisted and get her interested in the co-operative program, stewardship, mission study, personal-service, soul-winning

and our young people's work.

It is said there are two reasons for the lack of interest in missions: Absence of information, and the lack of religion worth giving to others. In teaching missions, we must hold up the Christ,

leaving methods largely in the back ground.

Never before has the missionary enterprise demanded such individual and united effort as now. Every life has its place and its task. Sometimes the woman in the rural district seems to render a larger service than the better prenared woman in the town and city churches. There is a great task ahead in trying to organize and enlist every woman as well as the young people in our Baptist churches getting them interested in the work. Then the newly made organizations must be fostered and nurtured or they die. There is the foreigner to be Americanized and led to Christ. The Negro women and girls need our guidance in their work, also instruction in sanitation and home relation. We should teach them the things we demand of them. These are some of the problems we must stand by to complete our task.

We are glad to report that our Union in the Middle Florida Association, as never before, is fast falling in line with the effort of the State Convention in pushing the cooperative program in an organized way. We are proud of our young people. Their work gives us the brightest hope for the future. This year we report a large number of tithers among them. Mission Study has more than doubled. Quite a number of awards has been granted. Their reports in personal-service are developing into larger and more useful channels each year. Subscriptions to our Young People's Magazines have increased four-fold. The information gained from this literature has broadening and uplifting influences. During August, of this year, a young people's camp at Cherry Lake was sponsored by the W. M. U. This was a training school of informa-

tion and inspiration that was well worth-while.

At the last State Convention, the pennant for Junior organizations was granted our Association, as was the 1929 West Florida Assembly pennants. At the Southern Baptist Convention last May, Florida claimed seven A-1 W. M. U.'s, and the Middle Florida Association justly owns one of these. As a reward, they sent us a 1928 A-1 South-wide banner of which we are indeed glad to possess.

As a whole, Woman's Work in this Association is better organized and better fitted to go forward than ever before. What task can be more delightful than organizing and training our Baptist boys and girls through the graded organizations of the Woman's Missionary Union? Through this work, we are holding before them ideals that will help them to build strong Christian characters for the future; in home, in church, in school, in society and world affairs. They are taught Bible Study, Mission Study and how to be good Stewards of personality, of time, of talents and money, and to prove their Stewardship by serving and sending.

We now turn from the things we have accomplished, to the beginning of another Associational Year with our eyes fixed upon Him, trusting and striving to accomplish far greater victories in the future. And as we go forth in His name to conquer, let us re-

momber that "God requires faithfulness and not Success."
