RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. Not more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

We your committee report as follows:

Twenty-one years ago the relief and annuity board made its irst annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention, since then much good has been accomplished by those and for those who took part, both churches and pastors and Missionaries, but the churches and pastors were slow to take hold of this plan, and because of that fact the relief and annuity board and brethren throughout the S. B. C. began to study out a plan that would be more interesting and feasible for the churches and pastors. This plan is known as the Ministers Retirement Plan.

The following State Conventions had adopted this plan according to the report of the Relief and Annuity Board at the 1939 S. B. C. Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kentucky, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and Virginia. This plan seems to be growing rapidly in the churches and with the pastors.

Our State Convention appointed the following committee at its 1938 session, Hugh Latimer, Chairman; W. M. Vines, W. T. Gary, A. W. Mathis, F. N. K. Baily, Geo. H. Moore, Virgil L. Estes, to confer with Dr. T. J. Watts and work out a plan for our State Convention to join with the Relief and Annuity Board. This plan is known as the Ministers Retirement Plan. This plan was recommended to the Florida Baptist Convention at West Palm Beach January 20, 1939 and was unanimously adopted, to begin July 1, its operation. Enough of the churches and pastors of our state Convention have already joined this plan to put it in operation, which began July 1, 1939.

This plan works on a percentage basis, 3% of the pastor's salary, 3% by the church or churches and 2% by the State Board.

We believe this is one of the most forward steps ever made by Southern Baptists, to take care of the ministers and Missionaries who have given their lives for the cause of Christ.

We therefore recommend that each pastor and church in the Middle Florida Association that has not already joined this plan that you do so immediately, and thus strengthen this plan and provide means for those who fight the Christian battles of life until their strength and health fails.

REPORT ON MISSIONS, COOPERATIVE PROGRAM AND THE HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

Acts 1:8 "Ye shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem-State Missions

Through our State Mission Board we are helping to win the lost to Christ by sending the Gospel to destitute sections, and by helping to organize and grow more and greater churches, Sunday Schools and B. T. U.'s; developing and training leaders from our groups of Spirit-filled young people. We cultivate stewardship and the Mission Spirit through our W. M. U. and Brotherhood departments, and through our student workers, seek to enlist in Christian service that large group of Baptist boys and girls found in our State Colleges and Institutions.

We maintain a strong Evangelistic work in the State with two Evangelists giving full time to this sacred task, and others giving part time as their services may be in demand. We have supported this year 67 missionary pastors who have preached to 83 churches and mission stations including our Indian work. We are also aid-

Foreign Missions

Realizing that many thousands of our neighbors in other lands were without the Gospel and feeling that Christ would have us make Him known to them, we organized the Foreign Mission Board. This Board is an Agency through which we take the saving knowledge of Jesus to our friends who have not had the privilege we have had of knowing Him as Saviour.

During the life of the Foreign Mission Board we have carried the Gospel to some 16 nations or more. Many churches have been erected on foreign shores; Schools founded and medical attention given to those needing it. In this way we have been able to reach many of them for Him.

One of the outstanding things we are trying to do in the foreign fields now is to educate the natives and prepare them to go forward with the Christian activities.

During the years many of our Foreign Missionaries have gone through many hardships and faced many dangers, but they have stood bravely through it all as loyal ambassadors for our Great King Emanuel. As a result great things have been accomplished on these fields for God.

Much praise is due the W. M. U. for their loyal support of the Foreign work through the Lottie Moon Christmas offering. Last year it amounted to around \$300,000.00.

As never before we must rally around the cause of foreign Missions and give them the love of God instead of a hatred for each other.

CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program is the best plan Southern Baptists have found of enlisting all our people in all our work. It is scriptural, workable, and meets with the approval of our people.

We wish that more of our people of the Middle Florida Association would give to our Denominational work through the Co-

14 thurches through our Building and Loan Fund.

During 1938 we made some advancement in our gifts to mis-The Treasurer's Report made to the last State Convention mowed that Florida Baptists gave to all Missionary and benevolent tauses for 1938 the splendid sum of \$208,342.04. Of this amount the Cooperative Program received \$116,384.86, which amount was distributed in accordance with the instructions of the convention. All special gifts, which reached a grand total of \$91,993.18, were sent to the departments designated by the donors, without deducting one cent for expense of handling same.

Our State Mission Budget for the year is \$86,810.00. This is \$12,000 more than the budget of the previous year, and our State office assures us that every dollar put in the budget will be needed to carry on the work as planned for the year.

The Board depends on three sources for its income. First, the 34 per cent allotted from cooperative program receipts. Second, special gifts during October from the W. M. U. week of prayer, and the Sunday Schools. Third, a donation of \$6,500.00 from the Sunday School Board to assist in maintaining the Sunday School, B. T. U. and Student Work departments.

We recommend that each church in Middle Florida Association recognize these special State Mission offerings.

Home Missions

The Home Mission Board is the agency through which Southern Baptists are doing their Home Mission Work.

It was organized in 1845 with Marian, Ala., as its headquarters. It was moved to Atlanta, Ga., in 1882 and has remained there since that date.

During the 94 years existence of the Home Board it has employed more than 40,000 missionaries. There have been 790,000 baptisms as direct results of the work of the Board through the work of these missionaries.

The Board through these missionaries has organized 8,60°1 new Baptist churches. Thereby reaching in an indirect way many thousands of people.

The Home Missionaries are reaching people that otherwise would not likely be reached. As a result of their labours they baptized 5000 new members last year.

We are now operating within our income and last year paid \$150,000 on our indebtedness.

The Home Board is principally supported by the percentage received through its allotment from the Cooperative Program receipts.

Your committee recommends that we support Home Missions with our prayers, our sermons and our means.

operative Program.

The records show that less than half of our churches have paid any thing to any mission work since January 1, 1939.

We feel that if all our pastors would present the work of the Denomination, and how it is carried out through the Co-operative Program, to their people that most all of them would do what they could for so great a cause and as a consequence receive God's blessings for same.

The following table shows that Middle Florida Association is making some advancements:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION, PERIODICALS, AND TEMPERANCE

The question of Christian Education is one which should appeal to every member of every church capable of giving thought to the seriousness of the condition in which we find ourselves. Plato said "that education was the servant of society." In this country education under Christian auspices undertook the realization of the same idea. It was because of that fact that the pioneers out of their poverty laid by sums of money to establish institutions of learning and higher education in this, their new-found country. Our great denomination led in this in establishing many institutions of learning throughout the Southland including academies, junior and senior colleges, and seminaries. We are justly proud of our own Stetson University at DeLand with the able Dr. W. S. Allen at its head. Stetson has made greater growth in the last few years than any college in the State. Southern Baptists have three great seminaries: The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, The Southwestern Theological Seminary, and the Baptist Bible Institute. We must not neglect Christian Education in the home, the place where it rightly began,

Periodicals are the means of keeping us informed about our denominational activities and programs. Every Baptist home should have the Witness in it. Dr. E. D. Solomon is giving us one of the best papers that we have ever had. We ought to have the Commission and all missionary papers that we can get hold of for information and inspiration.

Temperance or Social Service. The liquor traffic remains our enemy number one. The liquor traffic is the enemy of labor, the community, the public school, the home, the church, and the demoralizer of character. It behooves every Baptist to do what he can to end this eternal menace. The liquor traffic is like every other sin it does not need mending but ending. It is bad enough without mending it.

We have many other forms of social evils that are grappling at the very vital of our society. Gambling with its many forms whether legalized or unlegalized. It may be called by different names such as Bolita, Cuba, Poker, Bridge, Race Track, or betting on ball games, with the many other forms but all of it carries the same deadly evil and the character is the same. The Nudist Colony and the lax-sex relation and many other forms such as vile literature sold in our news stands and the showing of nude pictures in many theatres in our State. We need Christian character to stand firmly against these evils whether they are political or non-political for surely they are the enemy of the cause of Christ.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

We extend our thanks to The First Baptist Church of Madison for their loving kindness and courtesy in entertaining this session of the Association.

That we welcome back into our fellowship the Concord Baptist Church organized in 1841 one of the pioneer churches of this section of the United States; the Church in which the Florida Baptist Convention was organized in 1854.

That we recommend to the churches the adoption of the ministers retirement plan.

That we recommend to the churches the work of our educational director, Miss Lamb, and urge that the churches avail themselves of her helpful assistance.

That, we recommend the setting up of some plan for the grouping of our rural churches under one pastor with sufficient support so that he can live on the field and give his entire time to the ministry.

That we recommend the reading THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS that our people may better understand what our denomination is doing.

That we recommend the unified budget system of finance and that the cooperative program be included in the church budget.

That we recommend that our pastors make no compromise with social evils as represented by the hell joints that line our highways, although some of their patrons names may be on our church rolls.

We recommend to our churches the work of the Florida Baptist Children's Home and that they contribute liberally to its support with both money and produce.

That we commend the church archives inventory of the Florida Historical Records Survey for the work they are doing in collecting and preserving the history of our association and its churches, and that we pledge our cooperation in this work.

We recommend the following men to be appointed to serve as active committee men on the Brotherhood of the Association for the ensuing year:

Rev. J. A. Nichols, Paul McCullers, E. B. Browning, A. H. Hutto and Carl W. Burnett.

We further recommend that our program committee give the Brotherhood of our Association a full hour on the evening of the first day in the 1940 meeting.

That we recommend to our pastors that they inform themselves and inform their people on some of the heresies which go under such names as Jehovah witnesses and holiness which names are designed the camouflage of the truth.

That we recommend that our pastors inform themselves and inform their people concerning the insidious political doctrine which is sapping the life of our American institutions and endangering, religious liberty, known as communism.

That we urge our pastors to train their people in personal evangelism.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE MIDDLE FLORIDA ASSOCIATION

At the meeting of our Association last year, 1938, the constitution was so amended that the Executive Committee is now composed of six laymen and the pastors of churches within the Association with the officers of the Association ex-officio members.

Your committee has held two meetings during the Associational year and both were well attended and the active interest and hearty cooperation of all the members have been very gratifying,

The Evangelistic Campaign was laid on the hearts of your committee by the Committee on Evangelism and a serious attempt was made to arrange a simultaneous campaign, but we found that this would not be advisable on account of the variety of crops and the different dates of harvesting. However, each pastor promised to hold a revival in his church or churches.

In order to help quicken universal interest we conducted in April an all day conference on Evangelism which was attended by delegations from twenty-nine of our churches. The Holy Spirit was manifestly present.

The reports from the churches show that there has been a deep spiritual awakening. All the churches except (3 not heard from) have held revival meetings with additions by baptism 299 and by letter 162. This is an increase over last year of 129 by baptism and 17% by letter. We thank God for these blessed results.

We recommend for the ensuing year that our pastors seek to keep the revival fires burning all through the year; that each church hold a revival meeting and that each church, led by its pastor, take a careful religious census of its territory and follow up the census with monthly visitation. This census should be taken this fall.

At the first meeting of your Committee last November it was agreed to seek to secure a well trained woman as Young People's Educational Director for our Association. The special committee appointed, to-wit: E. B. Browning, J. A. Nichols, Carl Burnette, O. A. Henderson and J. L. White, after prayerful consideration employed Miss Freita Lamb, at a salary of forty dollars per month and room which costs six dollars per month. She entered upon her work the first day of April, 1939.

Miss Lamb is well prepared for this work by training and experience and her service has been eminently satisfactory. In 20 churches she has conducted training classes in Sunday Schools, B. T. U.'s, W. M. U., conducted three Daily Vacation Bible Schools, and assisted in revivals, (in twenty churches) visiting some of the churches twice, reaching in her training classes more than 500 young people and has witnessed 111 professions of faith. Perhaps of greatest value is the fact that Miss Lamb is calling out many of our young people to be leaders in their churches upon whose shoulders must rest the responsibility of carrying on the kingdom work.

The Committee on Educational Director was authorized by your Executive Committee to request each church to take the responsibility of a definite amount, sufficient to meet Miss Lamb's salary. Nearly all of the churches heartily and joyfully respond and her salary has been met to date. Dr. W. W. William appropriated \$60.00 toward Miss Lamb's salary for which we thank Dr. William and his Department.

The Executive Committee recommends: First, that the Association approve the action of the Executive Committee in employing Miss Lamb and that her services be continued for the ensuing Associational year. Second, that the churches at this time pledge a definite amount toward the salary of Miss Lamb and that said amount be sent in promptly each month to our treasurer, O. A. Henderson, Lee, Florida.

Your committee realizes the profound need of greater emphasis being laid upon our Cooperative Program and that our pastors should more diligently teach missions—State, Home and Foreign—and urge our members not only to give regularly to the Cooperative Program but to make free-will offerings in keeping with the request of the Southern Baptist Convention and our State Convention.

We earnestly recommend the plan of the Every Member Canvass which should be taken annually. The Every Member Canvass Committee should visit all the members and talk and pray with them about the duty and privilege of giving to the church and all denominational objects. It will be a fine aid to distribute tracts on missions and without fail seek to place the Florida Baptist Witness in each home. One who does not read his denominational paper cannot be informed about Baptist affairs and, therefore, will not be interested in denominational enterprises. Our people need to be informed on the work of Baptists in Florida and there is no medium of information except our Baptist paper.

The Middle Florida Association presents the problem of the rural church. There are only four full time churches, namely, Perry, Foley, Greenville and Madison. There are nine half-time and twenty-three that have preaching once a month.

There are larger areas of untouched territory. The churches have not been able to cultivate these unoccupied sections.

We wish to call especial attention to Cherry Lake, eight miles north of Madison. This is a reservation of approximately 20,000 acres of farming land. The corporation under the advice of the Government has divided this into small farms in order to induce families to return to the farm. There are in Cherry Lake some 275 families—all small farmers, with 205 boys and girls in the public school. It is the fifth largest school in Madison county.

There are two churches, a Methodist and a Baptist, to minister to those households. Our Baptist Church is weak, but full of faith and courage. Brother Henry Langford, a student of Norman College, is the pastor. The church must have financial aid in order to carry on successfully. We call the attention of Baptists to the importance of this needy field. It is real missionary work. There are other needy fields for which we should pray and seek to aid.

We thank God for His wonderful blessings upon pastors and churches and give to Him all the glory, and beseech Him for the enduement of the Holy Spirit that we may carry on to greater achievements.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL SURVEY COMMITTEE

This committee was appointed early in the year by The Associational Executive Committee and charged with the following duties:

- 1. Prepare a map of the association showing roads, location of churches and other data.
- 2. Make a study of the needs of the association and prepare a written report of such needs to be presented to the association along with the report of The Executive Committee.

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Associational Map

Rev. Bob Catledge, the only member of this committee having technical training relative to map preparation and upon whom the committee relied for this service, was unable to perform this task by reason of his necessary absence from the association. We recommend that this, or a like committee, be requested to have a satisfactory map prepared, prior to next association, copies of which may be secured by the churches and interested individuals.

Survey Report

In presenting this aspect of our work, the Committee wishes to tender grateful thanks to Rev. J. A. Nichols for the use of a very valuable report of a survey on evangelism compiled by him. The Committee found this report most helpful and we commend Brother Nichols for his constructive work.

Our report of needs, due to the necessary limitations of space and time, will naturally have to be in briefest outline. Our study and prayerful consideration lead us to feel that the following are among the challenging needs of our association:

1. Your Committee feels that there should be renewed emphasis on the development of our rural churches. Special effort should be made to foster Christian Education through means of study courses, distribution of tracts, establishment of libraries, cir-

culation of periodicals, and an informative and inspiring operation of every phase of the regular church activities. The Word of God should occupy the place of centrality in this educational undertaking.

It is obvious that this educational program, while involving the entire membership of the churches, should center on our young people. It is among this group that the largest potentialities lie. In this connection, we wish to commend the work of our Associational Young Peoples Worker and recommend her continuance. We are deeply appreciative of the assistance rendered our Association by the various departments of our State Board and we urge that our needs be faithfully kept before our State organizations in the future.

We visualize the need for better housing facilities for God's work. A good church edifice, designed in relation to the purposes sought to be achieved, well equipped and tastefully beautified both as to the interior and surrounding grounds, becomes a rallying point for effective church life. One of the finest legacies a congregation can leave to those who will come after them is a place of worship and service of such nature or the inspiration to have such for the Master's cause.

Longer pastorates is a worthy objective. We urge greater care and deliberation, under God's leadership, in the selection of pastors and the displacement of the annual call with arrangements whereby the pastors will have time to set up objectives and work to bring them to pass. This will naturally affect for good the pastor and the church.

- 2. It is the conviction of this committee that there is a widespread need for scriptural indoctrination of our people. The winds of loose and perversive doctrine blow on every hand. The monumental record of service of our denomination in the past must not be endangered. We decry the status of church discipline and recommend that it be given a scriptural restoration in our churches.
- 3. We recognize the need for building up the social side of our church life. We feel that our churches should literally be permeated with a spirit of friendliness and fellowship from the pulpit to the pew. We have no disposition to evade the basic consideration that our young people, and our entire membership, must have recreation and be taught the wise use of leisure time. We further feel that unless the church people provide this necessary means of self-expression and training that The World is bidding for them with all of Satan's allurements. If we are to maintain faithful stewardship and account for our opportunities we must take thought of these vital matters.
- 4. There is a crying need for humility in every phase of our church life and in our relation to our fellows. In an age which has magnified the creative power of man, we need to realize that above all and over all, keeping watch over the centuries, is the allwise, all-powerful Creator. Let every agency claiming divine sanction, every person covered by the blood of Jesus Christ, do their part to engender a spirit of humility before the most high God. May we up-build our spiritual breast-works to the defeat of every satanic influence of a modern age.

- 5. By way of emphasizing the report of Committee on Temperance, we wish to point out the need for teaching temperance in every manifestation of church effort both by precept and example. We would like to go one step further and state that our entire constituency should exercise the full power of Christian citizenship in having put before the youth of this state enrolled in the public schools a vitalized, functioning course in temperance. This is a basic responsibility of those who take thought of the future. We may guard the bridge against destructive influences and strengthen our institutions if we send out from our public schools young men and young women to places of service and leadership who, by precept and example, are evangels of a new order of temperance, sobriety and cleanliness.
- 6. In conclusion, we wish to point out the need for capitalizing on the influence of Christian character. This carries with it the suggestion that we awake to a renewed responsibility of living consistent Christian lives. No sermon is so eloquent of the saving grace of Jesus Christ as the life of a dutiful and earnest follower of Him who spared not his own Son. The tide of conquering evangelism must follow in the wake of those who are living for Jesus, those who are living testimonials to the saving and keeping power of The Master.

S. S., B. Y. P. U. AND EVANGELISM EVANGELISM IN SUNDAY SCHOOL

We believe that each church should have a Sunday School. In fact, it is questionable as to whether or not a church can be classed as a New Testament Church, if it does not have a Sunday School. In our Association we have 11 Training Unions with an enrollment of 481. In the Southern Baptist Convention we have over 800,000 enrolled in the Training Unions.

With all of our glorious achievements we face a tremendous problem. On every hand we see churches having additions, but in so many cases these new Converts are not being enlisted in any form of service.

Please do your best to encourage every church in your Assoriation to make plans to conserve all the new additions to the churches and this can be done by having a vigorous Training Proram going on all the time.

Write for other information and we will be glad to supply it.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

If we will use the Sunday School it can and will be of great importance to our churches.

Often we think of the Sunday School as our teaching agency. This is true as far as it goes, but it should mean much more. Our Sunday School should function as an employment agency, giving church members a place of service; as an outreaching agency, reaching all who are not affiliated with a church; as a soul-winning agency, winning the LOST to OUR CHRIST.

Our Spinday School should function in these and many other ways. Our Sunday Schools should help us live the abundant life.

This year we have one new Sunday School, 15 teacher training classes, 138 teacher training awards, 3 Vacation Bible Schools. The digest of letters of this Association reports 26 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 2430.

We are reminded by the Holy Scriptures that we are to care for one another. The early Christians assisted each other when in need or distress. The example they set and the teachings of our Lord call to our attention in a most forceful way the importance of caring for the dependent children of our denominational household.

Our Children's Home puts forth a determined effort to give every child who is admitted definite help in the truest sense of the word. They are taught to work; they are sent to school; and they are given social privileges just as all normal children should have.

The work of the girls at the Home enables them to know a great deal about cooking, housekeeping, laundry work; office work, library work, and planning and serving meals. The boys also from their work on the campus learn the essentials in farming, dairying and caring for live stock; and how to operate the steam laundry The training they get in the printing department, makes it possible for them, if they are interested, to follow this as a vocation.

The equipment for this work must be constantly repaired; and this is done from the income from soap coupons sent to them from the W. M. U.'s and other organizations in the State. New fixtures are also bought from this coupon account. They have bought a mixing machine for the bakery this year, and they hope to get enough money from this account this winter to renew some much

worn equipment.

The children attend the city schools in Arcadia; and for those who are capable of continuing their education above high school accomplishments, the Student Loan Fund has been established. The successes of the children who have taken advantage of this loan fund have been very gratifying. We feel that this is a splendid service to render to any child who has an active, capable mentality, and personality, to fit themselves for jobs that require higher education and more definite training.

The children from the Home attend the Sunday School, the B. T. U. and preaching services at the First Baptist Church in Arcadia. Twenty-two of them united with this church this year.

The outstanding need of the Home is for more general support. The 155 children enrolled could be increased by at least twenty if the funds were available. They need to employ another house mother to assist with the Junior and Senior girls. Two matrons are caring for sixty-eight girls. This is entirely too many children for two workers, and nothing can be done about this overcrowding in dormitories unless we help them.

Your Committee wishes to recommend to the churches of this Association that they give prayerful consideration to the needs of our children, and lend the necessary aid that they may be helped in making useful men and women.

The children that our Home has taken over in Arcadia, are our children and our responsibility. We are able to take care of these children as they should be taken care of, and it is our duty to take care of them as though they were our children. When we take them into our Home, we have at that time, accepted the responsibility of raising those children as we would our own.

The Baptist denomination is able to take care of these children and raise them as they should be raised, and give them such advantages as a boy or girl should have. If each individual belonging to the Baptist Church would recognize and accept this responsibility as he should, we would have no trouble in providing for those orphan children that we have accepted the responsibility of their raising and training.

This Association, has in the past, done a fine job toward helping provide for these children, and we recommend that the Moderator of the Association appoint a committee to go around and take up collections of farm products, or anything that could be used in the Home in Arcadia. All that is necessary is for someone to go around and solicit this help, the people will respond to the cause, for it is a worthy one. They will, in most cases, respond very liberal.

Trusting that this will be done, and carried out in a greater way than ever before.
