ARTICLES OF FAITH

I, The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualfied to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation

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of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain to moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XI Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cared for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII, A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified,

buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and the wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spititual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of right-eousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI. Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church

of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

The Kingdom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of Gon on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Chirst. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed

and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

of

THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MIDDLE FLORIDA MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the Churches affiliated with this body who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches.

Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof.

Article 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be selected by the body. If it should become necessary, the Executive Committee of the Association may change the time, or place of meeting, or both.

Article 6. Any church, in harmony with this Association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the union upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

Article 7. Any church wishing for a letter of dismission shall make application therefor by letter.

Article 8. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an assistant Moderator, who shall be a layman or Pastor who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the suffrage of the messengers elected by the Churches, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article 9. This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of a lay member from each Church and the Pastors of each Church belonging to this Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational B.T.U. Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union President, the Associational Brotherhood President, together with the officers as ex officio members. This committee shall foster all the interests of the Association when the body is not in session. The committee shall have authority to appoint or recommend to the State Board Missionaries, or colporteurs, and to make appropriation to weak churches or destitutions, and to give such advice to the churches as may seem wise and necessary, and the Moderator shall be chairman of the Executive Committee.

Article 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which are adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis, Tennessee, in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

Article 11. The Association shall recognize and respect the rights and independence of every church cooperating.

Article 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee held five meetings during the year. At all these meetings reports were heard from the heads of each department of work: Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Sunday School and Brotherhood.

At the January meeting a motion was made and carried to invite Rev. James A. Sawyer to hold Association-wide revival as Rev. Charles Howard was ill and could not hold meeting.

A motion was made and carried at March meeting to have the Evangelism Clinic at Madison First Church with dinner at McNeil's Restaurant February 9, 1965.

Rev. Julian Maddox reported that the School of Missions was a great success as to artendance and finance.

In the July meeting it was voted to have a Pastor's Instruction Clinic at Greenville Sunday November 17 and a rally at Macedonia Monday, November 18, for the Sunday School Witnessing Campaign and also agreed to accept John Whit as director and to pay \$30.00 as our share of the expenses, this to be paid by January 1, 1964.

At the September meeting Bro. W.T. Coody announced Brotherhood meeting at Greenville, October 3 and Rev. Alva Horton announced that the School of Prophets at Middle Florida Assembly Grounds October 10 and 11, 1963, adopted recommended dates for 1964 Association meeting which were October 15 and 16, adopted recommendation of the Budget Planning Committee.

We agreed to participate in the Baptist Jubilee simultaneous revival in 1964, dates March 8-22. Adopted proposed budget for the Association, with an addition of \$25.00 for W.M.U. A motion was made and carried to use \$50.00 of the Miscellaneous Fund for expenses of the Jubilee Revivals. All of this of course subject to action of the Association.

REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM 1963

God gave Southern Baptists the Cooperative Program as a channel through which we can support the causes of missions at home and abroad. Through this channel every member of a Baptist Church and every Baptist Church affiliated with the South-

ern Baptist Convention, regardless of the size of the gift, can be assured of having a part in the ministry of teaching, healing, and witnessing.

The Stewardship Commission has developed three programs that are of great value to our churches. These programs are: (1) The Forward Program of Christian Stewardship, (2) Growth in Christian Stewardship, and (3) Year-round Stewardship Development (This will be available early in 1964).

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. We recommend that our churches focus attention upon world missions by observing October as Cooperative Program Month. Churches can use Wednesday prayer services as an opportunity to pray for world missions needs.
- 2. We recommend that every church put the Cooperative Program in the church budget on the percentage plan.
- 3. We recommend that each church send the gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program at the end of each month or at the end of each quarter.
- 4. We recommend that we not only claim to be Missionary Baptists, but that we practice what we preach by supporting missions through the Cooperative Program.

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Baptist hospitals are concrete demonstrations of a Christian response to human need. They came into being as a result of the teaching and example of Jesus, the Great Physician. They are channels of communicating the Gospel to the sick and troubled, and to their anxious families and friends. They are evidence of Baptist concern to experiences of disease, disability and death.

At this time, there are 48 Baptist hospitals located from Miami, Florida, to Yuma, Arizona, and from Kansas City, Missouri, to San Antonio, Texas. Most of these are owned and operated by State Conventions of Southern Baptists. The ownership of some is in the hands of local associations. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, are owned by all Southern Baptists and operated in their behalf by a Southern Baptist Convention Agency.

During the year covered by this report, the Convention's hospitals operated at near-capacity. The combined total of 800 beds were occupied by 35,953 patients. An average of 97 new patients were admitted each day.

More than 1500 individuals received part-pay care in the two institutions during the year. Cared for without charge by staff physicians, these people were encouraged to pay hospital costs as they were able, and they did so. Still, the net cost of this program amounted to \$429,570. The allocation of \$25,000, from the convention Cooperative Budget was applied fully to these costs, leaving a balance of over \$400,000, to be supplied from other sources, mainly operating income of the hospital.

On the larger scene, all Baptist hospitals reported charity services totaling in excess of six million dollars during 1962. To meet these needs, all Southern Baptists supplied their hospitals with slightly more than one million dollars. It becomes obvious that Baptists should do more through their Cooperative Program giving or through their Mother's Day Offerings where these are taken.

REPORT OF THE ANNUITY BOARD

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death.

If the member dies a natural death before age 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate equal to the average salary on which dues were paid. If he dies because of an accident, the cash settlement will be double the average salary.

There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the Protection Plan.

The benefit is easy to figure. Suppose a member dies at age 32 of natural causes, and the average salary on which he had paid dues in the Protection Plan was \$3,550. His widow or estate would get a cash settlement of \$3,550, plus the regular widow benefits. If he is killed accidentally, his widow or estate would receive twice this amount, \$7,100, plus regular benefits.

BENEFITS PAID

More than \$41 million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year these benefits totaled more than \$3 million, and were paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

MEMBERSHIP IN RETIREMENT PLANS

As of April 1, 1963, there were 15,964, or 49% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board Retirement Plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's Retirement Plans is approximately 25,000.

FIELD REPRESENTATIVES

The Annuity Board Field Representative for Florida is Phil Maxwell. He promotes the Board's Retirement Plans, trying to enlist all those pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in Florida. He also conducts a program of education, helping those who are in the plans to know more about the provisions they have for the future, and advising them if they should seek additional protection through a supplemental plan with the Board.

REPORT ON "THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION"

Radio and Television have been given to the Church as a powerful tool of mass communication-media through which the saving Gospel can be brought into the hearts of great numbers of people over vast areas.

For the first time in history of the world as we know it, it is possible to reach virtually every person with the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ. In our own country there are 49,800,000 television homes (nearly 91 per cent of all homes). There are 51,690,00 radio homes (nearly 94 per cent of all homes).

Special program production for all three networks, both radio and television, is at an all time high this year. For instance, four half-hour programs for NBC-TV have been allotted Southern Baptists through the Commission from September 1 to December 29 this year. CBS-TV has scheduled three television programs for the denomination. ABC-TV has already produced two.


In the area of radio there was a net gain of 244 stations carrying Southern Baptist programs in 1962 for the greatest annual increase and the highest station total in the Commission's history.

The Commission currently services a total of 1220 radio and TV stations weekly (plus 205 Armed Forces Network radio outlets) with a dozen different weekly radio programs and a weekly television series.

Quarter-hour programs for radio are: International Sunday School Lessons, 79; Chapel Upstairs, 21; Music To Remember, 12; Control Central, 22; Chinese Baptist Hour, 1; Mississippi Baptist Record, 12; "Momentos De Meditacion," 1. Oklahoma Baptist News on five stations is a five-minute program produced by the Commission for the state convention.

The Commission's constant effort is to meet the needs of stations and to provide new and different religious programming. By doing so, Southern Baptists' agency for radio and television is able to get its figurative foot in the door. Following the initial programming in an area, there is often an opportunity to add another program. An evangelistic program such as "The Baptist Hour" is always pushed into the opening, or "La Hora Bautista" for Spanish speaking areas.

An up-to-date accounting of the annual value of the time given Commission produced Southern Baptist programs throughout the nation shows it comes to the



astounding figure of \$3,701,988. This does not include the 93 stations overseas which receive our programs.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

STATE MISSIONS

The task of State Missions in Florida is particularly challenging. Our state is the fastest growing of any in the Southern Baptist Convention. If Florida Baptists are to meet this pattern of almost explosive growth, we are called to some very definite commitments. The first of these is to get the facts and to project plans on the basis of needs. Where do we need new churches? In what ways do our church programs need revamping to meet the crying demands of the hour? Whatever gets our attention gets our motivation and action. We are called to an honest and intelligent facing of the problem.

This new appraisal, if it comes at all, must come from the Leadership of the pastors and church officials. This means, the down to earth plans, to study these problems in our Brotherhood Programs, in The Baptist Training Unions, in the Sunday Schools, among our deacons, at pastors' conferences—on both church and associational levels. It means for the entire church to adopt and follow an intensified program of learning about God's work such as has been carried on by The Woman's Missionary Program for years and years. It certainly means an open-door policy toward all our district and state personnel.

One very wonderful man was asked the secret of his great success in life. He replied "For one thing I have never allowed my life's program to be based on old assumptions." It is very easy to get an assorted number of ideas and go riding through life with them. Will having a mission church hurt the progress of the mother church? Experience has shown, on the contrary, that a mission church is life-blood to the mother church.

Remember we are committed to the establishment of 190 new missions in Florida during 1964. The New Work Revolving Fund is available to get these churches on an operating basis. Must all of the mission churches be in South Florida and the other points of over-flowing population? May He whose tiding we bear guide us in these critical times to keep step with the program of State Missions.

HOME MISSIONS

Likewise, as in State Missions, we need a new look at all aspects of our Home Mission Program. This includes first-hand knowledge, based on careful study, of the establishment of new churches and missions; the relief program, resettlement of the Cuban in-flow, our chaplains in the military services, the survey section, our workers in city and rural missions--numbering 2100; the grand work of our associational missionaries, our ministry to migrant workers, THE HOME MISSION MAGAZINE, and THE COMMISSION.

Quite obviously, it is far beyond the scope of this report to discuss these items. It may be that such discussion is not even desirable. The facts on these and related aspects of Home Missions need literally to be "dug out" by individuals as they study alone or meet in study groups. Again we need to utilize all parts of our church to master this program in its broad ministry. It goes without saying that every pulpit in our association should literally glow with information and inspiration for this program.

But, when we get right down to brass tacks, the age old question arises: "Just how much do we care?" Do we care enough to study and promote the program? Do

we care enough to enliven a few deacons' meetings with the basic aspects of this program? Will our Brotherhoods do some honest "digging" along with the chicken and pie? Could our interest reach high enough to have some discussion for our young people? On the answer to these questions and on our prayers, this program will advance in the months to come.

In concluding this section, it is of pressing importance that we should stress again the necessity of developing good stewards in our churches. The program requires money. We have a plan that is surely under God's blessing. That is our Cooperative Program. Let us pray mightily for manning the bastions of real stewardship in all our churches. The Master has said, "I am the light of the world." Let us hold Him up in our support of Home Missions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The basic concepts of the two preceding sections: study the program, plan the work, and then work the plan, are no less pertinent to this presentation on Foreign Missions. Certainly, we need, like Isaiah of old, to see the Lord lifted up in all his glory. It is felt that there is no special need for listing the topics that require study. Actually, we need to major on strengthening our convictions about giving the Gospel to people in faraway places.

Some things are on the current scene that, it is felt, are actually detracting from our interest in the missionary enterprise. One of these is the frightening difficulty of the task as we look upon a world ever-shadowed by the communistic menace. The distorted minds of the communists have made Godliness their religion and are offering it to the hungry hearts of man. The progress they have made in deluding millions of people has been keenly shocking, to Christian people. It is feared that we have suffered some less of optimism and resolve by reason of this lamentable situation. Let us recall that only God has the answer to final analysis. The call is to renewed dedication, renewed faith, renewed action programs.

The other thing that appears to be a hindrance in many instances is the fact that our government is pouring untold billions of dollars into foreign aid. We tend to get the idea that "We are already doing too much for them." That is dangerous thinking. Man cannot live by bread alone. Our government can never take our task of carrying Christ to these needy people. Governmental aid saves the bodies. Only Christ can save the souls of man. Let us take a prayerful and honest look at the entire problem.

Christ was never needed more in all the ages. More and more the world will move toward readiness for his blessed salvation, as the remedies of man run their course. We urge a joining of hearts and hands for the solemn task, the urgent task, the blessed task.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention, has had another great year of service. During the first nine months of the year, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation. In the years to come, money received from these wills will greatly help all these institutions.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting men and women in preparing wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trust funds, and establishing endowments. At this time annuity contracts are not written by the Foundation, but are referred to the Home Mission Board, the Foreign Mission Board, or the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is hoped that in the near future it will be possible to enter this field.

The audit of September 30, 1962, shows \$792,204.83 held by the Foundation, compared to \$730,012.21 held at the same time the previous year. None of this

money is owned by the Foundation, but it is held as specified by the trust or will covering the particular fund. No part of these funds can be spent except as specified in the agreement.

Partial settlement of one large estate has been received, and final settlement is expected soon. The part received by Baptist causes will amount to more than

\$80,000.00.

Professional guidance is available to the Foundation in the field of investments. The Trust Department of the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, makes suggestions as to investments, which are voted on by the Investment Committee of the Foundation before investments are made. Remarkable progress has been made in the investment field, and earnings are considered good.

The Foundation operates under the direction of fifteen of the best qualified and finest Baptist laymen, and one pastor. These trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies. An Executive Committee is elected from the trustees, and serves in operational matters. These trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all

meetings.

Your Secretary expresses appreciation to the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, and to all convention employees for their helpful cooperation. He also expresses his appreciation for opportunities to discuss the work of the Foundation in various associational meetings. He has worked with the Sunday School Department, the Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Woman's Missionary Union, and in Schools of Missions this year in getting across the message of the place of the Foundation in Baptist life.

Help is given in writing wills and establishing trusts. Calls come every week from every part of the state in this connection. Again during the first nine months of this associational year, wills amounting to far more than a million dollars for

Baptist causes have been prepared.

Your Secretary is eager to serve you when and where possible.

Let us strengthen our institutions, guide our Baptist Young People to attend our Baptist schools and undergird the administrations, faculties and student bodies with a spirit of love and constant prayer.

REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us...it seemed good to me also... to write...that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

These same words seem an appropriate background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist literature that has become vitally important to our Christian living and to our churches and denomination. Not only do these publications seek to instruct us more perfectly in our faith and doctrines, but they become a vital stream of valuable information about the religious and moral trends in our swiftly changing world. These same publications become tools of evangelism, missions and stewardship, both in the churches and in the missions established by them.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, (as of August 1, 1963) is going into 65,189 homes in 895 different churches, with 759 of these churches using the budget plan for at least a portion of their membership. An increasing number are sending the paper to every resident family. One hundred thirty-six other churches have small clubs of subscriptions. Some thirty to thirty-five thousand Baptist homes in Florida, however, are not yet receiving the paper. There are also still 432 Florida Baptist Churches which are saving a little and losing a lot by failing to take advantage of the most economical medium of information which they can possibly provide their members, a subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

We would urge every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its

homes to enlarge its subscription list to include every resident family, and every church which does not now have the WITNESS in its church budget to promptly consider sending the paper into the homes of all its members. In spite of all the increases in production costs during recent years, the paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year, which may be paid in installments of only 10¢ per month for each family on a church's subscription list.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Distinct services are rendered to needy families of Florida, by our Baptist Children's Home. 436 children were assisted in the past year. Iakeland and Miami homes enrol 190, while 52 homes receive Mother's aid, and four are in foster home care. 740 children, and 439 parents and / or relatives were interviewed by caseworkers. They made 31 visits to those receiving Mother's Aid and 15 visits to homes of discharged children.

The most satisfactory and successful method of child care is Mother's Aid. Children remain at home with their mother and are given financial assistance, while Caseworkers visit the homes quarterly and counsel with mother and children.

Assistance of this kind depends upon the parents cooperation with the policies of the Home, requiring children to attend and become a part of the local church. Qualified children must attend public school.

Children who need more than personal attention, available in group living in the Home are placed in foster homes where they get Christian training. These foster Homes, both Lakeland and Miami are under Children's Home Supervision.

Children under supervision are principally from homes broken by illness, with lack of ability of the parent to carry on the responsibilities of family life. Divorce and desertion contribute to non-support in many homes. If rehabilitation can be achieved, or parents become able to assume family responsibilities, children are reunited, being supervised as long as workers feel it necessary.

The W. M. S. and Missionary Circles, Sunday Schools and Training Unions provide some aid in giving spending money, clothing and other personal needs. This is an excellent way to foster and maintain interest between members of the churches and the Home. Interest in the child is as important to those who give as the child himself. This teaches others are interested and desire to help him. Our children learn best by personal relationship with Christian adults, and those who give are enriched even more than the children.
