REPORT OF SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS OF (NEW ORLEANS & JACKSONVILLE FLA.)

STATEMENT OF OUTLOOK - Southern Baptist Hospitals, Inc. has mixed emotions in presenting its last Annual report, as an Agency, of Southern Baptist Convention. Its Hospitals are committed to serve mankind in a Baptist Oriented Christian Ministry. Its forty-five years history of health care service speaks for itself. This Corporation looks forward to a continued ministry of health care services as opportunity opens its doors, in the same Christian atmosphere as prevailed before. If the service or counsel of those of these Hospitals, actively engaged in day to day hospital service is needed by SBC Agencies, they await a call.

DEVELOPMENT AND EXPANSION OF HOSPITAL FACILITIES - Statements such as these were not heard in Hospitals a few years ago, but are common today. Computerization service, coronary and medical intensive care unit, Rehabilitation Medicine

Department, and Radiation Therapy and Treatment Center. A Hospital that does not have these services in the latest facilities and trained personnel, is not the hospital that is selected by Doctors and patients for service.

New Orleans - is looking at other projects for Development and Expansion. An extended Clinic Service is anticipated; a Branch Hospital on the West Bank of the Mississippi River.

JACKSONVILLE - Its Development and Expansion program was caught in the tremendous upsurge of construction cost in every area including interest rates. Å Mortage Loan sufficient to complete the present expansion program with a price tag of over \$30,000,000.00 has been secured from the Western and Southern Life Insurance Company. Construction is well on its way. There is a Medical Linear Accelerator in development reported to score 80 to 90 percent success in the treatment of Hodgins Disease, a cancer of the lymph system which takes the life of about 3,3000 Americans annually. The Linear Accelerator is often called an atom-smasher. With coming about of such improved equipment there must also be coming trained personnel to operate it.

MEDICARE - The net cost or loss in Medicare forced upon these hospitals by the Governments IS NOT CONSIDERED CHARITY, but, is included in the program of routine patient care. During the fiscal year the two hospitals discounted bills of Medicare patients which resulted in the cost of \$708,557. In addition, discounts to other Governmental agencies amounted to \$37,068. There were patients served in the outpatient clinics and also in the inpatient service resulting in a cost to the Hospitals of Charity Free Service for the current fiscal year of \$754,501. In addition to the above charity free costs to the Hospitals, Physicians on the Medical Staff rendered Medical Charity Free service to those patients valued at more than \$325,000. The cost of the Education Program for the year was \$947,889. At the Convention of SBC in 1970 the Hospitals were released, not upon their request, but with their agreement. The Hospitals have never received Tax funds as a Loan or Grant. At the same time a new Corporation was approved by SBC to continue the Hospital Agency until the Convention meeting this year. A final vote on dissolving the agency will be taken at the Convention in St. Louis.

Sessions were held morning, afternoon, and evening for three days, with enrolment of 75, and six professed faith in Christ. Pastor and people were pleased, and may repeat this next year. Total professions for year (based on incomplete reports) was approximately 45.

You will be glad to know that our new "Dave Alderman Memorial Chapel" seating nearly 300, of red brick and cedar construction, was built, finished and paid for in 18 months, at cost of \$16,000. We have a new low bid of \$1,600 (1,600) for chapel airconditioning, with nearly half enough in hand for this. If each Association would budget a hundred dollars, we could have it very soon. Another recent improvement is a new well, 80 feet deep, near the chapel, with excellent, clear water. This will be welcome news to our campers, some who disliked the "sulfur" taste of the old supply. This was donated by Delmer and Minnie Sapp, who live next to the assembly, and gave the 14 acre lakefront tract as site of the Assembly, between Branford and Mayo, just off U.S. Highway 27. Having no children of their own, they just keep giving and giving for the Assembly of their time and means. Mr. Sapp made a worthwhile suggestion to us recently that our pastors mention to your people that instead of funeral flowers, why not indicate that gifts to the Assembly as a Memorial be made. Pastors, help us spread the word. This is a worthy cause. We were informed recently that the Assembly has been named as beneficiary in a will by an anonymous friend, after decease. We have had a good year financially. All bills are paid to date with BALANCE in Gen. fund of \$1441.44, and in Bldg. Fund, 229.46. It has been a joy to serve as your Assembly Treasurer but feel best to resign since we are now pastor of First Church, Micanopy, over 60 miles distant. You may contact us about reservation or send gifts to us until notified of change. Thank you for your past co-operation and help.

COLLEGES AND SEMINARIES

Forty-three senior Baptist colleges and universities in sixteen states and thirteen junior colleges in seven states have rendered the various traditional services to our denomination and to our people. In addition these institutions have been given strong moral leadership in a time of moral decline. They have refused to allow radical minorities, either in the student body or faculty, to take over or disrupt the orderly process of instruction. These colleges depend upon their financial support from enrolments, state conventions, donations, gifts, grants, and endowment.

The six Southern Baptist Seminaries are experiencing increase in enrolments. Most of these have recently engaged in a self-study required periodically by the accreditating agencies. Intensified restudy of curriculum and innovative teaching methods have marked the entrance into the seventies. All changes are to show dedication of the seminaries to the Convention's objective, "to provide theological education, with the Bible as a center of the curriculum, for God-called men and women to meet the needs for trained leadership in the work of the churches."

Serious study is being given in all six seminaries to the possibility of simultaneously initiating a Doctor of Ministry degree commencing at the earliest feasible date. Southern Seminary has announced its date of September 1972. Also serious study is being given by all seminaries to the professional doctorate.

The Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Convention continues to be the major support of our seminaries.

Continuing education of ministers is a crucial function of the denomination. Less than one half of all Southern Baptist Convention pastors have had seminary training. Approximately 6,000 have had no college training. Constant change in society makes it imperative for seminary trained people to continue their training if they expect to minister effectively to their people.

The Seminary Extension Department, an outreach of the six seminaries, seeks to provide continuing training opportunities for pastors and other key church and denominational leaders by offering training in some two hundred extension centers located strategically throughout the United States and through its school of correspondence.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

This year has been a significant one. The Board of Trustees employed the services of the University of North Carolina Child Care Consultants to study the work of the Children's Home in three aspects - Program, Finances and Facilities. At this writing the study is well under way with the time schedule calling for completion by the end of this calendar year. Our Board of Trustees has worked with a committee from the State Board of Missions on this matter. We expect to come from this study suggestions that will give direction toward the type of child care ministry that could most effectively be employed by the Florida Baptist Convention and the Florida Baptist Children's Home.

We have continued to operate our three major programs - Institutional Care. Foster Home and Financial Aid. Because of our lack of financial resources we have diminished somewhat our financial aid help, but have maintained our Foster Home Program at the same level. In addition to these services we have begun to operate a counselling service on a sliding fee scale which helps to underwrite the cost of this service. The counselling service is for referrals from our Baptist ministers and churches only. Through this service we have reached 13 adults on an individual basis plus 8 marital counselling cases and 7 individual children. There have been approximately 300 interviews by our counsellor for this service. In addition to these there have been 55 consultative sessions by the counsellor to our Social Work staff.

This year we received 195 applications, 33 children were admitted. We have rendered financial assistance to 12 children in their own families and we have ministered to 16 children in foster homes. There were 31 children discharged from our care. There were over 2,000 interviews by our social workers with children, families and staff.

The financial resources for operating funds at the Children's Home continues to be a source of concern with the rise in the cost of child care. The opportunities available for this kind of ministry are many, but additional operating funds are needed. Careful consideration is to be given to the matter of fund development over the next year.

ANNUITY REPORT

As prices of goods increased and the value of the dollar decreased in 1970, a large number of Baptist pastors, church staff members and denominational employes moved to provide greater protection in the years ahead for themselves and their families. Most of these persons did so by increasing their Southern Baptist Protection Program participation to at least ten percent of total salary.

While members upgraded, the Annuity Board was introducing Good Experience Credit. This gives Protection Program members benefits over and above the amounts set forth in their certificates.

Increased benefits are made possible by interest earnings in excess of the Protection Program's initial actuarial assumptions. Since January 1, 1970, active members received Good Experience Credit in the form of increases in retirement credits accused.

Retired persons also get Good Experience Credit, Persons receiving benefits other than education, variable or fixed period are getting four per cent more income each month.

Each retired person, or widow, also received a "13th Check" for 1970 amounting to 8.33 percent of his annual benefit. It was the fifth consecutive year the "13th Check" had been given and amounted to \$424,594.

In its 53 year history, the Annuity Board has paid benefits amounting to \$82.1 million; \$8.4 million was aid in benefits during 1970.

An Annuity Board protection program is available to cover all the needs of a pastor, church staff member or denominational employe. Many churches help by paying the dues in retirement and life and health insurance plans. HOME MISSIONS REPORT

MISSIONARIES NUMBER 2,222

At the close of 1970, there were 2,222 home missionaries which is thirteen less than 1969. This reduction was caused by the rising cost of living and a slowdown in giving. Executive Secretary Arthur B. Rutledge said, "This meant some mission opportunities could not be taken, particularly in the newer areas of the Convention. Reports from the field tell of many exciting and fruitful accomplishments."

EVANGELISM DEVELOPS LAY MATERIALS

A training plan was put into operation for lay evangelism, including materials, spiritual preparation, and training which prepares laymen in sharing their faith. Many key cities will have training in lay witnessing in 1971.

942 CHAPLAINS SERVE

Southern Baptist ministers served as chaplains in the military, hospitals, institutions, and industry. There were 617 on active duty with the military and 325 in other positions, in addition to 701 part-time chaplains. These ministers reported 11,086 professions of faith and 850 units of work started, such as new worship services, Bible Classes or Sunday Schools.

NEW CHURCHES STARTED

About 350 new churches and church-type missions were established in 1970. Concerns for staring new work have been incorporated into SBC planning processes for the future.

"Extend Now," a method for starting new churches, is being promoted to make use of small group Bible study, community events, and scheduling of regular meetings. The plans will aid in ministering, witnessing, and starting new churches. COMMUNITY MINISTRIES

The Home Mission Board objective is used in this ministry program. Bringing men to God through Jesus Christwas practiced as workers reported 3,126 professions of faith. During the year, thirty-five new works were started among disadvantaged people in fifteen cities, and five hundred churches and Baptist centers were assisted in the development of church community weekday ministries.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The "Cooperative Program Travel Guide" was produced and distributed by the Home Mission Board to state and Southern Baptist Convention leaders. Concern and information were emphasized for people who wanted to visit these mission places, most of which are supported through the Cooperative Program. SCRIPTURES

Missionaries reported people saved and led to use the Word of God to Witness because of extensive distribution project in cooperation with the American Bible Society. The Scriptures were paid for by the ones ordering them or by unsolicited donations. Hundreds of Scriptures were sent free because, through the plan with the American Bible Society and some volunteer donations, almost \$15,000 was made available for the sending of free Scriptures.

Much valuable material was cut from this report to meet our limitations of space. Keep up with our program of Home Missions. Pray that Christ's call may be answered in every heart.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

MISSIONARY SUPPORT The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. At the close of 1970 the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,501. This included 165 missionary associates, 4 special project medical personnel, and 121 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 182 (92 career, 18 associates, 64 journeymen, 1 special project medical couple, and 6 career reappointments). Between January and May, 1971, 35 more were added.

Hundreds of calls for reinforcements in personnel have come from Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) and national conventions in dozens of countries. Some requests, repeated from previous years and still urgent, are yet unfilled.

On May 1, 1971, Southern Baptist missionaries were under appointment to 76 geographical or political entities. New fields added in 1970 were Laos, Mozambique, Surinam, and Upper Volta. A couple was assigned to Barbados on an exploratory basis. On the date of this printing, missionaries assigned to Upper Volta were in language school in France, and those appointed for Mozambique were awaiting visas.

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT Underlying all our missionary endeavors is the ultimate purpose of leading people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. Organized churches with which Southern Baptist missionaries are related on mission fields now total 5,853, of which 75 percent are self-supporting. Work and accomplishments reported are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK The training of national leaders is a prerequisite to strong indigenous churches. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Of special importance is the development of pastors and other church leaders through theological schools and in programs below the full seminary level.

PUBLICATION WORK Publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions, as all kinds of Christian literature are provided for purposes of evangelism and the developing of vigorous church life. Our missionaries are related to publishing centers in 24 lands and to informal literature production programs in a number of other countries. They assisted in producing over 27 million

pieces of literature; tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymnals, and other items.

HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE The program of hospitals and medical care serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and often opens strategic doors for evangelistic witness. During 1970, missionaries and national workers engaged in this ministry treated more than 51,000 inpatients and saw nearly 930,000 outpatients.

BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES Benevolent ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, children's homes, and direct relief work. During 1970 the Foreign Mission Board provided funds for emergency and recurring relief in several countries. Assistance was continued for Nigeria, to relieve suffering and the severe malnutrition problem caused by the recent civil war there. Vietnam was another area with continuing pressing needs for direct relief.

CONTRIBUTIONS At the end of 1970, Southern Baptists' contributions for foreign missions totaled \$31,503,218 (a per capita gift of \$2.71 one cent more than in 1969). The 1970 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering had reached a total of \$16,220,105 by May 1, 1971.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds are made available annually for foreign missions. Thus is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

This report has necessarily been reduced. Read your Baptist Publications to keep abreast of The Great Commission at Work. Pray for Miss Nita Ruth McCullough from our Association and for the Holy Witness to His Power everywhere. Seek and find God's will for our lives.

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention, serves Florida Baptists by assisting individuals and their selected attorneys in preparing wills favoring Florida Baptist causes.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation makes himself available to associations, churches, groups of Baptists and to individual Baptists, to disseminate information in this field.

Major accomplishments for the period October 1, 1970 to August 2, 1971 include:

- (1) Received and invested \$46,317.81 in new permanent money for Baptist causes.
- (2) Managed our investments with a view to security, earnings and appreciation.
- (3) Signed five new trust agreements, added to several old agreements and continued to work with the courts in connection with four wills known to be in probate, amounting to more than 1/4 million dollars to Baptist causes.
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940 worked with many individuals and their attorneys in the preparation of wills favoring Baptist causes.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation wishes to express his appreciation to Baptist in Florida for their cooperation.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

We are living in a day of rapid activity, explosive movements and radical ideas. Countless people are worried, anxious, confused and terrified over the condition of the

world. It is a time when faith needs to be strengthened in the hearts of our Baptist people or all is lost. Never has it been more imperative that spiritual knowledge be disseminated and that we walk together in unity and strength.

To help stem the tide of uncertainty and unrest, our Baptist writers, editors and publishers continue to work for better publications and increased circulation. Last year the Sunday School Board made available for Southern Baptists 125 different periodical titles, with special study and supplemental items, plus millions of books, tracts, bulletins, etc.

Also the 33 Baptist State papers reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in St. Louis this year a combined circulation which totaled 1,583,062.

The Florida Baptist Witness, our own state paper, as of August 1, 1971 had a circulation of \$65,563. Nine hundred sixty-nine churches are now using one or the other of the group subscription plans to send the WITNESS each week to at least a part, if not all, of the families in their membership. Many churches wisely send the paper to every resident family.

Rising costs of production and distribution, which have had us operating at a loss since January 1 this year, have forced us to make a slight increase of only 25¢ per year in the subscription rates of the paper. These new rates, effective October 1, 1971, are: church budget subscriptions - \$1.75 per year (3 1/2¢ per week) each, club subscriptions \$2.00 per year (4¢ per week) each, and individual subscriptions - \$2.50 per year each.

To aid the churches in increasing their subscription list or to get the WITNESS in the budget, the editor offers the following opportunities with no cost to the church; (1) Free bundles of sample copies of the WITNESS for four weeks will be sent to the pastor or designated person for distribution in any church trying to put the paper in the church budget or enlarge its present list of subscribers. (2) Free trial subscriptions for two months for any established church upon these conditions: (a) That they furnish us with the name and address (including zip code) of every family in their membership. (b) That they agree to present to the church in conference by the end of the trial period a proposal that the church put the paper in its budget for every family giving the church opportunity to vote upon the proposal.

Feel free to write the editor for details of any of these offers. Our purpose is to help every Florida Baptist through the WITNESS.

Amos, one of God's great pioneers for righteousness, marked the trail that led concerned Christian leaders in Florida to cooperate in a determined battle against the immoralities threatening our people and communities.

Organized as a non-profit corporation in 1945 by representatives of the major evangelical churches in Florida, United Christian Action, Inc. through the years has served its sponsoring churches through a three-point program of education, rehabilitation, and legislation.

Recognizing the appalling tide of moral and spiritual decay being produced by those destructive forces, United Christian Action seeks to apply the logical solutions of personal abstinence and commitment to Christian citizenship by encouraging the people of Florida to wage vigorous and uncompromising warfare in support of

moral righteousness.

Each year, over three million pages of trustworthy literature is researched, printed and distributed free to youth and adults for use in camps, schools and churches.

United Christian Action is supported by the voluntary gifts of denominations, individual churches and citizens determined to warn our generation, as Amos did for his, "Woe unto you that call evil good and good evil."

Services available include: speakers in churches, schools and community groups, Carefully documented, attractive leaflets, folders and books, a newsletter now going to 45,000 homes.

Today as never before the value of total abstinence is being demonstrated in the lives of young people and adults who have chosen this higher way of life.

Those of us in Florida who are earnestly trying to help solve the severe, almost epidemic, problems resulting from alcohol and other drugs, gambling and obscenity are literally at a frightening crossroads. We will not retreat into apathy or compromise. Therefore, we must renew the will to fight evil, and sharpen the weapons of truth.

Pressures are mounting to further victimize and exploit youth by lowering the legal age for drinking and gambling; to enlarge gambling by legalizing lotteries, sweepstakes and casinos; to weaken controls over pomography; to legalize parochiaid, giving, public tax funds to Catholic and other parochial schools - and other such matters of deep concern to Christian citizens.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The year of 1970 was a year of transition for the Education Commission. After eleven years of service Rabun L. Brantley retired on September 30 and was succeeded by Ben C. Fisher.

In June of 1970 a special self-study committee of the Education Commission made its final report. This two-year study resulted in a careful examination of all existing programs and the recommendation of new services and emphases for the Commission.

The self-study committee concluded that the basis for the continuation of our Baptist witness in higher education includes a determination on the part of the individual institutions to live within stated Christian purposes, the willingness of these institutions to serve the denomination in vital relationships and the willingness (even while limiting enrollments and expansion of facilities) to strive constantly for academic excellence.

The Baptist Education Study Task identified as a major problem that of denominational relations and communications. The current crisis in higher education has caused our educational institutions to realize more fully the importance of Baptist support and opportunity to assert their uniqueness particularly in statement of Christian purpose and commitment.

Church-related colleges are the last live option for post-high school training in

a Christian atmosphere. At these colleges Christian codes of conduct are expected and these expectations are stated in writing. Christian standards are never more perfectly achieved on the campus then they are in the local church. However, the witness is present in both precept and example.

Christian colleges continue to make a vital contribution in both the training of church - related vocational workers and lay leadership.

Enrollment and Support - During the past year state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention gifts to the schools totaled \$21,722,922, or a decline of \$3,395,213. Of this amount \$18,118,787 was for operations, \$3,551,385 for capital needs, and Oklahoma Baptist University received \$52,750 from the state convention as an addition to their endowment fund.

Church-Related Vocations - Volunteers for church related vocations totaled 14,219 for the year. This is a slight decline of 321 over the past year. No doubt this is due to some schools reporting only their ministerial students.

Program goals for 1972 include: National Colloquium on Christian Higher Education emphasizing college denominational relations, Christian purpose, financing, trustee orientation; continuing improvement of THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST EDUCATOR and increase circulation to Baptist leadership; and a convocation in Nashville of professors of religion for the purpose of establishing better communication between Southern Baptist Convention personnel and faculties on Baptist college campuses.

Program goals for 1972 include working with the Baptist Sunday School Board to develop a new program of Christian Vocational Guidance Centers on Baptist college campuses for the purpose of assisting students to know themselves better and to identify those occupations for which they have the greatest talents; promotion of annual conventionwide emphasis on Christian colleges, seminaries, and schools; producing the 1973-75 SOUTHERN BAPTIST CAMPUS DIRECTORY as well as literature connected with the annual emphasis; regional recruitment conferences for developing Conventionwide emphasis.

If the Association is to comprehend its mission it will need to understand:

A. What an association is:

A Baptist association is a self-determining spiritual body of messengers from churches which are in voluntary basic agreement as to faith and practice, providing a program of assistance that will aid co-operating churches desiring to reach their full potential of spiritual growth and service in keeping with the great commission of Christ.

- B. What are the basic objectives of the association.
 - 1. The strengthening of the churches.
 - 2. The promotion of fellowship
 - 3. The promotion of cooperative and simultaneous efforts in evangelism, missions stewardship and training.
- C. How churches can relate to the association.
 - 1. By participating in the meetings.
 - 2. By informing the people of the work of the association
 - 3. By contributing regularly to the associational budget.
- D. How the association is financed.
 - 1. Through gifts from the churches.
 - 2. Controlled by an associational budget.
 - 3. Goal every church giving at least 1% of their total undesignated receipts to Associational Missions, working toward a goal of 3%.

The Christian Life Commission's emphasis on applied Christianity is finding good acceptance among Southern Baptists.

The Commission's literature program has been substantially strengthened by ten new "Issues and Answers" pamphlets covering the subjects of aging, capital punishment, consumer credit, generation gap, open housing, pollution, population explosion, revolution, sex education, and taxation. The Commission now has some 70 tracts in print and available for helping churches emphasize the practical dimensions of the Christian faith. A complete and illustrated order form is available upon request.

A new approach to providing pastors and other church leaders with resource materials on the pressing moral issues of our times has been utilized this year. Three carefully researched resource papers on pollution, urban crisis, and drugs have been printed and inserted in Home Missions magazine, and others are projected for the future.

In response to the need for guidance in Christian sex education, the staff of the Christian Life Commission has worked with the Church Training Department of the Baptist Sunday school Board to prepare Christian Sex Education: A Resource Packet.

The Christian Life Commission has also focused on drug education by developing for the Seminary Extension Department an Independent Reading Program for pastors entitled PROBLEMS PASTORS FACE: HELPING PEOPLE WITH DRUG PROBLEMS.

The Christian Life Commission's objective is to help develop the kind of Christian morality, both private and public, which undergrids the total Southern Baptist Witness for Jesus Christ. God is calling Southern Baptist to act responsibly in all phases of life, permeating the community as the salt of the earth and the light of the world. In response to this calling from God, the Christian Life Commission is dedicated to emphasizing the application of the Christian faith in the world.

THE RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORT

An average of 2,895 radio-TV stations in the world broadcast one or more programs produced and distributed by the Radio and Television Commission each month in 1970. During the year, greater efficiency was achieved in reaching the spiritually needy through 182,844 separate broadcasts.

JOT, the animated cartoon program for children, was on 99 stations at the end of the year - 63 of the top 100. Four new episodes were added to the 13 original films in the series, and although the number of children responding to JOT was down, there were still more than 100,000 cards and letters received.

COUNTRY CROSSROADS, newest of the Commission programs, has risen to 345 stations and draws more mail than all other combined radio programs produced by the Commission.

POWERLINE, the teenage top 40 music program doubled its stations in 1970, and now is broadcast by 523 stations. It remains the ''most religious'' program put out by the Commission, in spite of what it sounds like to adults. It pulled 2500 letters from young people during the year, including some of the deepest spiritual problems every encountered at the Commission.

Plans continue for release of the first series of The Human Dimension on January 1, 1972. This series will replace THE ANSWER, which has been running on the nation's television stations since it was launched in the spring of 1956.

Work is now in progress for a production of a 30-minute animated Christmas special featuring JOT and his friends.

Articles of Faith

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created hethern" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned

in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain to moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XL Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cares for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resumection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of

Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of right-eousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI. Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians

should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV_{ullet} The Kingdom

The Kindgom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any

member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

- 4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be "The Middle Florida Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to foster a harmonious and efficient spirit of cooperation among the churches of it's constituency and to cooperate with sister churches of the Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the missionary, educational and benevolent program of Christ's Kingdom to the ends of the earth.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the churches affiliated with this body.

Section 2. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in its sessions as follows: Two messengers for the first fifty members or less and one

additional messenger for each additional 25 members or fraction thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches, together with the elected officers of the Association, who are members of the churches.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by ballot from nominations made from the floor at the last session of the Association, taking office at the close of the annual session.

If any vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill vacancy for the unexpired term.

The Moderator shall not be elected to serve more than two years in succession. All officers shall serve without salary except Clerk and Treasurer, whose stipend shall be referred to the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE V - OTHER OFFICERS

The Nominating Committee shall at the September Executive Committee meeting recommend for approval, subject to election at the annual session, the heads of the various departments namely. Sunday school, Church Training, Music, WMU, Brotherhood, Evangelistic Chairman, Stewardship Chairman and such other departments as shall be authorized by the Association.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

Section 1. All committees shall consist of three members except the Executive Committee, Association Mission Committee and Calendar Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers, heads of the Associational Organizations, pastors and one lay member from each church to be recommended by the individual church and chairman of standing committees.

Section 3. The Standing Committees shall be: (1) Assembly Ground, (2) Budget and Finance (3) Calendar of Activities (4) Committee on Committees (5) Missions (6) Nominating (7) Obituaries (8) Program (9) Resolutions (10) Time, Place and Preacher (11) Assignment.

Section 4. Members of the Standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association to take office at the close of the annual session.

Section 5. The Missions Committee shall be composed of five members who shall serve for five years with one-fifth retiring each year.

Section 6. The Calendar Committee shall include the heads of each department. Section 7. The Program Committee shall also include the Moderator and Clerk.

Section 8. The Budget and Finance Committee shall cooperate with the heads of each Associational Organization and Treasurer in preparation of a budget for the ensuing year.

This committee shall determine the sum per resident church member to be requested from the churches for funds to carry on the work of the Association.

ARITLCE VII - RIGHTS OF CHURCHES

This body shall recognize and respect the Scriptural rights of the churches composing it, and shall in no wise exercise authority over them. Churches may be at liberty to sever connection with this body at any time by giving written notice to the Executive Committee or Annual session.

ARTICLE VIII - PETITION

Petition for membership shall be referred to a committee on petitionary letters at any Executive Committee meeting prior to the annual meeting of the Association, and shall be subject to approval at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE IX - ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention at their annual session in 1925 and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the body and must secure a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

HISTORY OF MACEDONIA BAPTIST CHURCH

Organized in School House Near Home of M,J. Wialliams in 1865

Macedonia Missionary Baptist church was organized in a school house near M.J. William's home Sep. 17, 1865. The Presbytery was composed of Elders Ryan and Henderson M, Frier, there were 8 charter members as follows: Manning J. Williams, Cyntha Williams, Henderson M, Frier, Mary Frier, Elias Pert, Emoline Pert, Georgia Ann Hudson and Sarah Cornett. The Wm. Comett First Baptist church covenant and decorum were adopted at this meeting and Bro. Henderson M, Frier called as pastor.

At the second meeting or conference, Oct. 28, 1865, the constitution was approved and the church was named.

July 20, 1867 the church petitioned Mercer association for membership in their body and sent their petitionary letter by the pastor, Bro. Frier and M.J. Williams, who evidently took up the matter with the executive committee and the church was accepted as a member of the association for on Aug, 17, 1867 the clerk was instructed to prepare the first associational letter. The Mercer association met with Macedonia in 1875, this being the first time the church was host to association. On Aug. 23, 1878 Macedonia petitioned the Florida association for membership and was accepted, and remained a member of that association until 1900 when the present middle Florida association was organized at Macedonia.

The first church building was a long house located about where the southwest corner of the cemetery now is. On June 24, 1876 a building committee was appointed to procure funds and material for a new church. This building was completed that year and was dedicated Sunday, October 21, 1876. The Sunday school rooms of the present church is that building which stood between the present building and the highway.

The new part of the main auditorium of the present building was built in 1927 and 1928 and was dedicated January 26, 1930, this building made possible through the benevolence of the late W.C. Wells of Madison whose memory we shall always cherish. The land for the church and cemetery was given by the Williams and E.E. West. Mrs. C.M. Ragans later gave 2 acres. The pastorium now occupies part of that land.

As stated above Bro. H.M. Frier was the first pastor, he served this church faithfully for more than 29 years, was for 7 years moderator of the Florida association and was a charter member of three Baptist churches. Redland in Lowndes county, Georgia, Pine Grove (Piney) and Macedonia in this county. Other pastors include, T.P. Webb, F.M. Wells, O.J. Revels, John Farnell, J.D. Rutherford, S.S. Protor, R.L. Hacker, I.R. Clements J.J. Simmons, S.A. Cross, M.J. Fowler, S.G. Ward, A.R. Powell, A.W. Smith, A.M. Parker, A.N. Woodard, A.H. Townsend, J.A. Nickols, Ed McCollum, R.L. Williams, M.J. Fowler, E.A. Milton, Ben Perry, P.G. Elrod, Dewitt Cox, L.F.

Laffery, Ralph Beasley, John Hutcherson, A.L. Croy, C.W. Crim, E.L. Gurr and A. Clyde McLain.

The church from the very beginning has had a steady and continuous growth and has furnished outstanding Christian characters not only to this community and county but to many parts of this state and Georgia.

HISTORY OF PINE GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

ΒY

Mr. and Mrs. William Collins, October 1971

This church was organized October 25, 1856, the organizing council being Elder R.J. Mays, Ryan Frier, and S.C. Craft. The following were the constituent members: Jarvis J. Frier, Nancy Frier, Hiram Roberts, Mary Warren, Sarah A. Warren, Henderson M. Frier, and Elizabeth Woodward.

The first pastor was S.C. Craft, the first deacon was J.T. Frier and the first clerk was H.M. Frier who here commenced his services in the Master's Vineyyard. In four years the membership increased to 84. The first day of January, 1859, was set apart by the church as a day of special prayer and fasting.

During the same conference at which this agreement was entered into, the church established a mission (or arm) at a school house near the residence of Brother M.J. Williams, which was afterwards in 1865, organized into a church and called it Macedonia.

On the 26th day of January, 1861, a request was received from the Midway Church for the ordination of Brother H.M. Frier to work of the gospel ministry. The Ordination took place accordingly Febuary 23rd., following the ordaining council consisting of Elders Richard J. Mays and G.C. Powell.

At the church conference, March 21, 1863, the clerk was directed to make a list of its members who had enlisted in the Army and to ascertain the dates, if possible, of the deaths of any who had been killed or had died. It appears that this list was kept

open to the close of the war since the statement is given that 15 went and only 5 returned.

This church became a member of the Florida Baptist Association in 1866. In 1887 a number of members were dismissed by letter from this church to form the church at Hopeful. The church at Oak Grove was also formed by members dismissed from this church in 1879. Thus it appears that this has been, from the beginning, a vigorus and fruitful vine.

In conference Sept. 2, 1899, the clerk, J.L. Warren, was ordered to prepare the association letter and to petition that body for a letter of dismission for the purpose of organizing a new association. This letter of dismission was granted by the Baptist Association, but action was deferred until Dec. 24th, when a conference was called for the purpose of selecting delegates to attend a meeting at Macedonia Church for the purpose of organizing the new association. Bro. J.L. Warren and Bro. G.E. Blair were elected to attend. They in turn reported at January 6th, 1900 conference, that this new association to be known as the Middle Florida Baptist Association was set up, and that Pine Grove was one of the organizing constituent members.

In conference, June 18, 1908, the Church granted Bro. S.C. Warren the license to preach.

On Sept. 6, 1919 during conference the Pastor, Bro. S_*B_* Cole, the Church Clerk, Bro. S_*C_* Warren and the Deacons were authorized to revise and compile a new church roll.

During a series of 2 week meetings held beginning the week of July 27, 1924, a record number of candidates presented themselves for church membership. Three were received by letter and 16 for baptism. Pastor at this time was Bro. J.M. Conner and Revival Pastor was Rev. H.G. Eaton of Jacksonville, Florida.

Sunday School was organized in July 1927 after a talk by Bro. George W. Broom. Elected to serve as Superintendent was Sister Drew Hughey, Asst. Supt., Ardis Warren and Miss Thelm Raines as Secretary and Treasurer. Plans were made to meet each 3rd. Sunday.

Down through the years there have been many different places used for baptismal services. Perhaps many of these are familiar to you and hold special memories for you. They are as follows: Shop Pond, Hog Pond, Jane Pond, Matheny Sink, Calhoun Sink, Jug Pond, S.C. Warren's Sink, Hurston Pond, Squealer Pond, and more recently Cherry Lake (Sims) landing.

SUMMARY OF MORE RECENT HISTORY

In October, 1957, a sealed bid of \$5,995 was accepted for the building of the pastorium. The pastorium debt was paid on June 16, 1965 leaving the church at that time with no outstanding debts.

The Men's Brotherhood was organized in 1959.

In April, 1960, a night circle of the WMU was organized and given the name "The Bertie Rowe Circle" in membory of Mrs. A.M. Rowe.

In June, 1960, the church for the first time in its history began sending representatives to Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly.

In September, 1960, the date for an annual Homecoming Day each year was set for every fourth Sunday in October.

One additional acre of land on the North side of the cemetery was secured in 1961 for the purpose of enlarging the cemetery. A cemetery Committee consisting of the Brothers M.C. Herring, William Collins, and Clayton Burnett was appointed in 1963.

This is now a committee of 6.

A recommendation from our Deacons to build a church was adopted by the Church Sept. 12, 1965. The Building Committee was made up of our Deacons, Mrs. Belle Davis and Mrs. Hoyt Wainwright. Plans and specifications were approved January 9, 1966. Plans called for removal of the old building, leaving the 3 block Sunday School rooms. The approved bid of \$12,500 was received Feb. 13, 1966. On March 13, 1966, the church agreed to apply for a loan from the Florida Baptist Convention in the amount of \$10,000. Construction began July 4, 1966, and was completed October 6, 1966. Dedication services were held March 5, 1967. Our first service in the new building was a wedding of Oby Vannand Betty Dixon on August 6, 1966. First Worship Services were held on August 7, 1966.

Added as special projects and generous gifts and not included in the building contract have been tiling, heating system, air-conditioning system, pulpit furniture, kitchen, sidewalks, piano and carpeting. Our Brotherhood planned and completed land-scaping of the Church grounds. Our Church Library was approved in February, 1967, with Mrs. Belle Davis as Librarian. New Hymnals were also given as special gifts.

MEMORIAL TRUST FUND

On Tuesday, April 30, 1969, a group consisting of M.C. Herring, Mrs. M.C. Herring Mrs. Frank Davis, Mrs. Audrey Wood and Rev. Douglas Mitchell met at the home of Mrs. Audrey Wood for the purpose of forming a Memorial Trust Fund for Pine Grove Baptist Church.

After much thought and consideration the following recommendations were discussed and recommended that they be presented to the church.

- 1. That this committee of M.C. Herring, Chairman; Mrs. M.C. Herring, Secretary-Treasurer; Mrs. Audrey Wood, Mrs. Frank Davis, Linton Willis, Ex-officio member; Rev. Douglas Mitchell, Pastor, Ex-officio member; be elected by the church for an indefinite term.
- 2. That a Memorial Trust Fund of Pine Grove Baptist Church be set up at the Florida First National Bank at Madison, Florida.

We futher recommend that the Trust Fund be left open for anyone desiring to donate for causes other then the cemetery.

These recommendations were passed unanimously by the Church on Sunday, May 18, 1969, in Conference of the Church.

By order and approval of the church, on July 24, 1971, Bro. John C. Downing was issued a license to preach. Formal presentation of the license was made on October 3, 1971


