

# Clifton Mansion: Site of Roots of Florida Baptist Convention

Artist Seeber Fowler produced the original sketch of Clifton Mansion, the home of Richard Johnson Mays, the first President of the Florida Baptist State Convention. In October, 1854 the organization papers of the Convention were drawn up in Clifton Mansion, located near Madison. Mays' plantation home burned in 1933. Fowler worked from an old photograph and information from Edwin B. Browning, Sr. and a few others who had seen the Mansion.




It is with love and a deep sense of loss that we pay tribute to Rev. Verner Wheeler - a dedicated pastor.

- 2. Linda Demott, Associational Music Director, led the Association in singing "Because He Lives", accompanied by Lorraine Owens.
- 3. Jay Hollowell, Pastor of Lee First, gave the Devotional reading Matthew 8:1-3, and led in prayer.
- 4. Howard Money, Pastor of Faith, welcomed the messengers and visitors to Faith and expressed the pleasure of the church in hosting this annual meeting.
- 5. The Response was given by Marintha Howard, 1982-83 W.M.U. Director.
- 6. Clerk Geraldine Stokes, moved "That messengers from the cooperative churches now registered, or who may register, constitute the working body of this Association and that the printed program become the order of business." The motion was seconded and approved.
- 7. The Moderator appointed Ronnie Combass, Pastor of Pleasant Grove (L) and Charles Knight, Pastor of Cherry Lake First to serve on the Time-Place-Speaker Committee.
- 8. Eddie Humes, Pastor of Madison First and Walter Chapman, Pastor of Central were appointed by the Moderator to serve on the Resolutions Committee.

- 11. Faye Browning, Madison First, gave the Historical Report which was adopted.
- 12. Linda Demott led the Association in singing, "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story."
- 13. Audrey Wood, Faith, reported for Florida Baptist Children's Homes. She moved the adoption of the report, which was

- adopted, and spoke forcefully encouraging all churches to remember the needs of the children.
- 14. By request, Moderator Lex Webb, read a paragraph from the Children's Home Report, stating the re-dedication of Residence No. 1, Tallahassee Campus, in honor of Audrey Wood.
- 15. The Baptist Campus Ministry Report was given by Edward Sapp. The report was adopted as presented.
- 16. Deanie Webb gave the Woman's Missionary Union Report. The report was adopted. Deanie introduced Marintha Howard, new W.M.U. Director, who reported on the Enlargement Plan implemented with the help of the STARTEAM leader of Tallahassee.
- 17. In absence of Jody Read, Edward Sapp moved the written Youth Rally Report be adopted. Paul Townsend, Brewer Lake, encouraged all churches to bring their youth to the rallies for a Spiritual Blessing.
- 18. Howard Money gave the Evangelism Report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted as presented.
- 19. Moderator Lex Webb called for the Miscellaneous Business and Announcements. There was no business.
- 20. Special Music, "Now I Have Everything", was given by Edward Sapp, accompanied by Linda Demott.

- 4. Associational Church Training Clinic was held during the Associational Council Workshop on August 30, 1982 at Madison First. Ten churches were represented.
- 5. Associational Children's Bible Drill, Youth Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament was held on March 5, 1982 with these participating: Children's Bible Drill, Don Bishop (Faith); Youth Bible Drill, Bobbie Jo Davis (Faith) and Gena Stokes (Beulah); Youth Speakers' Tournament, Margaret Moore (Lee) and Michaela Vick (Faith). A total of three churches were represented. Two of these young people progressed to the Regional and State Drills and Tournament. Michaela Vick and Gena Stokes. The 1983 Associational Drills and Tournament will be held on March 11, at 7:30 P.M.

- 7. "M" Night, 1982, will be held on November 22, at Greenville Baptist Church at 7:30 P.M.
- 8. A Regional Church Training Convention, including Children's and Youth Bible Drills and Youth Speakers' Tournament will be conducted in our area by our State Church Training Department at Lake City on March 25, 1983, afternoon and evening.

#### FOREIGN HOME & STATE MISSIONS

FOREIGN MISSIONS: The Foreign Mission Board's annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention highlights some encouraging signs as well as some sobering realities. The Good news: Our total missionary staff grew to 3,136, an increase of 355, to work beside national colleagues in 95 countries; overseas Baptist Churches for the second time broke the 100,000 barrier in number of baptisms, reaching 127,337 last year and financial support for foreign missions reached a total of \$95,480,007 including a Lottie Moon Christmas offering of \$44,713,596.

The sobering picture comes when we view the multitudes beyond the reach of anything we are now doing to share the Gospel. To change this picture and accomplish the goal, of BOLD MISSION THRUST, Southern Baptists must PRAY MORE, GIVE MORE AND DO MORE.

HOME MISSIONS: Although not without its problems, last year was a banner year in Southern Baptist Convention HOME MISSIONS because churches responded to the pressing needs of our land.

At years end, the Home Mission Board had 3,074 missionary personnel on the field, 130 of these are serving in Florida. More than 30,000 men and women had volunteered to serve as temporary or part time missionaries through the Mission Service Corps and Special Mission Ministries. Over 400 new churches had been started.

Though barely keeping up with inflation, both Cooperative Program contributions to Home Missions and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering reached new highs, totaling \$16,441,512 from the Cooperative Program and \$18,539,913 from the Annie Armstrong Offering.

The missions task of local churches was a major focus of the Missions Section Home Missions Board last year. This year, establishing and training Church Missions Committees will be a priority.

STATE MISSIONS: Florida Baptists have a goal of establishing 400 new congregations by 1985. With only two years remaining, more than 200 new churches and missions must be established if the goal of ministering to the people of Florida — of spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ — is to be met.

Planting new congregations cost money and it is a task which generally cannot be totally undertaken by a single church or a single association. It is a task in which ALL Florida Baptists must participate.

This year, Florida Baptists are concentrating on spreading the

Florida SUNSHINE. In a state which calls itself the SUNSHINE State, many people live in darkness. Our State may have the light of Old Sol, but Florida Baptists have the True Light, the Florida SUNSHINE.

#### FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

The Heart of the Florida Baptist Children's Home cannot best be revealed in annual statistics. One needs to get invloved and to hear the responses of some of those who have lived the experience. The first Campus Alumni Reunion was held on the Tallahassee Campus in July 1982. It was a happy time for all, there were about 18 former residents and staff members who came back for the occasion. Special Sunday morning worship services were held for all; with area administrator Jerry Edwards officiating. It was a most fitting way to end the reunion with a prayer of Thanksgiving and Song, "To God Be The Glory". "Children are a Heritage of the Lord", as the Word says in Psalms 127:3a. There were 385 children cared for through the multiple services of the Florida Baptist Children's Home in 1981-82. of which 58 were cared for on the Tallahassee Campus: they placed 3 children in foster homes; 7 were adopted into three homes; and 16 were in after-care services: the other 32 were cared for in the residence on campus, making up the total of 58.

Here are a few of the highlights of the year:

- 1. The Carlton Residence for 10 additional children on the Tallahassee Campus was dedicated on September 26, 1982 at 2:30 P.M. with Dr. Edgar Cooper bringing the dedicatory address. This building with a projected cost of \$200,000.00 was completed at a cost of approximately \$145,000.00.
- 2. On September 27th at 10:00 A.M. the final Board meeting of the

year was held in the Board Room on the Tallahassee Campus. Highlighting this event was a re-dedication ceremony for Residence Number 1, which was named in honor of Audrey Wood of Madison, Florida, Faith Baptist Church.

- 3. The Homes continued their major thrust of helping needy children toward permanent family living by arranging for the adoption of 10 children during the year.
- 4. More than \$100,000.00 in capital funds are being raised for major renovations on the Miami Campus. This includes new roofs, new furniture, and a complete new plumbing system.
- 5. The Mother's Day Offering was slightly more than \$235,000.00 as compared to last year's total of \$221,000.00.
- 6. More individuals and groups have engaged in Volunteer endeavors than at any time in the history of the home. Individuals, church and civic groups are encouraged to become involved in Mission Action projects; and I personally challenge EVERY Pastor in our Middle Florida Baptist Association to remember

- our Children's Home when making up your church budget for the new year.
- 7. On January 1, 1982, Richard Phillips, former Area Administrator on the Lakeland Campus was appointed assistant to the executive director in charge of promotion and development.
- 8. On June 1, 1982, Jack Bennett ACSW was appointed Area Administrator on the Lakeland Campus.
- 9. Two missionaries, the John Brackin family and the Robert Roberts' family occupied the Missionary Residence on the Lakeland Campus during the year.
- 10. For the eighth consecutive year the Children's Homes have operated on the positive side of the ledger. We praise the Lord for dedicated men and women on our Children's Home Staff that are leading us in this all important ministry.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union emphasis for 1981-82 was Life-Changing Commitments. Throughout the year, meetings, activities and materials centered on the various aspects of Christian lifestyle and suggested ways of helping WMU members to make life-changing commitments.

The denominational emphasis, Bold Mission Thrust, provided these goals: Bold Growing, Bold Going, Bold Giving. As Woman's Missionary Union strengthened its ongoing tasks of mission study, mission support, mission action and direct evangelism, WMU members, leaders and officers were involved in Bold Mission Thrust.

Five WMU Leaders' Conferences were held at Lake Yale Baptist Assembly, Fort Lauderdale and Blue Springs Assembly. These conferences provided training for associational and church Woman's Missionary Union leadership.

The 88th Annual Session of Florida Woman's Missionary Union was held on April 29-30, 1982, at the First Baptist Church of Tampa, with 985 registered.

Ten weeks of Girls in Action and Acteens Camps were held at Lake Yale Baptist Assembly and West Florida Baptist Assembly.

Florida Woman's Missionary Union launched an Enlargement Plan as a part of the National WMU Enlargement Plan. A goal to visit 415 churches and missions without a WMU by September, 1983, was implemented with five called as STARTEAM visiting 200 churches. A total of 180 new WMU's were organized.

The 1981-82 WMU watchword, "Also I heard the voice of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me" (Isaiah 6:8) and the 1981-82 hymn, "Send Me, O Lord, Send Me," challenged members throughout the year. New commitments and changed lifestyles were evident in members of Florida Woman's Missionary Union.

#### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

"Despite the economic problems in the nation, 1981 was a year of solid growth and expanding achievements with record number in assets, benefits paid and member accounts," said Darold H. Morgan, president of the Annuity Board of Southern Baptist Convention.

Key statistical highlights in 1981 included:

- 1. A 10 percent 13th Check was sent to annuitants who retired before 1980. Those annuitants who retired in 1980-81 received their 13th Check bonus in their monthly checks.
- 2. A total of \$24,298.521 was paid in retirement benefits.
- 3. Total assets administered by the board as of December 31, 1981 were \$896,535,999 compared with \$806,518,757 in December 31, 1980.
- 4. Relief funds from the Cooperative Program totalled \$357,200.
- 5. Premium income reached \$72,854,632. Of this amount, \$45,443.258 was designated for the Fixed Fund and \$10,294,788 for Plan A.

Significant changes have taken place in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program since 1978.

One of the most important changes is the bringing together into a composite document the various retirement plans developed by the Board. This document, now called the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan, has been adopted by the Florida Baptist Convention. The particular value of this new document is that it gives detailed information regarding the provisions of all retirement plans offered by the Annuity Board and combines them

into one plan.

Total assets held in trust by the Annuity Board in all retirement accounts grew to a record \$896,535,999, in 1981. At the same time, the Board paid retirees \$24,298,521 in retirement benefits and a thirteenth check to those retiring prior to 1980.

A Short Term Fund and a Voluntary Annuity Plan were added to the investment funds available through the Board. The Short Term Fund has been designed to take advantage of short-term investments with anticipated high interest earnings. The Voluntary Annuity Plan is an Individual Retirement Account.

The medical and life insurance program administered by the Board and underwritten by the Aetna Insurance Company have been redesigned. Participants in the programs were paid \$22,177,886 in claims in 1981. Premium costs for medical insurance will undoubtedly increase as medical care continues to rise.

The staff of the Annuity Board and the Florida Annuity Office are totally committed to "serving those who serve the Lord".

Let me encourage all of our churches to put your pastor in the Annuity Program because you want your Pastor on the field full time and very few of them are being paid a living salary. When our pastors retire they need more money to live on than what Social Security will pay them. Please give this close consideration.

Applicants must be residents of the State of Florida and members in good standing with a Baptist church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention for at least 12 months prior to application. Exceptions may be made in case the applicant is an employee of a Southern Baptist Convention agency, board or commission. The

minimum age is 62,

The ministry of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center is made possible by the support of Cooperative Program gifts and the prayers of the people of this state. We are most appreciative of this support.

The support from the State Mission Offering of the Florida Baptist Convention, and the contributions from individual Baptist Churches across the State of Florida has been better than in any preceding year. # HISTORICAL SKETCH OF ELIZABETH BAPTIST CHURCH

This year the Elizabeth Baptist Church completed a \$237,000 renovation and building program. The church, which celebrated its 151st Anniversary this year, has taken on a completely new look. The entire roof line was rearranged and the auditorium was expanded to accomodate nine more new pews. For the first time in its long history, the church can now baptize during the regular services on Sunday. Before February, 1982, the church baptized in the Aucilla River, Silver Lake, Rasor Lake, Monticello First and Olive Baptist Church. The church wishes to express its appreciation to their sister churches for the use of their baptistry in the many years that have past. A brand new grand piano now graces the interior to accompany the congregational singing and special music. Except for the fellowship hall and kitchen, the church has been completely carpeted.

A brand new nursery facility, which includes separate rooms for bed babies and toddlers with a restroom in between, has added greatly to the effectiveness of the educational system in the church.

A stain glass window with an amber cross graces the background of the baptistry. The church's electrical and lighting system was completely renovated with new materials and lights.

A handicap ramp and restrooms fitted for those who need the help of a wheelchair enhanced the effectiveness of ministering to those in need.

A new fellowship hall with four new Sunday School rooms, that are educationally equipped, has added to the outreach of the Sunday School and Church Training. (Refer to 1972-73 Annual for complete History.)

the church. The old church bell was rung and the marker was dedicated in a very impressive ceremony directed by Mrs. W.C. Copeland, Jr.

An observation made at the marker dedication led to the second event, the restoration and cleaning of the stained glass windows. Under the careful direction of Mrs. Copeland, the windows were restored and the interior cleaned with donations from families of past members. The final results were viewed in ceremonies on Sunday afternoon and evening on September 25, 1982.
