





Family Life

Associational Family Life Programs in Florida were begun in 1983. Florida was the second state in the Southern Baptist Convention to make such provisions. State, Association and Church Family Life Programs all include three areas with officers for each serving on the Church Council; Senior Adults, Single Adults and Family Enrichment. These relate to the Southern Baptist Family Ministry Department at the Sunday School Board, which has sections for each of these areas.

Church actions to help strengthen families include: Family Commitment Day; Senior Adult Day; Single Adult Day; Studying the Baptist doctrinal book, Biblical Foundations of the Family; organizing senior and single adult weekday ministries; conducting marriage enrichment or parenting retreat or conference and utilizing the Family Life Periodicals - Home Life, Living with Teenagers, Living with Children, Living with Preschoolers, Christian Single and Mature Living are all available on the Church Literature order blank.

Annual events such as Christian Home Emphasis is recommended as a time to focus on many of these activities. It is in the denominational calendar for observance from Mother's Day to Father's Day each year.

Other help available for families include Covenant Marriage and Parenting by Grace. Both of these models are in the LIFE system (Lay Institute for Equipping) and will be promoted jointly by the Discipleship Program and Family Life departments of our state.

This year we had a successful Marriage Enrichment Sampler at Pinetta Baptist Church. All participants were enlightened in how they could make a good marriage better. Hopefully there will be more conferences for all age groups forthcoming.

Dr. Paul Powell, pastor of Green Acres Baptist Church, Tyler, Texas, has accepted election as president of the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Dr. Powell will join the Annuity Board Staff as president-elect on October 16 and become president on March 1, 1990, succeeding Dr. Darold H. Morgan, who is retiring after 18 years in the post.

The trustees of the Board recently authorized a permanent 10 percent increase in the retirement benefits for those who participate in old plan A. At the same time the trustees voted a 50 percent increase in the death and disability benefit on the Church Annuity Plan. This benefit is provided by the Florida Baptist Convention in behalf of participants in the new expanded Church Annuity Plan.

The new Church Annuity Plan is off and running strong. Over 900 Florida Baptist Churches have enrolled their Ministers and Church Staff in this new plan that began January 1, 1988. Churches who want their ministers and staff to receive a State Convention contribution must file a church approved cooperative agreement. Forms to do this may be obtained from the Annuity Office of the Florida Baptist Convention, or contact your Association Annuity Advisor.





Florida Baptist Family Ministries

A NEW NAME

At age 85, Florida Baptists' ministry to needy, dependent children and their families has been wed to the 30-year-old ministry to senior adults. Thus the new name as of January 1989: Florida Baptist Family Ministries.

The name is an umbrella identification for Florida Baptist Children's Homes and the Florida Baptist Retirement Center. Each institution continues to minister under its existing name with the State Office in Lakeland and the 21 trustees using the umbrella name.

1989: TRANSITION AND GROWTH

"Transition" best describes this year. But by careful planning and preparation by trustees, staff and Convention leaders, transition has been coupled with steady growth By year-end, services will include:

- Care for 500 children (plus ministry to their families) on campuses in Lakeland, Tallahassee and Miami; a network of foster homes; adoptions; maternity care; emergency shelter care; and the Alice Madray Memorial Group Home.
- Care for eight to ten developmentally disabled women in the Taylor Group Home.
- Care for 90 senior adults and ministry to their families through the Florida Baptist Retirement Center, Vero Beach.
- Full involvement of children, senior adults and staff in local church ministries.
- Religious commitments by 40 to 50 children in care.

Quality is the watchword. Accreditation of the Children's Homes by the National Council on Accreditation is anticipated by year-end. This emphasis on quality within our Christian commitment is incorporated in our statement of Mission:

"...to provide social services and programs within a Christian context of evangelism, missions and education to individuals, families, and congregations within the State of Florida, which shall be of high quality and include such services and programs as approved by the Board of Trustees. This Corporation makes available its services without discrimination based upon race, color, religion, national origin, or sex. This Corporation may perform such other purposes as shall be allowed under the laws of the State of Florida and of the United States."

VISION 2000

In June, the trustees adopted Vision 2000, a long-range plan that sets direction for these ministries to the end of the century. During the next decade, Florida Baptist Family Ministries will move from serving 525 individuals yearly to 3,600 by:

- Improving/expanding existing services to children, their families, and senior adults.
- Providing care in 90 private foster homes. Opening 15 community-based group homes. Providing 15 family counseling centers. Providing adoptions for 60 special-needs children annually. Adding two additional group homes for the developmentally disabled. Expanding services to senior adults.
- Expanding informational systems and development/public relations emphasis.

The Children's Homes and Retirement Center are blessed to have the prayer and financial support of Florida Baptists. An operating budget of \$5,590,000 is realized from Cooperative Program support, the Mother's Day Offering and individual contributions.

Church Training

Church Training continues to play a major role in growing disciples and developing believers. The associational church training program has the responsibility of helping each church to organize, improve and enlarge its program of discipleship development through Church Training.

This is the first year of "A Call to Baptist Basics." Through this study church training members will acknowledge God's sovereignty and be led to demonstrate responsible stewardship of time, possessions, abilities and the gospel.

1988 Associational "M" Night attendance was 40 (statewide attendance was 8,647). "M" Night 1989 will be held November 28 at Madison First Baptist Church.

In the first six months of the 1988-89 church year a total of 1,783 churches in Florida requested 39,287 awards in the Church Study Course system. Figures for the associations will not be available until the end of September. Again this year three special awards will be presented from the state Church Training Department at "M" Night. These awards will go to the churches with (1) the largest total number of study course awards, (2) the largest number of awards in Church Training Leadership, and (3) the largest percentage of total awards compared to resident membership. By the way, Florida placed second in the Southern Baptist Convention in total doctrinal awards received during 1987-88.

Of the 28 churches in the Middle Florida Baptist Association, 23 reported Church Training this year. Last year 23 churches reported church training.

Sunday School

The Sunday School emphasis of Challenge 10/90 will draw to a close this year with a theme of Share Hope: Reach 10. The national theme verse is, "Therefore, since we have such a hope, we are very bold." II Corinthians 3:12 (NIV). Florida Baptists have selected the verse, "Christ in you, the hope of Glory" Colossians 1:27, as our theme.

Reach 10 means that individuals, classes, Sunday Schools and associations are encouraged to set goals built upon "10's"...that is, each person enrolling 10 in Sunday School or leading 10 persons to Christ. It may mean 10 new classes started, a quarterly increase of 10 in Sunday School, 10 people visiting and witnessing or 10 new prospects discovered.

Twenty Sunday School directors from as many churches were given that challenge at the Key Leader Workshop, held at Faith Church on August 15. As Sunday School enrollments are reported through the annual church letters, goals will be formulated on the associational level with a general guideline of achieving a 10 percent increase in enrollment for 1989-90.

•A major event of the past year was a very successful Growth Campaign, held April 2-9 with George E. Dunn serving as Campaign Coordinator. Significant results were reported by the eight churches participating.

An outstanding record was achieved in Vacation Bible Schools, with several churches having their best ever. Sixteen churches reported, with a total VBS enrollment of 1,651, 50 professions of faith, and 4 Backyard Bible Clubs.

Four Outreach Bible Study groups have been reported in the association.



Digest of Letters 1988-89

There were 142 baptisms reported, this is an increase of 59 over last year. Additions by letter decreased by 72. Our current Resident Membership of 5,398 is an increase of 25 members.

Sunday School enrollment was reported at 2,660, an increase of 269. Vacation Bible School enrollment was 1,683 a decrease of 92 with 21 churches reporting VBS.

Church Training enrollment was 1,052, a decrease of 218. There were 921 reported in Church Music, an increase of 48. WMU enrollment was reported at 516, an increase of 29. The Brotherhood enrollment was 382, a decrease of 2 over last year. The total receipts reported was \$1,341,654, an increase of \$136,219.

Cooperative Program giving was \$123,330, an increase of \$10,017. Gifts to the Association was \$37,923, an increase of \$3,017.

Grand total Mission Expenditures was \$243,463, an increase of \$21,466.

There has been some positive growth in our churches - we, as Southern Baptists have an exciting year ahead as we continue to strive to be all that Christ wants us to be.

State Board of Missions Report

First of all I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Middle Florida Baptist Association for granting me the privilege of representing you on the State Board of Missions. The work of Baptists in the State of Florida is very extensive. The experience I received in my first year on the State Board has enabled me to serve more effectively in my second year. I have attended all meetings of the State Board, all committee meetings, work group meetings, and the special session of the Florida Baptist Convention held in Orlando in September.

My assignment this year has been on the program committee. Some of the things the State Board of Missions worked on this year were: Alterations and update of our Constitution and Bylaws; exception to policy for churches desiring loans, who are not meeting the requirements for associational and cooperative program giving; approval of many changes to the organizational structure of Florida Baptists in order to meet the current needs more effectively; approval of Jerry Passmore as Director of the Evangelism Division of the Florida Baptist Convention; and work on the Budget for the coming year.

Jerry Passmore's election as Director of the Evangelism Division was the first high-level administrator hired since John Sullivan became Executive Director of the Florida Baptist Convention in February. I feel this was an excellent choice and that he will provide the leadership required for success. Since becoming the pastor of Olive Baptist Church in Pensacola, Florida in 1972, the church has become one of the top churches of Florida Baptists in baptisms. The church has baptized 2,400 people under his leadership. He has established a strong evangelism training program and a commitment to financial support of denominational causes through the Cooperative Program.

H.R.S. has agreed to exempt most church activities from Florida Statutes 402 and 409 that require background screening to determine "good moral character" which must be met by people serving in close contact positions with children under 17 years old. H.R.S. staff member said waivers from the screening process could be issued for Sunday

School, Vacation Bible School, Church Training, Children's Missions Education Programs, Church Music Programs, Backyard Bible Clubs, Youth Recreation Programs, and Mothers day out and Parents night out. However, three programs: Day Camps, Overnight Retreats and Youth Mission Tours will fall under the screening regulation. It would be advisable to contact the local H.R.S. Office in your area to insure your church is in compliance with these new laws.

I would like to say a word about the budget for 1990. The State Board of Missions is recommending a budget of 23.4 million dollars which is a four percent increase over the 1989 budget. The proposed budget designates 49.25 percent of its receipts to the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program to fund Worldwide and National Mission causes. The remaining 50.75 percent will be used in the State to support Florida Baptist Ministries, institutions and agencies. It is the desire of the State Board of Missions to return to the 50/50 division of Cooperative Program Funds as soon as possible (hopefully in four years) if God blesses and cooperative program funds increase. I strongly request that any of you that serve as messengers to the State Convention support this proposed budget.

I would strongly encourage the churches of our association to select messengers to the State Convention who are willing to attend and take part in the decisions that are made there. Each church is entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 100 members in excess of 100, up to a maximum of 10 for any one church. Decisions are made there that effect us all, so I feel it is extremely important that we participate in the process.

I would like to address the abortion issue for a moment. We spent most of our time at the September State Mission Board Meeting and also the Special Session of the Florida Baptist Convention discussing the difficult issue. There is a diversity of opinions on this issue even among Florida Baptists, however we were able to agree on a recommendation on the Sanctity of Human Life. I would like to include this recommendation as part of my report.

The legislature will be in session Tuesday, October 10, making decisions on this issue, please pray that God's desires will be done in this regard.

If you have questions or concerns about any of the Baptist work or programs in Florida or if I can be of assistance to you please feel free to contact me or the State Board of Missions. I will help you if possible or find someone who can. The State Board of Missions and the Florida Baptist Convention are there to help you, if you have a need please feel free to contact them for assistance.

Thank you again for permitting me to serve you on the State Board of Missions. It has been a pleasure for me as I have thoroughly enjoyed my work. I hope in some small way I have been able to contribute to its accomplishments.

Recommendation on the Sanctity of Human Life

FLORIDA BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION

Bill Billingsley, President Al Townsend, 1st Vice President Carolyn Anderson, 2nd Vice President

The Florida Baptist State Convention consists of 2,057 Congregations with one (1) million members.

We are a diverse people in almost every way: theologically, socially, ethnically, geographically, politically, and economically.

We are an independent people. We are a nonhierarchical Convention. Soul freedom and liberty of conscience are among our most cherished beliefs. As a result, no individual or group can ever presume to speak for all Southern Baptists in Florida.

At the same time, Florida Baptists are greatly troubled by the casual attitudes about abortion reflected in the current state of abortion law. Florida Baptists have consistently and forcefully expressed opposition to abortion on demand.

While these prior statements and actions are not binding on the conscience or practice of any Southern Baptist member or church in Florida, they do express who we are as a people.

We have had our differences about some of the circumstances in which abortion might be justified. Disagreements about the morality or immorality of abortions in such cases as rape or incest have been real.

Nevertheless, Florida Baptists are far more united in our agreement that legal change is needed than we are divided about some of the difficult circumstances about which disagreement exists. Those areas of disagreement represent a minute percentage of the 1.5 million abortions performed annually nationwide.

We believe human life to be sacred and that it begins at conception. Among the many threats to the preservation and development of human life, abortion has become a major threat. The right of human life must be protected by the State. Thus, we call upon Florida Baptists to support legislation that will achieve the dramatic saving and nurturing of human life.

In order to implement our commitment to the sanctity of human life, We direct: That the Committee on Nominations recommend to the Florida Baptist Convention, November 13-15, 1989, an Adhoc Committee of 15 persons that will plan, with the administrative staff of the Florida Baptist Convention, Florida Baptist Family Ministries, strategies that will follow through on this moral concern, i.e.; educational materials on Christian sexuality, crisis pregnancy centers, additional homes for unwed mothers, adoption, foster care, and other related ministries.

A Tribute To:



Mr. Clayton C. Dees August 18, 1898 - September 19, 1989

Clayton C. Dees and twin sister, Katie, were born to Summer and Ada Snipes Deees, August 18, 1898.

A man of God, a school teacher as a career; always gave God credit for any and all accomplishments he may have made. He felt and testified that he was called into the teaching profession where he spent 50 years.

In 1928 he married Euphia Whiddon Dees of Lake Bird. The couple moved to Day where they lived their entire life.

He became a Christian October 1917 after the Lord had been dealing with him during a revival meeting. He was saved while plowing a mule, kneeling down in the field and praying for God to save his soul. God saved him; he was baptized in October 1917, into the Brewer Lake Baptist Church where his parents were charter members. He was a member of Brewer Lake for 72 years and worked in every capacity of church work. He was Sunday School Director for many years, served as Deacon and chairman, clerk, teacher, building committee, and did much manual labor to help with the building projects.

The Dees were parents of three children, who were all saved in October. Euphia was saved in September 1941; Clyatte, the son, saved in October 1941; Peggy was saved October 14, 1944; and Mary Martha was saved October 14, 1949.

Clayton was from the old school with true values. He loved God, his wife, his family, his work, his church, his friends, his home and his country.



Bethel Creek Baptist Church

History of Bethel Creek Baptist Church

Lafayette County, Florida

On a hill beside a creek on Highway 53 in Lafayette County, Florida stood a small log church where the people who lived in the surrounding area came together to worship God. The area was sparsely settled and the membership was small, but Gid Singletary remembers his father being one of the ministers who preached there. Although it is not remembered the name of the church, it is known that the church burned. A cemetery was started behind the church and some of the tombstones date back to 1868. Some graves may be older than that as many graves have no tombstones.

On the same site as the log church that burned, a group of people met under the trees for their worship services. This continued on for a few months until God spoke to Rev. M.J. Fowler and told him to build a house for His people. Rev. Fowler contacted some of the men in the surrounding community and those who could made contributions of money or materials and Rev. Fowler laid all the blocks for the church. That is how Bethel Creek Baptist Church was born. Many people helped with the building of the church as palmettos had to be dug, and some trees were cut, windows hung, roof put on, etc., but Rev. Fowler laid all the blocks and became the first pastor.

In early 1949 the church was organized and on August 14, 1949, the church was dedicated and the people celebrated with an all-day service with dinner on the grounds. It was a time of rejoicing as God's people once again had a house in which to worship!

When the church was organized in 1949 it had 18 charter members. The enrollment has fluctuated during these 40 years. As there were times when there was no pastor. The current membership is 90.

Additions have been made to the original building. The additions consist of three Sunday School rooms, two restrooms and a Social Hall/educational room. Many improvements have been made to the cemetery. It was surveyed, enlarged, all trees removed and fenced on all four sides. Area lights have been installed on the church grounds and the church has been air-conditioned and carpeted. Signs have been erected.

The Lord continues to bless Bethel Creek Baptist Church as many people have been saved through its ministry.

A Brief History of Cherry Lake Baptist Church

Cherry Lake Baptist Church, like all other churches, has a very unique history.

Cherry Lake was an old community with many families living here on old family farms. The old Cherry Lake Community all of a sudden was changed into a very different situation. Cherry Lake Farms was a "NEW" community placed in the middle of an old community. The new community was made up of "city folk" who had been on the bread lines, out of work or working for W.P.A. These people found themselves in these circumstances because of the "Great Depression" of 1929-1939. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt had a brainstorm idea of a community that could be self-supporting, made up of people who needed and wanted to work and were in need of homes.

Cherry Lake Farms was a self-supporting community. It had its own printed money, furniture factory, water, telephone, telegraph and electrical services. The community had its own store, as well as cattle ranches and chicken farms. This store carried anything from fertilizer to arts and crafts, to a barber shop. Already discouraged, many of the people who came were faced with hard work and challenge and decided to leave. Many of the "hardy" hard workers stayed after the exodus of the discouraged.

Those who stayed saw a need to worship. This need to worship had caused some to go to town and other places to gather for worship with other believers. There was a vision for a Baptist work in the new community. A group of dedicated people formed a cottage prayer meeting. Some encouragement came from a group of Christians in Madison. This encouragement caused at least nine adults and two teenagers to meet one Sunday afternoon in the "Camp Men's Hall" to organize a Missionary Baptist Church. Reverend W.T. Rycroft called this meeting to order as the temporary Moderator. The meeting was then turned over to Judge J.F. McCall who gave some instructions to the group on how to organize a church.

The group adopted the *Articles of Faith* and the *Covenant*. Those present were: Reverend W.T. Rycroft, Mamie Rycroft, Reverend John R. Collins, Gracia Collins, Johnnie Grace Collins, Miriam Collins, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Eville, Mr. and Mrs. H.E. Lamuns and Simmie Smith.

Reverend John R. Collins, who had been ordained at Moseley Hall Baptist Church a few months before, was elected as pastor. Worship services were held on the third and fourth Sundays. Prayer meetings were held on Tuesday evenings, and were regular worship services - new members were received into the church.

Mr. F.B. Eville and Mr. H.E. Lamuns were elected as the first deacons. Mrs. Frank Eville was the first church clerk. The Pastor's salary was set at \$10.00 per month.

Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Society and a Baptist Young Peoples Union (B.Y.P.U.) added strength to the church. The first organized visitation committee was formed in June of 1937 consisting of three women.

In 1937 more deacons were added to the church by ordination. Also a Board of Trustees was appointed. Mr. W.L. Stokes was elected church clerk in 1937.

During the first revival, Reverend Roebuck preached and there were 37 new members added.

In 1951 the church needed a spiritual rebuilding and was also without a pastor. Reverend John R. Colling was called back as pastor and the Florida Baptist Convention supplemented his salary for a while.

The church was housed, first in the "Camp Men's Hall", then the school supply building, then the Hinton House and then growth had set up a need for a new place to

worship and grow. Just as the Hinton House was purchased for \$1,500.00 and paid off in installments, the new church building would be started in a type of installment plan. Later as the church grew, a pastorium was built so the pastor could live on the field. An educational building and fellowship hall was completed in 1976.






