

A motion was made and carried that the Clerk be instructed to have the Associational Minutes published with in sixty days from adjournment of the Association.

It was moved and carried that this body adjourn until 9:30 o'clock, Wednesday a.m.

SECOND DAY

The Minutes of the previous day were read by the Clerk, and adopted. It was moved and carried that Miss Susie Humphrey and Mrs. W. C. Loper be recognized as messengers from New Hopeful Church; also, Brothers A. M. Parker and J. L. Odum from San Pedro Church.

Report of treasurer was read and adopted. It was moved and carried that the treasurer pay S. B. Cole \$1.00 for postage on Associational Church letters.

Report on Orphanage was read by Brother Farnell, and after discussion by Brother Farnell and Mrs. Peelman, was adopted.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotional services were held. Moderator called the meeting to order. Report on Sunday Schools was read by Brother C. L. Leggett, and after discussion by him, same was adopted.

The report on Periodicals was read by Brother R. R. Ware, and after discussion by Brothers Ware, C. Fowler, J. H. Poteet and W. R. Lambert same was adopted.

Report on Home Missions was read by Brother Townsend. After discussion by him, the report was adopted.

It was moved and carried that the Association decide on the next place of meeting, and it was decided to vote by rising to feet. The following churches had extended an invitation to the Association to meet with them: Greenville, Brewer Lake, Macedonia. After a ballot, Greenville received the next Association. A motion was made and seconded that the next Association be held on Friday before the third Sunday in October, but upon vote, same was defeated.

At eleven o'clock, Brother O'Kelly preached the Missionary Sermon. After the sermon, the body adjourned until 1:30 o'clock.

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ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in only one true and living God, and there are three in the God-head, the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Arricle 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is, by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace an t never finally fall away.

-Article 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord : Sapper are the only ordinances of Jesus Christ: that nothing is Baptism except immersion, and that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none except baptized believers are entitled to partiake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

Article 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of hands of the Presbytery.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASS'N.

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of the Middle Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sunday school enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gouppel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of members chosed by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty members or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty, and all ordained ministers of this Association in good standing. No church, however, shall have over four delegates.

Article 3. The letters sent by the churches at each session of the Association shall designate their respective members in full fellow-ship, those baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper, on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of the Scriptures contained in the Old and New Testaments, to declare our belief and understanding thereof, we therefore append our belief in twelve articles, and prosent them with our minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present, who shall hold their office until the next session of the body, and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings of the Association. The Clerk shall record the proceedings thereof and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall be no power to the Lord over God's heritage nor infringe upon the eternal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates, and if, upon examination, found to be othodox shall be received by the Association and the hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds set up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. Any amendment or alteration of this constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two succesive meetings of the Association. All questions coming before the Association shall be decided by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Article 10. The Association shall have power:

First. To provide for the general union of the churches.

Second. To give the churches advice in matters of difficulty.

Third. To inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at the meeting of the Association.

Fourth. To withdraw all connection with any church or churches in the union that shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God.

Fifth. To appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association, as specified by the chi rches, and when not specified it shall be appropriated to promote the best interest of the Master's cause.

Sixth. To adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board is the only great inter-State missionary organization of Southern Baptists. Its work is largely co-operative in connection with various State Mission agencies. It thus forms a bond of union and has probably been the greatest force among Southern Baptists for the unification of our denomination.

Through this agency Southern Baptists in the largest way make it possible for the strong to help the weak. The principle work of the Board is, therefore, in the weaker States of the Mississippi Va: ley and the Western States of our territory. Yet the changes in our industrial and business life, and in the cities and country-side of the older States are so great that increasing attention must begive to the needs of the older sections.

The problem in the cities of the South is growing acute in many places like Birmingham, St. Louis, New Orleans and Memphis. The Home Mission Board is helping to solve this problem and to meet the lemands as rapidly as funds will justify.

Evangelistic campaigns by the Evangelistic Department of the Home Mission Board are proving a mighty factor in the cities.

An opposite problem is presented in the changing conditions of

country life, where we must go with greater forces of men, and money. In the country lies the greatest numerical strength of Baptists and yet there is found our greatest weakness in point of efficiency.

Through the missionary and enlistment forces of the Home Mission Board much is being done to conserve our vast host of country Baptists and to enlist them in our denominational work.

The Board has just closed the most remarkable year of its history, both in the amount of finds received and in the results accomplished, as shown in the Board's report to the Southern Baptist Convention in Chattanooga in May.

At an annual meeting of the Board in June 1920, the work was laid out on a basis of 100 per cent greater than any previous year. The calls were so numerous and compelling, fields so white unto harvest, and the spirit of the brotherhood so optimistic in view of our great success in the 75 Million Campaign, that the Board, by the urgent advice of the various State Mission Secretaries, was emboldened to project its work on a new and vastly enlarged scale.

At that time cotton was forty cents a pound. The prices dropped so suddenly and drastically that during half the year cotton was only about ten cents. This brought a serious financial situation with the Board. Heavy obligations had been assumed which could not be cast off. The Board retrenched where it was possible, but in spite of this had to report a debt of \$727,622.00. Consequently for the new year they have had to retrench very materially in order to take care of the indebtedness as well as the current expense.

The Board needs immediate help in order to maintain its credit at the bunks, to meet the current expense, and lessen the burdensome debt.

Let us conclude this report with a brief statement of results of the year's work which are truly inspiring:

In the EVANGELISTIC DEPARTMENT there were 15,567 baptisms, 22,689 additions to the churches. Since the Department of Evangelism was organized in 1907 there have been baptized 124,100 converts, with a total of additions to the churches of 169,102 members; and 17,611 volunteers for the ministry and mission work. A great record, indeed.

Among the FOREIGNERS, INDIANS and NEGROES there were 25,532 baptisms, additions 50,307. We had eighty enlistment workers who rendered 5,336 weeks of service; in our SANATORIUM for the sufferers of the great White Plague there were 298 patients treated and we have a property worth \$400,000.00; in the work among the

SOLDIERS and SEAMEN there were 3,331 professions of faith and at our Seamen's Institute, Jacksonville, Florida, the boys from the seas wrote home 6,049 letters; in thirty-seven MOUNTAIN SCHOOLS 6,183 conversions and we have property valued at \$1,688,000; in CHURCH EXTENSION the Board aided 824 churches with loans or gifts and there were 1,084 others asking aid which could not be helped; in the PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT the Board distributed 5,641,000 tracts and sent forth thousands of copies of various books.

The above sets forth briefly some of the inspiring accomplishments of our Home Mission Board and attests the efficiency of this great agency in helping to make the South Christian and Baptistic and through it to bring the same blessing to the whole world.

We recommend that earnest prayer be offered constantly for our great Home Mission work and that the churches immediately come to the help of the Board with contributions in order that the glorious work may be carried forward and the Board may soon be relieved from its burdensome debt.

We, your committee, earnestly recommend that we as Mission ary Baptists contribute more liberally in the future to our pastors than we have in the past for we feel that our pastors have a hard time preaching the Gospel.

It is hard to understand how Missionary Baptists can proclaim to the world that they accept the New Testament as a rule of faith and practice and condemn all other religious bodies for not doing the same, and at the same time refuse to make a scriptural support to their pastor according to 1st Cor. 9-14; Gal. 6-6 and many others that can be found in the Bible. We also find that some churches promised their pastor a salary and did not come up to it.

We earnestly recommend that we come up to our obligations along this line and we hope by the help of God that we get morn Missionary spirit in us and when we do we will take better care of our pastors.

Our Lord commissioned His disciples to be His witness in all the world. It is interesting to note that in our 75 Million Campaign we are simply adopting the program of Jesus. We did not have to make a program. We have one already given us by our Lord. And the things we are seeking to do are exactly the things which Jesus did and taught.

The question of whether we shall engage in World Lissions is ultimately a question of loyalty to Christ our Lord. The question for us then, is not whether we believe in Foreign Missions, but do we believe in Jesus Christ and accept His program of service?

2. The other appeal is the world's need of the gospel. Jesus said: "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white

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already to harvest." The heart of the call that carried Paul from Asia to Europe was the appeal of need. "Come over into Macedonia and help us." It was a cry of need, a call for help.

Both these appeals are still binding. Let us willingly respond to this two-fold call from heaven and earth, saying, "Here am ', Lord. send me," use me.

Your committee on Christian Education begs to submit that Florida Baptists are blessed with one of the best educational institutions in the southland. John B. Stetson University takes rank with the leading institutions in this country.

We are due to this school our prayers, our boys and girls and our money.

It is now no longer necessary for our young men and women to leave the state for specialized training in higher education.

We take it that all the knowledge received in school is not necessarily Christian. We submit for your consideration that the term as usually applied is a misnomer. The term "Christian" means

Christ-like, hence Christian education would necessarily be obtained through a study of His Word.

In as much as a great majority of our young people will never enter the pales of our higher institutions, we suggest that greater emphasis be placed on the home life (not to the distraction of the schools), in the Christian education by a more diligent study of God's Holy Word, in the family circle, by reading the state paper, Baptist Witness, a well selected library and this accompanied by good music.

As to education in our schools we believe it is a wise provision that the state excludes sectarian and atesistic teachings from the system, but it is the duty of the citizenship to see to it that men and women of Christian character are employed to fill the places of such commanding influence.

We urge that the Srnday schools make use of the "Child's Gem," "Kind Words", and "Baptist Boys and Girls," all published by our Sunday School Board.

All Missionary Baptists should keep in touch with the missionary activities of our denomination, by reading "Home and Foreign field", the missionary journal of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Our women will find inspiration in reading the "Royal Service" published by the Women's Missionary Union.

But the most important of all, perhaps, we urge our people to subscribe to and read our own state paper, "The Florida Baptist Witness," as a means of keeping informed concerning our denominational work in Florida, believing that with information will come inspiration.

Last, we would recommend that all our membership have and use plenty of good literature in the homes. Hundreds of magazines and books are published today that should not find their way into christian homes. We, as Baptists and Christians, should select the literature that make up our home libraries. Of course the Bible should be the first selection, but we should furnish the young people with wholesome literature to read instead of allowing some one else to furnish them something they should not read.
