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## ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in only one true and living God, and there are three in the God-head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God and the only true faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is, by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is Baptism except immersion, and that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none except baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

Article 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of hands of the Presbytery.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of the Middle Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, Colportage, Sunday school enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty members or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty, and all ordained ministers of this Association in good standing. No church, however, shall have over four delegates.

Article 3. The letters sent by the churches at each session of the Association shall designate their respective members in full fellowship those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper, on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of the Scriptures contained in the Old and New Testaments, to declare our belief and understanding thereof, we therefore append our belief in twelve articles, and present them with our minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present, who shall hold their office until the next session of the body, and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings of the Association. The Clerk shall record the proceedings thereof and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall be no power to the Lord over God's heritage nor infringe upon the eternal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates, and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox shall be received by the Association and the hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds set up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. Any amendment or alteration of this constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two successive meetings of the Association. All questions

coming before the Association shall be decided by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Article 10. The Association shall have power:

First. To provide for the general union of the churches.

Second. To give the churches advice in matters of difficulty.

Third. To inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at the meeting of the Association.

Fourth. To withdraw all connection with any church or churches in the union that shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed word of God.

Fifth. To appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association, as specified by the churches, and when not specified it shall be appropriated to promote the best interest of the Master's cause.

Sixth. To adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

#### REPORT ON LAYMAN'S MOVEMENT

The Layman's Movement is an organized effort on the part of our denomination to enlist the laymen of our churches in the work of the Kingdom. It is an effort to lay upon the hearts and consciences of our brethren their obligation as stewards of the manifold grace of God. It is an effort to get our men to study the doctrines of stewardship and missions as taught in the word of God, and to study the needs of the fields of work with a view to increase interest and efficiency in the service of the Lord.

The Laymen's Movement needs special emphasis in the Middle Florida Association at this time. Our men are not reading our missionary literature. We are not informed as to the needs, the status and progress of the work. God says, "my people perish for lack of knowledge." That is just as true today as when first written. At the best we can do we are all very ignorant, but we are guilty before God, if we do not try to learn all we can. Those redeemed by God's grace ought to be anxious to learn all they can about God's will and His work.

We have heard the work of the Kingdom spoken of as a man's job. What the laymen's movement seeks to do is to get the men on the job. The majority of our men have never taken the work of the Lord seriously. Jesus taught us to put the Kingdom of God first.

In view of the needs of the work we recommend:

First. That one man be put in charge of this movement in this Association and urged to enlist the men in all our churches in the study of the Bible Doctrine of Stewardship or Trusteeship, in the reading of the Baptist Witness and Home and Foreign Fields, and in the study of the fields of service. Let the men have mission study classes as well as the women.

Second. That this one man try to get one man in each church to actively represent and foster the movement in his church.

Third. That this Association elect W. C. Wells, of Madison, as the Association representative of the Laymen's Movement.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

No other phase of our Baptist work has had such wonderful growth in recent years as the Sunday school. According to the best and most reliable reports from the fields, the Southern Baptists have now 29,072 white Baptist churches with 3,281 schools in these Baptist churches. The membership in these schools reaches the grand total of 2,193,591. While this looks rosy we must think of the church members that do not attend any Sunday school; and just think of the more than 9,000,000 prospects for our Baptist Sunday schools. Surely there is room for growth.

It is now estimated that there are 200,000 officers and teachers in our schools, but if we had, all now need to teach, we should have 400,000. During the past twenty years the Sunday School Board has issued 87,000 normal course diplomas, and during 1921 more than 17,000 diplomas were issued. With this fine showing not more than one-third of the total number of officers and teachers have had any teacher training.

In Florida in 1917 there were 435 Sunday schools in our Baptist churches, with a membership of nearly 32,000, with nearly 3,000 officers and teachers. For 1922, with the best and closest estimates, we have 560 Sunday schools with 43,000 pupils; with six months of the present year, 1922, there have been 91 teacher-training classes held, 226 diplomas granted, 869 seals awarded, and the indications that 1922 will be the best Sunday school year that Florida Baptists have ever seen, or seen by Florida Baptists. Part of this growth is due to the excellent field work done by capable young men and young women during the summers of 1919, 1920 and 1921. In spite of the good work done there are now more than 200 Baptist churches out of the 763 that have no Sunday schools. The cry is for leadership in the work.

Therefore, brethren, realizing the great good that this teaching and working half of the church is accomplishing for our Lord and Master, may our prayers ever go up for a continuous en-

thusiastic revival in both Sunday school and church, until we shall have Sunday school leaders in every church and community throughout the land.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

The Baptist Orphanage at Arcadia, Florida, is in a very serious condition, in several ways and for several reasons. We have a hundred and twenty children there now, and many others are knocking for entrance who are worthy. There is a great deal of repairing needs to be done in order to keep the property in good condition. New buildings and enlargements of every kind is needed in order to meet the demands for which the Orphanage stands, namely; to house, care for and train the Baptist orphans of the State, to say nothing of other orphans.

The above conditions exists because the Baptist of the State have not, and are not, making the proper provisions financially for this, one of the most important institutions in the State. The 75 million campaign only gives the Orphanage \$20,000.00 a year when they need \$30,000.00 without enlargements, to enlarge it would take more. There are a few individuals, churches and Sunday Schools that make small contribution, but that is very small. The people have slacked off sending food and clothing, and therefore, their running expenses are more.

My brethren, if you and I fail to take care of this little babe it will be an eternal shame upon the name of our Lord and His cause. He has no other way to minister to the needs of these little ones than with our hearts, our hands and with our money. Listen at the scriptures. "And one you say unto them, depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit? Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone." James 2:16, 17.

Brethren of this Association, let us recommend that the churches and Sunday schools of this Association take a monthly cash collection and send direct to the Orphanage not to be credited to the campaign. Also let us send them food, clothes and bed clothes. Let us do these things for Christ sake.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The subject of Christian Education may be discussed from two standpoints: First, Training in the things pertaining to the work of the Kingdom; Second, Instruction in schools and colleges that are under the control of Christian influences and religious surroundings.

In our discussion of this question under this head at associations and other denominational meetings, we generally, and very properly, discuss it as referring to the last division or head. We shall, at this time, consider it from this viewpoint. Before beginning this matter from the viewpoint which we shall discuss it, may we not ascertain something about how the Mosaic law dealt with the subject of education and as to what Solomon said about it, and also as to how Christ considered it?

"And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be upon thy heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shall talk of them when thou sittest in thy house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." Deut. 6:6-7.

"Train up a child in the way he should go, and even when he is old he will not depart from it." Prov. 22:6.

"Correct thy son and he will give thee rest; yea, he will give delight unto thy soul." Prov. 29:17.

"A child left to himself causeth shame to his mother." Prov. 29:15.

"And early in the morning he came again unto the Temple and all the people came unto Him; and he sat down, and taught them." John 8:2. This refers to the teaching of Jesus.

"As he was teaching the people in the Temple, and preaching the Gospel, there came upon Him the Chief Priests." Luke 20:1.

The Baptists of Florida have a school where young people can go and be under the influences of Christian teachers. The cost of attending this school is reasonable and is within the reach of almost anyone who desires to go and is really interested in being educated under environments that will make better men and better women. The fact that one has been educated in a school fostered by a religious denomination will have a tendency to make that person a better man or a better woman. One gets from school more than mental development and knowledge. There is a sentiment that goes with one through life for his Alma Mater. We do not want to be narrow, but if we, as Baptists, do not have the truth, as we understand the truth, taught, then we should cease to be Baptists and be something else.

It is no fuss we have to make with the State Colleges or other schools, but the ideals held up before the young folks in the State Colleges are not as high and cannot possibly be as high as the ideals of the Christian schools and schools fostered by the different denominations. The State school necessarily trains more for commercialism; the State school trains that the pupil may make money, but the school under religious influences, the denominational school, if you please, trains to make better men and better women, and Jesus, the perfect Man, is held up as the Ideal.

Christian Education connotes an education that develops the mind and develops the soul and makes not only for mental betterment, but makes for spiritual development. Christian Education necessarily takes Christ in and any education that does not take Christ in is built upon a false foundation and will not make the best men and the best women. Christian Education forgets evolution, but remembers Jehovah; Christian Education gets away from the monkey and monkeying and elevates the man; Christian Education betters Earth and reaches Heaven.

## SECOND DAY

Devotional services by J. H. Poteet.

Meeting called to order by the Moderator.

A motion to defer reading the minutes of the former day until the close of the Association; motion carried.

Brother S. L. Loudermilk made a short talk bringing greetings from Miami Association.

Reports on Foreign, Home and State Missions were read, and motion and second to adopt. After the reading the report on the 75 million campaign, as the report on the 75 million campaign covered practically the same ground as the mission reports, there was a motion and second to adopt only the report on the 75 million campaign; motion carried.

## REPORT ON 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN

Since other committees have been appointed to report on all phases of the work fostered by the 75 Million Campaign except Foreign, Home and State Missions your Committee brings a report only on these phases of the campaign. However, we deem it our duty to report on the progress and present status of the campaign as a whole.

Our Financial Achievements: Our contributions to Missions, Benevolence and Christian Education during the first three years of the five-year period have reached the grand total of \$35,152,211.69, which is more than twice as much as we gave to the same objects the three years immediately preceding the campaign. More than nine millions of this went to Christian Education. The campaign came just in the nick of time to save some of our Christian schools and to give new hope to the cause



of Christian education. In round numbers two and one-half millions of the more than 35 millions has gone to our Orphanage. In Florida the State Board of Missions sends a check every month for \$1,500 to our Orphanage in Arcadia, even if every cent of the money has to be borrowed. This shows us that the campaign while emphasizing the larger phases of our work is by no means neglecting the orphan.

The total expense of the Southwide campaign has been only a fraction more than four per cent to date. It will be less in the end.

But our contributions, however large, are not an end in themselves, but a means to an end. The most important thing is the work our increased offerings have enabled us to do. In the field of evangelism we have received 150,000 more converts for baptism during the first three years of the campaign than in the three years immediately preceding. We have increased the number of our Sunday schools by 3,000 and the number of pupils by 400,000. Two hundred and eight new missionaries have been sent out to foreign fields, the native workers in our foreign fields have been increased from 771 to 1,173; 117 new churches have been organized and 211 new Sunday schools with a gain of 17,576 pupils. We have baptized in our foreign mission work 21,723 since the campaign began.

While our receipts at home to foreign missions fell off last year 29 percent the gifts of our converts on our foreign fields increased 57 percent. This is a rebuke and a challenge to us.

The very success of our work on our foreign fields will embarrass us, if we do not push the battle with vigor. We must not only hold the ground already taken, but also enlarge and strengthen our work, else we shall lose a part of what we have already done. It is no time for retrenchment.

Our Foreign Mission Board is beginning work in the new and promising fields of Spain, Jugo-Slavia, Hungary, Roumania, Southern Russia, Palestine and Siberia. Europe's Macedonian cry is as appealing today as in Paul's day and the needs are as challenging and urgent.

In Roumania we have a nucleus of 20,000 Baptists now. These have suffered the bitterest persecutions. In July, 1920, Dr. J. H. Rushbrooke, our Baptist Commissioner for Europe, succeeded in getting the Roumanian ordinance permitting unjust discriminations against Baptists and barbarous treatment of them repealed, but the persecutions have not ceased and our brethren and sisters there need our sympathies, our prayers and our help.

The past convention year witnessed the establishment of contact with Russian Baptists. We gave \$46,000 through our Foreign Mission Board to relief work in Russia, and probably hundreds of thousands through other channels. We appropriated \$7,000, which amount was equaled by our Northern brethren, to have Bibles and Testaments printed in Russian and distributed. This was done at such small cost that with \$14,000 we distributed 100,000 copies of Bibles and Testaments.

The word of God is proving to be its own evangel in Russia. In 1914, just eight years ago, there were said to be 100,000 Baptists in Russia. Today there are 1,000,000. Dr. Gill, Superintendent of our work in Europe, says there are not less than 5,000,000.

All that a large portion of the people in Russia need in order to become Baptists is a chance, and some are coming to us almost without that. All they need is a New Testament and somebody to baptize them. "No spiritual movement in modern times is so striking and impressive as the Baptist movement in Russia," says October Home and Foreign Fields. The Greek Catholic Church, the State Church of Russia, never departed from Bible baptism as did the Roman Catholics. Already accepting immersion and longing for political and religious freedom Russians are peculiarly ripe for the Baptist message of an open Bible, soul-liberty, and a free church in a free state. We have never had such an opportunity to make Baptists since John baptized the multitudes in the Jordan as we have in Russia and Siberia today and we'll never have another such opportunity in any country while the world stands. With adequate aid to our cause there we would have in ten years more Baptists in Russia than in all the rest of the world combined.

We quote two paragraphs from the pamphlet, "Three Marvelous Years of the 75 Million Campaign," by Dr. S. B. Rogers:

"Achievements in Home Missions. Evangelism, Enlightenment and Enlistment form the keynote of the work of the Home Mission Board. During the three years of the campaign period this agency has employed on its own account and through its co-operative work an average of 1,405 missionaries, and reports for that period, 134,832 baptisms, 218,371 additions to the churches, 2,276 Sunday schools and 759 churches organized, 1,409 houses of worship built or repaired, and 9,523 volunteers for special Christian service.

In addition to its work along evangelistic and enlistment lines, the Home Board reports the completion of its \$1,000,000 Church Building Loan Fund, launching of an encouraging work among the Jews, establishment at Jacksonville, Fla., of the Seaman's Institute, vast improvement in 38 mountain mission schools with more than 6,000 pupils, establishment at El Paso, Texas, of a modern tuberculosis sanatorium, and strengthening of its work in Cuba and Panama and among foreigners, Indians and negroes."

Accomplishments of the Campaign in Florida—In the two and one-half years immediately preceding the campaign we gave to all causes \$306,086.48. In the first two and one-half years of the campaign we gave \$631,959.75, or a little more than double the amount before. From 1919 to 1921 the number of our churches increased from 720 to 763, membership from 60,874 to 72,385, number of church buildings from 571 to 647, and the number of houseless churches decreased from 149 to 104. Number of pupils in Sunday school increased from 37,116 to 42,933, the membership in our B. Y. P. U.'s, Sr. and Jr., from 5,253 to 8,704, study classes of B. Y. P. U. from 24 to 142, and diplomas and certificates granted from 190 to 1,199. There has been a marked gain in the spirit of unity and co-operation and a general advance all along the line in our work.

There is one fact in the present status of the campaign which calls for special observation and which ought to cause us grave concern and challenge and stir us to renewed interest and effort. While in the results accomplished there has been a steady advance, our receipts last convention year fell off from the pre-

vious year about three-quarters of a million dollars for Foreign Missions alone, and nearly one-half million for Home Missions and for other objects somewhat in proportion. To date this year the receipts show a decided loss over last year. We face a crisis in all our work—Foreign, Home and State Missions, Orphanages, Hospitals, Ministerial Relief and Christian Education.

In order to meet the need and answer the challenge of the hour we recommend:

1. More preaching on the campaign, more emphasis upon the needs of the work, in our Sunday schools, W. M. U. and prayer meetings.

2. A follow-up campaign between now and Christmas to secure pledges from new members and from individuals and churches that did not subscribe at first.

3. That the Association be divided into three or four districts with an interested leader in each to press the campaign in securing new subscriptions and in trying to get old pledges paid.

4. That these same leaders in these districts do their best to increase the number of tithers in all our churches, because systematic, proportionate giving is necessary to put our work on a safe basis.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Temperance means self-control. It is neither prohibition nor total abstinence, neither is it the consequence of prohibitory laws by legislative enactments; it is the fruit of the spirit (Gal. 5:23).

Since we see that temperance is the fruit of the indwelling Spirit of God, it comes to be a Christian virtue, and cannot be produced by any other, save the author of Christianity, who is the Holy Spirit.

Prohibition has failed in many instances to produce soberness and abolish drunkenness, but temperance has never failed.

Temperance as a Christian virtue extends far beyond the use of intoxicating liquors, yea, it extends to every phase of the Christian life. Temperance not only means self control in the satisfying of our thirst for strong drink, but the self control of our appetites over luxuries and things injurious to our health and gluttonous eating, control of our tempers and tongues; to the excessive misuse of the Lord's day, worldly entertainment pleasures and societies, modern fashions and styles, and the excessive greed for worldly fame or worldly gain. The lack of the virtue of temperance in God's people in any of these things is just as abominable and displeasing to God, dishonorable to Christianity and as contrary to the laws of Christianity as drunkenness and a church, or the churches, have just as much Scripture authority to make and enforce prohibitory laws against these things (and we know that they have none) as they have against the manufacture and sale of strong drink.

If the churches would turn their hands to the God given method of developing the virtue of temperance in the churches, by "teaching and admonishing," rather than the making and enforcement of law, and when the "teaching and admonishing" fails to withdraw fellowship; God would be glorified by the churches being obedient to His Word, the churches would be blest in not being so lacking of the virtue of temperance, the light of Christianity and the power of the indwelling Spirit of God would be more perfectly seen and appreciated in the churches, and there would be a wider difference between the churches and the world.

Brethren, "If we live by the Spirit, by the Spirit let us also walk," for this purpose was He given that He might guide us into all the truth, and thus produce not only the virtue of temperance, but all other Christian virtues.

Among us, there are no men who toil more faithfully than our ministers, and if we would pay them a salary equal to their needs, they could do much more efficient service.

We are going in a circle in this Association. The churches are getting as good men as they pay for and the pastor is giving value received for what he gets. If we have better preachers we must learn to discharge our obligation to them more readily, not as a matter of charity, but as an offering to God for his free gift to us. We recommend that the churches pray for light and liber-

ality, and that they measure up to their responsibility in this matter.
