ARTICLES OF FAITH

- Article 1. We believe in one and only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.
- Article 2. We believe that the Holy Scripture composed of both the Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice of God's people.
- Article 3. We believe the doctrine of Sovereign, particular and eternal election.
 - Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.
- Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.
- Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ, which is the consequence of faith in Christ.
- Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit.
- Article 8. We believe that the saints are preserved by grace and persevere in grace and will never finally fall away.
- Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of a New Testament church, that immersion is the only Scriptural baptism, and believers are the only Scriptural subjects for baptism, and none but baptized believers who are members of Missionary Baptist churches in good standing are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.
- Article 10. We believe in the resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked dead, and that both will be judged according to the deeds done in the body.
- Article 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.
- Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are Divinely called, having been ordained by prayer and the imposition of the hands of a presbytery duly authorized by a Missionary Baptist Church.

CONSTITUTION OF MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MID-DLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."
- Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by Missionary Baptist churches, who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, chairmen of the standing committees, and pastors of churches in this Association.
- Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof. In no case shall any one church be entitled to more than five messengers.

THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. Not more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

EVANGELISM, SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND B. T. U. REPORT

"God's Call to Support Evangelism, Sunday Schools and B. T. U."

Jesus' words, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you," constitute not only a call to support, but a command to engage in evangelism, teaching and training.

Evangelism

It is a source of real joy to notice in the digest of the church letters from 34 churches of our association that 32 of these conducted revival services at some time during the year, and that there were added to our numbers by baptism 208, by letter and otherwise 144. However, it is with poignant regret that your committee observes the neglect of personal evangelism and individual effort at soul-winning on the part of the great majority of our membership in nearly every church in our association. Your committee calls this body to face our primary duty of personal evangelism, to use our every effort to awaken our several memberships from their state of lethargy in this regard, and to go forward with every individual Christian carrying his own message of Jesus' saving love to the lost all about us.

Sunday Schools

As reported last year, there yet seems to be general lack of interest in our associational Sunday School work. We are glad, however, to report that out of the 39 churches in our association 34

have Sunday Schools, as against 30 schools last year (only 24 of which were reported in church letters). Our schools have a present enrollment of 1,966, as compared to approximately 2,700 last year (only 2,059 of which were reported in church letters). There have been 176 teacher training awards given during the year, a sign which your committee considers hopeful and encouraging. We feel that our teaching service, the Sunday School, is a very central need of the church which only the contentedly ignorant would be willing to do without. We therefore suggest that more time and effort be put upon our Sunday Schools, and that each church do its best to have its force of teachers take advantage of definite Sunday School teacher training during the coming year.

B. T. U.

The Baptist Training Union is truly a training camp for Christian soldiers of all ages who want to better equip themselves for the battle for Christ. We deplore the fact that no more of our people take an interest in such training and that fewer than half of the churches in our association have any kind of B. T. U. work. It is gratifying to note some good progress over 1934, however. According to latest figures from our State office, there are 34 individual unions in 19 different churches, as against 22 unions in 11 churches last year. Study course awards in number 134 have been given in Middle Florida Association this year. Your committee would particularly call the attention of the 20 churches having no training program to the value of such work, and earnestly pray for continued progress in the ensuing year.

REPORT ON MISSIONS AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

What is the Baptist Cooperative Program? Dr. T. F. Calloway, President of the Georgia Baptist State Convention, states, "Our Cooperative Program is the comprehensive plan through which every member in every church in the Southern Baptist Convention may support every cause fostered and thereby combine under God to give the whole Gospel of the whole Christ for the whole man, to the whole world."

Instead of presenting one cause in the program to the exclusion of others, its advocates present all the causes, and appeal for the support of them all on a pro rata basis, according to their relative needs. It is, therefore, an all inclusive plan. State, Home and Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Hospitals, Orphanages and Old Ministers' Relief are combined in one budget, each of these causes receiving its pro rata share of every undesignated dollar given to the Program each week. This enables each giver to have some part in carrying the whole Program of Jesus each time he makes an offering to the Cooperative Program.

State Missions—Each of the eighteen States in the Southern Baptist Convention territory and the District of Columbia is organized with a view to evangelizing, enlisting, teaching, training and utilizing its constituency in the quickest and most effective way possible.

A hundred years ago there were only about 210,000 Baptists in the South. Now there are more than 4,277,050 white Baptists with 24,360 churches, and almost as many more Negro Baptists. But 7,130 of these churches gave nothing of record to any of the causes fostered last year. The Middle Florida Association gave through "Specials and Cooperative Program" this year \$1,662.37, a gain of \$258.24 over

Home Missions-From every Home Mission field there come reports of gracious revivals and large ingatherings. We have more than 200 home missionaries, with over 400 mission stations in our home territory, in Cuba and the Panama Canal Zone. The Home Board operates five Good-Will Centers, two Rescue Missions and a Seaman's Institute, fifteen schools in Panama, Cuba and the homeland, and one Tuberculosis Sanitorium in Texas.

Foreign Missions-Our 377 missionaries and 2,394 native workers in the fourteen different foreign countries in which we are working baptized 17,794 last year, the largest number in the history of the Board in one year. Of the 2,728 churches, with a total membership of 204,894 in foreign countries, 2,000 of these churches are selfsupporting. The largest number of baptisms reported last year from any foreign country was 6.050 in Roumania.

There are approximately 23,000,000 people in the Southland who are not affiliated with any church, and multiplied millions of unsaved people throughout the world. The task is great and the laborers few, and without God our efforts are fruitless; but, He has all power in heaven and on earth; therefore, "Through Christ who strengtheneth us," we can and must evangelize, teach, train and heal this sinning, suffering, dying world,

We thank the Lord for these wonderful accomplishments and spiritual blessings of the closing year. We appeal to each individual Baptist and to every church in our association to do your best this year in helping to win the world to Christ.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION, PERIODICALS AND TEMPERANCE

I. Christian education—what is it?

If we are to have Christian education it must be foundational. fundamentally and proportionately—first, foundationally.

I. The primary or first class room.

Someone asked when should a child's education start. The answer was, before it was born. Now having found the first class room we must consider the first in our school.

Roger W. Babson, I believe it was said that the mother of every successful business man was a Christian.

- I am told that back of nearly all of our great statesmen (not politicians) was a Christian mother.
- II. Proper impressions and heritages having thus been given, we consider:

Second fundamentals, which is law and order.

Thus we find the school room for Christian education is the

home, schools, churches, business, politics, society. In all these fields must stand the Christian teacher considered as a whole.

First, the Christian teacher with a Christian law.

If the individual is to get a rounded-out Christian education they must be walled in by law-Christian law. What is it?

:Monroe said it was equal rights for all and special favors to none. Jesus said, do unto others as you would have others do unto you. It's been named the golden rule. This law in the home, school, church, business, politics and society. This law will wall in those school rooms where-

Second, order can prevail.

With this disciplinary order effective-

- I. The home will become more than a hat peg.
- II. The schools and colleges will mould out that finished product (intellectually) of Christian citizenship.
- III. The church will become a mecca of life where God can speak to the hearts of men.
- IV. Business would become the Good Samaritan dealing out her just rewards to every man.
- V. Politics would become a law, through which God could speak to the nations.
- VI. Society would become an influence to preserve the character and virtue of the lives of our young men and women. And let us remember that every garden (Saul) not so walled in is open to be sapped by the tentacles of the octopus of selfishness and greed of which American people are more and more becoming a victim, which will lead us to know—

First, that the writer of this article has considered correctly the rounded out school room for a Christian education and, second, raises the question, are these school rooms being named for Christ.

III. Third, Christian education is not only foundational and fundamental, but is proportionately (I Cor. 12:4) diversities of gifts, but the same spirit.

First, if God has called us parents to head the home and teach our children, then we are obligated to God, to our children, to the nation through our children, and our happiness will largely be measured by our devotion to the task.

Second, if our gift is to serve in the church remember God is a jealous God refusing any other gods before him and we had better watch our ideas and opinions for to God we must give an account,

Third, if our gift is in business, God has said in Mal. 3:5 that he will be a swift witness against those that oppress the hireling in their wages. Look out, America. Again he said go to now ye rich men, weep and howl for your miseries that will come on you. James 5:1, in contrast he said, Prov. 19:17, he that hath pity upon the poor lendeth to the Lord and that which he hath given will he pay him again.

Fourth, if our calling is to teach, remember we are the stakes around which the mind and morals of students are to grow, and we are responsible for what we teach.

Fifth, if we have a political calling God has asked this question, Ps. 94:20, shall the throne (or political) of iniquity have fellowship with God, which (the political power) frameth mischief by a law.

Look out, pari-mutuel gambling laws, a legalized liquor traffic, slot machine taxation like Esau selling our souls for a mess of nottage.

If we have a social calling, remember we are not society-makers.

but society will be like that. Which of us is already made? So let's not lean on our schools and colleges and seminaries too much as a bulwark of our nation. But let's let them lean on us, the rugged education, giving to them proper seasoned timber out of which our colleges and seminaries can train great leaders in the commercial, political and religious fields who will honor God, glorify Christ and construct laws which will bless and make happy a free people.

Periodicals.

Remember the devil is that fallen angel and he has been greatly wounded because God would not tolerate his sin of pride in heaven. Therefore he was cast out and he knows he has but a short time on the earth. Therefore he is mad with our Father and our God and has purposed to get even with God and there being but one field in which he can even attempt to get men with him, and that is the destruction of immortal souls and through his shrewd, subtle craftiness he has and is making a conquest on the periodical field, having all the fat acres of our dailies, using them as a Hissop to sprinkle our nation with whiskey.

Many of our magazines are given over to lust lore and some generally accepted by our social standards as high in educational values, but as a spiritual dynamo they are as empty as a last year's bird's nest.

Many of our local papers are subsidized by local political and social standards and, alas, we are left with but here and there a sheet which sends out the clarion call of righteousness, speaking out like Jeremiah against the political, social, commercial and religious debaucheries of our day.

Like our own Baptist Witness, and we have an inkling how that editor's pen has been pressed to get silent on the great topics of the day. But he is not that type of a man and thus we ask that the Witness be allowed to visit each week all Baptist homes in our association, and let's let the news racks reel and groan under their load of propaganda not devised by our friend and let an editor plus a fine lot of contributors, who speak fearlessly on the great topics of the day, speak to us through 1936 as the Lord leads them to speak.

Temperance is another great field the devil is about to take.

First, intemperance in talk, gossiping, backbiting (dog under the doorstep), talking, slandering. The devil laughs. Paul told us about it.

Second, intemperance in money matters. Providence is providing all it can and we are canning all it gives. Like a sponge, always taking in and never giving out. No wonder we are dead like the Salt

Third, intemperate in dealing with each other. We do not stick together like once we did. We are in the foot of Daniel's image. Surely the Lord comes soon.

Fourth, intemperate in strong drink. Our political friends said they would pull us out of the besmirch of strong drink. Quickliest noticed lights in town now lead to strong drink. How about our drunks today multiplied by many numbers? Death by drunken car accidents is rising fast, and time and space fails us, but there is an old legend that woman will take the last drink and she is taking it. But thanks be unto God, among all of our conflicting problems there

are a great host who have not sold out to Baal, who, the world says, are fighting a losing fight. But when Jesus comes the battle will be over, the victory will be won, the crown will have been received. Then the price we now pay will not be worthy to be considered then.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT, BROTHERHOOD, RELIEF AND ANNUITY

Strange to say, until quite recently, our churches have been little interested in the old minister. Baptist ministers do not with pomp and ceremony take the "oath of poverty," but their ordination is almost equivalent to such an oath, and nearly every young man who enters the Baptist ministry may be morally certain that whatever his business ability he will be a poor man to the end of his days. Indeed, it has been regarded as almost a disgrace for him to be otherwise than poor.

If, then, the churches have practically sentenced the minister to perpetual poverty, what shall they do with him in old age? We know what they have done. They have doled out to him a miserable pittance and have occasionally, I fear, wounded his self-respect by making him feel that it was considered an act of charity. This treatment of the old minister has been styled by Mr. Joseph H. Odell, in an article in The Atlantic Monthly, "The Economic Crime of the Protestant Church."

At length our churches are awakening to the injustice to which they have subjected the battle-scarred veterans of the cross of Christ who are

Only waiting till the shadows Are a little longer grown.

It is a matter for profound rejoicing that the question of the provision for "the forgotten man" and his family has come to have such a prominent place in the minds of our Southern Baptist people and in the plans of our Convention. But if the unwritten history of retired pastors and their families could be made manifest, it would present such a record of penury, anxiety, self denial, and suffering as would bring the cause of the Relief and Annuity Board into the front rank among all the beneficiaries of the denomination.

Whoever forgets the veteran minister or his widow, the younger preachers themselves must not. By the Service Annuity plan it is now possible for practically every minister in our Convention to help secure for himself provision for disability or old age and care for his family when his days of toil are done.

Mindful of the time when they, too, shall be old or overtaken by calamity and shall not wish to become a charge upon relatives. shall not the younger preachers to the last possible man be enlisted in the Service Annuity plan? And even if they anticipate no need on their own part, shall they not for the sake of those who are bound with them in the sacred bonds of the ministry, press the cause of the

Relief and Annuity Board and uphold the hands of the noble Executive Secretary by membership in the Service Annuity?

It is occasion for mutual congratulation that the whole denomination is being deeply impressed with the fact that it is a matter of chivalry and honor and denominational self-respect to care for those who have spent and been spent in the Master's service; that it is a debt, a moral obligation. We will address ourselves to this golden task in the name and in the spirit of him who prematurely wore out his life in the gospel service.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

At the beginning of the associational year of 1935, we had 141 children in our institution. The average for 1934-35 was 143. We have received in the home 10 children and discharged 11. The applications of children, especially from half orphans is more than doubled this as compared with last. We have had many very sad cases of half orphans brought to our attention, but the funds that we receive made it impossible to assist them. It is our hope that we will be able to do a better part by our distressed children who had a parent living than we have done. The need for work in this field is very urgent. The children we have placed have gone to relatives or to schools. Some have secured a job. It has been very hard for the last three years to place our older children because of the scarcity of positions. We have kept in constant touch with business in this State and everytime it was possible for us to do so, we have placed one or more of our children. We have requests all along that necessitates our making a place for the younger children of the State and increase the turnover. This keeps us ever on the alert for places where our children can earn their living.

The buildings have been improved. All dormitories, except one, have been painted. The paint was paid for by the W. M. U.'s of Florida and the boys in the Home did the work. They also repaired the buildings. As soon as the nursery is finished and two of the dormitories are re-roofed, our buildings will be in good condition.

This has been a very difficult year in our Home. The first of July we had accumulated a deficit of \$1,642.03. Our receipts for the first six months of this year as compared with the first six months of 1934 were \$2,337.66 less. Had our income been equal to that of 1934, we would have had a balance of approximately \$700.00. We believe this condition is attributed to the freeze in Middle and South Florida, as this is the source from which most of our income is received. It is unfortunate that our institution receives its income from certain localities rather than State-wide. If the cooperation of our churches in Florida could be secured, there would never be any trouble about expenses.

The Sunday Schools give approximately half of our income. The Cooperative Program furnishes us with about 20 per cent and the other is divided between individuals, W. M. U.'s and churches.

The farm and dairy continue to play an important part in the operation of our institution. Each showed a balance at the close of the year. It pays to operate each of them.

The support of the Home should be more general than it is. The cooperation should be closer. The responsibility of the institution

should fall on every Baptist in Florida. The power to continue the Home lies in the Baptist churches in this State and it is very important that each church do something from time to time to protect its holdings and its children. Our institution can never enlarge under the support that it is now receiving. At times it is impossible to protect the investment that Baptists have made in our Home because of the lack of funds. This is an unwise procedure. If the cooperation of one-half of the churches and Sunday Schools can be secured, our Home can be filled to capacity and every item of expense could be paid monthly. With the calls of childhood coming to us as they now are, we believe that it is incumbent upon all to aid our distressed children.

The Home is deeply grateful for the support given it—for the money and donations of farm produce that were so liberally given from the farming sections last year; they are profoundly grateful. It is the desire of those in charge of the Home to do more for the needy childhood of our denomination and to give them a Christian home and Christian training and to see that gifts and our prayers can always be mindful of the value and importance of rearing children.

We, your committee, wish to recommend that the Home be given more consideration in this association and that we take more interest in our boys and girls whom we have accepted as our very own.
