THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

4. Not more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.

6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.

7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.

8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

Middle Florida Missionary Baptist Association

held with

Pleasant Grove (LaFayette County) Baptist Church

October 7, 8, 1941

Morning Session

2. Motion made and carried that messengers enrolled constitute working body of Association.
3. Motion made and carried that program as published be the order of business.
4. Motion made and carried that Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk be elected by the body instead of being nominated by committee.
5. Report on Sunday Schools, and B. T. U. read by Clerk, and motion made and carried that discussion be left open until later in session.
6. Motion made and carried to take up report on Relief and Annuity at this time and same was read by Rev. C. C. Kiser and on motion to adopt was spoken to by Bro. Kiser and Frank Andrews and adopted.
7. Rev. J. H. Sutley and wife of Peace River Association, were recognized, also Rev. Bob Catledge of Alachua Association. Rev. C. C. Kiser was recognized as a new pastor in our Association.
8. Doctrinal Sermon by Rev. M. D. Jackson, pastor of Greenville Church using as a text Matt. 16:18 and Matt. 28:18-20.

9. Motion made and carried that Dr. Harrison Griffin preside over body and introduce our State workers and this hour be given them to discuss missions and other matters.

13. Executive Committee report read by the Clerk and adopted.

19. Report on Children's Home read by G. F. Andrews and discussed by Supt. Johns and adopted. (A collection of \$25.03 was taken).

20. Report on Deceased Ministers read by O. A. Henderson and adopted.

21. Report on Ministerial Support and Brotherhood read by Clerk, discussed by Dr. Griffin and the Moderator and adopted.

22. Motion made and carried that we accept invitation of Madison church to meet with them for organization of Associational Brotherhood and the following committee was appointed to promote this meeting: M. D. Jackson, J. F. McCall, Guy McLain, Jake Vickers and Carl W. Burnett.

23. Missionary Sermon by Rev. J. L. Dyess using as subject: The Mission of a New Testament Church, and as a text, The Great Commission.

Afternoon Session

24. Devotional conducted by Rev. A. M. Rowe.

25. Report of Educational Director read by Miss Lamb and on motion to adopt was spoken to by her, and adopted.

26. The Moderator made report of Special Committee appointed by the Executive Committee in regard to Miss Lamb's work and motion made and carried that further consideration be left to Executive Committee.

27. Motion made and carried that resolution read by Bro. Jackson in regard to Miss Lamb be adopted and copy be presented to her and one be furnished Baptist Witness for publication.

31. Motion made and carried to give the Host Church a rising vote of thanks for their hospitality and fellowship in entertaining the Association.

33. Motion made and carried to pay Clerk and Treasurer their usual fees.

34. Report on Nominations read and adopted with provision for Executive Committee to appoint Sunday School Associational Officers.

35. Motion made and carried that nominations for Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk be made and then elect them by ballot. There being only one nomination for each of these offices a unanimous vote was cast for E. B. Browning as Moderator, Rev. M. D. Jackson as Vice-Moderator and Carl W. Burnett as Clerk.

36. Motion made and carried to adjourn to meet with Pine Grove Baptist Church on Tuesday and Wednesday after first Sunday in October, 1942.

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

The Relief and Annuity Board of our Southern Baptist Convention is graciously serving our pastors, missionaries and layworkers of the churches when they come to the age of retirement, whether that period comes as a result of disability or old age. The chief department of service of this Board is the Minister's Retirement Plan and Old Age Security Plan.

Our State of Florida became actively engaged in this method of caring for disabled or retired ministry and workers in July, 1939. According to report found in Table VII of 1940 minutes of this Association, not a third of the churches in our Association are supporting this all important phase of the work. We are unable to mention the number of pastors in the Association who are taking advantage of this plan, but it is hoped that all of the churches and pastors will find it worthy of their support.

The advantages in being a participant in the Retirement Plan are too numerous to mention here. As for the church, it has the full and happy assurance that their ministers will be cared for when they become too old to occupy a regular pulpit. The pastor has the assurance that the money he is investing will be finally returned. Again the pastor is assured that benefits from the State Reserve Fund may be received when he retires on account of total and permanent disability or when he retires on account of age (at 65 or thereafter).

The Ministers Retirement Plan has been pronounced sound by outstanding Actuaries, and will work well when properly supported. It is the one hope to solve the problem of dependency of disabled and aged ministers among Southern Baptists. May the Lord lead every pastor and every church to participate in this great Plan.

REPORT ON BAPTIST TRAINING UNION, SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND EVANGELISM

Church members must be trained to take the place of our present leaders. They are ready and anxious to be trained and our Baptist Training Union offers the best possible form of training.

We are very glad that some of the Churches of our association are at present conducting one or more Unions. We still think however that every Church should provide a place of training for their members so that they may become valuable leaders in our Churches.

Training Union Associational Conference week March 16-20, 1942, should be remembered.

We recommend that the Church leaders consider the importance of the Training Union and lend their support.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday School has been recognized by all our outstanding leaders as the essential teaching agency of the Church. It fulfills that part of the Great Commission which commands us to go forth and teach all Nations.

We have about thirty-eight Churches in our association and most of these Churches have a Sunday School. We believe that our Sunday School work is progressing and that our Teachers and Leaders are preparing themselves better and better every year. From information obtainable several Sunday Schools in our association have held Study Courses during the past twelve months.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools are becoming more popular every year and quite a number of Sunday Schools held very successful ones this past year, some reporting average attendance of around 100. Our associational Education Director, Miss Lamb, has been very active in helping the various Churches with Vacation Bible School's as well as all other phases of the work.

We recommend that every Church member seriously consider the value of his SUNDAY SCHOOL.

EVANGELISM

The heart of every Baptist present yesterday must have beat with joy as he listened to the very able sermon on "A New Testament Church." Why? Because we feel that Baptist churches are after the New Testament pattern. And they are in most things. Some are true in all things. But in the main thing most Baptist Churches are far from the New Testament plan. To what are we referring? We mean New Testament Evangelism.

It was for the purpose of evangelizing that New Testament churches were organized. There was no other reason for the beginning and the existence of a church in New Testament times except to preach the gospel to the lost. Today there is no other reason for the beginning and the existence of a church except to preach Christ and Him crucified to a dying world.

We might try to justify ourselves by saying that we maintain regular preaching of the gospel publicly in our churches. And most of our churches do. But we major on a public proclamation of the

gospel. In New Testament times the emphasis was upon personal evangelism. May we look at what the New Testament itself tells us. In John the first chapter we read concerning what was the beginning of the New Testament church by the Master Himself, vs. 35-42. These men mentioned here were not yet appointed apostles. They were ordinary laymen. If we read the 4th chapter of John we find the account of Jesus Himself winning the woman at the well. On many, many occasions Jesus won people personally.

Let us look next at the church at Jerusalem, the first church, after the ascension of Christ.

The parting words of Christ to the church were, "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." On the day of Pentecost there were 119 other preachers besides Peter. The second chapter of Acts reveals this.

When persecution arose and they were all scattered abroad they went everywhere preaching the word. Philip, a deacon, went to Samaria. He also went down into the desert country and presented Christ to the Ethiopian eunuch. We Baptists today make much ado about how Philip baptized the eunuch, but omit following the main example that Philip set for us. That of personally presenting Christ to a lost soul.

Until every member of a Baptist Church is seeking to evangelize as the members of the churches of the New Testament did can such a church really claim to be a 100% New Testament church.

Someone has said that Christ left the matter of winning the lost up to the church, that the church has turned it over to the preacher, and that the preacher has passed the responsibility on to his sermons. If the sermons do not win, too many preachers fail to do anything else.

We need more and more of the public proclamation of the gospel. But above all we need to get back to the New Testament plan of presenting the gospel to individuals here and there as we come into contact with them. We have many opportunities day by day as we come into contact with lost people. Every Baptist should carry with him at all times a copy of the New Testament and know how to use it to lead a lost person to Christ.

If we have experienced Christ in our own hearts how can we refrain from telling others about Him? The gospel is good news. Good news in any community spreads more by personal contacts than in any other way. The good news of the Christ can be spread better that way also.

How many of us can truthfully say what Paul said to the elders of Ephesus as recorded in Acts 20:17-26?

HOME MISSIONS.

On the Cuban field, according to the report of Superintendent M. N. McCall, there are fifteen more workers than were reported a year ago. The present force of 87 missionaries in Cuba delivered last year 9,815 sermons, made 55,714 missionary visits, baptized 261, and ministered to 4,544 church members in the 57 churches on the island.

Dr. J. W. Beagle, field secretary, reports 260 workers in the department of missions in the homeland. Thirty new Missionaries have been appointed. The 260 workers serve 186 churches and 498 mission stations. The 186 churches report a membership of 16,900. Our workers report 4,932 conversions, 2,468 baptisms, 21,726 contacted in personal work, 302 Sunday schools, 256 revival meetings.

The distributable Southwide dollar is divided as follows:

Foreign Missions, 50%; Home Missions, 23 1-3%; Relief and Annuity Board, 10 1-3%; Southern Seminary 4 1-5%; Baptist Bible Institute, 4 1-5%; New Orleans Hospital, 2 1-5%; Women's Missionary Union, 8-15%; American Seminary, 1%; Total 100%.

STATE MISSIONS.

The program of State Missions for the last year has been one of the best in the history of Florida Baptists—And the outlook for the future is most encouraging.

The program of work carried on in Florida is varied and far-reaching. Teaching, preaching, enlistment and the care of orphans are a part of the activities. And every department of the work supports the whole program.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Despite the threat of war and actual war, the Foreign Mission Board is able to report that the convention year just closed was one of the best of its long history of 96 years.

Through its 457 active missionaries and the nearly 3000 native workers the Board has been doing the work of teaching and preaching and healing in 16 countries of Africa, Asia, Europe and South America. 25,291 students have been taught, 136,994 patients have been ministered to and innumerable thousands have had the Gospel preached to them. The membership of the churches was increased by 18,542 who came by baptism. The 251,734 members contributed a total of \$379,896.00.

THE HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club is going stronger than ever. More money has come through the Club so far this year than any corresponding period since the Club started. The Club had paid a total (July 1, 1941) of approximately \$1,400,000 on the principal of our Southwide debts. It has stopped enough annual interest to pay the salaries of 95 foreign missionaries. The Southwide debt which was \$6,000,000 a few years ago, is now only \$2,500,000. We are fervently praying and devoutly hoping for a Debtless Denomination by 1945, the Centennial of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Our people are becoming more debt-conscious and more sick of debt. They want to get rid of all these debts and stop paying interest. They have set their hearts upon having a Debtless Denomination by 1945.

Our people believe every loyal church and every member who possibly can ought to help in this effort. Our people believe that when our pastors and other leaders intelligently and sympathetically present this matter to their people they will respond, many of them generously, some even sacrificially. It is up to our pastors to lead in this effort.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is scriptural. All the causes included in the program are found in the Great Commission, and all the causes included in the Great Commission are found in the Program. The Program is promoted according to the Bible principle of voluntary cooperation.

The Cooperative Program is Comprehensive and unifying. It joins all the churches, members, and agencies in one concerted effort to promote all the causes dear to the heart of our Lord. It saves us from littleness and lopsidedness. Most of us are informed in some measure about our missionary, educational and benevolent work, but we must face the fact that we as an association are not supporting these worthy causes in proportion to our ability. According to the Florida Baptist Witness the churches of our association gave from January through September of this year the following amounts:

To the Cooperative Program \$676.85; To the Hundred Thousand Club \$125.45; To miscellaneous causes \$928.26; Total \$1730.56. This is just three-fourths of a year, but if we give during the last three months of the year in proportion we will contribute only approximately \$2300.00. We were asked to give \$2000.00 through THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM ALONE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION, PERIODICALS AND TEMPERANCE

EDUCATION

In dealing with Christian Education in this report we are limiting ourselves to a discussion of Stetson University. Dr. W. S. Allen, the president of Stetson, is to be commended for the stand he has taken to keep Stetson a Christian College and to keep it in the hands of Florida Baptists. He is seeking to emphasize the cultural and spiritual work of the school rather than its athletic program. He should have the loyal support of every Florida Baptist in the firm stand he is making.

If a law should be passed outlawing denominational colleges Baptists would be the first to protest. But if we continue to diminish our contributions to our denominational schools the time will soon come when we will be without their services. The final result will be the same as if we were not permitted to have them.

Direct support financially of Stetson must be increased by Florida Baptists if the University is to live and grow.

PERIODICALS

A concerted effort is being made in the Southern Baptist Convention to increase the circulation of our Baptist papers. In Florida we should do our part to increase the subscription list of the Florida Baptist Witness. After all the success of such an effort depends upon the local churches. And in the local church the pastor can do more than anyone else to get the people to take the Witness.

We cannot be intelligent Florida Baptists unless we are informed concerning the work within the state, and in the southland. The one main source of information concerning such work for us is the Florida Baptist Witness. So may we endeavor to do something definite to increase the circulation of our state Baptist paper.

TEMPERANCE

About a decade ago we were told on every hand to repeal the National prohibition law to promote temperance. Of course every serious thinking Christian knew that intemperance rather than temperance would be the result of repeal.

What do the facts reveal has happened since the repeal of the National prohibition law? Below are quoted a few figures on the matter as released by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

1. Arrests for drunkenness increased 81% from 1932-1939.
2. Arrests for driving while drunk increased 60% from 1932 to 1939.
3. Arrests of women for drunkenness increased 240% from 1932-1939.

In concluding we wish to state that in our opinion a revival of the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ is the only hope to save our nation from a continued growth of intemperance in the matter of alcoholic liquors.

This is encouraging and know this good work will grow.

Layman's Day, October 19, is a south-wide occasion. We hope that every pastor will cooperate with the laymen in making this a great day in all the churches.

It is not too early now to plan to attend the great Brotherhood mass meetings to be held; The Brotherhood Session of the State Baptist Convention in Panama City, January 14-16, 1942, at our State Summer Assembly in DeLand, and the South-wide Summer Assembly at Ridgecrest, N. C.

We are heartily in favor of continuing the committee on Brotherhood promotion and feel that a Rally this Fall will do much to encourage and enlist our men, for Christ.
