## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT AND BROTHERHOOD

The support of our ministers, both active and indigent, is a sacred duty resting upon every christian, because they are God's anointed and while active should be relieved of providing for his family in a material way that his thought and spiritual energy may be given unstintingly to the performance of the high and noble duties of ministering unto the needs of his flock along spiritual lines free to go where sadness and sorrow may be found and administer comfort to the bereaved; and then when the time comes when the Man of God is bowed down with the weight of years and exhausted from a life actively spent in the services of his Maker, and must retire to inactivity and all too frequently to oblivion, simple gratitude as well as a high sense of gratitude should move every Christian to see to it that such an one does not suffer for proper and adequate sustenance. For ingratitude and neglect along this line we shall in the great beyond be held strictly accountable.

May this worthy cause find a large place in our thinking and planning.

### BROTHERHOOD

The most urgent need of the hour is the enlisting of our men in Christian work. Manhood is strength not merely of the body and mind but strength of the soul and real Character, that God-given quality which sets us apart from the other creatures of the earth and makes us children of the King. Our denomination has a great wealth of manhood for which we should be truly thankful, but to enlist them in the interest of the church and harness their powers for good is our immediate task. Certainly the organization of the Brotherhood is a far reaching step in that direction for it brings us into a close relation one with the other and creates a spirit of understanding and sympathy, teaching us to depend upon each other and to appreciate each other in the true sense of values.

May our church always be able to pride herself upon her spirit of achievement, as well as the hopefulness, initiative and vision of her youth. Youth means a preponderance of courage over timidity, of success over failure, of adventure over a love of ease, of faith, self confidence and hope. These are the factors which enter into the spirit which we call morale and which is indispensable in the achievement of success in spiritual things as well as secular. Our boys in the far-flung battle lines are returning, and will become soldiers of the Civilian Front, to assist us in fighting the battles of reconstruction, and it is appallingly true that in the crowded and creative days following this war new tasks and new responsibilities of the highest importance will again fall to the lot of the church and problems every bit as difficult and momentous as in war will confront the forces of good and tax the powers of organized society, in maintaining the highest standards of moral and christian living. It will not be seriously argued by any one that there is any better way or means of holding high the standards of christian living than through the organization

of Brotherhoods in every church in the land. We believe that the present awful nightmare of "Man's Inhumanity to Man" is rapidly passing and let it be our hope and prayer that the world shall once more revert to the spirit expressed in those beautiful words of old: "To do justice, to love mercy, to walk humbly with thy God."

## PROPOSED STANDARD FOR THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

1. Every Church represented in Associational Meetings.
2. Every Church in the Relief and Annuity Retirement Plan.
3. Every Church with a Sunday School and other Departments so far as possible.
4. Every Church adopting Tithing, the Bible plan of Stewardship.
5. Every Church with a Unified Budget.
6. Every Church remitting all cooperative program mission money to the Mission office in Jacksonville at least every three months.
7. Every Church paying expenses of Pastor to State Convention, and to Southern Baptist Convention if possible.
8. Every Church with the Florida Baptist Witness in the Budget.
9. Every Church having at least one Revival meeting a year.
10. Every Church promoting Study Courses for Leaders, Teachers, and Members, at least one such school a year.
11. Every Church striving toward full time services in all phases of the Church.
12. An Associational Budget.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Because we believe in sending the Bible to the whole world, Southern Baptists give to the world-wide work of the American Bible Society. Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

THE REGULAR WORK of the Society includes all those tasks. It is a missionary non-profit organization, working in cooperation with the denominational mission boards. It aids in translation work, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, and supplies them at cost or less. It provides the Scriptures on foreign fields at less than cost because the income level of the people is so low that they can pay only a fraction of the cost. In cases of special need, at home and abroad, the Scriptures are given without charge.

THE WAR EMERGENCY WORK which the Society is carrying in addition to its regular program, provides without charge (1) New Testaments and other Scriptures for our Armed Forces, (2)

Scriptures in more than 40 languages for War Prisoners and Refugees and (3) Scriptures for needy people in liberated areas as soon as they are set free.

Southern Baptists recognize the American Bible Society as an essential part of their own regular program of world-wide missions. Resolutions have been adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and by state conventions, commending the work of the Society and requesting the churches to contribute to its support.

During 1944 the Society distributed 12,403,541 volumes of Scriptures. It received a budget income of \$1,060,647 for its regular work and received for its War Emergency Fund \$423,010. All these records were the largest for any year in its 129 years of service—and yet it had to leave unanswered more needs than in any previous year.

Vast needs still lie ahead in the war emergency and post-war rehabilitation work. Conservative estimates of emergency needs for a four-year period beginning July 1, 1944, total \$2,932,600. Increasing opportunities on many mission fields call for a larger regular program of Scripture distribution, especially in lands blacked-out by illiteracy, where millions each year are now being taught to read. These multitudes with eager minds and hungry hearts must have the Word of God.

Southern Baptists can be counted on to do their full share. Through the help of appropriate resolutions and an effective committee in each Association, Southern Baptists each year can give enough to make a significant increase in world-wide Scripture distribution, just when such an increase is most urgently needed.

Last year many churches in this Association contributed to the American Bible Society. In the coming year every church can make a contribution. Your church can help.

### REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

We should re-evaluate our work among our dependent children. For almost half a century we have been conducting a Children's Home as a benevolent and Christian service of our denomination. During this time hundreds of boys and girls have come and gone from our institution. Hundreds went out as substantial citizens and all had Christian training. The work we have done is commendable, but it is time for us to re-think our program of sustenance to the unfortunate children in our state.

The problem of the half orphan is becoming alarmingly acute. The four D's of dependency, which are: desertion, divorce, disease and death; are making many problems for our social and church life. If we are to meet our full obligation in this field of service we must enlarge our program of child caring. We can no longer shift a responsibility so appealing as this by denying the half orphan a home and a chance in life. We shall face up to this condition. Let us do it as Christians.

To meet the new demands brought about by the war and changed social conditions we must enlarge our program of child caring in contacts with the child in his community, and in his family. If he is committed to our Home then we assume full account of his care and training. Easy divorce laws, rapid changes in the attitude of parents toward their children which often ends in desertion and poverty in thousands of homes that will not permit proper medical care, brought many applications to us that we could not contact during the war. Since the war has closed we can offer but one excuse to those who should have a home in our institution and that excuse would be based on a lack of finances to care for the child. Cooperation and prayer will meet the need.

A greater service in Christian social work at the Home must first be preceded by an enlarged institution. The management of our Home has made careful and extended study in this field and is ready to build a modern institution as soon as ample funds are provided. The cottage plan will be followed throughout with due consideration to economy. Each building for children will have its own dining room and kitchen, and the number of children in each will be kept to a point that will be fair to the denomination and to the child. We now have much of the funds and the chance to build a Home that will equal the best in our country and at the same time provide for more children than we can care for in our present buildings. The buildings we have were adequate and acceptable at the time they were erected, but times have changed, houses have deteriorated and knowledge has increased. We should cooperate to put into effect a housing program second to none.

The finances at the Home are in good condition. The gifts have been larger but not more universal than in previous years. If every Sunday School should make a monthly offering to the Home there would be no need for campaigns or drives to re-build, or to take care of the needy applicants who come to us for help. A gift from every church, every month will put us in the front ranks in Christian service to children. Let us urge you to make a contribution each month to our Home.

## REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Of the thirty-seven churches that make up the Middle Florida Baptist Association only twenty-five reported Sunday School work in their midst during the year of 1944. The Middle Florida Association reported for 1944, 4706 members being in good or regular standing, while at the same time having only 1837 enrolled in the Sunday School with an average attendance of 992 of which no doubt half was not church members, which would mean that less than 500 Baptists were in Sunday School attendance last year from the Middle Florida Association. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, could we believe that only one out of ten of the God-fearing, Christ-loving, Heaven-bound, Eternally-saved Baptists of this Association were able to attend Sunday School in our New Testament churches last year? Dear friends, this is some what of a dark picture, nevertheless, true, and we the members of this Association are the only people on this earth, by the help of our Heavenly Father, that can do anything about this condition. Fathers and

mothers of this Association, as surely as God has permitted us to gather in this wonderful gathering to-day, this problem that we have before us is no less than an adult problem and not a child problem, and will never be solved by children and as the prophet of old said, "you are the man or woman that has been found guilty."

In the Spirit of love we submit the following for your consideration:

1. That we urge the attendance of adults in Sunday School;
2. That the churches without Sunday School try to organize this year;
3. That each church having Sunday School enlarge, by adding new departments, classes and visitation;
4. That our church organize and support a Mission Sunday School;
5. That each church plan to have Vacation Bible School.

We believe that our reports to this Association will show some improvements over last year but may we never be pleased until every boy and girl as well as adult shall be taught of Christ and His love.

Even though we are proud of our 1945 record we realize that we fell far short of our goal, because there are twenty-two churches in our Association that do not have any Training Union work whatever, and this burdens our hearts, and your Committee would particularly call the attention of those Churches having no training program to the value of such work, and may they realize that the Kingdom of God will make great strides wherever this all important Church organization is developed.

## REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

The people of America, acting through the processes of government, have embarked this nation on a program of Social Security. This massive program undertakes to bring security to workers, to the unfortunate, to youth and to the aged. What has been done for our disabled, aged and needy preachers and other religious workers?

Following a most cherished principle of our national life, the eternal separation of Church and State, nothing has been done, nor should be done, by the agencies of Government. It is strictly up to the religious forces of America to meet this obligation.

Southern Baptists organized the Relief and Annuity Board in 1918 on a joint contributory plan to care for Baptist preachers and workers. The Board has had enormous growth and paid out in 1944 \$774,142.99 in benefits to Baptist personnel. Thus we have, already, the mechanics for handling this solemn and sacred responsibility. The present weakness is that thousands of workers are not covered. They face, in many cases, insecurity in old age. It is almost humanly impossible for a person in active youth to see over the crest of the future to a time of need. Yet, time marches ceaselessly. Can we afford not to heed the wisdom of experience and pass up this important matter?

Your Committee recommends action all over this Association.

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

and

## PERIODICALS AND TEMPERANCE

### Christian Education

The impact of the war together with a short-sighted training program have brought serious deficiencies in personnel in the Christian ministry, along with the professions. Our future as a denomination will be largely determined by how well Baptists meet this crisis. It is a fundamental principle that the cause of Christ demands a trained leadership on church, state, and south-wide basis. The cause can go no further than the vision, ability, and heart-span of our leaders.

It is true beyond the slightest doubt that we must, in order to have trained leaders, provide for their training. This is a test and a very real one in cooperation. These trained leaders so imperatively needed in the pulpit and the pew, on the foreign field and at home, will not spring up over night. We must provide for new workers to be sent into the harvest and for in-service training for those already engaged.

We have our south-wide seminaries, our B. B. I. and our own Stetson University. These institutions must be supported. The future of the cause of Christ is very closely bound up with the welfare of these institutions.

If we wish to be practical, in addition to the high responsibilities pointed out, we must provide in this area of Florida for training on the Associational level. Only a few of our young people and adults can reach Ridgecrest, DeLand, New Orleans, or our other great institutional training centers. It is imperative that we work out a plan whereby we may bring training, vision, and inspiration to our leadership and the masses of our people. This indicates that under God we must have a cooperative training center within reach of our people. We need this program as well as to learn the techniques of cooperation among our leaders and our churches. We recommend:

1. That we support our organized institutions in keeping with their importance and our ability.
2. That a committee consisting of lay business men and progressive women together with representatives from the ministry be appointed to survey needs, formulate tentative plans and arouse the enthusiasm of our people on the matter of a cooperative training program.

#### Periodicals

Psychologists tell us that we learn vastly more through the medium of vision than through any other of our senses. What we read, unerringly, shapes our thinking, our attitudes, and the manner of our living. Your committee recommends:

1. The establishment and maintenance of good religious libraries in every church in the Association.
2. That each church in its regular budget provide for subscriptions to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS for each family.
3. That we, in our churches, in our Sunday Schools, and within our family circles, ring out clearly against perverse and impure literature.
4. That we recognize that people are going to read. They will read wholesome literature if it is provided.

#### Temperance

Baptists cannot escape their obligations to the temperance cause. Intemperance is not a separate malady. Its roots go into unbelief, greediness, indifference, and the whole vast framework of the frailties of humanity. Our leaders recognize that the tide of battle has gone against us.

The use of whiskey no longer wears the garments of the gutter. It has now in many places been put on a respectable footing. Our chief danger lies in the fact that our standards are crashing and that no social penalty, in many cases, is exacted of the intemperate person. Our forces need integrating and modernizing as we go out to fight intemperance.

The advertising of the narcotic interests should contain pointers for the advocates of sobriety. We must ally ourselves with education and fight this evil at its source—its use. We must hold up a general standard of righteousness with which intemperance will be inconsistent. We recommend:

1. That we accept and seek to drive home into the minds of our people and those for whom we are responsible, a safe, sound, and scriptural concept of the meaning of temperance: total abstinence from harmful things and a wise and moderate use of good things.
2. That we organize for a long range fight against intemperance in its relationship to our entire social pattern, with emphasis on the teaching of God's Word.
