ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in one and only one true and living God, and the there are three persons in the God-head, God the Father, of the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

article 2. We believe that the Holy Scripture composed of both ne Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, and the only ule of faith and practice of God's people.

: Marticle 3. We believe the doctrine of Sovereign, particular and ternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself rom the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will nd ability.

Article 6.—We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ, which is the conequence of faith in Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Word of God and and the Holy Spirit.

Article 8. We believe that the saints are preserved by grace and preserve in grace and will never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of a New Testament church, that immersion is the only Scriptural baptism, and believers are the only Scriptural subjects for baptism, and none but baptized believers who are members of Missionary Baptist churches in good standing are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in the resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked dead, and that both will be judged according to the deeds done in the body.

Article 11. We believe that punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are Divinely called, having been ordained by prayer and the imposition of the hands of a presbytery duly authorized by a Missionary Baptist Church.

CONSTITUTION

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THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MID-DLE FLORIDA MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duty elected by the Churches affiliated with this body who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches.

Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof.

Article 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 5.—The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be selected by the body. If it should become necessary, the Executive Committee of the Association may change the time, or place of meeting, or both.

Article 6. Any church, in harmony with this Association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the union upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

Article 7. Any church wishing for a letter of dismission shall make application therefor by letter.

Article 8. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, and Assistant Moderator, who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the suffrage of the members present, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article 9. This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of six laymen and the Pastors of each Church belonging to this Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational B. T. U. Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union President, the Associational Brother-hood President, together with the officers as Ex-officio members. This committee shall foster all the interest of the Association, when the body is not in session. The Committee shall have authority to appoint or recommend to the State Board Missionaries, or colporteurs, and to make appropriation to weak churches or destitutions, and to give such advice to the churches as may seem wise and necessary, and the Moderator shall be chairman of the Executive Committee.

Article 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which are adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis, Tennessee, in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

rticle 11. The Asociation shall recognize and respect the ights and independence of every church cooperating.

Article 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient. **1**

THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie. when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church. according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10 This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL

For the Year 1945

F. S. Groner, Administrator

As we review the record of service rendered during the year we are reminded of Matthew's statement concerning the ministry of Jesus: "Great multitudes came unto Him, having with them those that were lame, blind, dumb, maimed, and many others, and cast them down at Jesus' feet; and He healed them; insomuch that the multitude wondered, when they saw the dumb to speak, the maimed to be whole, the lame to walk, and the blind to see: and they glorified the God of Israel."

Of course, never is it possible to tabulate the entire work of a hospital: for much of its service is moral and spiritual. However, figures which may be tabulated tell a story of achievement in service of which we may well feel gratitude. We admitted 25,269 patients during the year, and gave them 139,985 days of service. Eight hundred and ninety-four persons were gievn 9,862 days of free service, at a cost to the Hospital of \$58,058.98. There were 2,663 births, and 3,175 emergency room cases which were not hospitalized. Forty-two young women were graduated from the School of Nursing and 17 doctors completed their fifth year of medical training. Operating income was \$1,317,475.84; gifts, etc., amounted to \$14,423.55, thus giving a total gross income of \$1,332,-4.3.17. We paid all operating expenses including the free work; and closed the year with a substantial cash balance,

The report of the auditor filed herewith will indicate we paid during the year on Farnsworth Hall \$56,160.57, for the incineralor audiding and eugipment \$26,908.57, for new equipment \$25,303.78; and that the total addition to our surplus during the year was \$118,260.29 after deducting \$49,762.42 for depreciation.

We gave free service to missionaries of the Home and Foreign Boards, and 54 young women from the Baptist Emergency Home were likewise given free service.

A gift of \$25,000 was made to the Foreign Mission Board with which to establish a hospital in the African field in Nigeria.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

This has been a good year in our Sunday School work. We now have 38 Churches in our Association. Of that number there are 29 reporting a Sunday School organization. In comparison of last year's records with this we note that in the 1946 minutes there were 31 Churches reporting Sunday Schools. There were 2508 enrolled in these Sunday Schools with an average attendance of 1458. This year's record shows we have approximately 2750 enrolled with an average attendance of approximately 1586. Our Training Teacher Awards fell down from 139 in 1946 to 123. We only had eight Churches which held a training Teacher Study Course with two other Churches having one and two who took some private siudy course work.

However, there is one phase of our Sunday School work which

we are proud of the progress. That is we more than doubled the number of Churches which had Vacation Bible Schools. Last year we had four. This year we had ten. This is not as many as ought to be. We hope to double that next year. Enrolled 759; average attendance 608.

On January 15, 1947, Dr. Thomas J. Watts, executive secretary of the Relief and Annuity Board for the past nineteen years, retired and Dr. Walter R. Alexander, associate executive secretary, was elevated to this important position.

Officers of the Board

The twenty-ninth annual session of the Board was field in Dallas on March 26, and the following officers were elected: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. W. Marshall Craig, chairman of the executive committee; Mr. George J. Mason, recording secretary; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. R. S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer—investments.

Nineteen hundred forty-six was one of the most prosperous years the Board had ever known. Many new members were enrolled in the several plans through which the Board serves our Southern Baptist constituency. A total of 2,541 new certificates were issued during the past year.

Widows Supplemental Annunity Plan

Six other states qualified for participation in the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan as of January 1, 1947, bringing the tital number of states now participating in this plan to twelve. It is expected that this plan will be operating in all the states and the District of Columbia at an early date.

Relief

The high cost of living has made it necessary to heed the requests of hundreds of those on the relief roll for increased amounts. Many others should receive raises and will receive them when Southern Baptists make it possible. More than sixteen hundred look to the relief department for their livelihood. Even small amounts received by these who served before there was any Relief and Annuity Board means the difference between dire want and more or less comfort.

The calendar of denominational activities of the Southern Baptist Convention requests an offering from the churches throughout our Southern Baptist Convention during the month of April. We would urge all of our churches to take an offering for the relief department of this Board some time during the year that these old heroes of the cross may not suffer.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home continues to put forth every effort to assist the unfortunate children of the state. It has not been able to assist more than a mere fraction of he children who have applied for help in the past year. The number of half-orphans is increasing rapidly. Divorce and desertion are wrecking thousands of homes in our state. The need for help among children who have one or both parents living has exceeded that of any year in the last fifteen. Desertion leads the field in causes of dependency and divorce is second. Desertion is a parent of divorce. It precedes a great number of divorces and is one of the chief evils of our home life today. We deplore the rapid disintegration of so many of our homes. It creates numerous problems in our church and community life and brings untold damage and suffering and hardship to thousands of innocent children.

The management of the Home tries to help as many of these children as possible, but there are more than they can possibly assist. They plan to employ a social worker within the next associational year and possibly another one later. It will be the duty of these workers to investigate the cases asking help of the Home and to use every means at their command to assist those who apply for assistance.

Three new buildings are being erected with a fourth to be started within a couple of weeks. Baptists of Florida own 51 acres of land in the city of Lakeland and approximately 80 acres adjoining which lies outside the city limits. They have room for pasture and truck farm and about thirty acres for a building site. The property borders the Lake Hunter Drive. The city owns the narrow strip of ground between the street and the lake but it is understood that the children can use the lake for fishing and boating.

When the dormitories are finished, we shall have one of the most modern and up-to-date institutions in the entire South, if not in the nation. Each building for intermediates and seniors will be two stories high and will house twenty children, two children in a room. The dormitories for the juniors will accommodate twenty children, four children in a room, and the nursery will house sixteen children with four to a room. Each building will have its own dining room. They are following the cottage plan throughout.

The finances of the institution have held up remarkalby well. The gifts have been sufficient to meet the expense fort his year.

Our children attend church, Sunday School, and Training Union at the First Baptist Church in Arcadia. We recognize that our efforts would have been in vain and Baptist money spent for charity only if we neglected the religious training of our children. Their health, happiness, and success in life many times depends on their relationship to God. The greatest benefits that any child can have is the knowledge of God and an environment in which kind ideals and Christian living can develop and grow stronger through the years.

REPORT ON THE NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

MIDDLE FLORIDA MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Our Seminary in New Orleans started the present session with a new name and a new president. The three years of Dr. Duke K. McCall's presidency were marked by far-reaching progress in every line. Dr. Roland Q. Leavell assumed the presidency on July 1, 1946. The name of the institution was changed at the Southern Baptist Conevntion in Miami from the Baptist Bible Institute to the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

The change of name in no way indicates a change of policy on the part of the school nor change in the nature of the student body. During the past session there were 338 students enrolled, of whom 135 were college graduates, 47 others had done some college work, and 156 were without college training. One distinctive feature of this Seminary is, and will remain to be, that students without college training who can keep up with the classroom work may enter and be trained for ministerial and missionary service.

The present session opened with a record breaking attendance. The faculty is at its maximum strength. The beautiful new men's dormitory with a capacity for 96 students has been completed, although the gifts from Southern Baptists have not been sufficient to pay for it. Some memorial rooms are yet available for those giving \$1,000, and gifts of \$200 for furnishing rooms are sought. These will come, and no debt will remain. The administration expresses deep gratitude for all generous gifts. Twenty new family apartment units have been made available by the F. P. H. A. for married ex-service men. Scores and scores of ministers are applying for admission who cannot be admitted on account of lack of housing facilities.

Our school maintains three departments, the Seminary department for ministers, the missions and religious education department, and the department of sacred music. These are not separate schools, but the work is intermeshed so as to give every student a sympathetic knowledge of all fields. The spirit of evangelism is diffused throughout all classes. The Bible is the basic, fundamental study in every department. The extension department is growing in usefulness, although correspondence courses are not encouraged as a substitute for resident work, and credit for extension courses cannot count toward a degree.

Every dollar invested in New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary does two dollars' worth of Kingdom work. It does full value in ministerial and missionary training and also does a dollar's worth of missionary work. Every student must take part regularly in some practical activity, such as preaching in churches, street preaching, work among Negroes and Catholics, deputation missions in a fleet of buses, visitation in homes, teaching in mission schools, group work in jails and rescue missions, kindergarten and slum work, distribution of Bibles and tracts, and scores of other evangelistic activities. Every student must make written reports weekly, and they cannot pass their classroom work if reports on practical activities are omitted for three consecutive weeks. Thus the student body is a mighty mission force in a needy mission field.

A printing press and a night school giving Seminary training to Negro preachers are two great Kingdom assets of the New Orleans Seminary.

A survey committee of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention reported the property of our Seminary as being worth \$558,626 and endowment amounting to only \$456.12. That committee voiced our need for at least \$2,000,000 endowment. Our immediate need is more housing space for students and more scholarships of \$200 each for individual students, for which they will render services to the institution or in missionary evangelism on needy fields nearby.

REPORT ON STETSON UNIVERSITY

Stelson has entered upon its greatest year, with an enrollment that will reach approixmately 2,300. Enrollment of last year, not including summer school, was 1648. There were 963 veterans, 755 Baptists, 83 ministerial students, and 106 preparing for special Christian service. We have on the campus the sons and daughters of more pastors and Christian leaders than ever before.

Stetson University is growing by leaps and bounds, and immediate action is imperative. We must have buildings and equipment. Florida Baptists will meet the challenge of this hour. We have raised about \$450,000 in cash and \$200,000 in substantial pledges.

To complete the million dollars pledged by the conevntion, we must first vigorously present Stetson to our churches; secondly, we must put Stetson in our church budget for next year. In the third place where the church budget plan is not used, it is suggested that a special offering be taken. With more than 850 churches working at this task, we could easily raise 75,000 to 125,000 dollars annually for endowment and for urgently needed building.

The convention last year adopted the recommendation that Stetson University be included in our church budget.

We call upon our churches, our associational leaders, and our State Mission Board to get solidly behind this undertaking, and the harevest of souls, trained preachers and leaders for the home and foreign fields justify all our efforts. We can't share this fellowship without participation.

First, we recommend that each association appoint a member to the State Committee on Christian Education.

Second, that we encourage our people to remember Stelson in their wills.

We regret very must the retiring of Dr. Allen from the Presidency of Sletson University. Dr. Allen is a great man and has led Sictson in a fine way and has made out of it a great Christian institution. We express to Dr. Allen our gratitude for his fine Christian and unselfish leadership. We pray that Gold will bless him and speedily restore him his health.

During 1946 the American Bible Society-

- —distrbiuted at home and abroad over 11 million volumes of Scriptures;
- —sent to Japan more than 1-3 million Gospels and more than 1-3 million of the 2½ million New Testaments requested by Japanese Christian leaders;
- —shipped to Germany over 1 million Scripture volumes and 205 tons of materials for a self-help plan by which the German people and the German Bible Societies will do the actual printing of at least 1 million full Bibles.

Southern Baptists can lead in providing ENOUGH Bibles for world needs NOW!

- Hungry-hearted multitudes, especially in liberated countries, Germany and Japan, are eager for the Word of God. But it is a race against time. Their eagerness may not last indefinitely and opposing forces are actively at work.
- 2. The Bible is rationed throughout the world, as it has always been rationed in mission lands, because the supply is limited by gifts available.
- 3. In 1946, Southern Baptists gave \$130,550 to the American Bible Society; total church gifts were \$1,119,845. Increased gifts from Southern Baptists will help to provide enough Bibles now and will multiply their value by inspiring others to give more. - 4. A worldwide missionary advance, through increased Scripture distribution, waits! Waits only for needed funds!

REPORT OF THE RADIO COMMISSION, S. B. C.

The youngest agency of the Southern Baptist Convention is The Radio Commission, S. F. Lowe, Director, with headquarters at 427½ Moreland Avenue N. E., Atlanta, Georgia.

Since 1941 the Radio Commission has broadcast the Baptist Hour for at least three months every year, with two three-months periods in 1946. The Baptist Hour programs in April, May and June 1947 were evangelistic and designed to promote all that Southern Baptists are doing in the field of evangelism. These programs also supported Dr. C. E. Matthews, Secretary of Evangelism, The Home Mission Board, in launching his program to enlist one million Baptists to pray daily for a spiritual awakening.

The Radio Commission has launched two new services during the past year. First, a special transcribed program is being provided for use in Government hospitals. It is a daily devotional designed to meet the spiritual needs of sick service men. Fortyseven hospitals are using them and others are asking for them. The Commission is seeking to meet this growing opportunity.

Second, the Radio Commission is launching a transcription service to local churches through which plan a good two-speed record player that can play both phonograph and radio records and which retails for \$150.00 is offered to churches for \$100.00. The radio records are made available to churches in packages of four records per package on a rental basis of \$4.00 per package which includes cost of express, packing, processing and programming. Churches are already using these records in B. T. U., Sunday school, prayer meeting, in church after Sunday school on days other than "preaching day," and in hospitals and other institutions in the community. This promises to be one of the best services of the Commission.

The record library of the Commission is available for use over local radio stations. Hundreds of stations broadcast some of these programs duing the current year, with 93 stations airing a series of programs on the Chistian home during Christian Home Week of this year. These records are available free for broadcast over local radio stations, though there is a modest rental when the records are used in the local churches.

The Commission cooperates with other agencies in the Convention in broadcasting desired by the agencies. During the current year in response to the Y. W. A. Dept. of Woman's Missionary Union, the Commission aranged for the broadcasting of the series entitled "All Aboard For Adventure," over 27 stations. Currently it is cooperating with the Home Mission Board in airing the Good News Hour over 67 stations, and with the Executive Committee, S. B. C., in broadcasting "THE PROV-ME HOUR" over approximately 150 stations, and with the Baptist Brotherhood in arranging for the broadcasting of a special program over 100 stations on Layman's Day, October 12.

During the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in St. Louis the Commission broacast two television programs.

The forecast of able radio leadership is that by 1950 television will be broadcast on a national scale. What will Southern Baptists enable their Radio Commission to do about preparing to use this new and most effective medium of mass communication?

The FM Station is the new type of station which will make it possible for Baptist institutions and local groups to own and operate stations for the glory of the Lord.

Radio—this modern method of communicating the gospel to the masses of people in this critical period of world history offers Baptists an unprecedented challenge. What will be their response?

BAPTIST BOOK STORE

Through the expanding program of Florida Baptists, the Baptist Book Store, 218 West Church Street, Jacksonville, Florida, has steadily kept pace with the needs and reuqirements of the various churches. Growth in any one department naturally affects any other department. In this we feel that the Book Store has rendered a very definite service.

The reason for establishing book stores throughout the entire bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention is that churches may be served more promptly and efficiently than when it must be ordered from another denominational house or even from outside the state limits. All church supplies can be secured through your own state book store, or they will render the service in locating it for you.

During the year much progress has been made in the advancement of Church Libraries. Realizing that "a man is himself plus the books he reads" and that "information is often the source of inspiration", we know that libraries have a very definite part in the firmly rooting of an entire constituency. We would recommend the serious consideration of a library for every church. Special terms are available and every effort is made to present a reading program to all members.

It has been said that one picture is worth 10.000 words. The Visual Aids Department has been established, carefully equipped, and efficiently managed. Anything from wall maps, blackboards, opaque projectors, slides and film machines can be obtained. We are also the agent for renting any film that you might wish to show in your church.

A very new service has been added in the securing of Carillonic Bells and Chimes for churches. These are ideal witnesses throughout the land, calling the people to worship. They are also the means for producing living memorials.

First and foremost it is the purpose and plan of the Baptist Book Stores that we render an efficient service. This is your denominational book store. We would urge that you give us an opportunity to prove our worth and we know that we will give you a very prompt delivery on any orders that reach us.

REPORT, ON THE CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM AND TITHING

Southern Baptists in recent years have had three major financial objectives: (1) to get rid of the old debts upon our boards and institutions, (2) to promote the Co-operative Program for the equitable support of all our work, and (3) to enlist tithers to provide a permanent, dependable, systematic support for all our causes, local, state and worldwide.

Thanks to God and our people, we became "Debt-free in '43," we now hope we can remain debt free and carry on but owe no man anything save love.

Our co-operative program continues to grow in favor. All our state organizations and agencies approve of it, and 75 percent of our churches contributed through it in 1946.

But our Co-operative Program receipts are not sufficient to meet the imperative immediate needs of our causes. All our institutions are full and running over. Our colleges and seminaries turned away hundreds last year for lack of room. Then the property of our Foreign Mission Board calls for \$5,000,000 to put it back as it was before the war. Other millions are needed to care for pathetic calls and unprecedented opportunities.

To help meet these enlarged needs a special tithing campaign has been launched. All our conventions and agencies are cooperating in its promotion. Each state has adopted a tithing goal for 1947. Our state tithing goal is 50,000.

Recommendations

We urgently and prayerfully recommend:

- 1. That every church enter full-length and full-strength into the special tithing effort seeking; (1) to enlist at least one-fourth of its members as tithers, and (2) to get all its members to bring their whole tithe into the Lord's house for at least three months, October, November, and December.
- 2. That October 5, or nearest convenient Sunday, be observed as Tilhers' Enlistment Day in all departments and at all services of our churches.
- 3. That where possible all or a major part of the tithing receipts in October, November, and December be given to the Co-operative Program causes to help meet the dire needs of our denominational agencies.
- 4. That the Every-Member Canvass be put on faithfully in every church and that every effort be made to maintain and enlarge the number of tithers.
- 5. That the plans and suggestions of our state organization and the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention be used in seeking to enroll


