ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in one and only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

Article 2. We believe that the Holy Scripture composed of both the Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice of God's people.

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of Sovereign, particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ, which is the consequence of faith in Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit.

Article 8. We believe that the saints are preserved by grace and preserve in grace and will never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of a New Testament church, that immersion is the only Scriptural baptism, and believers are the only Scriptural subjects for baptism, and none but baptized believers who are members of Missionary Baptist churches in good standing are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in the resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked dead, and that both will be judged according to the deeds done in the body.

Article 11. We believe that punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are Divinely called, having been ordained by prayer and the imposition of the hands of a presbytery duly authorized by a Missionary Baptist Church.

THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**RULES OF DECORUM**

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.

6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.

7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.

8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

of

THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MIDDLE FLORIDA MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the Churches affiliated with this body who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches.

Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof.

Article 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be selected by the body. If it should become necessary, the Executive Committee of the Association may change the time, or place of meeting, or both.

Article 6. Any church, in harmony with this Association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the union upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

Article 7. Any church wishing for a letter of dismission shall make application therefor by letter.

Article 8. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an assistant Moderator, who shall be a layman or part-time Pastor who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, and who shall also be Moderator for the Fifth Sunday Meetings, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the suffrage of the messengers elected by the Churches, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article 9. This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of six laymen and the Pastors of each Church belonging to this Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational B. T. U. Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union President, the Associational Brotherhood President, together with the officers as Ex-officio members. This committee shall foster all the interest of the Association, when the body is not in session. The Committee shall have authority to appoint or recommend to the State Board Missionaries, or colporteurs, and to make appropriation to weak churches or destitutions, and to give such advice to the churches as may seem wise and necessary, and the Moderator shall be chairman of the Executive Committee.

Article 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which are adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis, Tennessee, in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

Article 11. The Association shall recognize and respect the rights and independence of every church cooperating.

Article 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The way to a more efficient Church is through a trained Church membership. The Baptist Training Union does just that. It trains the Church members. The Middle Florida Baptists are realizing more and more each year the great need of a trained membership. The following figures will give proof of this statement: Last year we had 21 Churches with Training Unions, but this year we have 29 Churches with Training Unions. Last year we had 97 Unions with an enrollment of 1456, and average attendance of 689, but this year we have 141 Unions with an enrollment of 2027 and average attendance of 1330. Our increases are: 8 Churches with New Training Unions; 571 added to the Training Union enrollment, and a 641 increase in our average attendance.

The teeth of the Training Union Program are the study courses. In the coming year let us have a Training Union in every Church, every Church member in Training Union, and a study course in every Union.

REPORT ON CHURCH MUSIC

A study of the development of church music as fostered by the Sunday School Board in recent years is most interesting and encouraging. The adoption of the report of the Committee on Church Music and Worship, by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1943 instructed the Sunday School Board to inaugurate a Church Music Training Course. This has been done, and is being well received. We in this Association were able to learn something of that work last summer.

Music has a mighty appeal to the hearts and minds of people. We all agree that Spiritual music has a major part in preparing the soul for worship and in soul-expression in worship. Our church people are seeing more and more - the need for good church music. And they have a desire to learn more about it. It is up to us as an Association to help our Churches build a Church Music Program that will honor God.

Music must have a prominent place in our worship services. Because it allows us to express the deepest feelings of the soul, in praise or penitence, it calms the troubled heart with peace, and stirs the languid spirit to courage and action.

We must magnify real religion in the music program of our churches, if our music is to have spiritual quality and power.

It has been in some instances little more than jazz—in other instances little more than artistic display and sound. In either case, it is music without spirit which brings shallow religion. Music of this kind can never minister to lost souls and weary hearts. It must be true to the gospel, vibrant with reverence, warm with divine emotion, and dynamic with spiritual appeal. It must be Christian music, for Christian worship.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Advance has begun!—This is the keynote of the worldwide mission work of Southern Baptists. It is also the central theme of the report from the American Bible Society, which serves every form of Southern Baptist work at home and abroad.

The Society reports, with gratitude, a growing appreciation by Southern Baptist churches, of the basic missionary principle that.

In every missionary advance,
the Bible goes forward first.

Providing the Bible for mission work is an essential missionary task.

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

In most countries of the world, the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures. Someone must help those who can pay only a part of the cost and the many who cannot pay at all.

The American Bible Society, a missionary non-profit organization, supported by gifts, serves as that "someone." It aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world.

During 1949 the American Bible Society—

—distributed through its own work, at home and abroad, nearly 9 million volumes of Scriptures. Another 2 million volumes were produced through gifts of materials and money to Bible Societies of other countries, especially Germany and Japan, bringing the grand total to nearly 11 million volumes for the year.

—in its World Emergency Program, reached a total of more than 25 million volumes of Scriptures in 9½ years, distributed to service men, prisoners of war, displaced persons and civilian populations in Europe and Asia.

1950 opportunities call for continued Advance in Scripture Distribution.

Japan is the great story of present Advance and the major challenge for continued Advance. The Japanese have turned to the Bible with an interest without parallel in all history. General Douglas MacArthur has estimated that 30 million copies of the Scriptures will be needed to reach "every village and hamlet in the land." The American Bible Society counts on Southern Baptists' help towards that goal.

In 1949, Southern Baptist churches gave \$78,384 to the American Bible Society; gifts from churches of all denominations amounted to \$302,481. In view of Southern Baptists' strength and readiness to respond to missionary needs, it is expected that Southern Baptist churches will soon be giving to the American Bible Society at least \$150,000 each year. Please send gifts to your Baptist State Headquarters office, marked "for the American Bible Society."

REPORT OF THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

One Man alone, cannot accomplish much in winning the world for Christ. One man, plus the more than six million other Southern Baptists, working together CAN DO THE JOB! **Through cooperation!**

Southern Baptists have a unique, effective way to publish the glad tidings. The vehicle for our cooperative mission work is the Cooperative Program. We do not give TO the Cooperative Program; we give THROUGH the Cooperative Program in carrying out the Great Commission.

The Cooperative Program is like the family budget! It takes care of the needs of all our agencies, boards and institutions through which we work in trying to win a lost world to Christ. For example, each church sends its gifts for Worldwide Missions through the Cooperative Program to the office of the State Board of Missions in Jacksonville. The State Board of Missions keeps half of the money for mission work within the state and sends the other half to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. From Nashville the money goes on its mission around the world preaching, teaching, and healing in the name of Jesus.

The Cooperative Program makes possible the COOPERATION of every Baptist in carrying out the Great Commission: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." ONE MAN cannot do this; only the cooperation of all will make it possible!

Dedicated lives, tithing Christians, will cause a tremendous increase in receipts of the local church. This will make it possible for each church to reach the ideal division of funds—50-50—keeping 50% for work in the local church and sending 50% of the receipts for World-wide Missions through the Cooperative Program. Our Commission is to teach ALL NATIONS. We must have the proper PROPORTION, in the division of our monies, between local and worldwide missions.

The peak of our Advance is the advance in Foreign Missions. "It was the realization that we need to do more for a lost world through our foreign mission program which roused us to undertake the Advance Program." The Advance Program IS THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM. Foreign Missions wait on complete success of the Cooperative Program!

Southern Baptists are a great team—facing a great task. Are you doing your part? Will you not resolve today to give Christ FIRST PLACE in your heart and life? Happiness and peace will be yours. **REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME
LAKELAND, FLORIDA**

Since relocating the Institution we have completed five cottages for children, a dairy barn, a house for the farmer, a laundry, the Gaines Vocational Building, the Administration Building and the Chapel. This completes our building program except for two cottages, one for little boys and one for little girls. We have been granted permission to ask for a special offering this Christmas. The funds received from this offering will be used to erect one of these cottages. We believe the other can be built by income from private sources.

When these two cottages are finished we shall cease building until a definite need arises and funds are available for the maintenance of additional buildings. We think housing for 150 children will, with good case work, meet the needs of our children for some time.

The finances are in good condition. We have received sufficient funds to meet all expenses. We have been remembered in three Wills: Mrs. Annie Lively of Lakeland and Mrs. Scholze of Coral Gables made the Institution a beneficiary of their estates. The estate of Mrs. Lively has not been closed. Mrs. Scholze gave two thousand dollars. Mrs. Minnie Norwood of Arcadia \$653.09.

We have cared for 157 children during the year. Intake and discharge have been greatly accelerated in recent years. This is due to more temporary care and the employment of a case worker, who works with individual children and their families. A close contact is kept with the relatives of many of our children and as soon as they are able to resume responsibility for their care they are returned to them.

The program at the Home is planned to meet the great and pressing need of giving security to children and rehabilitating families whenever possible. Boys and girls who are admitted to our Institution are given good physical care and every opportunity of developing into Christian men and women.

Looking back over the past three years we can see the many blessings that God has granted in our program of child caring. We look to the future with great confidence for a continued and enlarged service to the dependent children of our state. We trust that every church in this Association will have a part in the Christmas offering, that we may build another cottage, remembering that the Master said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND PERIODICALS

I—CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

"Christian Education is education with Christ in it." Yes, Christ at the center of our educational frame-work. This type of education stems from the home where children hear their father and mother in prayer and teaching in precept and example. Likewise, the church, and the Christian College. These three institutions are the bulwarks of our American way of life.

Growing Interest

"Southern Baptists are displaying renewed and increasing interest in Christian Education. They are building and supporting Baptist Colleges and schools as never before. In the institutions themselves, rapid strides are being made in the direction of coordination of effort, increased efficiency, and financial stabilization."

Florida Baptist churches observing Stetson Week, Christian Education Sunday, and Home Week, reflect a growing interest in Christian Education.

Activities

During the year the Department of Christian Education directed the School of Prophets at the DeLand Assembly and the West Florida Assembly at Panama City, the latter enrolling 97 pastors and 27 laymen. There were brought to both of these schools some of our southwide leaders and many pastors. Such conferences and meetings are invaluable.

The Orientation Course for ministerial students was inaugurated last spring bringing to the campus pastors and denominational leaders to acquaint our young ministerial students with the work and function of our denomination and its many agencies. The extension course for pastors is on the way. Just as soon as funds are available, this program will be put into operation.

Publicity

This department directed the showing of the film, "THE DIFFERENCE", to the churches of Florida this past summer, with Bill Guess, a graduate of Stetson, promoting the showing. Brother Guess did a great job, reaching 19,242 persons, with 144 showings and a total of 323 prospective students. The film was shown in each of our 36 associations.

Religious Center

Within a few weeks, the \$100,000 religious center building on the campus of Stetson University will be completed and ready for occupancy. This building is the gift of Florida Baptists to Stetson University in honor of Dr. William Sims Allen, president emeritus.

On Thursday morning, at 11:00 o'clock, November 16, this building will be dedicated to the purpose of making more real the love of God in the lives of the students and faculty. From its lovely lounge furnished in the casual early American style

to the quiet dignity of the prayer-rooms decorated in the best of taste through the generosity of Dr. W. A. Hobson, the spirit of Christ will permeate throughout the whole of the activities. This building will house the Ministerial Association, the YWA, the Volunteer Band, and the Baptist Student Union Executive Council.

The college day will begin with the strains of hymns sung at Morning Watch and will close with the hymns of the Vesper Services which are a vital part of the religious program at Stetson.

Stetson Moves Forward

There are many signs of progress on our Baptist campus. More and more of our fine Baptist boys and girls are looking to Stetson for their education. With a scholarly, Christian, consecrated faculty, the best in Christian Education is being offered. A sizeable percentage of the student body continue to be ministerial students, or those who have volunteered for mission fields or other phases of full-time religious work.

With the completion of the Religious Center a much better program of Christian Education can and will be fostered. Thus Stetson continues to place great emphasis on Christian Education.

Recommendations

1. That we observe Stetson Week, January 22, 1951.
2. That we visit the campus of Stetson University.
3. That we send our sons and daughters to Stetson.
4. That we place Stetson in our wills.

II—PERIODICALS

The Florida Baptist Witness, under the editorship of Dr. W. G. Stracener, is continuing its ministry of keeping Florida Baptists informed as to the Kingdom work and objectives. The paper is reflecting increasing journalistic improvement in format, organization, content, style, and general attractiveness. There is a clear note of advocacy of sound doctrine, alert stewardship, and recognition of world responsibilities.

An informed Baptist is one who has resources for advancing the work of the Kingdom. Reading is a prime medium for gaining information. The Florida Baptist Witness has a unique ministry. It hammers unceasingly at the problem of keeping our great denomination in concert with the Master in His great plan of Redemption.

We recommend that the churches purchase subscriptions for all families from the regular church budget; that it be reviewed in the services, furnished helpful data for publication, and supported generally through prayerful effort.

THE BAPTIST HOUR—A MISSIONARY MINISTRY

The Baptist Hour is definitely a missionary service of the Southern Baptist Convention, rendered through its Radio Commission.

In its purpose and fruits, it seeks to carry out the spirit of the Great Commission. Through gospel sermons and songs, many lost ones are won to Christ, believers are strengthened in the Lord, shut-ins, shut-outs and the sick are ministered to; our whole people are undergirded spiritually during these frightful days through which we pass. There are thousands who do not know the gospel as Baptists believe and teach it, but are becoming acquainted with our Baptist people and their teachings through the weekly broadcasts of the Baptist Hour. Our mail brings ample evidence of such fruits.

With a network of some 180 stations during most of the year expiring with the close of September, an estimated 150 million listeners have been reached with the gospel. Speakers for the four respective quarters were: Dr. R. G. Lee, Reverend Charles Wellborn, Dr. Duke K. McCall and Dr. Forrest C. Freezor.

Our Southern Baptist Convention has voted at its last two annual meetings that the Baptist Hour shall be financed for the most part through personal contributions mailed to the Baptist Hour, Station E, Atlanta, Georgia. This action was taken because it was felt that so large a cost (of approximately \$360,000 a year) could best be met with this method, employed successfully by the Old Fashioned Revival Hour and the Lutheran Hour, both of which are commercial religious broadcasts. All that is needed now is for all our Baptist people to realize the importance of this radio work, and feel a personal responsibility for it.

Meanwhile, in order to help clear the present Baptist Hour deficit, and properly prepare for a great Baptist Hour season in 1951, no Convention-wide Baptist Hour will be broadcast during October, November and December of this year. The program will return to the air in January with Charles Wellborn as speaker for the first quarter.

In addition to the Baptist Hour, the Radio Commission is seeking to extend our Lord's kingdom in the following ways:

(1) Before the end of 1951 some new fifteen-minute devotional transcriptions will be available for use by our churches and for broadcast over local radio stations.

(2) Two television programs are now on film and are available for broadcast over local TV stations. In order to meet the many opportunities in this new and rapidly developing field, the Commission is seeking to enlarge its TV ministry as rapidly as possible.

(3) Cooperation with all agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention and State Conventions in broadcasting has been a service of the Radio Commission from its beginning.

We urge every church, every church organization, and every member within our association to give the Radio Commission and its work a large place in your prayer life.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY REPORT

The reports of Relief and Annuity Boards over our south land show continued growth and progress. More and more Florida Pastors are grasping the security this plan has to offer. The purpose of the Relief and Annuity Board is to provide support for a minister who has been overtaken by old age or disability. Those who preach the gospel should also live of the gospel all the days of their life. Many of our churches have been reluctant in calling pastors beyond 50 years of age for fear they might become a burden to them, even though with the passing of the years their efficiency has increased. Herein is the plan briefly described. (Subject to correction):

Each pastor pays 3 per cent of his salary.

His church pays 3 per cent of his salary.

Our State Convention pays 2 per cent of his salary.

This is kept to his account through the years. Should he retire at 65 years of age, or when disability comes, he will receive $\frac{1}{2}$ of his average salary through the years. A regular income, however small it may be, will be cherished at the setting of life's sun.

When the Committee met with Elizabeth April 30, 1950, by motion made and carried we voted to give Burton Baptist Church \$250.00 to help purchase a roof for their new church. Also motion made and carried for the Association to purchase materials for "Vacation Bible Schools" and "School of Music."

The Committee voted to pay our Clerk \$10.55 expense money to "The Moderators and Clerks" meeting in Jacksonville during January, 1950.

Midway Baptist Church has been successful in erecting a new six-room parsonage this Association Year. Bro. Austin McElroy, the pastor, has led this church in an effective attempt for progress. With a Christ-like spirit we welcome him into our Association.

By motion made and carried the Committee has employed two summer workers for ten weeks each, at \$25 per week, payable by the Association. We feel their labors were profitable and much enthusiasm created.

HOME MISSION REPORT

At its last annual meeting the Home Mission Board launched a five-year Crusade in response to the need revealed by a survey of the fields and the necessity for strengthening and sustaining the home base for a great world-wide mission program.

The needed strength will come from three sources: more members, more churches, and more effective witnessing.

The first emphasis, therefore, in the new crusade is soul-winning. During 1950 and 1951, the Evangelistic Department is directing evangelistic crusades throughout the Convention territory and in the outposts of Alaska, Panama, and Cuba. This is a concerted effort to reach a large number of the 39,000,000 unchurched people in areas served by the board. More Christians will mean more strength.

In 1951 and 1952, following this soul-winning effort, the crusade will be directed especially in establishing new churches and mission stations. There are 21,000,000 people in areas served by the Board who are not within easy reach of any Baptist church that can serve them. New converts won in the evangelistic crusade will need new places of worship.

Within this five-year period an effort will be made to lead in constituting 5,000 new churches and 10,000 new mission stations. A survey of cities, suburban areas, rural districts, mountain regions, underprivileged sections, and language groups, reveals a need far in excess of this goal. The strength of Baptists has always been in the number and strength of the churches.

Throughout the five-year period, but receiving special emphasis in 1953-54, the Board will lead in a crusade to make the witness of Baptists more effective, especially in needy areas. The work among the language groups, underprivileged, juvenile delinquents, migrants, and isolated people will receive special emphasis. Efforts to reach the 1,500,000 "unattached" Baptists, to revitalize 1,000 inactive country churches, and to create a greater loyalty on the part of all our constituency are included in the crusade goals.

To accomplish these tasks, the Home Mission Board will need 1,027 missionaries (an increase of 248), an annual operating budget of \$2,000,000.00, and a total of \$3,500,000.00 to meet capital needs.

Make America safe and our constituency strong in missionary service by winning the lost, building strong churches and stimulating an effective Christian witness. Join in the Home Mission Crusade.

STATE MISSION REPORT

In Florida, State Missions has an important place in Baptist life. Jesus has set the example and given the command to ADVANCE. This is "Favored Florida's" marching order!

State work in Florida consists of preaching the gospel to the ends of the earth. We employ 38 full-time missionaries for Florida. They teach, preach, hold Bible institutes, direct vacation Bible schools, and direct assemblies.

Then too, State Missions has to do with helping educate more than 2,000 students, care for many homeless and destitute children. We take care of the spiritual development of hundreds of our Baptist boys and girls who are away from home attending college, through churches in college centers.

Through State Missions, Florida Baptists provide for the education and training of more than one hundred ministerial students, and assist some two hundred others who are preparing for full-time Christian service and for the mission fields.

Florida Baptists have been entirely too slow in starting new missions and organizing new churches. Last year we aided fourteen such places. We need to open fifty new mission stations now! This year we have spent \$10,500 in such endeavor.

The ADVANCE PROGRAM of the Kingdom of God in Florida waits on a proper understanding and rightful undergirding of our State Mission Program.

Each year Florida Baptists observe a "special" day known as STATE MISSIONS DAY. Our plea is for you and your church to observe STATE MISSIONS DAY, October 22, 1950. Give your people an opportunity to make a worthy State Missions offering which is desperately needed. Can we depend on you? Get your special offering envelopes from Dr. Jno. Maguire.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Foreign missionaries reported a total of 13,322 baptisms during the year 1949; a reasonable estimate for China, from which no report was received, would bring the total to approximately 15,000.

The Board appointed 67 new missionaries during 1949. Fifty have been appointed during the first four months of 1950. The total number of active foreign missionaries now under appointment is 753. Missionaries are stationed in 24 countries and assist national Baptists in several more.

Foreign Mission Board receipts for 1949 totaled \$5,319,261.04, not including \$120,354.15 received for world relief.

New Areas

A missionary couple transferred from Colombia in the spring of 1949 to open Venezuela's first mission station at Caracas. In the spring of 1950 a new church building is being constructed in Caracas and another Venezuela station is being opened at Barquisimeto.

Costa Rica became a foreign mission field by transfer from the Home Mission Board early in 1949.

Bangkok, Thailand, and Baguio, Philippine Islands, became temporary mission fields for Chinese language students. Early in 1950 a veteran China missionary couple arrived in Seoul, Korea, to spend a year in survey work for a new field.

A missionary couple has been appointed for work in Ecuador where Southern Baptists have had no work before, and two other couples now in language school in Colombia will probably choose Ecuador as a mission field. After language study, the missionaries expect to locate in Guayaquil or Quito, some of them this year.

New Institutions

Southern Baptists' first international theological seminary opened in September, 1949, at Ruschlikon-Zurich, Switzerland. Twenty-eight students from 15 nations are enrolled. Italy's new Baptist Bible school opened at Rivoli in October, 1949, and a woman's training school is under construction in Rome to open in the fall of 1950. Hawaii's first Baptist high school opened in September, 1949.

The first Baptist church in Formosa was organized at Taipei in August, 1949, with 30 charter members and 17 baptisms the Sunday after organization.

Construction is in progress in Asuncion, Paraguay, on Southern Baptists' first hospital in Latin America. A second missionary doctor has received license to practice in Colombia, making a second mission hospital possible in Latin America.

Two missionary doctors have been appointed for Arabia where Southern Baptist mission work has been delayed for lack of a doctor. One doctor is already on the field learning the language. A hospital is in prospect for the Hadhramaut or Yemen in southern Arabia.

The theological institutions in the Latin American area are being reorganized to give two strong institutions for Spanish America and two for Brazil, or Portuguese America. The seminary in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is already being reorganized and the second for Spanish-speaking republics may be established at Cali, Colombia. The Rio de Janeiro and Recife seminaries will continue to serve Brazil.

New Projects

For the first time Southern Baptists are using mission airplanes for transportation. The two in use are both in Brazil, one based at Corrente and the other at Fortaleza. Distances once requiring weeks of boat or muleback travel are covered in a few hours by plane.

A co-operative farm is being established at Petach, Tikva, near Tel Aviv, Israel, by a group of Baptists of Slavic origin aided by Southern Baptists.
