ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualfied to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation

of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain to moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XI. Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cared for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified,

buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and the wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spititual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of right-eousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI. Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church

of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

The Kingdom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of Gon on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Chirst. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed

and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

Constitution

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THE MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MIDDLE FLORIDA MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the Churches affiliated with this body who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches.

Article 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof.

Article 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 5.

Section 1. This Association shall meet twice a year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Committee.

Section 2. The first meeting will be held the week following the first Sunday in May, in lieu of an Executive Committee meeting, for the purpose of electing department heads, emergency business, progress reports, by incumbent heads of department, the budget committee report, and an inspirational message.

Section 3. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press. This report will be published in conjunction with the Annual Minutes. The second meeting will be held in October, the month which begins the Associational year.

Article 6. Any church, in harmony with this Association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the union upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

Article 7. Any church wishing for a letter of dismission shall make application therefor by letter.

Article 8. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an assistant Moderator, who shall be a layman or Pastor who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the suffrage of the messengers elected by the Churches, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article 9. This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of a lay member from each Church and the Pastors of each Church belonging to this Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational B.T.U. Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union President, the Associational Brotherhood President, together with the officers as ex officio members. This committee shall foster all the interests of the Association when the body is

not in session. The committee shall have authority to appoint or recommend to the State Board Missionaries, or colporteurs, and to make appropriation to weak churches or destitutions, and to give such advice to the churches as may seem wise and necessary, and the Moderator shall be chairman of the Executive Committee.

Article 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which are adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis, Tennessee, in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

Article 11. The Association shall recognize and respect the rights and independence of every church cooperating.

Article 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient.

THE RADIO TV COMMISSION REPORT

"Go ye therefore and teach all nations" is taken seriously by Dr. Paul Stevens Director of the Radio and T.V. Commission and his dedicated staff as they continue to "enlarge the place of their tent and stretch forth their habitations." Their message? To tell the world about Christ. Their audience? "A world on the run--with a radio in its pocket." (The Beam, Dec. 1965)

The 21 programs produced and distributed by the Commission showed a net gain of 453 stations during the year in addition to the 238 stations of the Armed Forces Radio T.V. Network. Programs produced for the denomination by the Commission were being used WEEKLY by 2389 outlets at the end of the year.

Not only has the Commission grown in volume but it has found new ways in which to present the message of God's love to all people. Five language groups, other than English, are being reached through regular broadcasts. In addition to the better known programs such as THE ANSWER and THE BAPTIST HOUR a new type of program was started this year. News programs for state Baptist Conventions of Arkansas and Tennessee began broadcasting during 1966. Also this year we began what is thought to be the first Radio Bible Correspondence Course with seminary credit available. This was done in cooperation with the Seminary Extension Department and Dr. Ralph Herring, Director of S.E.D.

THE BEAM, The Commission's monthly magazine, has a circulation of 30,000 plus 5,000 readers who received the Spanish version SENALES quarterly. This magazine offers information of the work of the agency, inspiration by printing messages from THE BAPTIST HOUR and excerpts from PATTERNS MASTER CONTROL, etc., as well as technical advice for our churches.

During the spring of 1966, representatives of the Commission joined NBC-TV in filming, in color, a one hour special on the Life of Christ. It will be telecast in the spring of 1967. Watch for it!

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE And THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

Long recognized for excellence in both the content and appearance of their literature, Southern Baptists have during the past year continued to improve and extend its production and circulation. The publications provide assistance in Bible study, guidance in daily Christian living, and helps for organizing and developing stronger churches.

During the last convention year the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention prepared, published and distributed a tremendous total of 106,860, 315 copies of more than 100 different periodicals to users in 50 states and numbers of foreign countries. In addition to this literature, there were published 3,128,774 special and supplementary study items, 635,648 copies of 57 new books and 474,732 reprints of 122 old books, 1,297,937 copies of 32 new study books and 2,859,399 reprints of 105 old ones, plus 72,146,308 church bulletins and inserts.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, has experienced a small but steady increase to reach a circulation of 67,662 as of August 1, 1966, up 2,289 over a year ago. Nine hundred twenty-seven churches are now using one or the other of the group subscription plans (764 with budget lists and 163 with clubs) to provide the BAPTIST WITNESS to at least a part of their members. An increasing number of churches send the paper to every resident family.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS is still the best bargain we know--costing the churches which take advantage of the budget plan only \$1.25 per year per subscription--50 issues of a 16-page news magazine at only 2 1/2 cents per copy. And this cost may be billed to the church for convenient monthly payment.

In cases where for some reason it cannot meet the minimum requirement for the budget rate (a number of subscribers equal to at least 10% of its reported membership) a church may order 10 or more papers at the club rate of \$1.50 per year each.

HOSPITALS REPORT

Facilities of the hospitals at both New Orleans and Jacksonville were filled almost to capacity during the year. Both hospitals have accepted the challenge of the present day political and cultural changes as an opportunity to demonstrate applied Christianity in the ministry of healing.

A total of 37,460 patients were admitted to the two hospitals, and 269,682 patient days of service were rendered them.

The New Orleans hospital is well under way in the last phase of current expansion construction program. Expansion and development plans for the Jacksonville hospital are well advanced. Christian people, and Baptist in particular, have reason to rejoice in the health care services rendered by the church related and Christian dedicated hospitals.

Teaching and training opportunities for interns and residents in pastoral care, in medicine and related fields, hospital administration, schools of nursing, technological schools, and other health care programs, are outstanding. The facilities and medical instructors are highly commended.

The services rendered by these two hospitals to those unable to pay, continue in large amounts. It is not anticipated that Medicare will reduce this amount. Much charity service is to patients under age 65, and at present, the most favorable reports indicate that not more than 93% of cost of services rendered to Medicare patients may be paid to the hospital by government and patient. Where does the balance come from? You and I must tighten our belts and increase our contributions.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation has had another good year of service. Again, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation.

The Foundation works in two fields. We seek to acquaint our Baptist people with the advantages of wills, trusts, and direct gifts. We also invest the funds coming to us with regard to safety and return on investment.

The audit of September 30, 1965 shows \$782,560.97 held by the Foundation in various funds. This is an increase of \$70,000.00 over last year. The Foundation owns none of this money, but holds it in trust for the various institutions favored in wills or by gifts. All of this money must be handled as specified in the will or agreement.

The trust department of one of Florida's largest banks is custodian of a large part of our investments, and makes recommendations concerning investments to our

Investment Committee of the Trustees. The Investment Committee reviews the recommendations in the light of other information and makes the final decision on investments.

The Trustees of the Foundation are elected by the Convention. At present we have fourteen outstanding business men and one pastor. The Trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies, or can be called at any time as necessary. The Executive Committee, which is the Investment Committee, serves in operational matters and meets as necessary. The Promotion Committee is concerned with advancing the program and the Audit Committee insures the safety of the funds held. All trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

As a special assignment, the Florida Baptist Convention elected your Foundation secretary-treasurer to direct the special campaign to raise \$1,500,000.00 for Stetson University and \$500,000.00 for Baptist Bible Institute.

A goal of \$3,000,000.00 for the Ford Foundation matching fund campaign for Stetson was reached approximately six months ahead of schedule.

Plans are underway at present for the Foundation to enter the field of Gift Annuities. More information about the operation of Gift Annuity contracts will be made available within the next several months.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A very important phrase of our Baptist work is the education of our people. Various means locally and otherwise are used and used very effectively, however, we as Baptist must give our very best consideration to increasing our effectiveness. After all our part in the progress of the kingdom work will to a great mean depend upon our understanding of our faith.

Several means of educating our people are being used and each is important in its own way. Our state Baptist paper, under the editorship of Dr. Stracner, is making a wonderful contribution and will be discussed in a report of its own. The organizational work of our churches and denomination is utilizing literature published by the Sunday School Board and will receive emphasis aside from this report. This report proposes to set forth the educational work done in the formal setting of our schools, colleges and seminaries.

The Southern Baptist Convention is now operating 6 seminaries; the Southern at Louisville, the Southwestern at Forth Worth, the New Orleans at New Orleans, the Golden Gate in California, the Southeastern at Wakeforest and the Midwestern at Kansas City. In these 6 seminaries during 1965 and 1966 there was a total enrollment of 4980. By and large the enrollment has increased over the past two years. It is gratifying to learn that because of increased gifts and endowments we have been able to improve our instructional facilities as well as the housing facilities at all of our seminaries.

It is hoped that a greater understanding of our seminaries will be communicated to the local churches of our convention in order that the changing society in which we live may supply a fertile field for our efforts as a denomination.

Supporting the work of our seminaries are the junior colleges and four year colleges as well as the academies and Bible schools of our entire geographical area. At the

present time Southern Baptist are operating 39 senior colleges, 15 junior colleges, 7 academies and 5 Bible schools making a total of 66 schools below seminary level. Enrollment in these schools reached an all time high during the year 1965 and 1966.

Especially gratifying is the report that in all schools, including our seminaries, 12545 young men and women were during the past year training for church related vocations. In the final breakdown 7510 were training for ministry, 1874 as home and foreign mission volunteers, 1959 as church education directors and 1202 as church music directors. Probably the greatest problem facing Southern Baptist in the field of education is the problem of the financing of schools. Education is growing more expensive. With the federal government becoming more interested and providing a quality education for our people, it is difficult for the private and church supported colleges to compete with public education.

Careful consideration must be given to the wisdom of organizing any new two year junior colleges. The time has come when it is questionable whether we can maintain the two year colleges we now have in operation. Our two year colleges must consider the possibility of making a transition to other areas of the field of education.

It is the thinking of this reporter that earnest and prayful consideration is necessary in the field of the present dilemma. It is also the thinking of this reporter much consideration must be given to improving the effectiveness of our education on the local level in our organizational work.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The Florida Baptist Children's Home offers three areas of child care. The primary area is group care in the Children's Home, the second area is the Mother's Aid Program, and the third is Foster Care.

The Home received 259 applications during the fiscal year 1965-66. Fifty-nine children were admitted and 101 were rejected for various reasons, including age and lack of ability to profit from institutional care. Eighty applications were withdrawn and 19 were pending on June 30, 1966. Seventy-five children were discharged during the year and 59 were admitted to Lakeland and the South Florida Branch. The children who were discharged went to their homes with a parent or parents. Thirteen families were assisted through Mother's Aid and there were 44 children in these families.

There were 1,496 interviews with children and 751 with parents. The Children's Home made 17 Foster Home studies and 52 visits to Foster Homes. The families on Mothers Aid are visited as often as the Administration and Case Work Dept. think necessary.

The Home is pleased to report that of the 259 referrals it received during the year, 132 were made by pastors. The Administration appreciates the cooperation of the pastors in referring needy families to the home.

The above statistics do not include interviews involving applications or inquiries. They include only the interviews involving children and families of children who are in our care. These interviews are necessary in helping the children settle in and resolve specific problems. It also helps parents with problems around the placement of their children. It enables them to make plans to take them back, return them to relatives or release them for adoption. Follow-up visits are made to children who have been discharged to parents or relatives. These visits help parents and children to

use what has been learned in the placement to work out their relationship on a sound basis. The visits also strengthen the families in the area of service and aids them in making adjustments in their home life.

There was a noticeable drop in applications received by the Home during the year 1965-66. This was due to an Order issued in 1965 by the Federal Government prohibiting a Dept, of Public Welfare from making application for a dependent child to Institutions that were not integrated; however, the Order did not affect the enrollment of the Children's Home.

REPORT ON UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION

Someone has asked the searching question: what can the average Christian do to contribute to the Christian triumph over the use of alcoholic beverages, the practice of gambling, the circulation and reading of indecentliterature, and other allied evils?

There are certainly a few things, very specific, very important that a Christian can do:

- 1. He can see to it that his personal life makes a real contribution to the ideals of sobriety, cleanliness, and Christian Citizenship. He can pray mightily for the triumph of the right.
- 2. He can let the distributors of food know, and know in no uncertain terms, that he does not condone or appreciate the splurge of borderline gambling contests being sponsored by our large Chain Grocery concerns such as Bingo, Prizo, Make Money and the other gimmicks that tend to give respectability to practices that, actually, appeal to and cultivate the gambling propensity.
