ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VL The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all

to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain to moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XI Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cares for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:86). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not

resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of right-eousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI. Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament

sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

The Kindgom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any

member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the

chair.

- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed for inserting in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decomm may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

Constitution

At the 1966 session of the Middle Florida Baptist Association, the moderator appointed the following persons to act as a Constitution Revision Committee: Elbert C. Tyner, LT. Carter, and Madison Smith.

After due consideration this committee, with the assistance of E.B. Browning,

Sr., would like to offer the following changes for your consideration:

ARTICLE 1. The name of this organization shall be "THE MIDDLE FLORIDA

MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the churches affiliated with this body who shall present letters certifying to their election, or other satisfactory evidence thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches together with the elected officers of the Association.

ARTICLE 3. Each church having fifty members or less shall be entitled to two messengers. Churches having more than fifty members shall be entitled to one addi-

tional messenger for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof.

ARTICLE 4. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches, and the fostering of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent enterprises, in harmony with the Florida Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE 5.

Section 1. This Association shall meet twice a year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Committee.

Section 2. The first meeting will be held the week following the first Sunday in May, in lieu of an Executive Committee meeting, for the purpose of electing department heads, emergency business, progress reports, by incumbent heads of department, the budget committee report, and an inspirational message.

Section 3. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press. This report will be published in conjunction with the Annual Minutes. The second meeting will be held in October, the month which begins the Associational year.

ARTICLE 6. Any church, in harmony with this association as to doctrine and practice, may be admitted into the association upon the presentation of a petitionary letter accompanied by satisfactory information.

ARTICLE 7. Any church wishing for a letter of dismission shall make application therefore by letter.

ARTICLE 8. The officers of this association shall be a Moderator, an assistant Moderator, who shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually at the fall session by the Association, and shall hold office until their successors are elected at the fall session by the Association.

ARTICLE 9. This Association shall have an Executive Committee composed of a lay member from each church, and the pastors of the churches belonging to this Association, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational Baptist Training Union Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union President, the Associational Brotherhood President and the Associational Music Director, together with the officers as ex-officio members. This committee shall foster all the interests of the Association when the body is not in session. The Moderator shall be chairman of the Executive Committee that shall meet in April and September of each year, but always subject to call.

ARTICLE 10. The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those which were adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention when in session at Memphis, Tennessee in May, 1925, and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

ARTICLE 11. The Association shall recognize and respect the rights and independence of every church cooperating.

ARTICLE 12. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual meeting of the body when two-thirds of the members present deem it expedient.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

October 1. 1968 brought in the most drastic changes ever made in the work of Woman's Missionary Union. With an emphasis on fewer officers and a minimum organization to get the work done, the new plans have been accepted in varying degrees of enthusiasm.

The annual session of Florida Woman's Missionary Union was held at First Church, Tallahassee, February 18-19. This was the seventy-fifth anniversary meet-

ing, and recognition was given to churches achieving anniversary goals.

The major item of business at this session was the final action that made Woman's Missionary Union a department of work in the Florida Baptist Convention, thus ending seventy-five years as an auxiliary. We feel that this new relationship is the proper one, and that it will enable Woman's Missionary Union more fully to participate in the missionary program of Florida, 12 persons from our association were present for this historic meeting.

Three major projects have been undertaken by the state organization this year. Stetson University provided on its campus a house for a missionary couple on furlough. Officials there requested Woman's Missionary Union to furnish it. This large financial investment included furniture, carpets, and drapes. The house was dedicated in April to the memory of Florida's first woman foreign missionary, and will be known as the "Lula Sparkman Terry House." The Irvin Northcutts spent last

school year in the home, the first residents.

In line with the decision of Florida Baptists to assist in the Crusade of the Americas plans in Ohio, Woman's Missionary Union provided assistance in Buffalo, New York (in the Ohio Convention) and in Cleveland, Ohio, Fifteen persons went to Buffalo in April to assist in the telephone survey. A total of 186 persons were paired in Buffalo and Florida as prayer partners. In June 24 persons went to Cleveland to assist in personal witnessing as a follow-up to the telephone survey which Cleveland Baptists made without assistance. Almost \$5,000.00 was invested by Florida WMU in these two projects. This amount came from individual churches, associations. individuals, and the budget of Florida WMU.

In our own association we have made progress:

As we think back over the year trying to think of the achievements we have made for the advancement of Christ in our mission work, we are reminded of the reports from almost all of our W.M.S.'s that they had reached or gone over their goals in both Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong offerings.

Several have visited rest homes for the aged and given clothing to the Cuban Refugees, a love gift to Faith Church, one society reported giving a birthday party for the aged in the Dowling Park Nursing Home, giving decorated Christmas stockings to

the aged, and a love gift to our speakers each time we had a Rally.

We have sponsored buying a washing machine for Miss Nita Ruth McCullough. Two of our ladies attended the Leadership Conference at Camp Yale in September. May we join hands with one another for a better year in our Mission field next year.

- 2. Help with refreshments at meetings and socials.
- 3. Pay for literature from the Baptist Book Store to put on the campus and for use in our meetings.

4. Possibly make a float for Homecoming.

As far as general plans go, our interests are going to be many and varied. We would like to do something for the foreign students of our campus, such as a progressive supper, a cookout, a picnic, or something in this area. We are enthusiastically planning to put on the musical drama, "For Heaven's Sake." There has been interest shown in the idea of a "Hootenany," which would include a group from the Florida Bible College in Boca Raton. We are also interested in a census of the dorms, and a suggestion box to give us helpful hints in our work.

Perhaps our most ambitious plan is that of an "Emphasis Week" on Campus. This would occur as a series of nightly programs lasting for one week. There are ideas for speakers and good entertainment, along with anything else the more ingenious of our organization can think up.

With a little luck and a lot of help from God, we can make a great impact on North Florida Junior College, and that is what we are praying for, and we ask your prayers for

us.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

During the past year, the Florida Baptist Children's Home has continued to offer three types of services: (1) group care in the institution; (2) Mother's Aid, or financial assistance to families: (3) Foster Home Care.

There were 150 children in residence in the Homes at Lakeland and Miami during the year. The capacity of the Home in Lakeland is 93 and in Miami 36. The total number of children cared for during the year was made possible by the rehabilitation of families. Most of the children discharged from the institution were returned to their (own) homes or to those of relatives. Some are in foster homes and one was placed for adoption through the Children's Home Society.

We gave assistance to 5 families through our Mother's Aid Program, serving 17 children. We had 15 children in 10 foster homes, making a total of 182 directly under

the care of the Children's Home for the year.

We received 153 applications and admitted 46 children. We discharged 53 children. There were 1,257 interviews with children; 602 with parents; 20 foster home studies; and 3 visits to families receiving Mother's Aid. Follow up service was provided to 25 children who were previously discharged.

The need for special services continues to increase. We are finding more and more parents and children who need professional help, making it necessary for us to assist them professionally as well as financially. The inability of parents to meet the needs of their families is evidenced by the number of calls and applications we receive.

Some of these cannot be met by organization and when this is not possible, referral is made to other sources for their assistance.

There seems to be a continuing feeling that the Children's Home has ample Trust Funds to meet its responsibilities to applicants seeking help. I must re-emphasize that these funds are to be held intact. Only the income from Trust Funds can be used in the operation of the institution. If we, as a denomination, expect to keep pace with the increase in the number of children who need assistance, we must have stronger support from our churches and the Convention.

MUSIC MINISTRY

Church music is already experiencing changes -- some good and some bad --, and our Association cannot ignore the fact that some changes in our music program are necessary and healthy.

PEOPLE LIKE TO SING! It has been said that the emphasis has been on choirs doing all the singing are too long in many churches, and many times the man in the pew has been ignored. Good trained choirs will always be important in order to lead the congregations in singing, and we cannot let up on our efforts on training good choirs and musicians. However, let's put more emphasis this year on everybody singing. Singing hymns that they understand make happy church goers.

This year there will be some changes in our Associational hymn sings. The Association is being divided into three sections and there will be hymn sings held in each section, we hope once each quarter. In this way, we can concentrate our efforts on fewer churches at a time, and people will not have as great a distance to travel. The one event that we will still have for the entire Association will be the Festival, January 25, 1970, at Cherry Lake at 2:00 P.M.

Last year there were 5 churches with 88 persons who participated in the Music Festival. This represented 5 choirs, 1 Ladies' Sextet, and 2 Hymn Players. The 28 churches in Middle Florida Association are capable of more participation than that and surely this next year we shall do much better. We also want to encourage some of our churches, to participate in our State Festivals in February and March. Not only is the participation good for us, but it is always helpful to hear other choirs and ensembles and see what other churches are doing in their music.

The Music Department also cooperated with the Youth Camp at Pickett Lake in regard to Associational camps in 1970, but the churches will be advised when plans have been worked out. We are sure there will be some changes in that area of our work.

The theme for Southern Baptists for 1970 is, "LIVING THE SPIRIT OF CHRIST IN RELIEF AND RELEVANCE" Good church music can certainly play a vital part in promoting this theme.

Take a good look at our church music! If changes need to be made, make them! If a training program is needed, provide it! If it's motivation, get motivated! But, by all means, DOSOMETHING TO IMPROVE CHURCH MUSIC. Middle Florida Baptists can do anything they want to. Surely we want to, and we are going to see more and better music in our churches this year!

REPORT OF "MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSEMBLY"

We have had the best year ever at the Middle Florida Assembly Grounds. Twentyfive groups from five of our seven sponsoring Associations, LaFayette, Middle Fla., Santa Fe River, Suwannee and Taylor, used the Assembly, besides groups from three Associations outside, that had summer camps, namely, Jacksonville, New River and Southwest Florida (Bradenton). Fourteen churches in our seven association group made contributions, some monthly, most were annual gifts. Despite the small number of churches helping, our funds together with camp rent fees, managed to pay all bills, and leave a \$500 balance, after transferring several hundred dollars surplus to the Chapel Bldg, Fund, as directors voted. Seating for open air lakeside services was donated from Mid. Fla. Ass'n Camp Fund proceeds. These accommodate 150 people. At a called meeting Sept. 25th, pastors from the area were all invited to view and discuss plans for the new chapel building. These were unanimously approved, and authority voted to begin construction in the next few days. It is hoped that by Association time construction will be well under way. Rev. I.T. Carter, an able and experienced builder was approved to supervise the construction, with his "crew." Suggestion was approved that we allow for air conditioning in the construction, to be added later, when money is provided, as well as central heating. Presently, \$5,500 is in the fund. We feel that when the walls go up, money will come in even faster.

The group voted to set aside SUNDAY, NOV. 2nd as "ASSEMBLY CHAPEL DAY" in all our churches, requesting that each church will have SPECIAL PRAYER and make a LOVE OFFERING for the CHAPEL FUND, to be sent in the following week.

On basis of incomplete reports, there were over a thousand people using the assembly the past year, 53 recorded professions of faith, 115 rededications, and eight commitments for full time Christian service. There were likely several more, but these came from report sent in to date. Some have not sent in the requested reports. SURELY this is missions in the first degree. We pray that your churches and Association will see fit to INCLUDE THE ASSEMBLY AND OR CHAPEL BLDG. IN YOUR BUDGETS.

Recently 50 additional cot type beds were purchased, which gives us a total of 140 (Just in time for record breaking Mid. Fla. A'ssn Camp, which registered total of 120). In this one group, 19 made professions of faith, and 69 rededications, with 5 commitments for service. YOU SEE WHAT THE LORD CAN DO, IF WE LET HIM USE US!

We at the Assembly hope and pray that you will appoint an "ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE", for two things: First - To plan a week of camp for your own young people. Likely several of your pastors have had "camp" experience, and could lead if asked. SEE WHAT YOUR ASSOCIATION CAN DO. Second - To lead in promoting the Assembly use and support by every church, and associational department, and urge the budget committee to include an association gift along with the churches. REPORT OF STATE MISSIONS

Likely the most significant event in the area of State Missions work this year was the coming of Dr. Woodrow Fuller to be Director of the Missions Division to our state office. Dr. Fuller comes with a wide background of experience in this field and will offer planned leadership for the entire state.

A number of events are worthy of mention:

1. The process of moving into a newform of association mission work was begun. We are moving from a state supported Field Secretary program to association supported association missions program with state aid.

2. A new working agreement with the Home Mission Board gives direction to the entire missions program, allowing for needed studies to be made that will reveal mission needs and then as funds are available, open up new areas of mission service.

- 3. A new work made possible by the Home Mission Board is the developing beach ministry. Five couples served this summer with the work to continue through August 15, 1971.
- 4. Two World Mission Conferences were held in the state with 47,655 attending from 76 participating churches. Ten such conferences are planned for 1970.
- 5. The Jacksonville Association employed Miss Beverly Hammock to serve in the area of Christian Social Ministries.

Missions in Florida is taking a new and exciting turn. Under God's leadership we can win many to the Lord.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Primary emphasis this year has been preparation for and conducting of the Crusade of the Americas. Thousands of rallies were held in associations, telecasts were made, and hundreds of other activities were undertaken for the year of witnessing.

We now have 2,385 missionaries serving in all fifty states, plus Panama and Puerto Rico, an increase of only 85 while 406 were appointed. In addition, there are now 986 Chaplains serving on active duty in the military.

Church Loan assistance went to 306 churches with loans totaling more than \$7 1/2 million. Emphasis has been placed on distribution of God's Word. Forty thousand new testaments were bought and distributed by Home Mission Leaders. Almost one-half million scriptures in the Russian Language and other Scripture portions are being distributed in cooperation with the American Bible Society.

By 1970 every city with 75,000 people is expected to have been entered by Southern Baptists with fellowships, new churches or church-type missions. Resort/Recreation areas received special attention from the Rural-Urban Missions Department.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

At the close of 1968 the Southern Bap. Foreign Mission Bd. had an overseas missionary staff of 2,371. Appointments totaled 247 and even with the additional personnel (the largest number in any year thus far) several hundred calls for missionaries are still unanswered. Missionaries are now in 67 countries with appointments already made to 3 others. At year's end there were 5,154 churches, 6,974 mission points and 4,413 national pastors. These report 50,003 baptisms, 611,470 members with 538,304 enrolled in Sunday Schools. To meet emergency needs for relief of human suffering in Nigeria, Vietnam and other countries the FMB provided \$98,233. Total contributions of Sou. Bap. for Foreign Missions amounted to \$29,745,

692 an increase of 5.16% of 1967. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering amounted to \$15,159,206,92.

REPORT ON HOSPITALS

Our two Southern Baptist Hospitals are located in New Orleans and Jacksonville. Mr. Hardy M. Harrell of Jacksonville is the Executive Secretary-Treasurer. The hospital in New Orleans experienced its first kidney transplant this past year. It was successful. In Jacksonville a double artificial heart valve was replaced, the first in North Florida. Along with many other services in these hospitals a full-time service by physicians (24 hours a day, seven days a week) has been initiated in the New Orleans hospital, the first in the state, and a committee of Trustees, Administrative Personnel, Physicians and others are working with the specific purpose to develop new and improved programs of services in the Jacksonville hospital. This committee concerns itself with only programs of services. Both hospitals have a team of heart surgeons and other needed personnel organized and making ready a team for heart transplants.

Including our two Southern Baptist hospitals there are 51 Baptist hospitals located in 15 states with a total of 14,884 beds and 1,755 bassinets. These hospitals have in their employment registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, radiological technologists, medical and various other technologists, numbering 10,114. Other employees, not including students, number 23,544. Total number of employees and students is 38,900. Net loss to these hospitals last year due to medical and other governmental agencies amounted to \$5,776,942.

Through the Christian ministry of healing, our hospitals provide a way by which the church can go into the world.

REPORT OF THE ANNUITY BOARD

During 1968, neither inflation nor the economy showed any evidence of a slow down. the cost of living rose 4.7% pushing the consumer price Index to a record 123.7 in

December, 1968. This was the greatest increase since 1951.

To meet the needs of retiring ministers, church staff members, and denominational employees, the Annuity Board has developed the Southern Baptist Protection Program to provide an adequate retirement income. The Annuity Board and state conventions heartily recommends the upgrading of retirement programs of churches and agencies by contributing 10% of total salary.

The three-plan Protection Program provides: Plan "A" the basic retirement fund; Plan "B" the supplementary fund; and Plan "C" the variable fund. The Life and Health

Benefit plan also had a good response.

Highlights of 1968: There are 3,451 new members in the Southern Baptist Protection Program; 23,714 members now participating in Plan "A", with 18,086 Churches providing protection for their pastors; 145 agencies providing protection for 9,894 of their employees; \$173,863 given in relief grants, and \$6,543,169 paid in total relief protection benefits.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation has had another good year of service. Every agency and institution supported by the Convention has again been named in wills where the Foundation gave assistance.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation has made himself available and has appeared in several pastors' conferences, many associational meetings and many churches to discuss Foundation work with these groups. He has also made himself available for personal conferences with individuals as the opportunity arises.

The audit of September 30, 1968 shows \$765,728.61 held by the Foundation under trust agreements or under conditions of wills. The Foundation owns none of this money but holds it in trust for the various causes favored. At the present time approximately \$100,000 for Baptist causes is in the process of being probated. This money will soon come to Baptists.

The Trustees of the Foundation are elected annually by the Florida Baptist Convention. At present there are fourteen laymen and one minister serving as Trustees. Five of these men serve on the Executive Committee, which is also the Investment Committee, and the remaining Trustees serve on the Promotion or Audit Committee. The books of the Foundation are audited annually by the Convention's auditor.

The Foundation continues efforts to raise capital funds for Baptist institutions. Florida Baptist Retirement Centers, Inc., Stetson University and Baptist Bible Institute have been benefited from the services of the Foundation to a considerable extent during the past years. Full cooperation is given in promoting the Convention's total stewardship program.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is available to meet with anyone who wishes to leave anything by will to any Baptist cause, or to discuss life-income agreements

with anyone who would like to establish a living trust.

ministry of the printed word.

BAPTIST FILM CENTER: New this year in the Baptist Film Center is the very popular "JOT" religious cartoon series. A total of twelve different titles are available teaching such truths as cooperation, sharing, integrity, Happiness in God's house, and many others. Each film is approximately five minutes in length. This series, produced by the Radio and Television commission, has been very popular on television.

Rentals in the Baptist Film Center have increased 23.7 percent during 1969. Your interest in the religious audio-visual ministry in and through churches has made this increase possible. Thank you for your continued support as we strive to serve Florida

Baptist's Film needs.

BAPTIST BOOK STORE ENVELOPE SERVICE: Another increase during 1969 was in church offering envelope sales boosting the envelope ministry to 10.3 percent over 1968. In addition the Baptist Book Store Envelope Service has added a new service to help your church. Church letterheads, Mailing envelopes, church bulletins, and calling cards, with your church picture, may now be purchased from your Baptist Book Store Envelope Service. Many churches have taken advantage of this new service this year.

BAPTIST BOOK STORE ANTHEM SERVICE: This new service of the Baptist Book Store has won many friends during 1969. Church musicians continue to discover the advantage of ordering anthems of all publishers from one source and receiving them postage free. This new service has caught on especially well during its two years of operation.

Our Motto is always, "SERVICE WITH A CHRISTIAN DISTINCTION FROM COAST TO COAST." Let us show you that we mean it.

- 4. That the WMU and Brotherhood join forces in the observing the four seasons of prayer, Associational, State, Home and Foreign Missions.
 - 5. That we continue to give emphasis to Stewardship and budget planning.
- 6. Every church participating in "The World Mission Conference (formerly School of Missions) September 27-October 2, 1970.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION

In 1968 the Southern Baptist Convention made a very significant forward progress in Christian social concerns. The year saw a more general acceptance of the Commission's emphasis on applied Christianity among pastors, lay people, youth, local churches, and the Baptist mass media than ever before.

Local churches throughout the Convention projected programs applying Christian principles in their communities, involved themselves in Christian action, conducted Christian Life conferences, performed Christian social ministries, and generally accepted the moral imperatives of the gospel as never before.

Unprecedented quantities of material on applied Christianity were channeled by the Commission through the various Southern Baptist mass media to audiences more sympathetic than any in recent decades, if not in Southern Baptist history.

Twice as many pamphlets on family life, race relations, daily work, Christian citizenship, and specific moral problems were ordered by Southern Baptist as ever before. Ten new titles in the "Issues and Answers" series were released in June, 1969. Ten more are in preparation.

The most influential program of conferences and seminars ever projected by the Christian Life Commission reached a representative cross-section of Southern Baptist leaders. A closely coordinated emphasis on Christian citizenship during the 1968 general election year produced a highly successful seminar in Washington, D.C., two very useful conferences at the Glorieta and Ridgecrest assemblies, a series of nine articles on "The Christian and Politics" carried by most of the state Baptist papers, and an excellent book on the subject published by Broadman Press. The Resource Guide to Current Social Issues, a 272-page book, was distributed by the Commission without charge to 55,000 Southern Baptist leaders. A significant conference on "The Church's Mission In the National Crisis" was held in Chicago in 1969. A major emphasis on "Extremism--Right and Left" was made in the 1969 Southern Baptist Convention and in the summer conferences of 1969.

The Commission's staff was strengthened substantially last year with the coming in January of W.L. Howse III, as director of organization and the coming in June of Elmer S. West, Jr., as director of program development. The 1969 election of Harry Hollis as director of special moral concerns brings the staff to a position of greater usefulness to Southern Baptist than ever before.

It is hoped that both associations and churches will be especially alert to new opportunities to apply Christian principles in the area of social concern. The expression of such concern will strongly undergird our total witness for Jesus Christ.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

While Florida Baptists lead their fellow Baptists in most other states in several areas of church and denominational activity, we have begun to lag in the area of keep-

ing our total membership well informed about all of our Baptist work.

In order to keep their people informed, indoctrinated and enlisted, Southern Baptists have many of their best minds engaged in writing, editing and publishing periodicals, literature and books. Good examples of such are: The Foreign Mission Board's COMMISSION magazine, the Home Mission Board's HOME MISSION. The Brotherhood Commission's BAPTIST MEN'S JOURNAL, and Women's Missionary Union's ROYAL SERVICE, also 29 Baptist state papers.

Our own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, as of August 1, 1969 had a circulation of 66,710 for a net loss of 187 for the year. As small proportionately as this loss is, with 14,064 more members added to our churches during the year, the circulation should have risen if all the churches had been fully alert to keeping all their members informed. Nine hundred sixty-three churches are now using one or the other of the group subscription plans (784 with budgets and 179 with clubs) to send the WITNESS to at least a part if not all of the families in their membership.

A 16-page weekly news magazine foronly 3 cents per copy (\$1.50 per year each) continues to be the biggest bargain we know anything about. This plan is a number

of subscribers equal to at least 10% of its total membership.

In cases where for some reason a church cannot meet the minimum requirement for the budget rate (a number of subscribers equal to at least 10% of its total reported membership) it may order 10 or more papers at the club rate of \$1.75 per year each and still pay on the monthly plan if desired.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

The Florida Baptist Retirement Centers was chartered November 12, 1959, and received its first residents in March, 1961. Its twenty-three acre campus in North Vero Beach is now occupied by nine buildings. The major units are the custodial center, infirmary center, and duplex cottage apartments. Total assets of the Centers are \$650, 435,06.

On September 1, 1969, there were thirty-two residents in the custodial center, fourteen in the duplexes, and sixteen in the infirmary, for a total population of sixty-two.

The age span in the Center runs from 66 to 96 years. The average is 82.8 years. We have fifteen preliminary applications in our waiting files.

The Rev. Mr. T.O. Baldwin joined our staff as Chaplain. He brought a rich background of experience, - fifty years as a Florida Baptist pastor, - to this new role.

The Rev. M. James Sartain came to the Center in May as Building and Grounds Superintendent. He has made a significant contribution to the lives of our residents.

What are the vital needs in the later years of human life? Food and shelter and the good health to enjoy them. Which is another way of saying: A roof over one's head, a decent meal, a healthy body. Or, in the language of the sociologist-activist: adequate housing, properly balanced meals, expert medical attention. In short, a rebirth of human dignity - through employment wherever possible, through assistance services where indicated. The needs are the same for all stages of life, only more so for the aging, Frailty and isolation are added burdens. Poverty has always been the enemy.

Old age takes an estimated 25 to 30 percent of a lifetime. As geriatrics advance

the span of human life, it may grow even longer. With these facts in mind, it is the dedicated desire of the Florida Baptist Retirement Centers' staff to do everything possible by the Grace of God to make these years "the best years of our residents' lives."

REPORT OF UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION

One of the main advantages of being an abstainer is the opportunity to see clearly exactly how alcohol and other narcotics, gambling and obscenity degrade, pollute and destroy individuals, families and communities.

The miserable failure of the permissive immorality practiced by many Floridians today is proof positive of the eternal values of Baptist ideals for living. Though we will all fall far short of our potential for good, at least we are earnestly trying to be a part of a Christian solution to these problems, rather than becoming a part of the

problem itself.

When the polluters seek to mislead your children into using narcotics, drinking beer, dabbling in obscenity, smoking-defiling their minds, bodies and souls, UCA has been there to spark the battle, to stand in the gap until aroused moral forces are alerted. Your concern over increased gambling in Florida helped win an outstanding victory when UCA filed suit against the Legislative act permitting Bingo gambling, and the Duval Circuit court ruled it unconstitutional.

Our problem today is not so much the noise of the bad people, but the silence of the good people. What used to disturb us now only amuses us. We are becoming a society strangling on its own greed, rich in material goods but poor in spirit.

On local, state and national issues, most Christian citizens remain strangely silent in the face of political and public immorality, hardly turning a finger to fight for the right, while the hard working protectors of the profiteers and polluters win their point time after time when the tide could well have been turned by a few voices of Christian concern.

The statistics of sin in Florida 1969 are appalling. Alcoholic beverages continue to plague us. With 21,000 legalized outlets for beer, wine or whiskey, 110 million gallons were consumed, costing \$575 million, creating 300,000 alcoholics and addictive drinkers. Their contributions are many--55% of auto deaths, more than half of all crime; divorces; broken lives, scarred souls.

Gambling continues its plague. With legalized gambling at six horse tracks (the Legislature authorized a seventh); six Jai Alai Frontons (the only ones in America), 16 dog tracks; unlimited and unrestrained Bingo gambling. Another \$600 million wasted

Obscenity and pornography without end, on newstands, drug and grocery store shelves, movies and cocktail lounges. While everyone grants that good books cause good actions, few seem concerned that bad books cause bad action. Obscenity in any form promotes an unnatural and promiscuous attitude towards life that is reflected in worsening moral and social problems, pandering to the rottenness in man.

In spite of all this, there are many encouraging signs of a moral revival ready to break out and change our communities for Christ.
