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HISTORICAL MARKER AT MACEDÓNIA

During this associational year the Executive Committee, working with the Macedonia Baptist Church in cooperation with the Madison County Historical Society, erected a Historical Marker in front of the church where the Association was founded in 1900. This marker for the Association and Macedonia Church was dedicated September 16, 1973. Rev. I.T. Carter, Moderator of the Association, gave the dedicatory address. Unveiling for the Association were: Eugene Stokes, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Lacy R. Woodard, long-time Treasurer of Madison Church and Lewis Tucker, leader in the Historical Society, for the church: Carl W. Burnett, Clerk Emeritus of the Association, and Mrs. Cordie Welch, Clerk of the Church.

Guests of honor included: Dr. John Maguire, former Executive-Secretary of the Florida Baptist Convention, B.D. Locke, Superintendent of Missions, Mrs. J.F. McCall and Mrs. Ward, daughters of Rev. J.T. Famell, the first Moderator, and Mr. Ed Rutherford, son of the first clerk, Rev. J.L. Rutherford and Mrs. Rutherford and son, Ed, Jr. were present also.

The inscription for the Macedonia Church is on the reverse side of the Marker.

MARKER INSCRIPTIONS

MACEDONIA MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

For The Glory of God, Macedonia Church was established as a mission of Pine Grove Church, 1859. It first met in a log building near the southwest comer of the cemetery. Charter members of the church were: Manning J. and Cynthia Williams, Henderson M. and Mary Frier, Elias and Emoline Pert, Georgia Ann Hudson, and Sarah Comett. The Assisting Elders were Ryan and Henderson Frier. It sponsored the organization of Faith Church, 1964. Always scripturally Sound and busy in Missionary outreach, Macedonia is a monument to the Grace of God.

Miss Irene Williams, Mrs. Julius Newsome and Miss Thursa Williams, direct descendents of the charter members, came and enjoyed the dedications.

The recent years have shown a creditable interest in preserving the illustrious history of Florida Baptists in the Suwannee River Valley.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

DECEMBER 4, 1972

CAMPS AND ASSEMBLIES REPORT

Camping is a vital, relevant part of the program of many of our more progressive Baptist churches. Camping gives the youth, as well as the adults, an opportunity to leave the hurried, busy atmosphere of a local community to a quiet setting, nestled in God's handiwork where a person can enrich his mind and soul in spiritual uplift.

Many young people and adults participated in a camp and/or assembly program during 1972-73. Many of the associational camps reported a greater than ever number

participating in one or more camp programs.

As of July 1973 we do not have official reports from the associational camps, but we can report that Lake Yale Baptist Assembly served 19,441 persons thus far this year. West Florida Baptist Assembly served 4,161 persons. A greater number made first time decisions in the consecration services at one of the assemblies. Many have made professions of faith in Christ or have volunteered for Christian vocation or have rededicated their lives to the service of the Lord.

As we gaze into 1973-74, we can visualize an even greater surge toward camping, not only as a recreational get-away type activity, but one that will stimulate body and

soul to greater involvement in the Lord's work.

Plans for the West Florida Baptist Assembly are indefinite. The committee is searching for a new site, since the present site is not large enough or suitable for further expansion that needs to be done. Land prices around the assembly have gone up astronomically and the committee does not feel that we can pay such a high rate per acre for ground to build on. Therefore, the committee continues to look for property within reason that will care for a greater number of people, including the adults.

Lake Yale Baptist Assembly continues to improve facilities and property. New property is being developed for camper spaces, permanent housing for families, and rough and tent camping for the various organizations. A new multipurpose building is in the planning stages that will give program teaching rooms for children and youth, as well as adults. This is a much needed building, since we do not have adequate provisions for the children or adults when they attend.

Please pray for the ministry of Camps and assemblies. Pray for your church in this camping program. God is blessing our ministry in a marvelous way.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

Significant decisions were made by the Children's Home Trustees in this last fiscal year. Two recommendations were made by the Trustees to the State Board of Missions. One, to sell the Lakeland Campus and build an entirely new campus in the Lakeland area and two, establish a branch home in the Northwest Florida area. When this matter was presented by the State Board to the State Convention, it was ultimately referred back to the State Board for further study. After a thorough study was made the recommendation was presented and adopted by the State Board to establish a branch home in the Tallahassee area, but denied the selling of the Lakeland campus.

During the fiscal year a total of 306 persons were served directly including children and relatives. Of this number 157 children were served on the campuses and in our foster homes.

Stringent fire codes from the State Fire Marshall's office necessitated our closing down the two-story cottages, until adequate repairs and renovations could be made. This cut the population of the Lakeland campus in half and a number of children were turned down because of lack of space.

As a result of the closing of the two-story cottages the emergency service was terminated.

During the coming fiscal year additional significant decisions will be made, as Florida Baptists move toward a child care ministry related to the present needs of our society.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Relief is a minor part of the Annuity Board work. As of December 31, 1972, there were 124 ministers and 274 widows on the relief roll. The total amount spent of relief was \$171,581.

Several youth groups came from area churches to share the message of God's Love. We are grateful for all who aid in gifts and time to lessen the load and brighten the days of these heroes of the cross.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Our Baptist Men continue to reach people for Christ through varied means. Churches everywhere are experiencing a sense of revival as men become aware of their mission and move out from their churches to "help somebody today."

Glendon McCullough, Executive Secretary, Brotherhood Commission, in his annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Portland, Oregon, recently outlined "Four Emphases for Baptist Men."

(1) Promoting knowledge of our denominational program by seeking to place in their church budgets the state Baptist paper for every family; the foreign and home mission magazines for all persons elected to leadership positions and Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union publications for a million of our lay members. (2) A new in-depth study of the Cooperative Program and an aggressive program for a larger percentage of the church gifts to be designated for the world wide ministry through their local church; becoming partners with their pastors in meeting needs in their church and community. (4) Providing for the church staff in any local church to the same degree they provide for leadership in their businesses in both salary and benefits.

During the year we had an average of 89 persons present at each of our four meetings. We thank the following churches for their hospitality as shown in their hosting our meetings: Greenville Baptist Church, Hopewell Baptist Church, Lee Baptist church, and the Pleasant Grove (L) Baptist Church.

STATE MISSIONS

The Missions Division of the Florida Baptist Convention includes several important and exciting areas of mission work and assistance to the churches in the state of Florida.

Language Missions has a support and communications ministry to over 500,000 persons of varied language culture background, which reaches from Key West to Jacksonville to Pensacola. There are 12 self-supporting language missions churches in Florida.

There is one missionary couple serving among the Indians of Florida, the Genus E. Crenshaws. There are Baptist churches near each of the Seminole reservations of Hollywood, Big Cypress and Brighton.

The Donald Otwells serve as missionaries to the 7,000 deaf people of Florida. Mr. Otwell travels over the state, maintaining contact with the 26 deaf groups through preaching, visitation and counseling, as well as training interpreters.

World Missions Conferences continue to receive strong attention and support. 1/2 to 1/5 of the associations are scheduled each year. Without fail these conferences and the fine messages of veteran missionaries have awakened new interest and support for World Missions from the local churches to the ends of the earth.

Over 30 Summer Missionaries have served in Florida this past summer. These college and Seminary young people are appointed by the Home Mission Board and Baptist Student Unions in the States.

The Financial Assistance to Churches and Missions continues to be a strong, active service. No loans have been declined this year because of insufficient funds. Churches needing small loans up to \$10,000 for repairs and limited projects are encouraged to apply.

New Work surveys have been made in 31 of the 47 Associations, revealing already a need for 380 church sites before 1985. Our Executive Secretary-Treasurer has convened a group of outstanding laymen with background and knowledge in the field of property and financing. This involvement offers great potential.

The Florida Baptist Convention Church Bond Plan continues to grow steadily without strong promotion. Churches planning to build or remodel buildings are encouraged to contact the Division office for information concerning the costs and strengths of this service.

Within the organizational structure of the Florida Baptist Convention the Education Division staff is responsible to the executive secretary-treasurer for planning developing, coordinating, directing and promoting the work of four program departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Church Music and Student. Its staff personnel are

continually challenged to design, develop and offer to church and associational leaders creative program activities, methods, materials, projects and motivation essential to strengthening these important functions in the churches.

The Education Division office has direct promotion and administrative responsibilities for two assigned programs - Church Administration and the Florida Baptist Convention Scholarship Program. Guidance materials and planning activities were provided in response to requests received.

The Scholarship Program has made possible grants and loans awarded to a large number of fine, deserving Florida Baptist young people. Most of these have expressed deep, personal gratitude for the assistance received. Some have reported they could not have attended college without the financial assistance extended to them by Florida Baptist churches through the Scholarship Program.

In two of these programs, namely Sunday School and Church Training, there has been five years in which statistical decline had been recorded each year. We are happy that in Florida this trend has now been reversed and hopefully we shall maintain this growth pattern in the future.

It is our desire to extend every possible assistance to the churches and associations so that the new church year just beginning shall be the finest and best in our history.

HOME MISSIONS

The Horne Mission Board has as its national objective "Crossing Barriers with the Gospel."

We have more than 2,250 missionaries in fifty states. Also we have 65 US-2 workers. These college graduates serve for a two-year period. There are also over 950 student summer missionaries and 880 chaplains.

The Home Mission Board gives major attention to areas of critical spiritual, moral, and social need. Many home missionaries, including over 250 in Christian social ministries, help Baptists to minister to persons involved in drug and alcohol abuse, to poor people in ghettoes, and to those in communities where violence is a constant threat and for disaster relief.

During a recent year there were an estimated 412,600 baptism in our churches, the third highest in SBC history and the first time since 1959 that we have passed the 400, 000 mark. NO doubt the new lay witnessing strategy, WIN, made a significant contribution.

Financial support of home missions barely keeps up with the rising cost of living. At the present we have more highly qualified volunteers for home missions than there are funds to support them.

The Home Mission Board, located in Atlanta, Georgia, is under the direction of Dr. Atthur B. Rutledge, Executive Secretary. The Home Mission Board staff directs the work of all home missionaries.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptists now have over 2,500 overseas missionaries in 75 countries. During this past generation of advance, Southern Baptists entered new countries at a rate averaging two countries a year.

The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, along with Cooperative Program funds, helps support missions work around the world. It enables missionaries and nationals to witness. It builds churches. It maintains schools and student work. It publishes literature of all kinds. It reaches people for Christ through hospitals, doctors, and nurses. It extends the witness of your church overseas, into 75 countries.

The Foreign Mission Board is dependent primarily on the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for funding.

Per member giving by Southern Baptists for foreign missions through the Cooperative Program and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering amounts to less than 6 cents a week.

You are asked to remember all of our mission Work in your daily devotions.

United Christian Action, Inc. is your inter church service agency working to protect and improve the moral environment in Florida. It would be easy to feel discouraged when considering the enormous problem we face as individual Christians and members of the church family. The reason Christianity has endured every kind of Persecution through the ages, is because People with vision and courage have refused to quit fighting the evils of their day.

We aren't about to give up in Florida. The outcome is too important for today, tomorrow, and eternity. Look at some of the problems.

1. Alcohol and other drugs continue to produce human miseries and economic woes with 21,000 legalized outlets for alcoholic beverages in our state, and these are exerting tremendous influence on our people. The drinking age has been lowered to 18. We are sure to pay a high price in warped lives and in problems among our youth for years to come,

2. GAMBLING is making new inroads with more legalized gambling outlets.

3. PORNOGRAPHY. An outstanding victory was won for decency when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in June that local communities could determine what pomography was, and could exert reasonable control over peddlers in news stands, movies, etc. We need to work with and through our local public officials to close down every source of Pornography.

FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS INFORMATION NECESSARY

Because information is necessary for intelligent study, actions and cooperation, Baptist state papers are important. This type of media continues to fill a strategic place in the life of Southern Baptists. Although each paper is owned and produced by separate state conventions, they are a primary source of unity which enables an autonomous people to cooperate in a spiritual ministry designed to declare and exhibit the gospel to a lost world.

Confidence on the part of Baptists in this ministry of the printed page is evidenced by the fact that the circulation of the 33 state papers has reached an all-time high of 1,700,000. This is made possible through those local churches who see the need and right of each member having the opportunity to be informed.

INCREASED CIRCULATION

The Florida Baptist Witness, our own state paper, has grown in circulation during the past year. As of August 1, 1973, we now have a circulation of 69,000, as compared to 64,000 last year. One thousand eleven churches (an increase of 39), out of the 1,501 churches in the state, are now using one or the other of the group subscription plans to send the Witness each week to at least a part, if not all, of the families in their membership.

Circulation to a great degree determines the effectiveness of the Witness. All the work, effort and expense mean little if the paper is not widely distributed. Likewise, readership is also determined by circulation for how shall they read if the paper be not sent?

The wise pastor will see to it that each member of his church has a chance to read the Witness then they will be Better Baptist.

EVANGELISM REPORT

A 34% increase in baptisms in two years rocketed Florida Baptists to a record year in baptisms in 1971-72 with 31,117 in the 1,501 churches. There were 38 churches baptizing over 100 and 34 churches baptizing one for every four members.

Southern Baptists topped the 400,000 baptisms mark in 1971-72 for the fifth time with a record of 452,673 baptisms.

In this church year of 1972-73, our association is reporting 146 baptisms, which is a decrease of 23 from last year. The New Macedonia Baptist Church has led us in evangelism with 25 baptisms, and the Church has led us in a ratio of baptisms with one for . Our churches reported 198 additions by letter and statement for a grand total of 344 additions to the churches of our association.

The Evangelism Department of the Florida Baptist Convention has given leadership in the developing of the Lay Evangelism Schools for training and involvement in personal witnessing. Since their beginning there have been 120 local church Lay Evangelism Schools with over 12,694 Florida Baptists trained in the concepts of living the victorious life and sharing their personal faith. Specially designed leadership training has provided a growning nucleus of 335 potential directors for witness training. For

our association, churches have conducted Lay Evangelism Schools and pastors have participated in the witness training.

On January 29, 1973 our Association held an Evangelism Workshop at the First Baptist Church in Madison, Florida. It was led by a group of State Leaders from Jacksonville, Fla. It was well attended and very informative.

Let me appeal to you, as a fellow Baptist, to prayerfully consider the work of the Association. Pray for me. Pray for our new officers. Pray for our organization leadership. Pray for the people that the Lord might quicken our people to action in a cooperative work, Keeping shop and trouble shooting is not enough. We must arise to accept the call to action for evangelizing the great mass of people in this area. We must open new beachheads in the form of new units that can become strong witnessing churches in unreached areas.

We are not called upon to do the impossible. We are called upon to yield our life and means to the will of God so he can perform the impossible through us.

We need now to seriously consider securing some sites for additional churches. In years past this was done by concerned Baptist - it now becomes our responsibility and opportunity. Our state is working closely withus through matching funds and loans from our New Work Revolving Fund. No significant new program or outreach effort is likely to be undertaken by the church if it has not been born in the heart of the minister, promoted by the force of his enthusiasm and nurished by his encouragement.

It is also unlikely that a congregation will serve, give and witness regularly unless the minister is a skilled administrator. The tact that is required to lead people without pushing them requires the delicate touch that distingushes a leader.

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist State Convention, serves Florida Baptists by assisting individuals and their attorneys in preparing wills favoring Florida Baptist causes, and in establishing trusts where the earnings go to Baptist causes.

The executive secretary-treasurer of the Foundation is available to associations, churches, groups of Baptists and individual Baptists to diseminate information and give assistance in this field.

Recent major accomplishments include:

- 1. Received and invested \$32,563.19 in new permanent money for Baptist causes during the period from October 1, 1972, to July 1, 1973. The audited report of the Florida Baptist Foundation as of September 30, 1972, showed assets of \$1,343,543.64, or an increase of \$194,892.36 over the assets reported September 30, 1971. For the year ending September 30, 1972, earnings from invested money amounted to \$70, 598.66 and securities appreciation amounted to \$71,376.67. This is approximately 4 1/2% earnings, plus 4 1/2% growth for the year.
 - 2. Managed the investments with a view to security, earnings and appreciation.
- 3. Worked with many individuals and their attorneys in the preparation of wills favoring Baptist causes.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION REPORT

The cooperation of the broadcasters in response to the Radio and Television Commission, has been nothing short of Marvelous. In 1972 the Commission was given more than \$7,500,000 worth of time to assist with its Bible-centered programs. This has been a blessing to Southern Baptists.

The programs, so to speak, go "through the cracks" in the usual procedures of Gospel Presentation. Many will listen to radio or view TV who cannot be reached through other means. The programs are designed to give the message of Christ to a present-day world - with crying needs.

Many letters come to the Commission, the headquarters of which are at 6350 West Freeway, Fort Worth, Texas, 76116. James Lee Pletiz is Chairman; Paul Morris Stevens, President. Why not drop them a line and commend them for the out-reach of the gospel? It is estimated that they influence 100 million Baptists per week.

When you write, ask for projected programs and other information. They are there to serve and appreciate the opportunity to be of assistance. You may get copies of "The Baptist Hour" Sermons" and, down the line, to JOT Fun Kits.

Dr. Stevens said, "Program effers to do two things: they help us gauge our audience and they help us to minister to listeners as we offer materials for Christian growth.

One response came from a prisoner on death row in a Caribbean Jail. Upon experiencing conversion, he heard the Baptist Hour Program. He wrote for a correspondence course and began Christian development. His keepers attest that he is now a model prisoner.

The Commission now distributes 3,334 programs weekly for broadcasting all over the world. This totals 207,480 separate broadcasts. It is sowing the good seed for the Master.

There is a special program, "Powerline for Young people. Likewise, came the award winning, "Master Control" which features interviews with interesting people. "Crossroads" is a half-hour of country entertainment and inspiration. The newest is "Night Song".

To get a grasp on the total effort, you need to contact the Commission. They have testimonies from all age groups reflecting the effectiveness of their efforts.

Let our people in Middle Florida Baptist Association and elsewhere, undergird this program with their prayers and contributions. The very existence of the commission shows that someone cared, loved, and was willing to serve. Then, too, vision led the way. Let's give the Commission our best.

COLLEGES AND SEMINARIES REPORT

We find the 1972-73 report on Seminaries and colleges, most encouraging. A substantial growth in the student body with many additional housing and educational facilities makes the Southern Baptist Colleges and Seminaries the best ever.

Southern Baptist have 43 Baptist Senior Colleges and Universities in 16 states and 13 Junior colleges in seven states. Students represent 41 states and 14 foreign countries.

The number of International Students decreased this year as more stringent entrance requirements affected several applicants. The Non-Baptist students continue

at about the normal level of 18% on an overall basis. The total enrollment of all Baptist schools now reach in all time high of approximately 96,500 students. An increase of 9.8%.

Southwestern, Fort Worth, Texas enrolled 2,406; Southern Seminary, Louisville, Ky. enrolled 1,422; Southeastern, Wake Forest, N.C. 642, Golden Gate, Mill Valley, California, 323 with 5 students from Florida. New Orleans Seminary enrolled 819, an increase of 9.4% over last year. Midwestern Seminary in Kansas City, Mo. enrolled an est. (significant increase) 8% over last year, approximately 361; making a total of 5,973 seminary students.

Articles of Faith

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holinoss and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of rightcousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of rightcousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all

to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain to moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XL Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cares for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience

thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI. Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth, Allmeans and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

$XX\Pi$. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-

operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christianunity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII, Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

The Kindgom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.
- 2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.
- 3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.
- 4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

- 5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair,
- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.
- 9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.
- 10. This decomm may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be "The Middle Florida Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to foster a harmonious and efficient spirit of cooperation among the churches of it's constituency and to cooperate with sister churches of the Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the missionary, educational and benevolent program of Christ's Kingdom to the ends of the earth,

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the churches affiliated with this body.

Section 2. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in its sessions as follows: Two messengers for the first fifty members or less and one additional messenger for each additional 25 members or fraction thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches, together with the elected officers of the Association, who are members of the churches.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by ballot from nominations made from the floor at the last session of the Association, taking office at the close of the annual session.

If any vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill vacancy for the unexpired term.

The Moderator shall be elected to serve two or more years in succession, All officers shall serve without salary except Clerk and Treasurer, whose stipend shall be referred to the Budget Committee,

ARTICLE V - OTHER OFFICERS

The Nominating Committee shall at the September Executive Committee meeting recommend for approval, subject to election at the annual session, the heads of the various departments namely: Sunday School, Church Training, Music, Evangelistic Chairman, Stewardship Chairman and such other departments as shall be authorized by the Association.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

Section 1. All committees shall consist of three members except the Executive Committee, Association Mission Committee and Calendar Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers, heads of the Associational Organizations, pastors and one lay member from each church to be recommended by the individual church and chairman of standing committees.

Section 3. The Standing Committees shall be: (1) Assembly Ground, (2) Budget and Finance (3) Calendar of Activities (4) Committee on Committees (5) Missions (6) Nominating (7) Obituaries (8) Program (9) Resolutions (10) Time, Place and Preacher (11) Assignment.

Section 4. Members of the Standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association to take office at the close of the annual session.

Section 5. The Missions Committee shall be composed of five members who shall serve for five years with one-fifth retiring each year.

Section 6. The Calendar Committee shall include the heads of each department.

Section 7. The Program Committee shall also include the Moderator and Clerk.

Section 8. The Budget and Finance Committee shall cooperate with the heads of each Associational Organization and Treasurer in preparation of a budget for the ensuing year.

This committee shall determine the sum per resident church member to be requested from the churches for funds to carry on the work of the Association.

ARITLCE VII - RIGHTS OF CHURCHES

This body shall recognize and respect the Scriptural rights of the churches composing it, and shall in no wise exercise authority over them. Churches may be at liberty to sever connection with this body at any time by giving written notice to the Executive Committee or Annual session.

ARTICLE VIII - PETITION

Petition for membership shall be referred to a committee on petitionary letters at any Executive Committee meeting prior to the annual meeting of the Association,


and shall be subject to approval at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE IX - ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention at their annual session in 1925 and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the body and must secure a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting.
