To write words of evaluation and appreciation of E. B. Browning is a difficult task. As one concerned with all truth, he has led in investigating, evaluating and recording the past, bringing to our minds people and their noteworthy accomplishments. At the same time his work and worth unrecorded, as he extolled the feats of others, encouraging us all onward.

Paul summed up concerning the "spiritual realities" with: "Now abideth faith, hope and love, these three, but the greatest of these is love. Make love your aim."

Our brother a man of faith: Faith in Christ Jesus our Lord, in God's word, in his church, in his brethren, co-laborers, faith that bears up and looks beyond the visible to the invisible, faith still abiding and serving. "Hope" that "well-founded expectation of future good," expected because God, who cannot lie has promised, with eye to the future serving now as though He possessed all, constantly working for that improvement to be consumated at the glorious appearance of our Lord and Savior. "Love" to love a girl to become his wife and together build such life of character and service, to love one's own and his neighbors children, to love the Lord, his church and his brethren and to love even those who count as enemies. To love where infirmity and need prevail to give oneself to bless and build this is the love God has and begets in us, a lover in the finest sense.

This is E. B. Browning, long may he live, for as he lives he will give forth the fragrance of "The Lily of the Valley" and "The Rose of Sharon." REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

MISSIONARY SUPPORT

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. During 1976, a total of 268 missionaries were appointed or reappointed, exceeding even 1975 appointments, which broke all previous records. Appointment of a large number of missionaries must never be taken for granted; much prayer and missionary education in the churches are reflected in the response to Christ's calling. At the close of 1976, the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,715 (including 218 missionary associates, 172 journeymen, and 4 special project workers). The 268 new missionaries included 128 career missionaries, 10 reappointments, 32 missionary associates, 94 missionary journeymen, and 4 special project medical workers. These bring the total appointed since 1845 to 5,889.

Almost 1,500 lay volunteers served overseas in 1976, in medical projects, special evangelism, church development, stewardship efforts, and in other ways. Information concerning opportunities for mission involvement was supplied to 100 family units that moved abroad during the year.

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Evangelism and church development are central to the objectives of missions: making disciples, maturing disciples in the fellowship of local churches, and developing churches into a cooperative effort for a continued outreach. Churches overseas are stimulated by the Foreign Mission Board and its missionaries, but rather than being extensions of our churches, they stand in fraternal relationship with the Southern Baptist Convention.

The program of evangelism and church development includes many activities such as radio and television, religious education promotion, lay leadership training, stewardship, camps and conferences, women's work, men's work, youth work, and music.

SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK

Strong indigenous churches must have capable and well-trained leadership from among their people. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Baptists also sponsor theological schools and Bible institutes to prepare men and women for church and denominational leadership.

PUBLICATION WORK

Adequate supplies of all kinds of Christian literature are needed for the developing of vigorous churches; therefore, publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions. There are formal publishing centers in 20 lands and informal literature production programs in a number of other lands.

HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE

While meeting the physical needs of thousands of people who might otherwise be neglected, Baptist medical work often opens strategic doors for evangelism. In cooperation with national medical personnel, this witness is expressed by Southern Baptists through hospitals, dental clinics, dispensaries and day clinics, nursing schools, and other health care ministries in overseas lands.

BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES

Social service ministries, closely related in motivation and results to medical work, include agricultural programs, community centers, orphan homes, and direct relief.

Increasing awareness of the growing world hunger problem on the part of Southern Baptists and response to special disasters led to greatly increased relief contributed in 1975 and 1976.

CONTRIBUTIONS

In 1976, Southern Baptists contributions for foreign missions totaled \$53,984,913. The 1976 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal was \$29 million—an increase over the \$26,169,421 contributed (as of May 1, 1976) through the 1975 offering.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds is made available annually for foreign missions. This is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

HOME MISSION HIGHLIGHTS

Our new Director is, William G. Tanner.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Southern Baptists were outstanding in their support of the Home Mission Board and its work in 1976. At the year's end, the 1976 Annie Armstrong Easter

Offering topped its \$9.5-million goal, receiving \$9,631,012, a gain of 13.46 percent. Cooperative Program gifts increased 13.65 percent over the previous year. The Board received \$7,680,150 in the basic Cooperative Program allocation, plus challenge funds of \$870,143.

PROGRAM-BY-PROGRAM SUMMARY

During the year, the 14 program areas and six support sectors performed a

number of functions. Here is a program-by-program summary:

EVANGELISM DEVELOPMENT—The program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in interpreting, promoting and properly relating the message, methods, motivation and spirit of New Testament evangelism. The program assisted with financial support in six states. It produced a book, THE EVANGELISTIC CHURCH, provided 90,000 additional support pieces of resource material, increased enrollment in the Correspondence Bible Course, assisted 17 state conventions in training sessions for associational chairmen of evangelism, correlated and supervised the work of two national consultants for black and ethnic churches, and assisted five state conventions in long-range evangelism planning.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM—The program works with churches, associations and state conventions in motivating, equipping and involving persons for a lifestyle of personal witnessing and the training of others for such a lifestyle. It introduced a new process of witness training, "TELL Witness Training," a series of information units designed to develop personal skills to allow an individual to function effectively as a witness. It also produced three TELL film cartridges and produced and distri-

buted a 30-minute color documentary, A DISTURBING SILENCE.

MASS EVANGELISM—A national conference for vocational evangelists was held, the first time such a meeting has been held in conjunction with the annual

meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

PIONEER MISSIONS—The program relates primarily to areas where Southern Baptist work has been initiated since 1940. It is implemented through other programs of the Home Mission Board and not through its own staff unit. The function of the program is to focus attention on the continuing needs that exist in the so-called pioneer fields and to give a composite report of work in these fields. Last year, the various programs of the HMB provided full or partial support of 1,249 missionaries and contributed \$9,814,953 to work in these areas.

STATE MISSIONS

The theme for State Missions for this year is "BOLD MISSION ADVANCE." If we are to reach our state for Christ, we must be bold in our praying, bold in our witnessing, bold in our giving. The offering goal is \$289,000. We hope each church in our Association had a part in the State Mission Offering.

EVANGELISM DEPARTMENT

In the year 1975-76 Florida Baptists baptized 26,386 in the 1,516 churches. There were 27 churches baptizing over 100 and 23 churches baptizing 1 person for

every 5 church members or less. There were 11 Associations reporting an increase

in baptisms above the previous year.

Southern Baptist for the same period of time reported 384,496 converts being baptized into the membership of its 35,073 churches. This is a good report for those associations which shows an increase, but the over all picture for the state of Florida shows we baptized 2,904 less people last year than the year before.

The State Evangelism Department has provided many tools for all churches to use, such as Witness Commitment Day in January, Associational Evangelism Rallies

in February, the C. A. R. E. Revivals in March and April.

These tools are provided to get people involved in personal witnessing, and evangelism. We need these tools and the help of God, because now as we are going it takes 34 people to baptize one person in Middle Florida Association. We need evangelising. Pray God's help for ours and all Associations.

FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS has a goal. We want to reach 100,000 circulation. Figuring three to a family, this would mean 300,000 readers each week. This in turn would mean a better-informed Florida Baptist constituency, which always leads to greater participation and success in missions. Our people will work and give for what they know about and when they are convinced their efforts are

supporting good causes. This is the ministry of the WITNESS to inform, inspire and indoctrinate.

Interest in the state paper is increasing. Pastors and congregations are becoming more vitally aware and concerned about denominational activities. In a day when so much of our work depends on cooperation with all Southern Baptists, ignorance cannot be defended as bliss. It is wrong for any congregation to be isolated from the great body of Southern Baptist fellowship. We are to bear one another's burdens and pray for each other, but how can we unless we know the successes, failures and problems of our brothers and sister's in Christ.

The present circulation of the WITNESS is approximately 86,000. One thousand two hundred and twenty-two churches and missions send the paper each week to at least part if not all of their church families. We regularly encourage the churches to place the state paper in the budget and include every resident family on

the subscription list.

Subscription prices for the WITNESS are very reasonable. Individuals can place an order for \$3.50 per year. Club groups (five or more) can obtain the WITNESS for \$2.50 per year. Churches on the budget plan sending the paper to every RESIDENT FAMILY can get the paper for \$2.25 per subscription per year. The budget plan puts a WITNESS into each home for only $4\frac{1}{2}$ cents per copy. There is no better bargain these days of inflated costs.

The WITNESS office has several plans for helping churches promote the paper, get it started or expand a subscription list. There is no charge. Churches wanting a bundle of Witnesses sent to their church for four weeks to promote the paper or

increase an already existing list of subscribers need only ask.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS is also offered free to newly-constituted churches. The offer is for one year on the basis that the church agrees to include the WITNESS in the budget the following year for each family. This plan is made possible through the joint efforts of the Florida Baptist Witness Commission and the Florida Baptist Convention. Actually a new congregation has the opportunity to enjoy the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS for two years for the price of one.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the S. B. C. recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all state conventions. The new program called "The S. B. retirement program will go into effect January 1, 1978. Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall with a route to promotional theme. Plan "A" will be closed to new members 1/1/78.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 benefits to widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During 59 years of service the Board has paid more than \$158 million, retirement, etc. For almost 45,000 members the Board held trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for members. 1,564 members in Florida, with woefully inadequate protection. We urge churches to see their employees are fairly provided for as you increase the measure of protection. No less than 10% of your pastor's salary should be the recommended participation in view of inflation and increased cost of life's essentials. Please do not neglect. Each pastor and staff member will be notified by the Board before 1/1/78 regarding their benefits if they remain in the Plan(s) they are in at present, and what benefits if they adopt "New."

Our Annuity Board in cooperation with Aetna Insurance Company of America, has hospital, medical, as well as life insurance plans, and long term disability plans.

Churches, as one who is there, compel your pastor to demonstrate a worth-while protection plan, medical and life, put your part in each year "The Laborer is worthy of his hire."

STUDENT DEPARTMENT BAPTIST CAMPUS MINISTRIES

CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

OUR Associational Church Training program has the responsibility of helping each church to organize, improve and enlarge its program of Church Training. We shall be doing this, along with other associations, at "M" Night, November 28; Watch Night, December 31, 1977; Baptist Doctrine Study Week, April 17-20, 1978, and a State Creative Learning Clinic, April 21-22, 1978. Other special Church Training sponsored events and materials to participate in the Florida Baptist Convention Special Bold Advance emphasis are included in the Church Planning Guidebook sent to all members of church councils this past summer.

The following are some things the Middle Florida Associational Church Training has done and will do to help the churches with their training opportunities.

- 1. Associational "M" Night Attendance 200 (Statewide Attendance, 17,585).
- 2. Associational Youth Rallies observed: Dates 3rd Saturday each month. Average attendance is 190.
- 3. Youth Week was observed in the following churches:
- 4. Associational Church Training Leadership School or Update or Curriculum Interpretation Clinic held: Date, March 7; Enrollment, 45; Churches represented, 7.
- 5. 'Associational Children's Bible Drill, Youth Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament held: Date, March 11 with these participating: Children's Bible Drill, 5; Youth Bible Drill, 0; Youth Speakers, 1; Churches represented, 1.
- 7. In the first 8 months of 1976-77 a total of 990 churches in Florida requested 33,481 awards in the Church Study Course. During this same period, October 1976-May 1977, 18 churches in our association earned 315 awards. Again this year three special awards will be presented from the state Church Training Department at "M" Night. These will go to the churches with (1) the largest total number of awards, (2) the largest number of awards in Church, Training Leadership, and (3) the largest percentage of total awards compared to total church membership. Cherry Lake First won these awards last year.
- 8. "M" Night, 1977, will be held: Date, November 28, at Macedonia Baptist Church at 7:30 P. M.
- 9. A Regional Church Training Convention and Children's and Youth Bible Drill and Youth Speakers' Tournament will be conducted in our area by our State Church Training Department with Sunday School Board faculty at Live Oak, March 31, 1978, afternoon and evening.
- 10. An associational one-night training clinic for church teachers of the Baptist Doctrine Week books in Church Study Course will be held: Date, April 7, at Lee First Church, at 7:30 P. M. Baptist Doctrine Study Week, April 17-20, 1978, is recommended for church studies.

At the present time there are only two churches in the Middle Florida Baptist Association not giving through the Cooperative Program. During the last church year the churches of the Middle Florida Association gave \$44,109.44 through the Cooperative Program as undesignated offerings and \$16,751.61 as designated. THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION

The past year has been a high water mark in the history of the Radio and Television Commission. The videotape production sound stage and the training theater were completed and the television department and related work were moved into the new 32,599 square foot complex in September 1976. Dedication services were held in April 1977.

The evangelistic thrust of the Commission is being felt throughout the nation with the launching of the two quarter-hour television series during the first quarter of 1977. In "The Athletes" the claims of Christ are made through the testimonies of athletic stars representing many different sports. Usually "Listen" will be shown in conjunction with "The Athletes." Dr. Charles Fuller of Roanoke, Va., is host and narrator on "Listen," which features a variety of contemporary subjects and closes with a strong Christian appeal.

The Commission received 12 hours of network television time on ABC, CBS, and NBC from September 1, 1975 to September 30, 1976—the best 13 month network period Southern Baptists ever received through the Commission.

Commission records show that its programs were carried by 5,444 different radio and TV stations at some time during the past fiscal year. This windfall of free broadcasting time valued at more than four times the agency's annual operating budget, came to \$9,825,493, and brought 205,000 responses to Commission programs.

Approximately 50 churches a year have been serviced at an average cost of \$25,000 per contract, including auditorium sound systems, video and audio broadcast origination, and lighting consultation services. The emphasis will continue to be on maximizing the pastor's opportunities to proclaim the gospel of Christ.

The Commission has worked closely with the Baptist General Convention of Texas in the Good News Texas project which is designed to use all facets of media to preach the gospel to the state's 12,140,000 people by utilizing a strategy to mobilize 1,400,000 resident Baptists in a program of follow-up witnessing.

This method of extending the Message of God's Kingdom, deserves our support, as individuals and through the churches and our association. What can we do? We can pray God's rich blessings and guidance upon those producing and delivering the programs. We can get our televisions (and radios) in good order and do some listening.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist State Convention, serves Florida Baptists by assisting individuals and their attorneys in preparing wills favoring Florida Baptist causes, and in establishing trusts where the earnings go to Baptist causes.

The executive secretary-treasurer of the Foundation is available to associations, churches, groups of Baptists and individual Baptists to disseminate information and give assistance in this field.

Recent major accomplishments include:

- 1. Received and invested \$16,210.50 in new permanent money for Baptist causes during period from October 1, 1976 to August 1, 1977. Established three new trusts during this period. Handled all existing trusts in accordance with the agreements or terms of wills.
- 2. Managed the investments with a view to security, earnings and appreciation.
- 3. Worked with many individuals and their attorneys in the preparation of many new wills favoring Baptist causes estimated to be in excess of one million dollars.

4. Assisted in settling estates favoring Baptist churches and other Baptist causes where the funds went directly to these causes without coming to the Foundation.

OFFICE OF ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Responsibilities of the assistant executive secretary of the Florida Baptist Convention include Church-Pastor-Staff Relations, Convention properties, the Camps and Assemblies Department, the Florida Baptist Retirement Center, institutional missions and the Program of Public Affairs. The Camps and Assemblies Department and the Florida Baptist Retirement Center make separate reports and, therefore, the summary of the Office of the Assistant Executive Secretary will exclude these two programs of work.

In keeping with the policy of the Florida Baptist Convention, the assistant executive secretary administers the Church-Pastor-Staff Relations Ministry. Basically, this is a ministry of sharing biographical material of church staff members with churches upon request. This does not constitute a recommendation of any staff member, but is simply the sharing of materials to churches who are seeking assistance in securing a pastor or staff member.

Institutional Missions: At the direction of Harold C. Bennett, executive secretary-treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, the assistant executive secretary serves as liaison for all of the Florida Baptist institutions. This includes the Florida Baptist Children's Home, Baptist Bible Institute and Stetson University. Close cooperation in budget planning and Convention programming is a vital part of this ministry.

EDUCATION DIVISION Keener Pharr, Director

In this annual report to the 47 associations throughout the state, we share a report of God's blessings upon our work in the year just completed and claim his promises for Bold Advance in the future.

- 1. We continue to do God's work in the midst of great need and challenge. Florida is one of the nation's greatest mission fields. Note these challenging facts which bear on our planning and working together:
 - *Florida's population is predicted to increase more than 50% in the next 12 years *Florida led the nation in metropolitan growth during the first four years of this decade. The fastest growing metropolitan areas in the nation are heavily concentrated in Florida.
 - *Four of the fastest growing areas in the United States were in Florida. These were: Fort Myers—46.4% increase; Sarasota—32% increase; Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood—30.1% increase; Orlando—27.7% increase.

- 2. We have a strong base of operation which makes possible our facing the future with faith and promise. These resources include:
 - *A great group of dedicated, committed pastors and key leaders in 1,608 churches and missions.
 - *A strong financial base administered by a concerned State Board of Missions, which makes possible the functioning of our total program and staff.
 - *A task force of approximately 500 trained, experienced and capable associational workers, fully committed to providing bold leadership in this state.
- 3. Through God's leadership we have recruited and retained a competent, capable leadership in the four program departments assigned to the Education Division.

These men are:

- -Paul R. Bobbitt, Director, Church Music Department
- -Robert S. Cook, Director, Church Training Department
- -Joe H. Webb, Director, Student Department
- -James E. Frost, Director, Sunday School Department

CHURCH EXTENSION William J. Guess, Director

Effective December 31, 1976, Don F. Mabry resigned as director of Church Extension, Florida Baptist Convention, to assume a leadership role in the Louisiana Baptist Convention. The position was filled on June 1, 1977, when William J. Guess, director of associational missions, Pinellas Baptist Association, accepted the invitation of the State Board of Missions to serve as director of Church Extension, Florida Baptist Convention.

The year has been marked by achievement. The Florida Baptist Convention Church Bond Plan reached \$7,915,500 in total dollar value of bonds issued. Fiftyone churches have issued bonds under this program, NOT ONE CHURCH HAS DEFAULTED UNDER THIS PLAN.

The Florida Baptist Convention Church Site Committee has granted a total of \$83,500 to assist in the purchase of seven church sites during the year.

Loans amounting to \$78,000 were approved from the New Work Revolving Fund during the 1976-77 Convention year, assisting four Florida Baptist churches.

Four churches received loans from the Church Loan Fund, amounting to \$21,500.

The Florida Baptist Convention has helped 11 churches and missions with Pastoral Assistance. A total amount of \$13,600 was granted to these churches to provide financial assistance for the pastors.

The Bold Advance goal for Florida Baptists in 1978-79 is to establish 200 new churches in Florida.

MISSIONS DIVISION J. Woodrow Fuller, Director

There are four departments with responsibility for missionary programs in the Missions Division. These are the Brotherhood Department, Robert W. Rowell, director, the Cooperative Missions Department, J. Ray Dobbins, director, the Evangelism Department, James A. Ponder, director, and the Woman's Missionary Union Department, Vanita M. Baldwin, director. All of the directors except Vanita M.

Baldwin have served in these capacities for several years. Miss Baldwin came in June 1977, to assume responsibilities as director of the Woman's Missionary Union Department. She has served 16 years with the Baptist Convention of New Mexico in a similar capacity.

A fifth area of work is that of Church Extension, related to and housed in the Missions Division Office. William J. Guess became director of Church Extension, effective June 1, 1977. He previously served for five years as director of associational missions in the Pinellas Baptist Association.

These five leaders are committed to programs that will assist churches and

associations in doing better work.

The priority emphasis of the Missions Division, and a strong emphasis for the entire Florida Baptist Convention staff in relation to Boid Advance, is that of starting new missions and churches. A goal of 400 new churches and church-type missions by 1985 has been adopted. This was based on a statewide survey made in 1972-73 of actual and projected needs.

This survey is being updated in 1977 and may reveal that a more challenging goal will be needed. Under the leadership of William J. Guess, a program is being planned to secure and utilize 100 summer student missionaries in 1978 and 200 in

1979 for a major effort in starting new work.

In some areas where there is no apparent need for starting new church-type missions, a mission match-up program is being suggested. This provides an opportunity for a church located in such an area to be matched with a mission need in another part of the state.

COOPERATIVE MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

J. Ray Dobbins, Director Hubert O. Hurt, Associate Russell V. Kauffman, Associate Murray J. McCullough, Associate

The Cooperative Missions Department is responsible for program and budget planning in the areas of Christian Social Missions, Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists, Interfaith Witness, Language Missions, and Special Missions Ministries.

Russell V. Kauffman, director, Christian Social Missions, reports continued good response among the associations in ministering to over 300,000 migrants. The mobile medical/dental clinic has ministered to over 4,000 patients this year. The new concept of regional directors of Christian Social Missions has been established in the Orlando and Pensacola Bay areas, with each director serving four associations.

Murray J. McCullough, Director, Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists, has participated in the annual meetings of the General Baptist State Convention of Florida. He has worked with leadership of the three Baptist State Conventions in Florida in planning a successful joint fellowship of National and Southern Baptists, with a banquet and meetings in Jacksonville. A church leadership training conference was conducted for National and Southern Baptists at Lake Yale Baptist Assembly, and assistance was given in organizing workshops and training conferences for National Baptists. Two new regional directors were appointed to serve in the work of Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists. One will serve in the southeast Florida area and the other in the central Florida area. Relationships continue to be good with both National Baptist conventions. The Seminary Extension program added two centers, making a total of ten in Florida.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION

Christian concern about moral issues of our day has continued to mount in the past year.

The moral problems plaguing our society are grave, immorality on television, the gambling industry, alcohol and drug abuse are of chief concern. We as Christians must do all we can to combat these evil forces.

When we realize the magnitude of these problems, we wonder what we can do as individuals. May I suggest a few. First of all, live as a Christian should, fully surrendered to Christ, that His life may be reflected through us. Secondly, join with other Christians in helping to educate our people, especially our youth as to the dangers of these evils. Thirdly, pray for God's guidance in these matters.

United Christian Action of Florida, and the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention have been active this year in conferences, making speeches, preaching sermons, distributing literature, to aid Baptist and others, in

becoming aware of and acting to solve the moral problems of our day.

Alcohol seems to stand out as the leader in the moral problems. For example: alcohol shortens life from ten to fifteen years. Many illnesses are caused by alcohol, such as cancer, cirrhosis of the liver and heart disease, with many others alcohol related. Approximately 35,000 accidental deaths in the U. S. last year were alcohol

related. One-third of suicidal deaths, one-half of homicides, 41% of assaults, 34% of forcible rape, 29% of other sex crimes, 50% of the nation's prison inmates have alcohol related problems.

The economic cost associated with misuse of alcohol is estimated at 25 billion dollars annually. About 10% of our work force in U. S. are alcoholics or alcohol abusers. These facts are alarming, we must pray that God will convict us and give us direction in these matters. For further information write:

HISTORY BEULAH BAPTIST CHURCH LEE, FLORIDA

The summer of the year 1902 brought the moving of God's Spirit upon the brethren and sisters of the populace of Beulah community. This inner moving surfaced, as is evident, by their meeting on August 9, 1902, in the one room Beulah School for the purpose of organizing a church. Present at this meeting were Presbyters Rev. J. T. Farnell and Rev. W. M. Tampling and seven lettered brothers and sisters. These charter members (in order of the original minutes) were: J. R. Henderson; B. C. Webb; S. K. Driggers; J. C. Thompson; J. F. Stokes; Sister M. A. Stokes; and Sister Bessie Thompson. These Presbyters and lettered Christians did organize and constitute the Beulah Baptist Church on the above mentioned date and location.

Appointments to the offices of the church were also made as follows: J. R. Henderson, Church Clerk; and J. F. Stokes ordained deacon and Treasurer. Rev. W. M. Tampling assumed the pastoral duties for the first four months.

Two months after its organization the church approved its first associational letter as well as appointing the very first delegates to an associational meeting, brothers B. C. Webb and S. K. Driggers with J. R. Henderson and J. F. Stokes serving as alternates.

Business meetings were held on Saturday before the third Sunday of each month. The order of business was of the following order: (1) Invitation to all of like faith and order to be seated in conference with the church; (2) Reading of the minutes of the past conference; (3) References—committee reports or communication received; (4) Call for acknowledgements; (5) Call for unfinished business; (6) Call for new business (a part of which was to open the doors of the church to receive members; and (7) Adjournment.

During these early months of the church's existence many individuals sacrificed time and materials to build a meeting house (sanctuary) in that the small schoolhouse (which stood approximately 50 yards west of the present auditorium) was not large enough to adequately serve the community. The first building was of frame construction and stood on piers (blocks) cut by the men and sills cut and

hewn by the men. This building was 25 feet in width and 35 feet in length. The building was oriented in a north-south direction approximately 8 feet east of the present auditorium, with the pulpit area in the extreme south end of the building.

It is believed that within three months after organization, the building had progressed to the point that meetings could be held therein. While construction was underway it was not uncommon that the women would cook, bring the food along and fellowship while working, as well as, around the bountiful noon meal (in the tradition of an old fashion barn raisings).

After having served as the first pastor of the church for four months Rev. W. M. Tampling was succeeded by the Rev. J. L. Rutherford (December 19, 1902).

From its inception until the association dropped fifth Sunday meetings, Beulah participated by sending delegates and an offering for mission purposes. Throughout the minutes these meetings are referred to as Union meetings.

During the first year a church decorum was developed and adopted by the church (we have not been able to locate a copy of this). The decorum is referred to many times primarily as to the frequency with which it was to be read to the congregation. The frequency at Beulah was quarterly in later years and semi-annually in the earlier years.

Even in the early 1900's committees played a big part of church function and operation as the responsibility for lamp oil and sacrament wine was bound over to a committee of two women, who were also to come up with the means by which to purchase same. Also a group called holders of church property (house and land)

were appointed this first year. (Our present-day trustees.)

In the early years and in fact for approximately fifty years pastors were called on an annual basis, usually the year coinciding with the church year (October-September). During the first ten years or so, pastors began serving on the first meeting date of November. Usually no salary was set for the pastor, but from the beginning they were given consideration as shown by the following annual salaries: 1902–\$12.35; 1903–\$14.25; 1904–\$9.70; 1905—no recording; 1906—\$28.50. Five dollars was the largest single donation received. The pastors salary was usually made up from the members on an annual or semi-annual basis. Collections in the early years for expense of church operation were taken quarterly. The first one taken was for \$1.45.

The associational letter for the 1902-1903 church year set the appraised value of the church's property at \$200.00.

The property on which the building is located was obtained from A. L. Wheeler the deed to which was presented to the church in October 1903. November brought some question in these papers and Brother J. F. Stokes was instructed to see Mr. Wheeler about this matter. This question was settled by January 1904 with the church owing Mr. Wheeler 15 cents which was ordered paid.

Initially communion services were set semi-annually but soon moved to a quarterly observance which is still the custom.

Worship services were conducted monthly with services on both Saturday and Sunday. Saturday before and third Sunday were the designated meeting times. The first hymnals used were Manely's Choice Hymn Book.

The first acknowledgement recorded was that of clerk J. F. Hewitte for using profane language, which was forgiven.

Except for one or two years, August was the month during which the Fall protracted (revival) meetings were held; and March and April, the Spring protracted meetings. Many times the spring revivals were similar to our present day weekend revivals.

During the year 1907 there was a movement in the association for the churches to engage in foot washing. At Beulah by silent vote it was affirmed as one's Christian duty, but the question was set aside until after the association met. In November the church voted not to participate and to strike the action of the church mentioned above from the minutes.

Six years to the month after the church was organized it was decided to enlarge the building by adding a 16 foot addition to the North end of the existing building.

Beulah hosted the association its first time in 1911. Preparations for this included the construction of a table for the noon meal and appointing a committee to meet the train and assist the delegates in getting to and from the meeting.

By the early nineteens the church was paying the railroad fare for the pastors which was about \$1.80 to \$1.85 per month. To make more efficient use of the Lord's money a mileage Railroad Book was purchased for the pastor.

An organ was purchased and placed in the church in 1919. Brother W. B. Driggers served as committee chairman to raise funds.

January 1923 offering of \$4.26 was taken for the suffering in Europe and Asia. November 1924 offering of \$4.00 to 75 million campaign.

January 1926 moved to take up collection (freewill) every Sunday church meets.

February 1931 Pastor asked church to adopt the J. M. Pendleton Manual and Church Covenant.

April 1931 church was behind on Pastor's salary \$5.68.

May 1931 Sunday School was partially organized with S. K. Driggers as Super-intendent and Frank Stokes Secretary-Treasurer. Four classes were started and an average of 53 attended.

The revival held in August 1931, brought more visible results than any other in the history of the church—19 for baptism and 6 by letter. The pastors salary was \$89.54 with \$5.00 to cooperative program and \$2.00 general expenses.

In 1932 the God's acre program was instituted. This program varied from one

acre per family, to one acre per plough, to the giving of a hog or cow.

In July of 1934 two deacons were ordained but their names are not recorded in the minutes.

January 1937 brings the first mention of Brotherhood meetings.

July 1941 a used piano was purchased for fifty dollars plus \$4.00 for tuning cost from J. L. Sullivan. A lamp for lighting purposes was purchased out of the treasury.

In December 1941 a good bit of repair on the building was done as overseen by the building committee. The old windows were taken out during the repair work and sold. The lighting system was revamped with the addition of a 6 volt bulb attached to a car battery. This bulb was suspended from the ceiling between the piano and pulpit. Lamps were primarily on the center row of posts in the building. These had replaced the wall mounted lamps used earlier.

October 1943 brought a monumental decision before the church--remain quarter-time or go half-time. The decision was made to go half-time. Rev. R. L. Williams was pastor when this decision was made. Having decided to launch into a fuller program of service, it was the decision that all monies would be deposited with the treasurer and he would make all expenditures of funds. Pastor's salary was set at \$10.00 per month with \$20.00 per year going to cooperative program and \$20.00 per year to the orphans home.

During November 1944 it was decided to give one morning offering quarterly to Stetson University.

For many years, it was the practice of churches of our area to help the Florida Baptist Children's Home in Lakeland by gathering produce and staple goods together to be picked up by the children's home staff. In 1945, it was estimated the worth of the goods sent by Beulah to be \$30.00.

During the summer of 1945, Pastor R. L. Williams became ill. One of the persons filling the pulpit was Rev. I. T. Carter (first time June 17, 1945, for evening service). A love offering was taken for the Williams family in the amount of \$10.46.

Rev. John R. Collins who served as pastor for five years (two separate pastorates) led in reorganizing the Sunday School. By the spring of 1946 the Collins' had experienced the loss of their home and a love offering of \$28.30 was extended to them. Pastor's salary was now at \$20.00 per month. During this time Saturday services were continued quarterly.

In 1947 a portion of the most recent addition (1908) was divided into three Sunday School rooms. During this time Brother Johnnie Thomas was running a bus route for the church. It was voted to give him \$8.00 per month for this purpose.

Pastor's salary was now at \$40.00 per month.

During the spring of 1948 the Creek Hollow was filled with water for a good long while, so that most people who lived north of the church were cut off in as much as the bridge on U. S. 90 near Lee had washed out. To aid us in going to church Brother Thomas would meet the folks 1 mile west of the church where they had crossed the waters, in Brother Edgar Stokes' boat, leaving their cars behind.

In April 1946 Brother H. L. Stokes was licensed to preach.

In September 1949 Sunday School bus route was discontinued.

April 1950 the organ purchased in 1919 was given to Brother Frank Stokes in the hopes some of his daughters might learn to play well enough to provide music for church.

The fall of 1950 brought a new era to the church—that of using electricity. The church was wired during August. The auditorium had six incandescent drop chain fixtures. The Sunday School rooms had porcelain fixtures.

The BTU was organized with the help of Sister Ben Perry in February 1951.

Pastor's salary was now at \$50.00 per month, 1951.

December 1952 the church voted to buy gas heaters.

July 1953 side door was moved from position of second window from pulpit to fourth window with the addition of cement steps, a short sidewalk and a portico. Brother H. L. Stokes and S. K. Driggers doing most of the work.

March 1955 participated in the simultaneous Revival effort of Southern Baptist. Rev. Bobby Dykes was evangelist with 6 coming for baptism and one by letter.

March 1956 brought another milestone in church history, as the decision was made to go full-time and pay pastor \$20.00 per week. Brother Ben Duque was pastor when this decision was made.

September 1956 voted to repair and renovate existing building using \$500.00 from Building Fund. Repairs included replacing blocks with cement piers, replacing one sill, and installing asbestos siding (white).

June 1957 there was much discussion about churches pulling out of the association to form a new one—it was the unanimous vote to stay in the Middle Florida Baptist Association.

June 1957 voted to build a new auditorium. The building committee consisted of Lamar Stokes, chairman; Leroy Alderman, Cleveland and Evelyn Driggers and

Billie Jackson. The specifications for the building were:

26' wide x 42' long
9' 4'' ceiling
4 windows each side

1 door on north side near platform platform 16'' high—10 ft. wide
across width of building

2 windows in rear double door in rear

On July 14, 1957, Leroy Alderman and Cleveland Driggers were elected as Deacons, Ordination services were set for August 25, 1957.

The church decided to buy new furniture for the new building on June 29,

1958. This furniture included pews, communion table and pulpit.

The dedication service for the new auditorium was held April 5, 1959, at 2:00 p. m. Rev. James T. Barber pastor of the First Baptist Church of Madison delivered the dedicatory sermon.

April 18, 1959, Brother Carl Ivey licensed to preach and ordained on April 25, 1959, at 3:00 p. m. with Brothers Ben Duque, Ernest Gurr and John R. Collins conducting the service.

April 1964 voted to place screen doors on side and rear doors.

August 1964 set up system of individual records for tithes and offerings.

November 1964 decided to lend eleven benches out of old sanctuary to Faith Baptist Mission until they could make other arrangements for seating. (These seats were built originally by men of the church.)

November 1965 voted to refence the cemetery.

May 25, 1969 Brother J. T. Payne was licensed to preach.

August 6, 1974 sold old building to J. T. Payne for \$600.00. The building was moved on August 30, 1974.

From December 1974 to June 1975 the church was inactive—no meetings held at all during this time.

On June 8, 1975, Superintendent of Missions, Rev. T. E. Ellerby met with the congregation to reactivate the church. On this date Brother Ronnie Combass was called as pastor and the call was accepted. Three members were received: David Payne; Janice Yarborough; and William Jackson all by letter.

During June an electric water system replaced the old hand pump and the

piano was repaired and tuned.

Brother Combass was ordained by the Macedonia Baptist Church on July 27, 1975, at 2:30 p. m.

The church moved forward again in August 1975 voting to build an addition for classrooms and restrooms on the back of the present auditorium. This was completed and dedicated the first Sunday of June 1976.

RECENT EVENTS

November '975—the night light was installed. March 1976—the church sign erected. July 1976—voted 1% of income for Associational Missionary. Pastor's salary set at \$50.00 per week. August 1975—New communion set purchased. October 10, 1976—Homecoming—Voyager's Quartet. Brother Max Long's last Concert. December 1976—voted to place Gideon Display rack. April 1977—hosted Associational Brotherhood. June 1977—cut door from Auditorium to fellowship hall. August 1977—installed flourescent lights in auditorium.

HOPEWELL MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

HISTORICAL NOTES ON EARLY HISTORY OF HOPEWELL BAPTIST CHURCH

The late Mrs. Almera Sanders in June 1941 on the occasion of the Centennial of Concord Church presented notes on the early history of Hopewell Baptist Church to the compiler of these data. Her father Orien E. Sullivan had been a deacon in Hopewell and, likewise, in Concord Church. The notes follow.

The Hopewell Church was organized in 1853 with six white members and a group of colored members. I quote the first entry in the record:

"Hopewell Baptist Church Madison County, Florida

June, 1853

This Church was constituted in June, 1853 by the following members, to wit: Seaborn O. Sullivan, deacon, and wife, Nancy Sullivan; O. E. Sullivan and wife, Elizabeth Sullivan; Nancy DeLaughter and J. D. Reid, assisted by Elder H. Z. Ardis on a confession of Faith hereto annexed.

There having been no regular record kept, its present condition is as follows, to wit: white male members, S. O. Sullivan, O. E. Sullivan, W. J. Carroll: white female members, Nancy Sullivan, Elizabeth Sullivan, Nancy DeLaughter, Josephine Sullivan, Ellen Sullivan, Mary McCall, Hannah R. McCall, Dekle and Randall, together with 38 black members, supplied in preaching by Elder Luie C. Croft on the first and second Sabbaths of each month."

The confession of faith is a scholarly presentation of the cardinal principles of the denomination. It is very solemn and binding in its terms and implications. I quote only a part of this interesting instrument in order that you might see something of its nature: We propose to become a visible church, by uniting ourselves in a holy covenant, and first give ourselves wholly unto The Lord and renounce the vanities of the world; secondly, in a spiritual sense, give ourselves to one another, to live together in a church capacity, according to the Gospel, and agree in faithfulness to watch over each other for love and good works, and will endeavor to glorify God with our body and spirit which we acknowledge to be His."

The record which I have contains minutes of only a few meetings, but has considerable data concerning membership rolls. I note that Elder H. Z. Ardis was pastor in 1861 and was succeeded, at his own request, by Elder Campbell.

The list of colored members is likewise divided as to sex and shows the names of their masters. I find the following owned slaves who were members of Church:

An interesting fact about the colored members was that they had no names until 1866. I give names of a group of these members: Sidney, Clarracy, Beady, Letty, Louvenia, Rose, Eve, Lena, Betty, Jinnil, India, Anthony, Jerry, Primas, Birl, Handy, Venue, Sam, Patsy, Tyrenia.

After the War ex-slaves adopted in many cases the family names of their former masters. This was the custom all over the south.

I see where a colored brother was received from South Carolina and referred to in letter as "Our beloved brother Primas." This shows there was no discrimination in spiritual standing among members.

The conduct of the members must have been exemplary, for I find no white incommunications and only three negroes. There was a committee of three colored brethren and two white brethren "to watch over conduct of black members." This is a possible explanation of such a splendid record of church citizenship.

You have noticed that some of John C. McGehee's slaves were members of Hopewell. We can, likewise, only wonder how the founder of the Presbyterian faith in this county, allowed these negroes to take up a faith not his own. That was most unusual, but shows the broadmindedness of Mr. McGehee, President of Florida's Secession Convention.

The record bears testimony of an honorable and auspicious beginning. The relationship depicted among races, then practiced in all churches, with the white and black kneeling together at a common altar, is most refreshing. What a wonderful influence this must have had on the slaves!

Hopewell Church still stands, the Gospel is still proclaimed. Its later history has attested to the faith of its founders. Surely a great future is before this church.

CONCLUSION

You will wish to note that the Historical Table in the Minutes of the Middle Florida Baptist Association shows that Hopewell was constituted in 1887. Then on

the cornerstone of the new building erected while the Reverend Alva Horton was pastor, 1877 appears as the official date of constitution.

Now, to further complicate this matter, the notes here given show June 1853 as the date of Hopewell Church being organized. Some people knowledgeable in these matters say that 1857 is correct but that the church was inactive for a while. Pending more adequate research, it is felt we may safely accept 1853 as the true date.

We dedicate these lines to the memory of Mrs. Almera Sanders, one of God's saints; and to the honor of the Reverend Dozier Sapp who was helped in his early days so effectively by Sister Sanders.

Articles of Faith

1. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of right-eousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour, and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain a moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XI. Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cares for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and the wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others: Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and inteelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXI Social Service

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regnant in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; to seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

The Kingdom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not

vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the

chair.

- 6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.
- 7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.
- 8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

Constitution

ARTICLE I-NAME

The name of this organization shall be "The Middle Florida Baptist Association"

ARTICLE II-OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to foster a harmonious and efficient spirit of cooperation among the churches of its constituency and to cooperate with sister churches of the Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the missionary, educational and benevolent program of Christ's Kingdom to the ends of the earth.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the churches affiliated with this body.

Section 2. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in its sessions as follows: Two messengers for the first fifty members or less and one additional messenger for each additional 25 members or fraction thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches, together with the elected officers of the Association, who are members of the churches.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by ballot from nominations made from the floor at the last session of the Association, taking office at the close of the annual session.

If any vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill vacancy for the unexpired term.

The Moderator shall be elected to serve two or more years in succession.

All officers shall serve without salary except Clerk and Treasurer, whose stipend shall be referred to the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE V-OTHER OFFICERS

The Nominating Committee shall at the September Executive Committee meeting recommend for approval, subject to election at the annual session, the heads of the various departments namely: Sunday School, Church Training, Music, Evangelistic Chairman, Stewardship Chairman and such other departments as shall be authorized by the Association.

ARTICLE VI-COMMITTEES

Section 1. All committees shall consist of three members except the Executive Committee, Association Mission Committee and Calendar Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers, heads of the Associational Organizations, pastors and one lay member from each church to be recommended by the individual church and chairman of standing committees.

Section 3. The Standing Committees shall be: (1) Assembly Ground, (2) Budget and Finance (3) Calendar of Activities (4) Committee on Committees (5) Missions (6) Nominating (7) Obituaries (8) Program (9) Resolutions (10) Time, Place and Preacher (11) Assignment.

Section 4. Members of the Standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association to take office at the close of the annual session.

Section 5. The Missions Committee shall be composed of five members who shall serve for five years with one-fifth retiring each year.

Section 6. The Calendar Committee shall include the heads of each department. Section 7. The Program Committee shall also include the Moderator and Clerk.

Section 8. The Budget and Finance Committee shall cooperate with the heads of each Associational Organization and Treasurer in preparation of a budget for the ensuing year.

This committee shall determine the sum per resident church member to be requested from the churches for funds to carry on the work of the Association.

ARTICLE VII-RIGHTS OF CHURCHES

This body shall recognize and respect the Scriptural rights of the churches composing it, and shall in no wise exercise authority over them. Churches may be at liberty to sever connection with this body at any time by giving written notice to the Executive Committee or Annual Session.

ARTICLE VIII-PETITION


Petition for membership shall be referred to a committee on petitionary letters at any Executive Committee meeting prior to the annual meeting of the Association, and shall be subject to approval at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE IX-ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention at their annual session in 1925 and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

ARTICLE X-AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the body and must secure a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting.
