Churches on the budget plan sending the paper to every resident family can get the paper for \$2.75 per subscription per year.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS is also offered free to newlyconstituted churches. The offer is for one year on the basis that the church agrees to include the WITNESS in the budget the following year for each family. This plan is made posssible through the joint efforts of the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS and the Florida Baptist Convention. Actually a new congregation has the opportunity to enjoy the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS FOR TWO YEARS FOR THE PRICE OF ONE!

The church page is available. Churches can now print bulletin material on the front and back of the WITNESS and send it into the homes from the press in Jacksonville. The members receive local church information and WITNESS news in one publication. With inflation escalating the cost of postage, printing, paper and personnel, many churches are finding the church page the economical way to go. Churches utilizing the WITNESS for local news can get the paper for the speical price of \$2.50 per subscription per year.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

"Celebrate The Love" will be the theme of the Florida Baptist Children's Home in 1980. And well it should be; for the 1979 Diamond Jubilee Year, marking seventy-five (75) years of committed Christian service to more than 15,000 children has been year of tremendous blesing.

This is the fifth consecutive year the Home has operated in the black with a balanced budget. The Mother's Day offering through ten months to date, is \$166,821. This year some 879 churches participated, compared to 785 last year.

A new program called PACT (Pals and Children Together) was initiated during the year.

A beautiful new residence for ten (10) children will be completed on the Tallahassee campus before the end of the calendar year, at a cost of \$165,000. Of this amount \$150,000 was made available through an anonymous gift of one family. A second new residence is planned for construction in 1980.

Cooperative Program income plus surplus allocation amounted to \$373,436.17 (last month estimated) compared to \$338,493.63 during 1977-7.8.

Extensive updating and renovation has taken place on the Miami campus.

During the year the Emergency Shelter in Lakeland was converted to a "Secure" shelter, with staff on "awake" duty twenty-four hours a day. The shelter has ministered to 154 children during the year.

On September 20, 1979 Paul Glore, former Director of Camps and Assemblies for the Florida Baptist Convention joined the staff as Assistant to the Executive Director, with primary responsibility in the area of development and public relations. We now have 55 dedicated Missionaries on our staff, which is the Home's greatest tool for helping make our ministry possible.

A record number of children have been cared for during the year --a total of 411. This is a increase of 30 compared to last year.

On December 6, 1979 the closing event of the 75th Anniversary year will take place in a "Salute To Love" banquet and celebration at the Civic Center in Lakeland. At that time, 1000 lay and professional peole from across Florida will gather from 6:30 to 9:00 p.m. in a gala event to say "thanks" to the Florida Baptist Convention for a grand history of caring. The meeting will be co-sponsored by the Home's Board of Trustees and the Lakeland Chamber of Commerce. Come and join us.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

A ''Banner Year''

The 1978-79 year was a ''banner year'' and a year of challenge for the Annuity Board in servicing and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention, according to Dr. Darold H. Morgan, president.

Among the challenges he listed were extremes of market variations, stagering pressures of escalating costs, changes in personnel and organization, and the eroding presence of governmental regulations.

The banner side highlights included:

1. A ''13th Check'' equalling an additional ful month's benefit and amounting to \$1,036,914 was mailed to almost 10,000 annuitants in Board retirement programs.

2. A total of \$25,558,637 was paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs topped \$13 million.

3. An Endowment Department, designed to seek funds for undergirding protection programs, was established. A goal of \$25 million by 1988 was set.

4. New churches in the retirement program numbered 630, a record enrollment. New pastors and church employees totaled 2,545, with 3,721 members upgraded programs.

5. Participants in the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program grew to 6,066. Family Benefit Section (Plan A) counted 23,986 members, and Age Security Section (Plan B) recorded a marked increase from 33,062 in 1977 to 44,324. Variable Benefit Section (Plan C) membership declined from 4,885 to 4,217.

6. Premium income reached \$51,797,996 (includes relief). Total assets climbed to \$569,734,471, compared with \$498,977,661 a year earlier.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTER

At the present time there are 71 residents at the Retirement Center, 56 women and 15 men. Five new residents have been received this year. The current age range is from 63 to 95 years.

Many visitors come to the Retirement Center during the year. There are usually a great number of questions regarding admission procedures and requirements. The following information will be helpful to anyone considering possible residency at the Center.

Applicants must be residents of the State of Florida and members in good standing with a Florida Baptist Convention Church for at least twelve months before making application. Exception may be made in case the applicant is an employee of a Southern Baptist Convention agency, board or commission. The minimum age is sixty-two (62).

Applicants may be single, widowed, married, or separated. Each person must meet all the requirements.

Persons seeking residency must be interviewed by the Resident Manager. Applicants must complete, sign, and return to the Resident Manager the required application form. A non-refundable applicaton fee of \$25.00 is required for each applicant. A letter of recommendation from the applicant's pastor must accompany the application.

The Center will accept ambulatory persons needing protective care.

The Center will not accept persons with the following disabilities:

1. Senile psychosis detremental to themselves or others.

2. Personality behavior disorders, emotional problems problems resulting in inability to adjust to group living.

3. Communicable, contagious or infectious diseases.

Your support and prayers make possible the ministry of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center. We are deeply grateful for the support and concern of all people who have expressed an interest in this ministry.

EVANGELISM REPORT

In the year 1977-78 Florida Baptist baptized 23,426 in the 1,535 churches. This year again the State of Florida had a decline in Baptisms. This last year we baptized 198 les people than in 1976-77. There were 20 churches baptizing over 100 compared to last year's 26. There were 15 churches baptizing one person for every 5 church members or less. There have been 14 Associations reporting an increase in Baptisms above the previous year.

Southern Baptist for the same period of time reported 336,050 converts being baptized into the membership of its 35,404 churches, a drop from last year of 9,640.

Middle Florida Baptist Association also shows a drop this year in Baptisms. But, Thank God, it was only two (2). OUr Association had a decline of 22 last year, compared to 24 this year. I feel that we as an Association have stabilized and I am very optimistic about the year ahead. I urge every church to be concerned and pray and take part in the 1980 Florida Baptist Revivals, the first Simultaneous Revivals sicne 1962.

An International Student Conference was attended and inspired a reception and witnessing program for the foreign students at NFJC. In 1980, we will be observing the 200th Anniversary of the beginning of Sunday school work. Joining the Baptist Sunday School Board's Sunday School Department, the State Sunday School Department and all Florida Baptist Churches should join in making the year 1979-80 a significant year of progress! As a part of this 200th celebration and to help to reach a 20 percent increase in Bible study enrollment by October 1, 1982, we are launching a Sunday School Bicentennial New Unit Recognition Plan. This includes the regular ongoing program as well as new departments for the mentally retarded, new Cradle Roll and Homebound Departments, Classes for deaf and language groups, Fellowship Bible Classes, Extension Bible Classes and at least 100 new Sunday Schools.

Each Association should join in setting specific goals and in urging the churches to set goals for organizing new units during the year 1979-80. For Middle Florida Association to do its part will require establishing thirty (30) new classes and departments, and two (2) new Sunday Schools.

"In the Florida State Historical Library there is a letter that tells of a congregation that narrowly escaped being massacred during the war with the Seminole Indians. The information recorded in the letter was obtained from an Indian who was later captured. He told how a band of Seminoles had determined to surround and kill the congregation of the first church established in Madison County, Florida. But as the Indians crept near the church building, they saw the congregation kneeling in prayer. 'They are talking to the Great Spirit; he will be angry if we kill them,' said the Indians to one another. Without a sound they slipped away.''

What gives interest and pertinency to our Middle Florida Baptist Association, is the fact that the church referred to is, beyond all possible doubt, the First Baptist Church of Madison, established in 1835 while the Seminole Indian War was raging! We are seeking a copy of the letter to which reference is made.

On the local scene, Greenville Baptist Church has worked on its history and same is now, as we understand it, being printed.

Quite obviously, there is much to do: keeping accurate records for the later writing of formal church histories, interviewing older members, getting down on paper the words that will speak the records of our fathers under the leadership of God. We urge each church to do this!

Isaacs, President of the Board of Trustees in this language: "The Radio and Television is committed to use and embellish the best of what we have found to be effective in the electronic media. What we have done we wish to do more thoroughly. We ask God to provide the leadership and power to enable us to attack the future boldly." The equipment and studio for producing attractivbe programs are the best. Central in the program is the preaching of the Gospel to a wide variety of audiences.

In the Middle Florida Baptist Association, as well as elsewhere, the needs are to support the program and to gain a careful knowledge of when "to tune in" and then do some prayerful and regular listening.

Brother Paul Stevens, long time leader, has resigned. The search committee, appointed to find and recommend Dr. Stevens successor, is actively seeking a president. Denominational input it vital. The committee is seeking the man God would find suitable for this important position in His kingdom.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God, an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver, the Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

III. The Fall of Man

Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created he them" (Gen. 1:27). "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but, through the temptation of Satan, he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness: whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, are under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

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IV. The Way of Salvation

The salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in Heaven, and, united in his person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

V. Justification

Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation

The blessings of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penitent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher, Saviour and Lord.

VII. Regeneration

Regeneration of the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the divine nature and a holy disposition is given, leading to the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

VIII. Repentance and Faith

We believe repentance and faith are sacred duties and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; hereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It ancourages the use of means in the highest degree.

X. Sanctification

Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain a moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. It continues throughout the earthly life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the Word of God.

XI. Preservation

All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere professors. A special Providence cares for them, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. A Gospel Church

A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by convenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Its Scriptural officers are bishops, or elders, and deacons.

XIII, Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

XIV. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, works of necessity and mercy only excepted.

XV. The Righteous and the Wicked

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and the wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

XVI. The Resurrection

The Scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

XVII. The Return of the Lord

The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not the angels in heaven, but my Father only" (Matt. 24:36). It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for his coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ.

XVIII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained by God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XIX. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of love.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

XX. Education

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Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a

part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

XXII. Co-Operation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great object of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary co-operation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and his Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XXIII. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ.

XXIV. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possessions. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to us for the Glory of God' and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XXV. The Kingdom

 The Kingdom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the gospel of Christ and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The Kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Moderator shall preserve order in the Association, which shall be opened and closed by prayer. He shall decide all questions of order and propriety.

2. All members of the body shall respect the authority of the Moderator, but any member shall have the right to appeal to the body from his decision.

3. The Moderator shall have the same right of speaking as any other member of the body provided he appoints some member to fill the chair; but he shall not vote except when there is a tie, when he may cast the deciding vote.

4. No more than one member shall speak at a time. Any member desiring to speak shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and when recognized by the chair may speak to the subject, but not more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body while in session without permission of the chair.

6. All motions in order must be disposed of by the body, unless withdrawn by the one who made the motion.

7. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for deliberation, the Moderator shall take the vote of the body and then announce the decision. If a division is called for the Moderator shall take the vote by calling on the members to rise and stand until they are counted. After the count is made on both sides the Moderator shall announce the result.

8. The Clerk shall enroll the names of the Messengers, and keep a regular record of all the business of the Association. He shall have the Minutes printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money sent up.

9. The Treasurer shall receive and manage the funds of the Association, taking receipts of all disbursements thereof, and present an annual report of all funds received and disbursed, for insertion in the Minutes of the Association.

10. This decorum may be altered or amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be "The Middle Florida Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to foster a harmonious and efficient spirit of cooperation among the churches of its constituency and to cooperate with sister churches of the Southern Baptist Convention in carrying out the missionary, educational and benevolent program of Christ's Kingdom to the ends of the earth.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers duly elected by the churches affiliated with this body.

Section 2. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in its session as follows: Two messengers for the first fifty members or less and one additional messenger for each additional 25 members or fraction thereof, and all ordained pastors who are members of or pastors of any of said churches, together with the elected officers of the Association, who are members of the churches.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer. They shall be elected from nominations made from the floor at the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Association in April of each year. They will take office at the close of the Annual Session held in October.

If any vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

All officers are elected for one year terms, but may be re-elected. All officers shall serve without salary except the Clerk and Treasurer, whose stipend shall be referred to the Budget Committee for consideration in the Annual budget to be voted on by the Association.

ARTICLE V - OTHER OFFICERS

The Nominating Committee shall present nominations to fill the following offices at the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Association in April: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, W.M.U. Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, and committee members of all Standing Committees.

All such Directors, Chairmen, and Committee members will assume duties at the close of the Annual Session in October, and are elected for one year terms, but may be re-elected.

ARTICLE VI – COMMITTEES

Section 1. All committees shall consist of three members except the Executive Committee, Association Mission Committee and Calendar Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers, heads of the Associational Organizations, pastors and one lay member from each church to be recommended by the individual church and chairman of standing committees.

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Section 3. The Standing Committees shall be: (1) Assembly Ground, (2) Budget and Finance (3) Calendar of Activities (4) Committee on Committees (5) Missions

(6) Nominating (7) Obituaries (8) Program (9) Resolutions (10) Time, Place and Preacher (11) Assignment.

Section 4. Members of the Standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association to take office at the close of the annual session.

Section 5. The Missions Committee shall be composed of five members who shall serve for five years with one-fifth retiring each year.

Section 6. The Calendar Committee shall include the heads of each department.

Section 7. The Program Committee shall also include the Moderator and Clerk.

Section 8. The Budget and Finance Committee shall cooperate with the heads of each Associational Organization and Treasurer in preparation of a budget for the ensuing year.

This committee shall determine the sum per resident church member to be requested from the churches for funds to carry on the work of the Association.

ARTICLE VII – RIGHTS OF CHURCHES

This body shall recognize and respect the Scriptural rights of the churches composing it, and shall in no wise exercise authority over them. Churches may be at liberty to sever connection with this body at any time be giving written notice to the Executive Committee or Annual Session.

ARTICLE VIII - PETITION


Petition for membership shall be referred to a committee on petitionary letters at any Executive Committee meeting prior to the annual meeting of the Association, and shall be subject to approval at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE IX - ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith of this Association shall be the same as those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention at their annual session in 1925 and shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation.

ARTICLE X – AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the body and must secure a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

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HISTORY OF LAMONT BAPTIST CHURCH LAMONT, FLORIDA

The Olive Branch Baptist Church was organized in May of 1897 with sevices being held once a month. It continued under the name of the Olive Branch Baptist Church until October 3, 1908. The name was then changed to Lamont Baptist Church. The church through the years has had the following pastors: J. F. Farnell, Stephen Crockett, J. E. Evans, W. Frank Moore, A. N. Woodward, C. E. Glover, D. F. Barney, A. W. Smith, J. M. Cannon, J. P. McCan, S. L. Loudermilk, A. W. Rowe, L. W. Branch, Brother Gardner, Brother Axion, Brother Persons, L. N. Catlege, A. W. Rowe, W. L. Raneu, W. C. Taylor, R. C. Rittenhouse, Lewis Dobson, R. C. Hines, W. L. Robbins, E. A. Sapp, V. L. Ward, Durward Kilpatrick, E. A. Sapp, Dewitt Rehberg, Colburn Hobbs, and Verner Wheeler, who serves at the present time. It has been and continues to be a member of the Middle Florida Baptist Association, the Florida Baptist Convention, and Southern Baptist Convention. The following have served as the church's Clerks: W. H. Walker, G. F. Andrews, T. P. Williams, David Walker (who served for 50 years), and Mrs. Ada Bell Davis who serves at the present time.

The church voted to move to a half-time program while Rev. R. C. Rittenhouse was pastor in July 1917. They tried on one occasion to move to a full-time program but it was not successful and remained a half-time church until July 6, 1975, with Rev. Verner Wheeler as the pastor.

The church has the following orgnaizations: Sunday School, Church Training, W. M. U., Brotherhood and Music Ministry.

On March 3, 1976, the church voted to build a pastorium. A Building Fund was started for the project and a Building Committee was appointed for this purpose. In July of 1976, the church voted to accept one acre of land on Old Saint Augustine Road donated by the children of Uncle Bud and Aunt Sallie Timmons. This land was to be used for the pastorium site. On February 20, 1977, the ground was broken for the pastorium. The three oldest members of our church, Brother David Walker, Mrs. D. W. Shealy, Sr., an Brother Elijah Denmark, with Mrs. Mamie Capps (a daughter of Uncle Bud and Aunt Sallie Timmons) breaking the ground. A beautiful and spacious three bedroom house was finished in November of 1977. This was the biggest undertaking in the history of the church. Many people donated free labor and made monetary donations to the building of the pastorium for which we are grateful.

Since moving to the full-time program, our church has experienced spiritual, numerical and stewardship growth. In March of 1978, John R. Field was licensed to preach. He was the first person in our church's history to be licensed. In September, 1978, Harold Reams also felt the call of our Lord to preach and our church licensed him to the Gospel Ministry.

In 1979, we felt the need of a Constitution and By-Laws. Upon recommendation from the Deacons, the Church Council wrote the Constitution

and By-Laws. The By-Laws included in it a rotating deacon system. This is the first time our church has used the system and it is being implemented the first of October, 1979.

We were saddened, but rejoiced in our Lord, as Harold and Patsy Reams left us for Southwestern Seminary in April of 1979, to prepare for the ministry. They are the only ones in our church's history that our Lord had led to this place. We praise God for His calling them.

We praise God for these and all of His blessings upon us. As we begin the year 1979-1980, we begin with the largest budget in our history. Thirteen percent of the budget will go to the mission causes of our Convention. We believe the Great Commission of our Lord was to go into all the world and we are grateful to our Lord for a little part of this. We do not look to the past. We rejoice in what God has done for and through our church. We look to the present day and the proclamation of His Word and the winning of our world to our Master. Also, we anticipate the coming of our Lord and we shall be busy for Him until He comes. . .

P.S. Since the writing of this history, by the grace of God, our church debt on the Pastorium has been paid in full. We praise our Lord for the blessing He lets our people be and we go on now to greater things.
