FOREIGN, HOME & STATE MISSIONS

Missions has been defined as finding a need and filling it. The finding and filling can only be accomplished if every Southern Baptist takes the right view toward giving. The right attitude is not how little we can give and get by, but how much more can we as Baptist give if we are really serious about witnessing to the world in this century.

FOREIGN MISSIONS: There are many indications that Southern Baptist are taking **BOLD MISSION THRUST** seriously. We now have over 3,000 missionaries serving in 95 countries and territories.

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT are central to the objectives of missions. Making and maturing disciples in the fellowship of local churches into a cooperative effort for a continued outreach is an area of primary concern. In 1979 workers reported an increase of 634 churches and 33,519 members, with a total of 96,376 baptisms.

Significant progress was made last year in the fields of schools and student work; publications; radio; hospital and medical care.

CONTRIBUTIONS: Last year Southern Baptist contributed \$74,976,749 in support of foreign missions. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering of \$36,217,473 constituted a large part of the gift total.

HOME MISSIONS: Great progress was reported in securing and utilizing Mission Service Corps volunteers. Especially note-worthy is the fact that 33,382 short-term volunteers supported mission endeavors last year.

During the year, 978 missions were started and 395 new churches constituted. At years end there were 2,283 church-type missions in operation, sponsored by 1,548 churches.

THE CHURCH LOAN PROGRAM is prospering and providing a much needed service. Last year 2,700 churches were served by this program and loan applications were processed for a \$21,313,745 commitment.

At the end of the year, the Board had 2,922 persons on the Home Mission Force and 103 elected staff.

The largest offering for Home Missions in the world was received with the Annie Armstrong Offering amounting to \$14,171,637. Cooperative Program gifts to a total of \$12,549,744, a 13.82% increase.

STATE MISSIONS: For the years of the **BOLD MISSION THRUST** emphasis and planning, Florida has been among the top leaders in the SBC. One major priority is reaching out to sponsor church-type missions and new churches in our state which is growing so rapidly. With refugees coming in daily, vast opportunities for Baptist ministries are apparent.

The Departments of the State Mission Division; Brotherhood; Cooperative Missions; Evangelism; WMU and Church Extension are committed to assisting churches in doing a better job in spreading the gospel. Every church should take advantage of the assistance so readily forthcoming from our State Office.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT: As of June 30, 1980, the end of the fiscal year, Florida Baptist have given a total of \$13,115,340.38 in cooperative program and miscellaneous gifts. This is an increase of \$1,541,114.97 over the previous year. Of the above amount, Middle Florida Association contributed \$73,078.43. Are you satisfied with what your church is giving? More importantly, is the Lord satisfied.

Over 323 pastors and other church staff had their retirement benefits upgraded this year. New churches enrolled in the program total 34, with 131 new members.

Again this year, the Annuity Board paid a "13th check" to all annuitants.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTER

At present, there are 70 residents at the Center, 13 men and 57 women, of which 66 have come from 18 associations in Florida, 2 from Georgia, 1 from Texas and 1 from Hawaii. The current age range is from 62 to 95.

Many visitors come to the Retirement Center during the year, asking questions regarding admission procedures and requirements. The following information will be helpful to anyone considering possible residency at the Center:

Applicants must be residents of Florida and members in good standing with a Baptist Church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention for at least 12 months prior to application. Exception may be made in case the applicant is an employee of a Southern Baptist Convention agency, board or commission.

The minimum age is sixty-two.

Persons seeking residency must be interviewed by the resident manager. Applicants must complete, sign and return the required application form with a letter of recommendation from their pastor. A non-refundable application fee of \$25 is required for each applicant.

The Center will accept only ambulatory persons needing protective care.

The Center is unable to accept applicants with the following disabilities: (1) Senile psychosis, detrimental to themselves and others. (2) Personality behavior disorders or emotional problems resulting in inability to adjust to group living. (3) Communicable, contagious, or infectious diseases.

The ministry of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center is made possible by the support through the Cooperative Program gifts and the prayers of the people of this state. We are most appreciative of this support.

EVANGELISM REPORT

In the year 1978-79, Florida Baptist baptized 26,505 in the 1,549 churches. This is a great increase of 3,079 for the state over last year. There were 28 churches baptizing over 100, and 25 churches baptizing one person for every five church members or less. There were eight churches above last year baptizing 100 or more. There were five churches above last year baptizing one person for every five church members or less. There were 33 Associations reporting an increase in baptisms above the previous year.

Florida has been marked in 1979-80 by two significant projects. This has been the year of the Florida Baptist Revivals, and sixteen of our churches participated in Simultaneous Revivals, March 16 through 30th. There were twenty-two additions by baptism and six by letter that were reported. We feel sure that next year will show the total effect of the Simultaneous Revivals.

The Korea Crusade was the climax this year for Florida Baptist in Evangelism. There were over 20,000 counseled professions of faith. There was about 7,000 non-counseled professions in a variety of other services.

The Tallahassee Campus has experienced its most productive and challenging year. Our campus population has doubled with the addition of our new residence, which opened in January. We now have 22 children in our care on campus, plus those children in after-care off campus.

Mr. & Mrs. Peeler are beginning their eighth year of service on this campus. Ken and Leann Dyke have joined the staff as child care workers, along with Kim Roberts, in residence No. 1. Cindy Evers has joined the staff as a social worker.

Through the support of our church friends, we have been able to send our children to various church camps and retreats, including Ridgecrest. It is because the Baptist people of our State care that three of our children have made their professions of faith this year.

Our three acre garden continues to provide an abundance of produce under the skillful care of Mr. Peeler. We also have four heifers donated to us by several churches and lay-people in Jay and Milton, Florida.

We are continuing to cultivate our growth and development in North/Northwest Florida with the desired goal of meeting the needs of children, encouraging family unity and providing a ministry of caring that we as Christian care-givers can believe in.

A total of 940 churches contributed to the 1980 Mother's Day offering. This is an increase of 16% in the number of churches participating over last year. \$186,000 was given, which was \$4,000 away from the goal set. Middle Florida churches participating were: Beulah, Brewer Lake, Central, Cherry Lake, Elizabeth, Lee First, Macedonia, Madison First, Mayo, Midway, Moseley Hall, Mt. Work has progressed to a degree on the Conference Center, begun by gifts from the Pastor/Deacon Conference two years ago. The floor is poured, walls up, and the roof is subject to being put on.

Many individuals have given generously to the financial support of the Assembly. The number of churches supporting regularly runs between 45 to 50. There are 178 churches that own the Assembly through their Associations. Think of what could be done if all these churches put the Assembly in their budgets for even a small amount.

Bro. Walter McKinney, Camp Manager, keeps the grounds in good shape. Churches and Associational groups are urged to continue using the camp.

She is now going to the Christian Sunday School even though she is a Hindu. "My Mother was so much encouragement to me", "Just tell them what you know about Jesus". "So I did and do every day." Her Father used to be an alcoholic, now he is a transformed person altogether. Many people come to their home for Spiritual help and encouragement.

Well, I hope and pray that our Middle Florida Association of twenty-eight (28) churches can and will organize in their Sunday School Classes, WMU Circles, and Brotherhoods, etc. The activities would be such a good way for us to increase our Bible giving, so many can know about Jesus. Let's do it and call it the "Good News Club".

Since its founding 164 years ago, the American Bible Society has offered the people of the world more than three billion opportunities to read at least some portions of God's Word.

Starting out with a distribution of 6,410 Bibles in 1816, The A. B. S. has increased steadily through the years its ministry of sharing the Scriptures to reach its current annual distribution rate of more than 250 million Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections.

In many overseas areas there were extremely encouraging increases in the number of people reached with God's Word. Following, are some of the highlights of the Bible work made possible through your gifts in 1979.

Africa: An increase of 90 percent. Asia: Rose from 3,995 to 6,532. In their total areas their circulation in Pakistan rose 99.7 percent. Other areas in Asia had very rewarding abilities. Latin America: 15 percent in New Reader Scriptures. Europe: The most significant development in Bibles occurred in Eastern Europe when 362,050 were circulated. United States: A. B. S. distributed 108,882,672 in various languages. Twenty-seven languages were added to the list.

Our efforts might seem to be feeble, let's toil at our daily tasks and thank God, in hope of, in the final round-up, having something to lay, in humble gratitude, as an offering at the feet of Jesus Christ, who is the center and heart of the Bible.

ELBERT C. TYNER YOUTH CAMP REPORT

For the first time in fifteen years, we were forced to cancel our youth camp because of flooding in the Pickett Lake area.

Eleven months of pre-planning and anticipation of over twenty staff members came to naught. There was much disappointment on the part of staff and campers.

We learned some very valuable lessons this year which will help us plan in the future.

In the past we have deposited registration fees when we reach our cut off enrollment of 80 campers. This presented a problem this year because registration fees were paid by three different sources (parents of campers, the church and sponsors of a camper). When we had to cancel, we had no way of knowing who was responsible for paying the fees because the checks had already been deposited. Therefore, we did not know who to refund the registration fee to. We did the next best thing and that was to send a check to the church with a list of campers and how much they sent with their application. We asked the church to see that the refund was given to the proper individual. This was not the best way of doing it but because we did not keep as accurate records as we should have it was the only way we had available. After returning the registration fee, we ended up spending about \$200.00. This included postage, paper, envelopes, film, gas and some food items not returnable. This next year, the registration fee will be dropped to \$5.00 with the understanding that it will not be reimbursable because of fixed expenses encountered in planning for the week at Pickett Lake. This new financial arrangement was presented as a recommendation to the Association's Executive Committee on August 4, 1980. They voted to pass the recommendation. The total fee will still remain at \$25.00 unless the inflation rate is unbearable this next year and we have to raise it.

In the past, we have purchased and delivered our food supply on Friday so we could be ready to go by noon on Monday. This way our cooks had time to prepare for the supper meal. Next year the food supplies will be ready on Friday but we will not pick it up until early Monday morning. That way if at the last minute we have to cancel we won't have to take the chance of our frozen foods not being returnable.

I am deeply sorry for any inconvenience the churches or individuals may have incurred because we had to cancel this year. The date for next year is July 27-31, 1981. Until I see you all there, may God bless you with a cup that is running over.

HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT

During the recent months, Greenville Church has received from the Press its History beginning May 7, 1849 through 1979. This document was prepared by the Chairman of this Committee as a kind of "Swan Song" to a long series of historical writings over the years.

It is noted that Macedonia has had its historical sketch up-dated. Certainly, the interest in examining our heritage is on the increase. In February of this year, those interested in history in the First Baptist Church, Madison, led by Mrs. Deanie Webb, held an exhibit of historical items that was truly arresting in interest and, we hope, stimuli for continuing the preservation of our rich past.

Quite obviously, there "remaineth much to do". We do hope that each church has appointed a Historian and has a safe place to store items that could be used in the future in writing the Church's history. This would include bulletins, programs, newspaper clippings, special observances of Founders Day, recognitions of senior members with any biographical data that might be written, and on down the line. These items are the "grist" from which church histories are written. They should be carefully preserved and dated.

Your committee Recommends:

1. That each church begin and maintain a historical collection of items referred to above, other church histories, Minutes of the Association and Convention; probably to be given attention by the Church Historian and Church Librarian.
2. That a collection of pictures be developed in each church. This will prove invaluable in later years. These pictures should include those from past years as well as those taken as the program develops.

In conclusion, we point out that Mr. Charles Walker of Aucilla has been called since we last met. Mr. Walker, spared to great age, was the last of that noble band who organized The Middle Florida Baptist Association at Macedonia, beginning November 9, 1900. We sorrow in the loss of this great man but cannot but feel regret that, probably, no one drew from his memory the many treasures it held and recorded them for posterity.

Each church would have a task worthy of the doing to so interview its senior servants and take down this invaluable guidance from the past.

RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORT

This Agency attempts to cover a bonafide area of Christian enlistment and growth of our Baptist Effort. Its scope and endeavors incorporate something of Paul's objectives when he said "...that by all means I should win some to Christ."

It will be helpful for our Baptist people to keep up with the programs and write any comments that we feel to either Jimmy R. Allen, President; or Frederick W. Isacs, Jr., Chairman of Trustees; The Radio and Television Commission, 6350 West Freeway, Fort Worth, Texas 76150. It goes without saying that we should learn about this work, pray for its guidance, and financially support the program.

Due to loss of free time, there has had to be an adjustment in the offerings. However, the distribution of dramas on "The Human Dimension", "Listen" and "The Athletes" will

continue. The "Baptist Hour" has been adopted more in the direction of supporting the local church. "Black Beat" now incorporates "Nightsong", and "Soul Searchers" to reflect a change in cultural languages. "At Home with the Bible" comprising 39 new episodes, was produced this year.

Now we must face up to an impelling fact; we must learn when the programs are aired and listen to them to get their benefits. Beloved friends in Christ, isn't it high time we do some real "policing" of our total communications coming over radio and television and "comb out" the undesirable? The Scriptures say "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he". The greatest philosophers add, "What gets your attention, gets you". This makes it even more important that we "feed" our minds on programs produced by the Commission.

To avail ourselves and our churches of the services of the Commission, we must know what they are. We quote from a recent release data relating to special services; "The Radio and Television Commission's technical assistance program is divided into two sections — Broadcast Services Department and the Broadcast Engineering Department. In the Broadcast Services Department consultants, thoroughly trained in production and engineering techniques and sensitive to Baptist desires, contact churches and other Southern Baptist entities on request, determine their needs, offer new ideas and approaches, and often produce the broadcast materials or direct the equipment installation.

Projects ranged from the production of spot announcements to production and time buying for statewide "Good News" media blitzes, from the creation of an animated television identification for a church to production of half-hour Korean Baptist Hour programs for California Baptists. They also include the SBC Executive Committee's Convention presentation in Houston last year and the satellite telecast of the Houston Astrodome Mission Rally. Two electronic communications workshops were held in Kentucky and Georgia, as well as a seminar in Arizona."

Again, let us learn, use, support, and grow from the programs offered by the Commission.

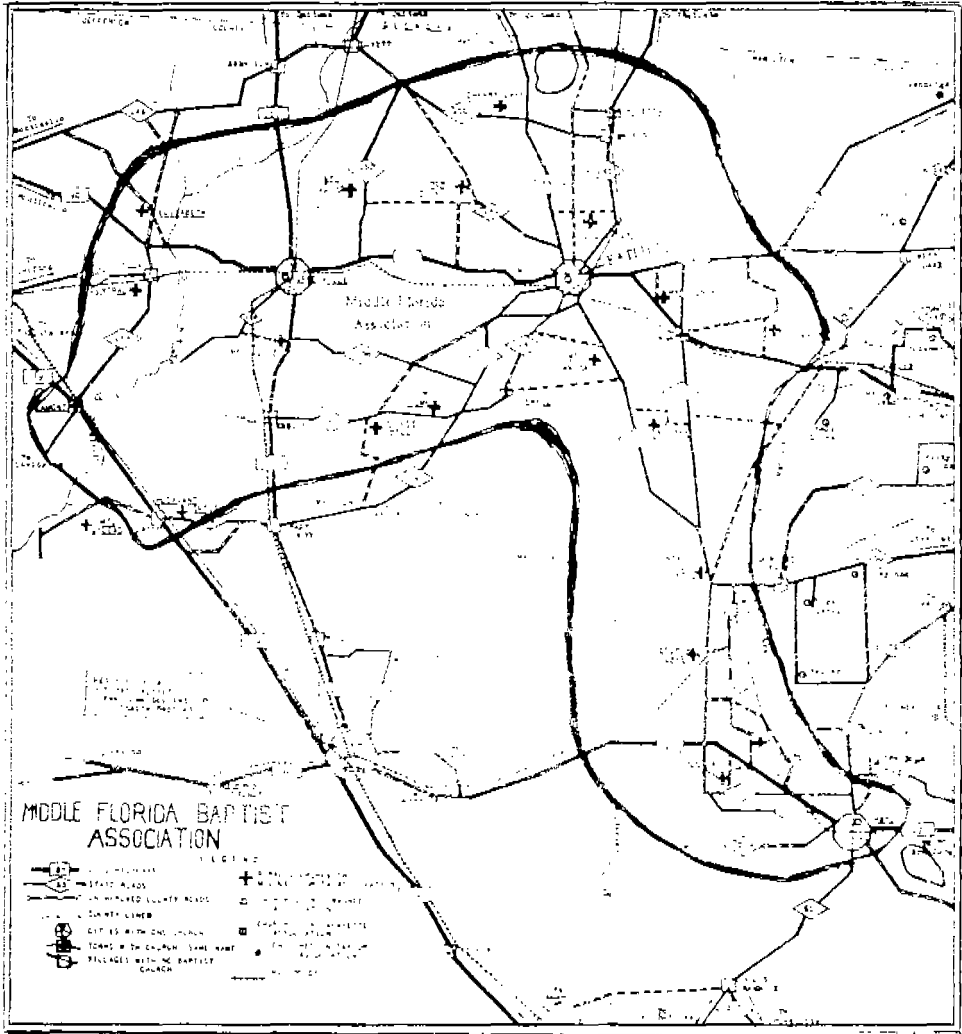
