## CHURCH TRAINING

Our Associational Church Training program has a significant part in <u>BOLD</u> <u>MISSION THRUST</u>. Some other things the Middle Florida Baptist Associational Church Training has done and will continue to do to help churches with their training opportunities are:

- 1. <u>1982 Associational "M" Night</u> There were 200 people in attendance on November 22, 1982 at Greenville Baptist Church. Rev. Ken Smith, Pastor of Fellowship Baptist Church in Tallahassee was our speaker. (Statewide attendance was 13,556)
- 2. <u>Associational Youth Rallies</u> Rallies were held every third Saturday night of each month in different churches throughout the association.
- 3. Youth Week Youth Week was observed March 13-

20, 1983 in many of our churches.

- 4. <u>Associational Church Training Leadership</u> <u>Conference</u> - It was held on August 30, 1983 with ten people present representing ten churches.
- 5. Associational Children's Bible Drill, Youth Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament - It was held March 11, 1983 at Cherry Lake Baptist Church. The participant was Marilyn Walker, from Greenville Baptist Church, participating in the Children's Drill. The 1984 Associational Drills and Tournaments will be held on March 12 at Midway Baptist Church at 7:30 P.M.
- 6. In the first 9 months of 1982-83, 1,068 churches in Florida requested 53,678 awards in the Church Study Course Program. Again this year, three special awards will be presented from the state Church Training Department at "M" Night. These will go to the church(es) with (1) the largest total number of awards, (2) the largest number of awards in Church Training Leadership, and (3) the largest percentage of total awards compared to resident church membership. Last year Elizabeth Baptist Church received all three of these awards.
- 7. "M" Night, 1983 It will be held on November 21, 1983 at Brewer Lake Baptist Church at 7:30 P.M.
- 8. <u>Church Training Leadership School</u> It will be held in August, 1984 (TBA)
- 9. <u>A Regional Church Training Convention</u> It will be conducted in our area next March (1984). (TBA) It will include Regional Children's and Youth Bible Drills and Youth Speakers' Tournament.
- 10. <u>New Church Training Programs</u> We had one <u>Church Training Program organized in our</u> Association this past year, Madison First Baptist started Church Training under the direction of Mrs. Lex (Deanie) Webb.
- Our Associational Church Training Program was

recognized on the state level as being 4th place in the state for being the Association with the largest numerical gain in Study Course Awards. Congratulations Middle Florida, we have something to be proud of in this recognition.

### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Annuity Board's primary ministry as a church pension board involves providing retirement benefits for participants in the annuity plans of the Board. Money contributed to the Church Annuity Plan or the Convention Annuity Plan by churches, institutions, denominational agencies and their ministers and paid workers is invested and held in trust by the Annuity Board to provide retirement income.

A relief program assists needy retired ministers and widows of ministers who have not been covered by Annuity Board protection programs. It also assists others who have inadequate benefits. The Cooperative Program funds the relief program.

Key statistical highlights in 1982 included:

- percent 13th Check 1. Α 10 was mailed to annuitants who retired before 1980. Those annuitants who retired in 1980-82 received their 13th Check bonus in their monthly checks.
- 2. A total of \$30,663,412 was paid in retirement benefits.
- 3. Total assests administered by the board as of December 31, 1982 \$1,057,947,515 compared to \$896,535,999 on December 31, 1981.
- 4. Relief funds from the Cooperative Program totalled \$455,009.
- 5. Membership records indicated that 18,111 persons were enrolled in Plan A, 65,855 in Plan B and 4,256 in Plan C.
- 6. Earnings on retirement and related funds for 1982 totalled \$108,923,263. This compares to

\$46,068,904 for 1981 or an increase of \$62,854,359.

#### FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTER

This past year has been a good one for the Retirement Center financially. Gifts and wills have helped make it possible to set up funds with the Florida Baptist Foundation that will produce usable income in the 1984 budget year.

At present, there are 68 residents of which 56 are women and 12 are men. The average resident census varies during the year from 68 to 74. The age range is from 66 years to 98 years. There are 19 Florida Baptist Associations represented at the Center.

The Center facilities, located in Vero Beach on 23 acres of property, include 14 duplex apartments, 5 efficiency apartments, 23 single bedroom units, and a 24-bed skilled nursing facility. There is a small lake, a picnic pavilion, and 10 acres of citrus trees. The Center has a maximum capacity of 85 residents. Located next to the Ritirement Center is the Indian

Located next to the Ritirement Center is the Indian River Memorial Hospital, plus several medical groups. Having these facilities nearby enhances the location of the Center.

Shopping areas and churches are within 5-minutes driving distance of the Center. Transportation for shopping is provided by volunteers from local church groups, and the nearby churches provide transportation to and from their individual activities and worship services.

Applicants must be residents of the State of Florida and members in good standing with a Baptist church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention for at least 12 months prior to application. Exceptions may be made in case the applicant is an employee of a Southern Baptist Convention agency, board or commission. The minimum age is 62.

Persons seeking residency must be interviewed by the resident manager or his associate. Applicants must complete, sign and return the required application form with a letter of recommendation from their pastor. A non-refundable application fee of \$25.00 is required for each applicant.

The ministry of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center is made possible by the support of Cooperative Program gifts and the prayers of Florida Baptists. We are most appreciative of this support.

The year 1982-83 has been a wonderful turn around from 1981-82, which was one of the most difficult years of our existence. The programs of the Children's Home have always been a Faith Ministry; Our Heavenly Father provides for His Own. Right now, we are well over the 1983 Mother's Day Offering Goal of \$255,000. Some 972 churches which include 24 Middle Florida Churches participated in contributing unto the, "Least of these." Services rendered 1982-83 were: Residential 148; Foster 23; Emergency Shelter 127; After-Care 65; Adoption 7. There has been 35,322 days of care during 1982-83.

A \$150,000.00 Capital Renovation Program was completed on our Miami Campus. One residence there was dedicated as the Mark & Jeanne Stanley Residence in honor of a longstanding Board Member. A Long-Range Planning Committee has been working diligently to project our programs five to ten years in the future; this plan will be finalized before the end of the year. Another out-growth of the long range planning

will be the employment of a state-wide Social Service Administrator in 1984 with responsibility for research and program projection in the social service area.

Our Homes continue to place a top priority on commitment and the leadership of the Holv Christian of the activities of the Home. Spirit in all А for emphasis specialized training continuing on Evangelism and Spiritual growth has enabled us to report 20 Baptisms of our children during the year.

More than eight years of intensive cultivation of deferred giving through bequests, wills, and annuities under the direction of Rev. Richard Phillips has resulted in a Banner year of contributions from such sources.

As we praise God for all His Blessings, let us look to the year 1983-84 with great Faith and expectancy knowing that God will supply all of our needs according to His riches in Glory.

I urge every church in our Middle Florida Baptist Association to determine to GIVE, PRAY FOR AND VISIT our Children's Home more than ever before and don't forget to put the Mother's Day Offering in your Church Budget.

It is encouraging to note that the Foreign Mission Board's annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention shows a growing response in most areas of mission endeavor. However, as missionaries send requests for more personnel and funds and document them to show what can be accomplished as these become available, it is clear that **Bold Mission Thrust** levels of response are not bold enough.

In 1982 Southern Baptists broke previous records as 406 new missionaries were appointed. This 2.58 percent increase falls short of the three percent needed to reach the goal of 5,000 missionaries by AD 2000. As 1983 began, 3,217 missionaries were serving in 96 countries, aided during the year by nearly 6,000 volunteers from Southern Baptist churches who went to help overseas - largely at their own expense.

Growing numbers of baptisms and new church starts were reported, especially in Africa and South America, due in part to a stronger emphasis being placed on evangelism. Overall, 700 new churches were started, an average of 13 per week, during 1983, for a total of 12,710.

Last year, Southern Baptist channeled \$110.2 million through the Foreign Mission Board to spread the gospel abroad. This figure could read over \$587.6 million if all Southern Baptist tithed their income and present percentages of distribution were maintained.

<u>HOME MISSIONS:</u> The Home Mission Board has accepted the Bold Mission Thrust challenge of reaching this country for Jesus Christ. But to make Bold Mission Thrust a reality instead of a slogan, all Southern Baptist are called to share in this endeavor. One agency, or one board alone, cannot witness to 250 million Americans.

The work of the Mission Section, H.M.B., last year was highlighted by beginning 1,180 new missions and churches. Very noteworthy, also, was the work being

done with 81 ethnic groups in 76 languages, starting 345 new ministries.

The Home Missions force includes 3,430 men and women serving in all 50 states, American Samoa, Puerto Rico, the American Virgin Islands, and Canada. In addition, 40,226 volunteers were placed in areas of special service and 1,568 chaplains in the military, industry, hospitals and institutions were endorsed. According to H.M.B. President, William G. Tanner, the volunteer program is absolutely vital to the success of the program. He estimates that 50,000 volunteers will work for Home Missions in 1983.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION has been busy during 1982-83 adding new and updated literature to our supply on alcohol, narcotics, pornography, gambling and related evils. We have added new 16 mm films to our film library and a film catalogue has been made available for all churches, youth groups, associational meetings or other interested parties.

The Executive Director, D. J. Abernathy, was in Tallahassee during the entire legislative session, lobbying for moral issues and against bad legislation which would add to our problems. We did not accomplish raising the drinking age to 21 this year. The alcohol lobby is so strong our legislators need to hear the loud voice of the Christian voters in support of raising the drinking age. Contrary to what some may think, your letters and your telephone calls to your representatives and your senators do help.

United Christian Action has aided churches and associations across Florida to become more aware of the drug and alcohol problem by conducting seminars, speaking to youth groups and in church services.

The strong financial support of ALL of the churches in Florida is needed if U.C.A. is to continue the work we have begun. No pastor and no church can address the problem as can U.C.A. Every pastor and every church, however, has a staff member, an ally, a friend and colaborer in U.C.A. Your financial support of U.C.A. makes it possible for you to continue your fight against the evils of pornography, alcohol, narcotics and gambling while you continue your work of soul winning and discipling the saints.

Jesus said in Matthew 28:20 "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

With your help, this is what U.C.A. is seeking to do. Thank you for your prayerful support and for putting U.C.A. in your church budget so you can help us twelve months out of the year.

## HISTORY OF MIDWAY BAPTIST CHURCH Lee, Florida



The Midway Baptist Church was organized in 1856 six miles south-west of Lee, Florida. From the available records, the church was active for ten years, but became inactive for the next seven years. The church met October 18, 1873, and reorganized with the following members: John Dixon, Daniel Hicks, Timothy Peterson, T. Turner, M. J. Dixon, William A. Brown, Vicey Dixon, Elizabeth Hicks, Catherine Peterson, Piety Peterson, Martha Turner, Nancy Dixon, Lydia Brown, Louise Pinkard, Eliza Sullivan, Mary Williamson, Martha Johnson, Elmina Hicks, Melvian Peek, and Nancy Brown.

Since 1873 the church has met monthly for conference which was held on Saturday before the second Sunday in each month until 1948 when the church went full-time, and the Conference date was changed to the first Wednesday night in each month. From 1945 until 1948 the church held worship services second Sunday and Saturday before and fourth Sunday in each month. Through all its history the church has manifested an interest in missions by making regular

contributions to missions at home and abroad.

The first building was made of hewn logs and was used until about the turn of the century when a large frame lumber building was built. As the people prospered, the building was remodeled. In 1947, four Sunday School rooms were added to the building. In the summer of 1950, a modern seven-room pastorium was completed. In 1954 the present brick building was constructed, consisting of an auditorium, seven Sunday School rooms, a baptistry, two rest rooms, and one social room. In 1970, a large fellowship hall was added onto the building. In the fall of 1980, a 63 by 30 foot brick veneer pastorium was completed.

From 1873 to the present time, the church has had thirty-two pastors. Some have served two or more times. Twenty-seven deacons have served the church during its history. At the present time, there are three active deacons: Eddie Hale (Chairman), E. E. Phillips, and Gus Phillips. The first SUNDAY SCHOOL was organized in 1924

The first SUNDAY SCHOOL was organized in 1924 with D. E. Thomas as Superintendent. Sunday School was conducted at the Enterprise School house for many years with the exception of second Sunday at church.

The first WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION was organized in June 1940, and has been active in good works since.

The Training Union was organized in September 1948 with Cecil Hicks as Director.

The Brotherhood was organized in 1950 with Sidney Jordan as president. The Brotherhood was reorganized in February 1983.

The following historical tidbits are but a few of the interesting incidents which have occurred through the years. On October 14, 1874, the church, in conference, declared foot-washing not an ordinance of the Missionary Baptist Church. On November 17, 1877, Brother J. J. Frier made a move and Brother H. J. Lamb seconded it that each male member throw five or ten cents into the treasury quarterly. In August 1917, a donation was taken to help visiting preachers who had conducted a revival. The amount received was \$4.30,

which was given to the two preachers. We thank God for His protection and guidance and for His unending love. "O Lord our God, how excellent is thy name in all the earth."


