

You tell your tales of prophets brave Who walked across the world And changed the course of history By burning words they hurled.


And I will tell how back of them Some woman lived their lives; Who wept with them, and smiled with them --They were the preacher's wives.



Stewardship

Your Stewardship Chairman has attended two Stewardship Leadership Workshops this past year. One at Baptist Bible Institute and one at Blue Springs Baptist Assembly. Brother Carlton Owens attended the Blue Springs meeting with me sitting in on the Annuity meeting pertaining to the new Annuity Program to go into effect in 1988.

The Middle Florida Baptist Association also had one meeting this past year in regard to the new Annuity Program for 1988. This meeting was led by Mr. Richard Barber, our State Annuity Program Director. This meeting was held at the St. Johns Baptist Church and was attended well with about 45 pastors and laypersons.

It was my personal privilege to be invited to two of our churches to speak on stewardship. If I can be of service to your church, please feel free to call on me.

There are two requests I would like to make to our churches to do in the upcoming yew year:

- 1) By faith, increase your missions giving through both the Association and the Cooperative Program.
- 2) The Church Stewardship/Finance Committee place before the church for vote to participate in the new Annuity Program effective January 1988. This approval by the church must be done and reported to the State Annuity Office this year for this reason. The state participates in

this new program in that it contributes up to \$420.00 a year, and they must know if your church aims to participate so the State Finance/ Budget Committee can include all the monies needed to finance their part. The state budget for 1988 is completed early in 1987; therefore, the state office needs this information early.

Convention-wide our income has increased in dollars; however, our percentage of giving to missions has decreased by about 2%. The work is greater than ever at home and around the world.

Sunday School

With the close of another year our Sunday School growth efforts have continued to take on greater dimension. We are now in Challenge 10/90. Ten million enrolled in Bible Study by September 30, 1990. We must set our sights on this goal and work toward it.

Goals and numbers are not interesting to many people but these represent people that Christ Jesus loves and died for. Our efforts in Middle Florida Association must be increased. Over the past three years we have actually lost in Sunday School enrollment and attendance even though the population has increased. We have decreased by 245 in enrollment and 117 in average attendance. At the end of the 1985 church year, we had 27 churches with 5,411 members and 3,682 resident members. Of this total, 2,546 were enrolled in Sunday School with 1,413 average attendance. We have much work to do.

As we attempt to gain in attendance over the coming years, more assistance will be available through your Association Office. The A.S.S.I.S.Team (Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team) is being organized and trained to assist individual churches in their Sunday School effort.

The Sunday School is our greatest asset in reaching and teaching people who need to know Jesus. A strong effort will be coming shortly in the area of Outreach Bible Study. This is designed for study out in the community to the unsaved.

This past year has been marked primarily by the effort to establish and train the A.S.S.I.S.Team and the annual V.B.S. Clinic to train V.B.S. workers.

Let's PRAY and SUPPORT a strong effort in 1987 for Sunday School growth.

Florida Baptist Children's Homes

"Child Care: Love In Action" is the 1986 theme of the Florida Baptist Children's Homes. It embraces the basic Christian principle upon which the homes have served children and their families for 82 years: "Suffer (allow) the little children to come unto me... for of such is the kingdom of God." Mark 10:14. The breakdown of family life is a chronic problem in our society. The children's homes is an extension of the local Baptist church in seeking ways to minister and restore hope for constructive family life.

CURRENT MINISTRIES

During 1986 the Florida Baptist Children's Homes will minister to 440 children, 246 families, and an estimated 135 additional families through family counseling, referrals and other services. These ministries are being provided through:

- * Residential Care in Lakeland, Miami and Tallahassee
- * Foster Homes across the state
- * Madray Group Home near Okeechobee
- * Emergency Shelter Care in Lakeland
- * Maternity Care for unwed, pregnant girls and women
- * Adoptions
- * Family counseling and referrals
- * Continuing education and after care services

SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

Children in care receive continuing counseling and role modeling by Christian child care and social workers. They attend local Southern Baptist churches and are encouraged to participate in all phases of church ministry. During the year 18 children made Christian commitments in their churches.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Florida Baptist Children's Homes is an agency of the Florida Baptist State Convention. The *Cooperative Program* and the *Mother's Day Offering* represent a major portion of the Children's Homes operating budget: 40%. It is expected that the Mother's Day Offering goal of \$400,000 will be reached by the end of this year and will be the largest in the homes' history.

Other Income is provided by individuals, businesses, foundations, memorials, wills and earnings from endowment funds. (Endowment funds are monies given to the homes for investing to produce annual income which in turn provides day-to-day care for children.)

Free Counseling and printed materials are offered individuals in planning their estate or writing their will. These are excellent avenues for continuing one's stewardship through final distribution.

Church Training continues to play a major role in growing disciples and developing believers. The Associational Church Training Program has the responsibility of helping each church to organize, improve and enlarge its program of discipleship development through Church Training.

This is the fourth year of one of Church Training's most exciting themes--DEVELOPING BELIEVERS. The 1986-87 Church Training theme is "Sovereignty and Stewardship." Through this study Church Training members will acknowledge God's sovereignty and be led to demonstrate responsible stewardship of time, possessions, abilities and the gospel.

Some other things our Middle Florida Associational Church Training has done and will do to help the churches with their training opportunities are:

- 1. 1985 Associational "M" Night attendance, 154 (statewide attendance, 10,560. "M" Night 1986 will be held on November 17, 1986.
- 2. This year's Associational Youth Rallies will be held each third Saturday evening of the month.
- 3. The 1987 Associational Children's Bible Drill, Youth Bible Drill and Speaker's Tournament will be held on March 16, 1987.
- 4. In the first nine months of the 1985-86 church year, a total of 1,664 churches in Florida requested 59,675 awards in the Church Study Course system. Figures for the associations will not be available until the end of September. Again this year three special awards will be presented from the state Church Training Department at "M" Night. These awards will go to the churches with (1) the largest total number of study course awards, (2) the largest number of awards in Church Training Leadership, and (3) the largest percentage of total awards compared to resident church membership. By the way, Florida placed second in total awards received during 1984-85.

Evangelism

In the past year, 1985-86, Middle Florida Association Baptists had one of their most successful years in reaching people for Christ.

Annuity Board

The Annuity Board launched the new Expanded Church Annuity Plan in Florida in April 1986. Dr. Dan Stringer, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention, launched the program by sending a letter and a packet of materials explaining the new program to each church. Since that time, there has been additional publicity about the Expanded Program in the *Florida Baptist Witness* and 41 associational conferences have been conducted by the Annuity Program Director. Churches are urged to approve placing their entire church staff in the new Expanded Church Annuity Plan this year. The new program officially begins January 1, 1988.

Some of the statistical highlights of 1985 indicate the Annuity Board enjoyed a year of exceptional growth and achievement. Assets held in trust by the Board grew to \$1,689,798,415. A total of 15,127 retirees were paid \$43,747,325. A record 9,434 Southern Baptist pastors and church staff personnel enrolled in the Church Insurance Program during two months of open enrollment in 1985, and \$551,132 was received for the Board from the Cooperative Program to be paid as relief to retired pastors or their widows. Florida has 1,036 churches and associations participating in the programs of the Annuity Board with 1,832 employees enrolled.

In the Middle Florida Association we have 12 pastors participating in the programs of the Annuity Board. According to the current Church Letters to the Association, only two churches have voted to approve the Expanded Church Annuity Plan. This plan does not officially begin until January 1, 1988. However, churches and associations need to adopt it now so that the Florida Baptist Convention can budget for it.

Florida Baptist Witness

"A nation that expects to be ignorant and free, expects what never was and never will be." -- Thomas Jefferson

In Baptist life, the concept of freedom is woven through all we believe and do. From the priesthood of the believer to congregational government freedom rings loud and clear. For example, the Bible is placed in the hands of all believers not just the clergy. The congregation of believers, not ecclesiastical bodies, determines what the local church will do and how it will support it.

Having a Bible in hand or being a member of a local church will not guarantee freedom. Knowing the Word through Bible study, prayer and participation in the life of a church are safeguards to freedom. Ignorance of the Word and what is taking place in the life of the church and denomination can lead to slavery. As Baptists we must never let others decide what we as individuals believe and know.

A major assignment of the *Florida Baptist Witness* is to provide information. The need for more Baptists to have more information is as great today as in any period of our history.

How can pastors and church members learn more about how their work is being carried out by Florida and Southern Baptist agencies and institutions?

The best and most effective way, obviously, is firsthand knowledge---visiting a meeting personally or serving as a board member or participating in a missions project. Not everyone can serve as a board member, missionary or volunteer, nor attend most meetings. Everyone can, however, be informed about Southern Baptist life by regularly reading his state Baptist newspaper.

The importance of the ministry of the *Florida Baptist Witness* is increasing. More and more pastors and congregations are becoming concerned about the work of Florida and Southern Baptists. Circulation is a record 95,300.

Four subscription plans are available. For an individual subscription, the rate is \$7.50 annually, payable in advance. A club plan (minimum of 10 subscribers) is available for \$6.50 annually, payable in advance. The budget plan, which calls for sending the paper to all resident families is \$5.50 annually or 11 cents per week. Churches are billed monthly for this service. The church page plan, in which the church uses the front and back pages for its own news, is \$4.25 annually per subscriber, plus a weekly printing charge, with

monthly billing.

The *Witness* also is offered to newly constituted churches for one year on the basis that the church agrees to include the *Witness* in the budget the following year for each family.

The Witness also will provide a church with a bundle of papers, at no cost for four weeks, to introduce the paper to its membership or to help increase an already existing list of subscribers.

State Board of Missions

This year the board held its first meeting in January at Blue Springs Assembly. During this time we had the opportunity to visit Baptist Bible Institute, at Graceville. This gave board members from the South Florida area an opportunity to visit B.B.I. who otherwise would probably never have this opportunity. The meeting in May 1987 will be at the Children's Home in Lakeland, Florida.

You will be happy to know that the Florida Baptist Convention has not had the need of a "Peace Committee" as the S.B.C. has had for some time. We are very fortunate that our leaders have maintained our mission purpose in one accord. This is not to say that we always agree, but so far we have been democratic and Baptistic.

As you know, I serve as vice chairman of the Budget and Allocations Committee as well as chairman of the Audit Committee.

The budget that will be presented to the Convention in November in Pensacola is the largest in history, 21.7 million. The committee has spent many hours discussing, shifting, etc., in an effort to present a balanced budget. Cooperative Program giving is down this year. Cooperative Program giving has not increased enough to provide the projected growth needed for Southern Baptist causes and F.B.C. programs, agencies and institutions' desired growth.

You will recall that at last year's convention, we voted to give 50.1 percent to S.B.C. causes, leaving F.B.C. with 49.9 percent. This year we are recommending that we give 50 percent to S.B.C. causes. This will help some in being able to present a balanced budget. Our budget process needs review.

The Budget Committee and Administrative Committee recommended a joint ad hoc committee be appointed to study the budgeting process and particularly that portion relating to percentages to our agencies and institutions. This is a six-member committee (three from B & A and three from Adm.) of which I am one of its members.

The committee solicits your prayer support. We have met once, and will be meeting several times throughout next year. We want our Convention to be financially sound and we want to be fair to our programs as well as our agencies and institutions.

S.T.A.L.L. 5. I'm sure you have heard of it. We are also on this committee

and I urge your church to get organized and participate in this program to help defeat lotteries and casinos. Your pastor has received the information and we must now work to defeat this issue.

We are so fortunate in Florida to have a dedicated state staff. Dr. Stringer has put together a staff that is committed to reaching Florida for Christ. They cannot do it alone, keep them in your prayers.

It has been a pleasure to represent you on our State Board of Missions. Thank you for this opportunity of service.

Constitution and Bylaws Committee

ARTICLE IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Director of Missions (Page 19, 1984 Annual)

- 5. The Director shall serve for an indefinite term at the pleasure of the Director and Association.
- 6. Termination
 - a. When the Director desires to terminate the relationship, he shall give written notice to the Association through the Executive Committee at least 30 days prior to the end of his service.
 - b. Should the Association wish to terminate the relationship, the following procedures shall be followed:
 - 1. Interested parties shall bring their views to the attention of the Executive Committee.
 - 2. The Executive Committee shall meet and counsel with the Director and if they deem it appropriate, bring a recommendation to the Association at a special meeting called in accordance with the Bylaws of the Association.
 - 3. Any vote to terminate must pass by 3/4 majority vote of those present and voting with a minimum of 50 percent of the churches of the Association represented at the special called meeting.
 - 4. The Director shall be granted 30 days severance pay.
- Section 2. The Moderator
- Section 3. The Vice Moderator
- Section 4. The Clerk
 - 1. The Clerk shall make, correct, and supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association and shall serve as secretary of the Executive Committee.
 - 2. He/She shall be responsible for all associational correspondence.
 - 3. He/She shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed to committees.

Section 5. The Treasurer

Section 6. Other Officers

ARTICLE V — PERSONNEL POLICIES

Section 1. Vacation

1st through 5th years - 2 weeks per calendar year

6th and thereafter - 3 weeks per calendar year

Vacation may not be carried over from one calendar year to another without the prior approval of the Association upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Sick Leave

Sick leave shall accrue at the rate of one normal work day per month to a maximum of 52 days. Sick leave shall be used for employee and immediate family.

Section 3. Compensation

As set forth in the current budget. When speaking in the churches on behalf of the Association, no honorariums should be expected (Except for pulpit supply - See Article IV, Section 2b).

Section 4. Work outside the Association

3 weeks for conferences and conventions

2 weeks for revivals and/or campaigns

Section 5. Employees on less than a full-time basis shall receive these benefits on a pro-rata basis.




