ARTICLES OF FAITH

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Article 1. We believe in one and only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

Article 2. We believe that the Holy Scripture composed of both the Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice of God's people.

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of Sovereign, particular and éternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ, which is the consequence of faith in Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit.

Article 8. We believe that the saints are preserved by grace and persevere in grace and will never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are the only ordinances of a New Testament church, that immersion is the only Scriptural baptism, and believers are the only Scriptural subjects for baptism, and none but baptized believers who are members of Missionary Baptist churches in good standing are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in the resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked dead, and that both will be judged according to the deeds done in the body.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are Divinely called, having been ordained by prayer and the imposition of the hands of a presbytery duly authorized by a Missionary Baptist Church.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Home represents one of our most singular pieces of work. It receives and takes care of the children of our departed brethren, and makes it possible for them to have an opportunity to grow into useful, Christian, manhood and womanhood.

The children admitted to our Home are taught to work. They learn to accept responsibility and to do their part toward their support. A farm, dairy herd, and grove pay dividends toward their keep. It is the practice of the management to teach our children to be self-supporting. They are taught eleven vocations on the campus, and to these are added agriculture, typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, and domestic science in the local high school.

All repairs except those requiring the services of a skilled mechanic are done by the children; repairs to buildings, painting, roofing, and all labor pertaining to the general upkeep of the Home is done by the boys. The girls do the cooking, laundry work, and other chores pertaining to general housework. They do not spend money for labor when the work can be done by the children.

The educational and religious training of the children are two important factors in the work of the Home. The children are sent to the city schools. This gives them the advantage of outside contacts, and us, assurance that they will receive as good instruction as the county provides.

The scripture is read daily in the dining room. Each Friday night chapel is held for everyone in the Home. This is a time given to discussion of principles of character building, and the religious problems of our children. They attend preaching, Sunday school, and B. T. U. services at the First Baptist Church of Arcadia. More than ninety per cent of our children over the age of ten are members of a Baptist church.

The success of a work with children can be measured only in a limited way by the visible results. The real success is too often hidden from our observations; and yet, the results of training and work among our children have produced enough visible results to be most gratifying. They have shown that they can be successful as teachers, as nurses, as beauticians, as printers, as secretaries, and as workers in a number of other fields. Those who have accomplished these things did so only with our help. They, and we, are to be congratulated on their success,—but as we think of those, and the others who are in the Home, who are receiving our help; we think of the hundred or more who have applied to us for help and had to be denied. Many of these are deserving cases, and need our assistance, but so long as only nineteen per cent of our Sunday schools make an offering each month toward their support, and only thirty-two per cent of those not giving each month send an offering during the year, and so long as forty-nine per cent do not give anything toward the help of our children, they will have to be left where they are.

It would be such a blessing to our children if it were possible to enroll a few more of our Sunday schools. This would enable them to increase their number, which is now one hundred fifty-two, without building any additional dormitories or having to meet any heavy expense by reason of the increase. They have the facilities for caring for one hundred seventy-five children on the campus.

Let us lend our support to this most worthy cause remembering the Master said, "Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me; and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me."

REPORT ON EVANGELISM, SUNDAY SCHOOLS & B. T. U.

Evangelism

"Ye shall be my witnesses."-Acts 1:8.

We believe the fires of evangelism are burning brighter than they have for a number of years. We have no official report as to the number of baptisms in this association this year but there are evidences that it has been a great soul winning year.

We would not discount the value of mass preaching as a soul winning agency, but we wish to urge more personal evangelism. As Andrew won his brother Simon to Jesus, even so the majority of souls are won; one by one.

We shall begin to reap a greater harvest of souls for the Master when every Christian has that surging impulse to win another to Christ.

Sunday Schools

"Go ye and make disciples of all people and teach them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."—Math. 28; 19-20.

The committee which was appointed at the last session to reorganize the Sunday School Association have succeeded in their ef-

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forts, and there have been three quarterly meetings of the Association at the Perry Baptist church, which was selected as the home of the organization. There has been one or more group meetings. However, we find that there is a lack of interest on the part of pastors, Supts., and teachers in the work of the Sunday school association. We therefore ask that every Baptist in the bounds of the association support this worthy organization.

We feel that the Sunday School is not only a part but a very vital part of the church, and that no church is doing its best until every function of the Sunday school is actively supported.

There must be no doubt but that the Sunday school can and should reach more people for Christ than any other part of the church.

This year there have been two new Sunday Schools organized. We have thirty seven churches with thirty-five Sunday Schools, approximately three hundred teachers and officers, and twenty two hundred pupils. From January 1, until October 1, of this year there were six Teacher Training Classes, receiving forty one Teacher Awards. There were several classes before January the first and there are now some classes being taught. There have been two Daily Vacation Bible schools taught.

Your committee wishes to recommend that efforts be put forth to organize a Sunday school in each of the churches that do not have one and that at least one Training class be taught in each Church during the next Associational year. We wish to recommend as a goal for the next year, twenty-five hundred pupils.

Baptist Training Union

"Give diligence to present thyself an approved workman unto God."---II Tim. 2:15.

The Training Union is to the Christian what the training camps were to the soldiers in the World War. It prepares him for the battles that are to come. We are Soldiers of Jesus, fighting against the devil. We need to be trained for the task.

The Training Union is that part of the church which develops talent in church leadership. At this time there is a great lack for leaders and therefore we urge that more effort be put forth in the interest of Baptist Training Unions.

We now have twenty-nine B. T. U. organizations which have sponsored five training courses and received sixty-six study course awards.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has just completed its twentieth year of service. This Board should find a larger place in the hearts of our people than has been accorded it hitherto. It has rendered a great service, but it is capable of rendering a still greater service. The benefits paid by this Board during the first twenty years were \$3,235,150.42. Our people should make the work of this Board a matter of earnest study and prayer and give to it their most hearty cooperation.

The Care of Our Aged and Infirm Preachers and Widows

Our Board continually faces the great task laid upon it by the Southern Baptist Convention and by the various States of providing food, clothing and shelter for thousands of ministers who have grown old in the service of Christ and for the widows of ministers who have gone to their Heavenly reward. The time has not come and will not come for many years when there will not be the necessity for aiding these servants of the Lord, and the amounts that we are paying them ought by all means to be increased for they are pitifully small.

Fellowship Offerings

The Relief and Annuity Board is continuing to ask that the churches take at least one FELLOWSHIP OFFERING in connection with the observance of the Lord's Supper each year and send it through the State Secretary-Treasurer marked "Special Fellowship Offering for Ministerial Relief." A growing number of our churches have done this and yet the great majority have neglected it. If thousands of our churches would take this Fellowship Offering the Relief and Annuity Board will be able to send thousands of dollars more money to our aged and dependent veterans.

Annuities For Our Preachers Who Retire In Future Years

Many churches and pastors in the Southern Baptist Convention have taken the long look and entered into cooperation with the Relief and Annuity Board looking to the building up of an annuity on which the minister and his family may live after he retures from active service. Retirement may be as early as 65 or may be deferred to a later date, according to circumstances. Churches having ministers who are provided for through an annuity plan are more likely to continue them in service after they are 65 than if they are not so provided.

In South Carolina the State Convention has adopted a plan which involves the cooperation of the minister, the church and the denomination on a basis of three per cent of the pastor's salary paid by himself, and three per cent of the minister's salary paid by the church or churches which he serves, and two per cent additional to be paid by the State Convention through its State Board. These contributions combined will produce worthy retirement annuities to every minister who participates; even those who are already in their fifties, sixties and even in the seventies, if in active service, there will be provision far beyond anything ever before known among Baptists for their proper and comfortable retirement.

It will be well for our churches to make diligent inquiry into

this plan and, of course, our preachers should also give it their earnest consideration. For further information relative to this Convention Minister's Retirement Plan our preachers and church leaders are invited to write to their State Secretary of Missions or to Dr. Thomas J. Our State workers are well trained, consecrated, and among the best in the land.

Our pastors and their local leaders are second to none; they are making every Church service worshipful and educational.

With these and other splendid educational advantages, let each one study, grow and live a life of service, acceptable to the Lord.

Temperance

MISSIONS, COOPERATIVE PROGRAM AND THE HUNDRED

THOUSAND CLUB

Missions is one in principle, and the terms State, Home and Foreign are used to define the sphere and function of the departments of our denominational ministry to the peoples of all the world.

State Missions

Our State Mission Board located at Jacksonville, Florida, with Dr. C. M. Brittain, Executive Secretary, is charged by our State Convention with the responsibility of organizing and directing our missionary enterprises, to seek to evangelize the multitude of the non-christian population and to assist our pastors in enlisting and training our members in worthy Christian living and service. Our State Board is also charged with the task of raising all possible funds to assist the Boards of our Southern Baptist Convention in our home and world-wide missionary work.

Florida presents a mighty challenge to our Baptist churches. Of one million and a half population about 65% are non-chur h members. It is estimated that there are 500,000 white persons, ten years old and up, who are unsaved. What a tremendous challenge to our pastors, churches and the State Mission Board!

To meet this challenge our State Board has its administrative department, the noble Woman's Missionary Union, the Sunday School and Baptist Training Departments, the Baptist Brotherhood, Evangelism, with three full time and one half time, evangelists; Student Work, the Baptist Witness and sixty-five missionary pastors serving seventy-nine churches and mission stations.

The State Mission budget for 1938 is \$74,115.00 which is the largest amount appropriated to State Work since the depression began. But it should be borne in mind that this is a small sum for so mighty a task and that every penny of this is necessary to meet the expenses of our Board.

The major task of our State Board during the ensuing year is in the department of evangelism. Our Southern Baptist Convention has called upon all State Conventions to organize and execute state wide evangelistic campaigns during 1939.

To carry out this South-wide and State-wide undertaking each association must actively cooperate. To this end we recommend: (1) that our association appoint a committee on evangelism which shall consist of three pastors and two laymen; (2) That this committee be requested to put on an Association-wide evangelistic campaign as early as possible in 1939; (3) That this committee arrange and execute all plans in the most cordial cooperation with the pastors and executive committee of our association.

most prayerful thought just now.

It is suggested that the Brotherhood has three objectives:

1st. To inspire our men to rally to the support of the pastor by regular attendance upon preaching services, by their prayers and loyal co-operation with him as he ministers to the spiritual needs of the church and entire community.

2nd. That our men of the churches must be so aroused and enlisted in the activities of the church that he can be depended upon to support the entire program of the church and that every member so educated and developed spiritually as to be used in this great enterprise. Reference here is not made to money alone. No, so many men bring themselves to the point that if a liberal contribution of money is made by them they have done their whole duty and the details are left to someone else. We most earnestly submit that the financial part be the least important. Does the scripture say somewhere that He our God, owns the cattle of a thousand hills. First of all He wants you and me, men of the churches, our consecrated and consistent Christian lives; not that others may see how great an amount of money is cast into the treasury, but that the private life bears out our claim of being Christian.

3rd. That our laymen may be brought to the point where each one will accept a larger share and part in directing the affairs of our denomination and the carrying to successful accomplishment its every enterprise. It is said that there are a million men in the ranks of our Southern Baptist Churches. Enough power in this group if properly utilized to turn the thought and conduct of the whole world to Christianity-to set in motion the spiritual machinery of christendom-enongh power to turn the footsteps of humanity to God. When these million men of our churches will have assumed their rightful places in the various phases of kingdom work, we shall witness the greatest forward movement in religious life ever known before. The opportunities of the Brotherhood are too vast and important to delay longer in putting this organization to work in God's kingdom. But in the prosecution of the task let all join hand and heart and be completely surrendered to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

In order to enlist men the Brotherhood has given itself to a three-fold objective:

Spirituality, which is fundamental and leads one to prayer which is the mainspring to an ever devoted Christian life.

Information, Without knowledge there is a sad lack of vision and "Where there is no vision the people perish." Let it be insisted that every man study prayerfully God's own word, to learn of Him and His will, and then be informed concerning our various missionary enterprises and activities.

Last, "Training for Service." When our laymen have become quickened spiritually and possess adequate information concerning the teachings of the Bible and the denominational enterprises, then we shall be ready for service.

PART II

Home Missions

Our Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Georgia, with Dr. J. B. Lawrence Executive Secretary, is reporting notable blessings and progress in all its fields of the Homeland, Cuba and the Fanama Canal Zone.

This Board has now 332 missionaries working in 886 mission stations. During the past year 23 new missionaries have been put in the field, 22 mission chapels and pastors' homes built, and over 100 new mission stations opened, over 776,319 tracts and 34,530 Bibles and portions of the scriptures distributed. Fifty thousand people have been personally visited and talked to about their souls' salvation in addition to the people appealed to in the 36,579 sermons and addresses delivered. It has been a glorious year of going on.

Continued progress, both in increased receipts and in phyments on the debt is plainly seen in the financial report. The Board received from all sources in 1937, \$508,454.67, an increase of \$64,999.40 or 14%. The treasurer's report shows that \$145,-560.37 was paid on the principal of the debt in 1937. This is the largest amount paid in any year since 1929.

The Board is strictly adhering to a cash basis in all its operations. This is the fifth year the Board has operated without borrowing for current work. The Board has operated within its budget.

The Home Mission Board is going on. The work to be done is just as important today in bringing in the kingdom of God in the homeland and the world as it has ever been. In fact, the mission task in the homeland is larger, more difficult and more important than ever before. The work to be done is more vitally related to the whole task of the denomination than it has ever been at any time in our history.

PART III

Foreign Missions

Our Foreign Mission Board is located in Richmond, Virginia, with Dr. Charles E. Maddry, Executive Secretary. It has served the Southern Baptist Convention and the world for ninety-three eventful years. And now when the old world is in troublous times because of wars and rumors of wars, the Lord is pouring out His Holy Spirit upon the workers at home and on every mission field.

For the calendar year of 1937, the Board received for its work from all sources the sum total of \$1,077,996.34. From the churches through the Cooperative Program, undesignated, it received \$421,259.72; designated gifts, \$230,459.70; Lottie Moon offering, \$239,376.92; for the debt through the -Hundred Thousand Club, \$64,259.91; for debt, miscellaneous sources, \$3,629.-62; legacies, \$8,749.66; miscellaneous receipts, \$110,269.81.

The debt of the Board now stands at \$316,000. Since the Washington Convention five years ago, we have paid on the principal of the debt \$771,510. The Board has lived within its income and has not borrowed any money in five years.

We glean from the report the following statistics: number of baptisms during 1937, 14,027; total native membership, 208,794;

total contributions by native churches, \$370,638; total native churches, 1,802; number of self-supporting churches, 986.

The Testing Hour

The Sino-Japanese War has caused great material loss to our mission enterprise in China.

Most of our mission property in the Central, Interior and North China Missions is now in the hands of the Japanese military authorities, and our missionaries are not even allowed to inspect the property and ascertain the extent of the damage. In Shanghai alone we estimate our losses are close to a quarter of a million dollars. It is impossible to estimate the amount of damage done to our property outside of Shanghai, but we know it will be exceedingly heavy.

Many of our missionaries have lost all of their personal effects, household goods, clothing, books, and all of those intimate personal accumulations of a life-time. We would estimate that 'fifty missionaries have lost an average of one thousand dollars each in personal property and belongings. The Foreign Mission Board has no funds whatever for reimbursing these missionaries. We are distressed over the plight of these devoted men and women and we fear some of them will actually suffer unless a way canbe found for their relief.

In spite of this great material and the imminent danger to life our missionaries have carried on bearing hardships with the heroic spirit of the martyrs of other centuries. While their work in certain lines has been hindered, the opportunity for personal and mass evangelism is the greatest in the history of missionary work in China. Thousands are being saved during these war torn days that never would have been reached.

Our Roumanian brothers and sisters and our missionaries are being imprisoned for conscience sake and their churches closed by the Roumanian Government.

Yet God is on His throne and He laughs while the heathen rage, for He has decreed that every knee shall bow and every tongue shall confess that His Son, Jesus Christ, is Lord of All and King of Kings.

Let us who enjoy peace, and prosperity pray for our missionaries and give sacrificially of our money.

PART IV

The Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program is the method adopted by our denomination to secure the contributions of individual members through their respective churches to all State and South wide eniterprises. It has proven to be the business like way of doing business for the Lord. It is growing in favor as the days go by, because it has provided a way to "lay by in store on the first day of the week as the Lord has prospered you."

The Cooperative Program receipts should be sent promptly to Dr. C. M. Brittain, Rogers Building, Jacksonville, Florida.

The proper way to work this Cooperative Program is through the Every Member Canvass which should be put on and completed once a year, preferably during November and December.
