Reassembled at 2 o'clock P. M. Prayer by Bro. F. M. Chiles.

On motion of Bro. E. H. Rennolds, Sr., the order of business was suspended, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That Art. X of the constitution be amended so as to read as follows: Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and as many additional ones as she may send, not to exceed one for each ten members.

Eld, H. H. Sturgis moved that each Ladies' Missionary Society be allowed to send one messenger. The motion was lost.

A letter petitioning membership was received from Enon church, which was read, and on motion of Bro. T. W. Spicer, the church was received and the right hand of fellowship extended to the messengers, Bros. Ben Smith and T. K. Quinn, by the Moderator.

On motion, Elders W. B. Hare and W. J. Hughes, with the deacons of Sumterville church, were appointed a committee on Divine Service.

Visiting brethren were then invited to seats with us; Elder J. A. Doll, of Virginia, Eld. D. T. McLeod and Bro. J. R. Summer, of Pasco Association, accepted.

The Committee on Divine Service reported Eld. L. D. Geiger

to preach to-night.

On motion of Eld. W. B. Hare, adjourned till after preaching to night.

### SATURDAY'S SESSION.

Reassembled at 9 o'clock A. M.

Engaged in Devotional Exercises led by Brother I. G. W. Kraker.

The minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved. Elder B. I. Hull accepted a seat as corresponding messenger from Marion Association.

Elder L. D. Geiger, as chairman of the Executive Commitmittee, reported verbally that the only business transacted by the committee was the recommendation of Elder W. J. Hughes to the State Board of Missions for appointment as Missionary in our bounds. Remarks were made by Brothers J. C. Porter, L. D. Geiger (E. H. Rennolds, Sr., in the chair) and W. B. Hare. The further discussion of the Executive Committee's report was postponed till the report on Missions is read.

### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Your committee would beg to report that in their humble judgment the importance of ministerial education cannot be easily over-estimated. Surely there never has been a time when the education of ministers of the Gospel was not desirable, and if it has heretofore been important, it is from every view of the matter more important at present, and its importance increases as time passes, and the mass of the people under our liberal system of public schools and free education become themselves more intelligent and consequently demand in ministers of the

Gospel that they shall keep pace with the onward movement in this direction.

The education of ministers of the Gospel of the blessed Son of God would seem to be peculiarly important in this age of skepticism and so-called science, in order that the cause of the Redeemer may not be left without advocates who are fitted to defend its grand and glorious truths in the midst of the unholy warfare that is being waged by these influences. It would seem that in order to anything like the full enjoyment of the grand truths and glorious doctrines of the Gospel'plan of salvation an educated people, but especially an educated ministry, is highly essential. We would not be understood as saying no good or but little good is accomplished by comparatively uneducated ministers; no, indeed; on the contrary, we know that God, in His infinite wisdom, has called and will doubtless continue, in His good pleasure, to call to His ministry men of limited education, and we are prepared to admit that grand results follow their ministry. Yet we believe that if a man can be a useful minister of Christ as an uneducated man, he can and will be a more useful one with the unquestionable advantages of an education.

Education in the ministry, accompanied with the spirit of Christian love and charity—the spirit of Christ—can but result in the increased promotion of the Master's cause.

It is highly important that our people should be informed as to the progress of religious principles, not only in our own State and the country in general, but also in foreign countries, and this important information can only be acquired by reading our religious peri odicals. There are other interesting and invaluable newspapers of other States, such as the Baptist Courier of South Caroliana, the Biblical Recorder of North Carolina, the Christian Index of Georgia, the Religious Herald of Virginia, the Baltimore Baptist, the Baptist Basket of Louisville, Ky, and other Baptist papers, all of which are worthy of our patronage, where we can afford to take more than one religious paper. But the most important one to us, as Florida Baptists, is the Florida Baptist Witness. So far as the Sunday-school literature, or periodicals are concerned, your committee deem it unwise and injudicious at present to recommend either the "Kind Words" series and publications of the Home Mission Board, or those of the American Baptist Publication Society, either one, to the exclusion of the other, leaving the choice of the one or the other to the discretion of the churches of this Association, without attempting to influence them by the action of your committee. ### MISSIONARY REPORT.

I herewith submit my report of missionary work done for the year commencing November 1st, 1889, and ending October

24th, 1890.

Churches supplied 5, other stations 4, sermons preached 102, miles traveled 2,300, family visits 160, baptisms 12, received by letter 11, restored 1. Received for missions for State Board-Cove Bend Church, \$10.12; Enon, \$4.83; Lecanto, \$8.26; Bushnell, \$2.19-total, \$27.02. Received on Associational Missions from J. M. Hedick, W. B. Hare, Dr. Smith, A. M. Norwood and Mrs. John Davis, \$17.67. Received from Treasurer on last year's salary, \$34.32. Received from Treasurer on salary balance three years ago, \$12.71. Received from State Board since January 1st, 1890, \$140,15. Received from Cove Bend as missionary pastor, \$40; Bushnell, \$34; Lecanto, \$30. Total amounts received from all sources, \$333.73.

### REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Of all subjects which claim the attention of God's people the subject of missions is one of most vital importance. The great heart of love is ever supplying the warm flow of blood to quicken dead nature, but the veins are inactive and hence no response from man's heart. How shall we change this order of things and bring man back to his God is a problem which finds solution in missions. This certainly is God's own chosen way of evangelizing the world. Through this medium we are to carry out the great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." These facts are admitted by the mass of those claiming to be Christians, but how to awaken a deeper interest in and make missions more efficient is the question.

Underlying this question is the subject of giving. Let God's people, let our Baptist brethren and sisters wake up to a realization of the fact that it is their duty to give as God has prospered them. Give systematically to missions and this problem will be solved, as God has already supplied the men to carry the everlasting Gospel as fast as the money can be furnished. Therefore we would beg the brethren and sisters of our Association each one to feel that it is their duty to give to missions. Give lib-

erally as to ability, and give systematically.

Our own home field demands a renewed effort on our part in the mission work. In 1877 I traveled as missionary for the Alachua Association, then embracing the territory of the Marion Association. Yet with only about half of the same territory there is more mission work needed in our bounds to day than in 1877. The same is true over the State at large. The State Board is doing all possible on their part to supply this destitution, but let it be clearly understood that the board can only do as the means are turnished; and the same is true of our Home and Foreign Boards. In view of our own Associational destitution we would recommend a continued effort to supply the destitution by a missionary, and that more liberal contributions be made at least quarterly to our State and Associational Boards to enable them to do this work. Let every church take quarterly collections and every member feel it his or her duty to help in this matter. Wes, we would emphasize, let every member give. "The liberal soul shall be made fat."

Brother T. W. Spicer moved to amend by striking out Friday before the 4th Sabbath and inserting Tuesday after the 3d Sab

The amendment was discussed pro and con by Brothers W. 1. Hughes, A. H. Helvenston, L. D. Geiger (E. H. Rennolds, Sr. in the chair), W. B. Hare and T. W. Spicer.

Brother E. H. Rennolds, Sr., moved that the amendment be laid on the table. The motion prevailed.

Brother Hughes' motion was then adopted.

Brother W. J. Hughes moved that the minutes be distributed in proportion to the amount of money sent for the printing fund.

On motion, any of our members who may be present at the next session of the State Convention, at Pensacola, next January, be authorized to act as delegates.

Elder L. D. Geiger was elected delegate to the next session of the Southern Bartist Convention, to be held at Birmingham, Ala., next May, and that he be allowed to select his own alternate.

Brother W. J. Hughes moved that the Clerk be instructed to have the minutes printed and distributed, and that he draw on the Treasurer for the necessary tunds, and that he be allowed \$15 for his services!

Brother A. C. Atkins moved that the Clerk be instructed to insert in the minutes the cost per minute; and each church be requested to send money next year in proportion to the number of minutes they want.\*

The Moderator appointed Elder W. B. Hare, Brothers W. S. Jennings and Joe Stanaland, Mrs A. E. Fuller and Miss Tallulah R. Atkins the Standing Committee on Temperance.

The Standing Sunday school Committee of last year was reappointed, except that Brother Ernest Yager, of Leesburg, was appointed in place of Brother M. H. Mabry, removed, and Brother O S. Bogue was made Chairman.

The following Executive Committee was appointed: T. W. Spicer, Chairman; J. C. Langley, E. H. Rennolds, Sr., J. M.

Hedick and J. T. Perry.

Brother W. B. Hare moved that the collection to-morrow be divided by paying three-fourths to the State Board and onefourth to the Executive Committee.

### NIGHT SESSION.

Elder H. H. Sturgis was appointed to preach the introductory sermon at next session, with Elder L. D. Geiger alternate,

Brother E. H. Rennolds, Sr., moved that any member of this Association being present at the meeting of any of our sister Associations be authorized to act as correspondent.

A vote of thanks to the Sumterville church and vicinity, for, their hospitable entertainment of this body, and to the F. C. & P. R. R. for reduced rates, was adopted.

### DECEASED MINISTERS AND DEACONS.

We are thankful to be able to report that the churches have during the past year lost none of their deacons. But we are made sad at the loss of one of our best ministers.

Eld. A. E. Cloud was born near McDonough, Henry countv, Ga., May 8th, 1828. He professed religion, joined the church, and was baptized in 1848. He was educated at Mercer University, graduating in 1852, and was licensed to preach the same year. Married Miss Lizzie Calloway in 1853. Was or dained fully to the Gospel ministry at McDonough, Ga., in January 1854. Elders L. T. Doyal, J. S. Calloway and D. L. Duffey constituting the Presbytery.

The greater part of his ministerial life was spent at Jonesboro, Ga, where he was pastor for thirty years. His health failing with lung trouble, he came to Florida in 1881, settling at Lady Lake, where he peacefully and quietly, but victoriously, feil

asleep in death, March 28th, 1800.

While in this State he served as pastor at Leesburg, Lady Lake, Pine Level and Whitney. Bro. Cloud was one of the truest men that ever graced the pulpit. His purity of life was his crowning virtue. As a preacher he was calm and deliberate, argumentative and sound. He was free from all tendency to novelty, either in subject or delivery, yet in no way dogmatical. 'He accepted the doctrines of the Baptists because he had investigated them, and found them to correspond to those laid down in the New Testament. As a pastor he was watchful over his flock, and ever a safe adviser.

When the Christians and moral citizens of Georgia were engaged in, their first efforts to drive the whiskey traffic out of the State, he was selected to carry the standard of moral reform in his county, and triumphantly elected to the Legislature, where he served a term or two with distinction. He was one of the originators of the college at Jonesboro, Ga., and for years President

of its Board of Trustees. He was liberal with his money, and gave treely for every good cause.

The church letters report also the deaths, during the year, of Bros. David Mathews, of Whitney, and J. W. Hansbrough, of Leesburg, and of Sisters Corinne Jennings and Eliza Hale, of Brooksville; Mahala Kraker, of Cool Spring; Mary A. Stark, of Lake Weir, and Jane Cain, of Wildwood.

### SABBATH.

### CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be denominated the Alachua Baptist Association.

ART. 2. It shall be composed of such churches as hold the doctrine of human depravity, the atonement of Christ, election to eternal life, regeneration and perseverance of the saints, baptism by immersion in water, administered to none but professed believers, and the Lord's Supper intended for those only who have been regularly admitted into the visible church.

ART. 3 We take the only living and true God, in three Persons, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, to be one God.

ART. 4. We take the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the only rule of faith and practice, both in the concerns of religion and the general affairs of life, and particularly for transacting the affairs of our churches.

ART. 5. We take the Church of Christ to be a congregation of faithful persons, who live in fellowship, and have given themselves to the Lord and to one another in cordial agreement to observe holy discipline, in conformity with the requirements of the Scriptures.

ART. 6. We take Jesus Christ to be the Great Head of the Church, and the only one given; that the government under Him is with the body, and is the privilege of each individual member; that spiritual discipline, with an eye single to the glory of God, must greatly conduce to the final prosperity and union of the churches.

ART. 7. In view of the increase of fraternal love, knowledge, usefu ness and efficiency which must accrue from an association of churches, in cordial union upon the principles of the Gospei, we have sought to be thus united, that by individual and collective action we may best subserve the great objects of the Redeemer's kingdom. And the concurrence of two-thirds will dissolve the connection.

ART. 8. This Association shall have power to withdraw its connection from any church which shall act contrary to the teachings of the Holy Scriptures.

ART. 9. New churches wishing to be admitted into this body shall petition by letters and messengers, and, upon examination, if found orthodox and orderly, shall be admitted by receiving the right hand of fellowship of the Moderator.

ART. 10. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and as many additional ones as she may send, not to exceed one for each ten members.

ART. 11. Every query sent to the association by any church in its union shall be read and put to vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated, and if there shall be a majority in favor it shall be taken up and debated; but if not, it shall be withdrawn; provided, always, that those be first considered which affect the union of the churches.

ART. 12. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, unless withdrawn by the mover.

Agr. 13. Every member who speaks shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while he is speaking unless he depart from the subject.

ART. 14. No person shall speak more than three times upon one subject without permission of the body. The constitution of this body may be altered or amended by the concurrence of two thirds of its members.

ART. 15. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.

ART. 16. It shall be the first business of this Association to provide for the general union of churches; second, to provide for the destitution of the churches and districts by missionary aid; third, to keep up a correspondence with other associations of like faith and order, that a chain of communication may be preserved among the churches; fourthly, to give the churches the best advice they can in matters of difficulty, and if communication should be broken between any of the sister churches, to inquire into the cause and use the best means to remove the difficulty; but if the breach cannot be healed, to withdraw from such church or churches as walk disorderly, until they may be reclaimed; and, fifthly, to regulate all matters pertaining to its business, to provide for printing its minutes, and appoint the time and place of its next meeting.

### BY-LAWS.

1. The officers of this body shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer.

2. The Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary shall be chosen by ballot at each session of the Association, and shall remain in office until their successors are elected.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the meetings of the Association, and the duty of the Clerk to keep record of the proceedings and prepare a minute for the press.

4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association and make a report of the same at each regular meeting of the body. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep all the funds of the Association, subject to the order of the Executive Committee.

5. There shall be an Executive Committee appointed at each meeting of this Association, of five brethren, whose duty it shall be to supervise and conduct all matters pertaining to this Association during the year.

6. Churches wishing to dissolve connection with this body must submit their reasons during its session.

7. It shall be required of the Executive Committee to hold a meeting for business at each session of the Association before its adjournment.
