EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

For a report of results, we refer you to his report as missionary.

As all amounts collected have been forwarded, and reported to the secretary, Bro. Chaudoin, of which we have not been advised, we

are unable to make a report of any funds collected.

We suggest that an Executive Committee be appointed with headquarters at Leesburg, with the pastor of the Leesburg church as chairman, and one brother from each district as members of the board.

We further suggest that the board be requested to prepare a programme for the Ministers' and Deacons' Meetings of each district, and announce the place of meeting in due time, so that these meetings may be more successfully in ugurated. The reason for this suggestion is the inestimable good resulting from these meetings, when successfully carried out; and the desirability of unity and concert of action

The demand for missionary work in our Association increases. Besides the weak churches, there are more mission stations stations than one man can possibly occupy. At Bushnell we have a house in a half completed state, and need help very much to get it so we can occupy it. The spiritual condition of the field at present is encouraging.

In submitting my report I feel it my duty to call the attention of the Association to the large number of negroes employed at the different mines within our territory, and I would recommend that they be looked after.

ary Union, ought to be in every Baptist family.

If any of our brethren desire other periodicals than those we have mentioned, we leave it to their own good judgment to decide between the many good periodicals published in other States.

LETTERS AND QUERIES.

We find, after a careful examination, that our Sunday School cause is on a stand still, being the same number; fourteen schools, as was reported last year. We feel this is one of the most important works our churches have to do, therefore think the Pastors and Deacons should do all in their power to organize and keep up a Sunday School in every Baptist Church or Baptist neighborhood, also that Baptist literature be used in the same.

We further find, to our sorrow, that but few of the churches report prayer meetings. We feel that this is the key to the spiritual life of a church, therefore deem it the duty of every church to have one.

As we feel it an honor to have our Associational letters prepared in a more business-like manner, we recommend to our Church Clerks to take more pains in preparing them. If they are incompetent to do so themselves, they can get the help of their Pastors.

WOMEN'S WORK.

Your Committee would respectfully submit that the interest in Women's Mission Work in the Association has not that hold upon the hearts of our sisters it ought to have. Where the trouble lies we do not know, but suspect that the Pastors do not encourage the sisters and aid them by their advice and sympathy. This work is the right arm of power to the Pastor in developing the entire church in the grace of giving.

At the last meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, it was reported by the Committee on this work that the women of the South raised during the year \$44,282. Of this amount the women of Florida raised \$1,328.58; \$122.43 of this was raised in the Alachua Association, or nearly one-tenth of the amount contributed by Florida. While this is a much better showing than some of the other Associations have made, still it is not what might and ought to be done by the women, and would be done by them if they were properly instructed and encouraged by our Pastors and brethren.

Your Committee recommend the following ;

. 1st. That the women of each church band themselves together in the local organizations, under the auspices of the church, and seek to enlist every sister to unite in the work.

2d. That the Pastors meet with them as often as possible and

encourage them.

3d. That the sisters take the *Baptist Basket*, published in Louisville, Ky., at fifty cents per year. This magazine will greatly aid them in their work.

4th. That the Societies put themselves in correspondence with Sister L. B. Telford, of DeLand, our efficient Secretary of Women's Mission Work for the State, who will render them ready assistance in every way possible.

EDUCATION.

This word, education, includes the mental and the moral, as also the secular and religious training of the young; when thought of in its true meaning and due import, we cannot lay too much stress upon it. We cannot watch and guard it with too much diligence. He who leaves his child in the world educated in the true sense, has given him that which alone prepares him to answer the great and solemn purpose and end of his being. Only when thus educated is he fitted to meet best the pressing responsibilities of a noble life. To leave the mental uneducated is to place your child behind, unable to cope with the progress of the age in which we live. To neglect the moral in connection with the mental, is to invest your child with powers which the devil may use to his own liking. To despise the religious is to ignore our Christian obligations and to turn your child out upon the world a ready prey to all the distracting isms of the day, perhaps to be overpowered by skepticism and led on to a woful end!

Education is not complete with the mental; there must be the moral and religious! And if your children do not receive these from you, it must come—it will come—and it may be of that nature and character which shall make your child, not a blessing, but a dishonor to his parents and a curse to himself and to his generation! Bear in mind that the secular must not be neglected, and you meet your responsibilities in this only when you have done your utmost in giving

the mental, the moral and the religious.

We are glad to know that there are excellent schools all over the land, and the facilities are reasonably good for educating. Then, when you would send your child to college, remember that the John B. Stetson, of our own State, at DeLand, is second to none, either North or South. Contribute liberally to the support of the excellent young brethren who are there struggling for an education that they may be the better able to preach the Gospel of Christ!

Don't forget that the Sunday School is a great aid in the proper education of your child! Take a good religious newspaper for him. Keep a good book always before him. Never suffer pernicious literature to enter your home! Feed the mind on that which is wholesome, and, under God, it will form character and shape life. Respectfully submitted.

The Committee on Divine Service reported Elder D. B. Farmer preach to-night, that a Sunday School mass meeting would be held at 9:30 a. m. to discuss the report on Sunday Schools, Elder N. A. Bailey to preach at the Baptist church at 11 a m., and Elder A. F. Randall at night, Elder B. M. Bean at the Methodist church at 11 a. m. and Elder H. C. Martin at night.

The Clerk was instructed to have 500 minutes printed, and be allowed \$15 for his services.

A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the Brooksville Church, and citizens generally, for their hospitable entertainment of this body, to the Methodist brethren for the use of their house of worship, and to the Florida Southern and F. C. & P. Railroads for reduced rates.

The clerks of churches were requested to forward the church letters to the Association Clerk by the first of October.

Ordered that so much of to-morrow's collection as may be necessary be used to supplement the Printing Fund, and that the balance be sent to the State Board without designation, and that the collection taken up for Bushnell church be reported to Bro. Chaudoin, as part of the Centennial Fund.

On motion of Bro. W. B. Hare, the following brethren were appointed by the Moderator as chairmen of the standing committees to report at next session, to-wit: On Education, C. V. Waugh; Temperance, D. B. Farmer; Woman's Work, W. B. Hare; Sunday Schools, N. A. Bailey; Missions, B. M. Bean.

It was ordered that the Associational Missionary be instructed to hereafter make his report to the Executive Committee prior to the assembling of the Association, and that it be included in said committee's report.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Ten years ago last May, the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention reported about \$28,000 total receipts for the year, and forty missionaries in the field. The receipts of the Home Board for the year ending May 1, 1892 amounted to \$227,281.51, and 265 mismissionaries were employed.

Ten years ago the Foreign Board had twenty-five missionaries and thirty-one native assistants in foreign fields, occupying thirty-four stations, with 740 church members, and the whole contributions to its work amounted to \$49,041,02. Last year the Foreign Board employed ninety-nine missionaries, and seventy-seven native helpers, occupying about 200 stations, with 2,723 church members, and the home contributions were \$114,325.80.

Ten years ago the Woman's Societies in the South, gave the Foreign Board \$8.633.95, and last year they contributed \$25,040.27. We would gladly give a more extended account of the work performed by our sisters, if we had the statistics at hand.

In April 1881, two missionaries commenced work under the Board of the Florida Baptist Convention, and the salary of our corresponding secretary was then paid by the Home Board of S. B. C. In 1891 our State Board, in connection with the Home Board, had 33 missionaries and expended in our State \$7,485.50, not including church building. Last year Florida Baptists gave \$1.300 to the Foreign Board, and \$907.16 to the Home Board, according to our Treasurer's report.

Your Committee have presented this very brief outline of mission work as a matter of encouragement, and to inspire greater zeal and diligence in our work. This Centennial year has already been marked with increased efforts to send the Gospel to the destitute in our own and in heathen lands, and it is to be hoped that it is the beginning of a wonderful advancement in the glorious work of our blessed Lord.

As special means of progress in the mission cause we recommend

the following:

1. That our pastors and workers urge the importance of systematic giving by the churches, Sunday Schools and Missionary Societies.

2. That in addition to District Union meetings, special missionary meetings be held by our churches and Sunday Schools whenever it is practical to do so.

TEMPERANCE.

Two years ago this Association, by resolution, made the Committee on Temperance one of our standing committees. The aim of the body was to have a committee at work gathering information all the time, and report at each session the status of the temperance cause in our bounds. At our last session the Moderator failed to name the persons to serve on this committee. As a consequence this special committee has not the data for a general report. We, however, wish again to place our Association record as in favor of temperance. Let us as Bible Christians strive to reach the apostolic rule, to-wit: Moderation in all things lawful; abstinence from all things forbidden, and even abstenence from all things allowed if indulgence tends to cause others to stumble (or sin.)

As Baptists, while differing as to methods, we again declare that we should be opposed everywhere, and at all times to to the manufacture and sale of all intoxicants as a beverage, as one of the greatest obstacles to the success of the Gospel. We favor all legal methods for the suppression of the matchless evil. Where this is not practical, let us strike hand with all other Christians in enforcing the laws that tend to limit its power for harm.

As Christians let us avoid extremes. We should not depend upon legislation to take the place of religious instruction and moral suasion. Let us never forget our duty to realize our individual responsibility to employ all our influence to the enactment and enforcement of good laws.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Association convened, after sermon by Eld. D. B. Farmer—text: John i. 12, 13.

Prayer by the Moderator.

The Committee on Divine Service reported Eld. C. V. Waugh to preach the next Introductory Sermon, with D. B. Farmer alternate.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee noted, with pleasure, during the reading of the letters from the churches, that most all of our churches report Sunday Schools. This is as it should be. While we cannot say that, among Baptists, the Sunday School is the nursery of the churches, yet we do not see why it may not be made thus. By faithfully teaching the word of the Lord and the power of his grace, and the great necessity for a clean heart and a regenerated soul, we are teaching those great doctrines that lead the soul to the Lord Jesus Christ! When we love sight of the idea that the Sunday School is simply a place to which to go to say the Scripture lesson, and strive to bring those truths to bear on the heart and the conscience until the pupils are made to feel their great need of Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour, then will we make the Sunday School become what it should be, a training place for the church!

It is a noted fact that very few of our brethren and sisters engage in this grand work! We stand greatly in need of a revival in this direction. Could we gain the ear of professing Christians who do not engage in this great work, we would say up brother, to the grand possibilities now opened to you in this department of Christian endeavor!

We would recommend that every church try to have a Sunday School, even if it be composed of only a few. Your interest and zeal will stimulate others to take hold with you and to shove forward in the

great enterprise!

We would recommend a return to the use of question books for the younger children, as the best means of imparting general information in Bible knowledge, and as the best means of impressing the great doctrines that characterize us as a people.

We would also recommend that, as far as possible, there be a dis-

continuance of union schools.

We would further recommend that a portion of time be allotted to the consideration of Sunday Schools at the Ministers' and Deacons' meetings. Respectfully submitted.
