the Introductory Sermon at the next session, with Rev. T. W. Spicer as alternate. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are glad to report some improvement in Sunday schools within the limits of the Association. As to the importance of this branch of Christian work, it can not be gainsaid. It is only second to the preaching of the word itself with advanced and intermediate classes, and with primary classes we believe it to be of more importance. This is proven by the past, that when well regulated Sunday schools exist, much the larger portion of conversions in the churches are among the children who have been handled by consecrated and efficient workers as teachers. The most important feature in connection with this branch of work is how to promote the attendance, and we are convinced that the means of accomplishing this desirable end is for the parents to always be as regular in their attendance as the children themselves. We desire to impress upon the minds of all laborers in the Lord's vineyard the importance of Sunday school work. There is nothing to take its place, and when this is neglected the most important field has been abandoned to the devil and his emissaries. Therefore, we urge upon all engaged in the work to renew their energies, and to those churches that have no schools we insist upon the importance of this branch of work.

In our own observation we find them more interested, zealous and responsive than we do the members of our older societies. Surely the children are the hope of the world, and we should be inspired to more active work and more earnest consecration by their example. Christ is coming, and let Him find us discharging the duties of faithful servants.

After much advancement there is still important work to do, and the best way to accomplish the greatest good is by systematic organization and systematic giving. Do we give our tithes to the Lord? If not, we are unjust, and by our actions we lose both in this world and the world to come, because our Good Shepherd said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Bro. Porter suggests that we give something for missions each Sabbath.

Could we do more in some way to banish this benumbing belief which is so strongly supported by the older population, that the Lord will take care of the heathen, we would have smoother sailing, but again our hope reverts to the children. In 1894 our own State had 55 societies and 33 bands. In 1897 we have 109 societies and 31 bands. Let the good work thus improve, aided by our prayers, zeal, consecration and purses. #### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

First, we would say, be temperate yourselves, or, rather, abstain entirely from drinking alcoholic liquors as a beverage. Don't get drunk, as is the manner of some, when you go to Ocala! Don't get a jug of whisky Christmas times and have eggnogg. Don't drink before and with sinners. Don't make and sell it. Abstain entirely, for if you are a moderate drinker, you may become a drunkard. There is no good reason for drinking. The drunkard or free drinker freezes sooner than one who does not drink. He cannot endure the heat, but has sunstroke. He cannot perform much manual labor. You would not entrust him with a spirited horse. You would not entrust him to run a train of cars carrying human beings. You would not entrust him to manage a lawsuit. The free drinker is gradually committing suicide. He does not live out the full length of his days. He does not resist disease. He is swept away by a pestilence. We should not thus destroy this body in which dwells the soul. The drunkard entails disease and suffering upon his offspring. Oh! how fearful to contemplate. We are taxed to build jails, to prosecute criminals. A great majority of crime and degradation is due to intemperance. Intemperance is a great enemy to Christianity. It is one of the greatest obstacles with which we have to contend. The spirit of Christ and the spirit of the still can not very well dwell in the same body at the same time. We, as Christians, should put ourselves square against tippling and the use of alcoholic liquors as a beverage. Any way to close or prevent a saloon. We would recommend you to scatter temperance literature, and thus

## Union Meeting at Oxford.

The Union Meeting of the First District of Alachua Association met at Oxford Saturday, October 30, 1897. T. W. Spicer was elected Moderator and E. H. Rennolds, Sr., Secretary. The first subject discussed was, "Is it consistent with the teachings of the New Testament for the membership of a Baptist Church to forsake the assembling of themselves together while at the same time they are devoting their time to other religious organizations? If not, why not?" The discussion was opened by W. R. Oberry, followed by E. H. Rennolds, Sr., O. S. Bogue, J. W. Brice, J. S. Geiger and C. A. Hooks, and answered in the negative. T. W. Spicer preached at 11 A. M. Text, Mal. iii. 8. "Will a Man Rob God?"

In the afternoon an interesting discussion was had on the subject, "Is the tithing system, as laid down under the Mosaic law, still in force or binding upon the children of God, under the New Testament dispensation? If not, why not?" Led by J. S. Geiger and followed by Dr. T. H. Hammond, E. H. Rennolds, Sr., J. W. Brice and C. A. Hook. Some of the brethren took one side of the question and some the other, and some were undecided.

On Sunday, after the Sunday school exercises, the subject of "An ideal Sunday school; have you one in your church? If not, why not?" was discussed by E. H. Rennolds, Sr., followed by W. P. Ebbs, of Lady Lake, T. W. Spicer, of Leesburg, O. S. Bogue and T. H. Hammond, of Oxford, W. S. Grimes, of Sardis, J. S. Geiger, of Webster,

W. V. Peacock, of Whitney, and W. R. Oberry, of Wildwood. The discussions were quite animated and lively, and imbued with the spirit of brotherly love.

J. S. Geiger preached Friday night and J. W. Brice Saturday night and Sunday, and remained to continue the meeting, the prospect being fine for a revival. The mission collection on Sunday amounted to \$5.
