We ought to be just, and see that the laborer who is declared by God's word to be worthy of his hire, gets it, but having failed so notoriously in this respect, we ought to at least be generous, when one of God's ambassadors falls at his post, and not stop at strewing flowers on his grave and saying words of praise of his good works, but we ought to remember his stricken and poverty-ridden family, with a voluntary, cheerful and liberal thanks offering to his loved ones, whose breadwinner spent his days breaking to us the bread of life, while we were devoting our time to laying up earthly treasures for our wives and children. All our pastors should press the claims of this Association upon their members, and thus swell the meagre amounts we are now paying to our deceased ministers' families. REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We find that the churches have given during the year \$176.42 for missions, an increase over the preceding year of \$15. The letters do not show up the

amounts as we think they should. We recommend that every church treasurer keep an account of all mission funds, and that the clerks be very careful to insert the amounts in the proper places in the columns prepared for the purpose. It is hard to make a report of the money contributed when the letters are so deficient in this information. Your committee regards this as the most important work given to the churches. Freely ye have received, freely give. We recommend that every pastor in the Association give special attention to this work, and that Sunday school superintendents be requested also to do their share in raising money for mission work. Let us remember the widow's mite, and our Savior's great sacrifice, as well as the commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee examined the reports of the twenty-three Baptist Associations held last year on the subject of education and find that fourteen of the associations appointed committees on education, four of which did not make any report as shown by the minutes, the Alachua being one of them. Your committee find that a wide scope has been covered by these reports, some opposing the schooling of men for the ministry, others urging that the Associations provide more liberally for the education of men for the ministry. We find that the associations are divided also in the opinion expressed as to the best schools; some favoring the Seminary, others recommending students to not attend the Seminary while Dr. Whitsitt is a member of the faculty, but all unite in praise and hearty recommendation of our beloved Stetson University. We recommend that higher education be urged upon our students and ministers. There is power in knowledge that is not attainable without knowledge. Little knowledge is a limitation on the usefulness of a minister, just as little steam is a limitation upon the power of an engine. Learning may be compared to the planter's seed. Much depends on the condition of the ground. If the ground is well prepared, clean of weeds and tares, the seed will spring up, grow vigorously, and mature bountiful crops, so with the teachings of men. If the schooling or preparation of the ground work is thorough, the character kept free from habits that will grow like the weed and destroy the crop before maturity, or before the harvest, greater will be the harvest from the education sought. Therefore we urge for your consideration the home teachings, the preparation of the ground, the upbuilding of character, destroying the seed that form the habits that often rob the world and the pulpit of its ablest men, in preparation of their higher teaching and learning, and urge the attendance of schools by all children of school age. We recommend that those of our denomination that attend higher schools than our common schools, attend Stetson University at DeLand and recommend this school to any and all seeking thorough and pure training and education.

Nothing appeals more strongly to us as your committee, than the necessity of lending a helping hand to those who are striving to obtain proper qualification for the service of our Master, and we recommend and appeal to the Association to contribute liberally as the churches represented deem proper to the aid of our brother, John P. Graham, a student from our territory

attending Stetson University, that he may continue in school, and become the instrument in the hands of God for great work and great good.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The temperance question is now engaging the attention of Christians of all nations. Many plans have been devised, and Christian influence has caused many laws to be enacted to suppress the making and sale of alcoholic liquors. All these movements have been attended with beneficial results, but they have fallen far short of the desired end. We believe that nothing short of the grace of God dwelling in the hearts of men is sufficient to accomplish the ideal results desired by every temperance advocate. Whiskey causes more corruption in politics than money; more untimely deaths than disease; more poverty, suffering, woe and want than perhaps any other one cause. We feel that it is the duty of every Christian to refrain from its use as a beverage.

We think that every Christian voter should cast his ballot against licensed barrooms, and should use his influence to secure the election of strictly temperance men to offices of public trust. We believe that each Christian should feel individually responsible for the illegal sale of intoxicants. We earnestly urge the pastors to agitate the temperance question, in order that the evils of intemperance may be kept before the minds of the people. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

This subject is one of vast importance, reaching persons and places almost impossible to be reached through any other medium. The literature setting forth these facts, however, is not attainable by your committee in so short a time we have to get up this report. In almost every country on the earth woman's influence for good is being felt and recognized. And your committee recommends that everything be done that is possible to encourage them in their grand work and urge the sisters to renewed effort all along the line of their work, reminding them that faithful, unwavering effort will give the victory in the end, and that they will have many stars in their crowns as a reward for their faithfulness. An old Prussian general who had but one word of advice in all councils of war was asked, "When repulse comes what then?" His reply was, "Forward." When victory comes the question is "what shall we do with it?" His reply was, "Forward." So, sisters, when discouragements come, we would say, "Forward," and when success crowns your efforts we still urge you forward in the grand work of sending help to every quarter of the globe, and remind you of an old maxim of Napoleon: "The army that remains in its trenches is defeated." We have ascertained from the best available authority that there are one hundred and thirty-four societies, thirty-two mission bands, and thirty-one associational vice presidents in the State. During the year 1897 the State Union gave to missions \$2,374.55. In 1897 the ladies of the Southern Baptist Convention appropriated more than \$40,000 to missions. Respectfully submitted.
