TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, submit the following report: Every one recognizes the truth of the old saying, "As the twig is bent, so the tree inclines." The impressions made in youth are the most lasting. We beg Baptist pastors, Sunday school superintendents, teachers and parents to think of this thing prayerfully and to throw around the children and young people every possible influence and protection against the growing habit and curse of intemperance.

The experience of the great majority who have have fallen into this terrible habit is that the taste for strong drink is almost, if not quite, everlasting, Men who would be good and useful citizens and members of the church. wielding an influence for good in the church, society and the government, are

robbed of their usefulness by this fearful monster, drink.

It is the conviction of your committee that no government has the moral right to license the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors, knowing that it brings destruction to the physical, moral and religious manhood of its subjects, wrecking the hopes and prospects of families and sending men to prison as felons and murderers. We would urge every church and every church member to throw the strength of their influence against this monster evil and let the work begin today, for yesterday is yours no longer, tomorrow may never be yours, but today the living present is yours, in which you may reach forward to the things that are before. Let the resolve of every one be: Oh, how earnestly we will labor with and for those who are cast down by drink, that within the home up yonder they, too, may receive a crown!

May we live to see this evil Swept forever from our sight; May we prove to those about us We are for the truth and right.

However, we recommend that as far as possible our young brethren should attend our State college, Stetson University, at DeLand, which we indorse, and to graduate there before going to the Seminary. We suggest that pastors of our churches impress upon members the great responsibility resting upon them in this line of church work. We recommend Baptist literature exclusively and especially the Southern Baptist Convention series.
