Report on Sunday School.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools make the following report. That we believe in Sunday schools, and do not think it needs any argument to prove their importance. Every church should try and have a good Sunday School, and every member of the church should give their hearty support to the work. We notice a want of interest in this part of the work, especially is this true on the part of older members of the church. It is the opinion of your committee that every member of the church should join the Sunday School, and thus encourage the children by their attendance. We would recommend to our Sunday Schools the literature of the Southern Baptist Convention, and take the American Baptist Publication Society. We also recommend the reading of our own denominational State paper, "The Homefield," "The Foreign Mission Journal," and last but not least, the reading of the Bible. We would urge our pastors to try and give the Sunday School work more of their attention. We would suggest propriety

of organizing a Sunday School Convention to take the place of fifth Sunday meeting.
