#### Report on Education.

Your Committee on Education respectfully report. Their appointment emanates from an organized representative body of Baptist brethren. They apprehend the subject committed to be denominational relation to education. Yet this interpretation is everything but a restriction of the subject, because, as of all people, we insist most upon the principle of individuality, and all education is the application of means to the leading forth (or development) of endowed capacities into controlling wisdom. How illimitable the aggregate accountability of an organized body of Baptists, each and all being responsible that the "fear of God" shall be the germinating influence of all development. From each every-day commonplace incident in the life of every Baptist, whether in domestic life or strife of business, in fraternal intercourse or the exercise of citizenship, proceeds an educating influence to all with whom he has to do. He educates recognition, a disregard of reverent submission, a pitiful defiance to the immutable law of love. God allows us to observe that in His economy life's attraction is the decided and potential agency of education, and the real pastoral relation that which needs confiding wisdom to the hearth-

stone and to personal care would seem therefore a most imperative Baptist obligation for mutual preservation. We commend to the church's consideration whether occasional proclamation of the gospel supplies this ordained provision for every New Testament church organization. Whether we dare expect development of our germ under such fitful gleams from the steady effulgence of the light of the truth; whether families or communities shall be as olive branches and shall flourish as trees planted by the rivers of water; whether this is not the initial for due recognition of our denominational responsibility for Christian education; without discussing mere scholastic institutions or advantages; without comment upon dutiful supervision of literature as means or influence for education. We commend to the churches that they see to it that our denomination suffer no reproach for responsibilities we have never assumed, and that we occupy no equivocal position in any such enterprise before the world. Let us piously and gratefully co-operate courageously to meet and improve every advantage God shall place within our reach with single and unflinching purpose to extend the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ to reach and train a loyal people staunch and pure in holiness unto the Lord. Education characterized the commendable conduct of the pupils' local high school of this place, whose attendance upon our introductory meeting yesterday gratified the officers and messengers of the Association.
