Your committee on periodicals beg to report:

This is preeminently a reading age. Every body reads something. The world of a few years from now will be determined largely by what the world of today reads. This is true of the denomination. What we read in this generation will determine what we shall be in the next generation. If our denomination is worthy of existence it is worthy of the best possible existence. To make our denomination what it can and ought to be our people must needs be constantly and completely instructed in our doctrines and in our achievements. There is but one way to do this, viz: through the medium of our denominational literature.

We therefore condemn the use of all union or non-denominational literature in our Sunday Schools and urge our Sunday Schools to use only our own periodicals; we would further say we believe we in the South should use only publications of our own Sunday School Board at Nashville.

As a medium of information concerning our mission work at home and abroad we contend that the Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal are absolutely necessary as a means of keeping informed about and in touch with our state work we claim that it is a positive duty every Baptist in the state owes to himself and to the cause to take and read our own paper, the Southern Witness.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee realizes that education is that power that enlarges men and women and enables them to accomplish the most for God's cause and humanity. We would, therefore, insist upon greater efforts for a higher educational standard among our brethren and sisters. We would contend for a complete education, and no education is complete that does not train man's hand, head and heart.

To train the hand without the head and heart is to make of man a great power without wisdom to govern or sympathy to direct. To train the head without hand and heart is as to put a mighty engine on a frail boat and take to sea. To educate the heart without hand and head is to give us a man of great zeal for right and but little or no power to do the right. As this complete education can only be had in our Christian schools we would urge upon our people the importance of patronizing our Baptist schools.

We would recommend that John B. Stetson University be acquired and controlled by our denomination as our school to provide this complete education in our state. We realizing the demands upon us for better equipped ministry would urge our young men entering the ministry to try to obtain a college or university education and to avail themselves of the training offered by our Seminary at Louisville, Ky., before entering upon their great life-work.
