MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION OF THE ALACHUA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Alachua Baptist Association met with the Wahoo church at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning, Oct. 25, 1907, to hold their sixty-first session.

The Association was called to order by the Clerk.

After a prayer and praise service Brother Kingsley preached the introductory sermon, from the text, "I will draw all men unto me."

Association adjourned for dinner until 1 o'clock.

The Orphanage was established Feb. 1st, 1904. It is for indigent white orphans of the state, irrespective of religious creeds or nationality. There are now 52 children in the home.

The support of the institution comes entirely from voluntary contributions from those who are willing to give to this noble object. Clothing for boys and girls and towels, sheets, and other bedding will be useful gifts.

A good school is maintained and the children have good church privileges. Twenty-one have joined the church so far. We heartily commend this institution to all who feel like helping a good cause.

We would therefore recommend that our people strive for a higher educational standard, and no education is near completion that does not train man's hand, head and heart. To train the hand without the heart and head is to make of man a great power without wisdom to govern, or sympathy to direct. To train the head without the hand and heart is as to put a mighty engine on a frail boat, and take it to sea. To educate the heart without hand and head is to give us a man with great zeal for right, with little or no power to do right."

As our Christian schools have been organized for the purpose of aiding in this better education, we would recommend that our people patronize our Baptist schools, and would insist that every Baptist should give Columbia College our sympathy, cooperation, and patronage.

We believe that we have God-given opportunities, and as his people we ought to appreciate the opportunities.

And last but not least we recommend the Seminary at Louisville to our young ministers who wish to complete their education.
