drive the liquor traffic from our state and nation.

MISSIONS.

Christians of all creeds and countries today hear an urgent call to renewed effort to hasten the time when "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord, as the water

Visions are brightening, horizons are enlarging, and missionary zeal is becoming more consuming. While rejoicing in the things already accomplished in spreading the "good news," there is such a "reaching forth unto those things which are before" as, for largeness of enthusiasm, comprehensiveness of forces and brightness of prospect, has never been seen.

Baptists have always been, and must always be, leaders in this

great enterprise. The call is most loudly to us.

But space will not admit generalizing; we can only point to our own work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Board at Richmond, Va., has been entrusted with the greatest work of its history; but on account of dept and smallness of funds, advancement has been slow. This is greatly regretted. Some new workers have been sent out and some new fields occupied, while the "Macedonian cry" appeals for hundreds and thousands of consecrated men and women, and open doors are almost numberless.

And sad indeed it is to reflect that not the poverty but parsimoniousness of our people sets the boundary to our progress.

If we would, we could say to our Board, in a practical way, lengthen your cord; and strengthen your stakes" as rapidly as conditions on the field will allow until the glorious work is fin-

HOME MISSIONS.

Recognizing that our Foreign depends upon our Home work, we

should give good heed to the needs of our own country. Our population is growing rapidly in numbers, and the tendency to worldliness is strong. Many places are far from being able to adequately meet the demands forced upon them.

Small churches located in fields where there should be large ones, poverty-stricken people struggling with conditions which demand extensive outlay and homeless bodies where houses of worship are essential to existence—not only in our own, but other Southern States-render appeals to our Home Board that are distressingly pathetic. Dr. Gray and his noble band of workers hold a peculiar position, and their claim upon us is strong. In no small degree, the success of Home Missions depends our Florida work.

The Home Board, for which our apportionment this year is only \$11,000, proposes to expend in the state \$12,600. Hence while sustaining the Home Board, we are sustaining our own

State work.

STATE MISSIONS.

We are rounding out our year's work for State Missions. In a very short time the record will close. What shall it be?

Dr. S. B. Rogers, our corresponding secretary, an expert on this line, gives the following figures as to the religious condition of Florida:

"The latest census report shows the evangelical bodies of Flor-

ida to be:

24.5 per cent of her entire population, divided as follows:

10.5 per cent are Baptists.

7.7 per cent are Southern Methodists.

6.9 per cent include all others except Catholics.

75.5 per cent of Florida's entire population today are without the pales of evangelical churches."

According to the same authority, our State Board of Missions is assisting 74 missionary pastors and missionaries who maintain preaching at 128 places, erecting (some completed) 98 houses of worship; the Board is further doing work for 400 Sunday Schools, helping to educate 14 ministerial students, assisting in the care of our 75 orphans, and caring for 12 aged ministers.

This is a great work!

To September 1st, there was reported from the field 1418 weeks' work, 1721 members received into churches, 24 Sunday Schools and 7 B. Y. P. U. organized, 8 churches constituted, and much other important work done!

At the end of the 3rd quarter of the year, \$26,414.05 had been raised. The Board planned for \$40,000 for all its work. Strenuous effort will be needed to secure the remaining \$13,585.95 for which the budget calls by the meeting of the Convention. Every association, every church, and every member should feel the pressure and come up to "the help of the Lord" in this time of need.

It would give your committee great pleasure to present some thoughts upon two things, viz: the proposed missionary conferences to be held over the country and the Judson Memorial Move-

ment: but for evident reasons we desist.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

A new plan has been adopted by the State Board of Missions and put into operation among the associations this year.

The district associations have been grouped and an evangelist appointed for the group instead of missionaries for each association.

The group to which the Alachua belongs has had the services of Bro. J. H. Lewis, who has held some very successful meetings at several points, and won his way into the hearts of the people.

Like all new plans, this one is an experiment, and ample oppor-

tunity for testing its wisdom should be given. We await the decision of the State Board.

OUR NEEDS.

They are many. We content ourselves with mentioning the

need of systematic giving.

Year after year, all our Mission Boards are forced to borrow money or discontinue the work! The latter course in unthinkable. We are glad to be able to borrow, but we regret extremely the necessity of paying interest on money which, if proper attertion were paid the matter, might be raised on the field as needed.

If this were done, all the Boards would have more money for legitimate missionary work. We have fallen into the habit of

making spasmodic effort under high pressure.

Regular effort might be harder but it would, doubtless, produce

better results every way.

At two of an associational union meeting, this subject has engaged the attention of the brethren, and schedule for systematic giving has been adopted. We earnestly recommend the adoption of some such schedule by this body which shall be published in

our minutes and earnestly commended to the churches for adoption and operation. We believe this would greatly help our work along all lines and save interest money to the cause.

REPORT ON ORPHAN'S HOME.

For lack of information, we cannot make a tabulated report of the work of the Orphan's Home, but we content ourselves by making an earnest appeal to the Baptists of Florida for their financial support of this most worthy institution.

We can hardly estimate the great good that is being done by our Orphan's Home and the importance of giving it our hearty

support.

The home has over 70 inmates and would have more but for the lack of room, so an effort is being made to enlarge the capacity that soon their will be room for more. So we appeal to you to help to do this work. One day in each year is set apart by the home as orphan's day and everybody in the State is urged to give the proceeds of that day's work to the home. We urge the observance of this day by all churches by donating to the home cash, clothing and food. When we think of the great advantage given these fatherless and motherless children by having their own School, Sunday School and Church, we feel that the Orphanage is ours and that we should give it our support.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We live in an age of schools and these schools are for the training and education of the young men and women of our land. Hence the importance of schools and the right kind of schools. The question that is of most vital importance to fathers and mothers of today is how shall our boys and girls be educated and where shall such training be had? Man should be built on a square, for he has a four-fold nature, and as we want the whole man educated, too much care cannot be taken in the selection of the school where such training can be had.

The school where the physical, mental, moral and spiritual natures all have the same attention should be the one selected. The schools that will give such training and afford ample opportunity for the development of good lives and characters are our Christian schools. There are two different features in the development of Christian character—principle and practice. Principle sought with a view to practice, and practice made to conform to

principle.

The Baptist school that emphasizes these things is the place for our young men and women. Believing Columbia College of Lake City to be a Christian school, whose president, Dr. A. P. Montague, is a man of raré Christian virtues and whose faculty are all Christian men and women, and all are members of the Baptist Church and that God's word, which is a "Lamp unto our feet and a light unto our pathway," is taught by precept and example to be the most important thing in the development of Christian character, therefore we most earnestly recommend that we Baptsts do give to Columbia College, our College, our most hearty co-operation and that we send our children there for training and culture for service in life's great work.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ALACHUA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This body shall be dominated the Alachua Baptist

Association.

Art. 2. It shall be composed of such churches as hold the doctrine of human depravity, the atonement of Christ, election of eternal life, regeneration and perseverance of the saints, baptism by immersion of the persion in water, administered to none except professed believers, and the Lord's Supper intended for those only who have been regularly admitted in the visible church.

Art. 3 We take the only living and true God, in three persons,

Father, Son and Holy Ghost to be one God,

Art. 4. We take the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the only rule of faith and practice, both in the concerns of religion and the general of life, and particularly for transacting

the affairs of our churches.

Art. 5. We take Jesus Christ to be the great head of the Church, and the only one given; that the government under Him is with the Body, and is the privilege of each individual member; that spiritual discipline, with an eye single to the glory of God, must greatly conduce to the final prosperity and union of the churches.

Art. 6. In view of the increase of fraternal love, knowledge, usefulness, and efficiency which must accrue from an association of churches, in cordial union upon the principles or the gospel, we have sought to be united, that by individual and collective action we may best subserve the great objects of the Redeemer's kingdom. And the concurrence of two-thirds vote of the body will dissolve the connection.

Art. 7. This association shall have power to withdraw its connection from any church which shall act contrary to the teach-

ings of the Holy Scriptures.

Art. 8. New churches wishing to be admitted into this body shall petition by letters and messengers, and upon examination, if found orthodox and orderly, shall be admitted by receiving the right hand of fellowship of the Moderator.

Art. 9. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional for each twenty-five members, one fractional part

thereof, in excess of fifty.

Art. 10. Every query sent to the association by any church in its union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated, and if there shall be a majority in favor it shall be taken up and debated, but if not, it shall be withdrawn; provided, always, that those be first considered which effect the union of the churches.

Art. 11. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the association, unless withdrawn by the mov-

er.

Art. 12. Every member who speaks shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while he

is speaking unless he depart from the subject.

Art. 13. No person shall speak more than three times upon one subject without permission from the body. The constitution of this body may be altered or amended by the concurrence of two-thirds of its members.

Art. 14. No person shall absent himself from the association

without leave of the Moderator.

Art. 15. It shall be the first business of this Association to provide for the general union of churches; second, to provide for the destitution of the churches and districts by missionary aid; third, to keep up a correspondence with other associations of like faith and order, that a chain of communicaton may be preserved among the churches; fourthly, to give the churches the best advice they can in matters of difficulty, and if communication should be broken between any of the sister churches, to inquire into the cause, and the best means to remove the difficulty; but if the breach cannot be healed, to withdraw from such church or churches as walk disorderly, until they may be reclaimed; and, fifthly, to regulate all matters pertaining to its business, to provide for printing its minutes, and appoint the time and place of its next meeting.

BY-LAWS.

1. The officers of this body shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer.

2. The Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary shall be chosen by ballot at each session of the association. and shall remain in office until their successors are elected.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the meetings of the association, and the duty of the Clerk to keep record of the proceedings and prepare the minutes for the press. 4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to con-

duct the correspondence of the association, and make a report of the same at each regular meeting of the body. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep all the funds of the association, subject to the order of the Executive Committee.

5. There shall be an Executive Committee appointed at each meeting of this association, of five brethren, whose duty it shall be to supervise and conduct all matters pertaining to this associa-

tion during the year.

6. Churches wishing to dissolve connection with this body must submit their reasons during its session.

7. It shall be required of the Executive Committee to hold a meeting for business at each session of the association, before its adjournment.
