The next session of the Association will be held with the Center Hill Baptist Church, Center Hill, Fla., on Tuesday and Wednesday before the Second Sunday in October, 1921.

Introductory Sermon preached by Bro. G. A. Martin

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CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be denominated the Alachua Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. It shall be composed of such churches as hold the doctrines of human depravity, the atonement of Christ, election to eternal life, regeneration and perseverance of the saints, baptism by immersion of the person in water, administered to none but professional believers, and the Lord's Supper intended for those only who have been regularly admitted into the visible church.

ARTICLE 3. We take the only living and true God, in three persons, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, to be one God.

ARTICLE 4. We take the scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the only rule of faith and practice, both in the concerns of religion and general affairs of life, and particularly for transacting the affairs of our church.

ARTICLE 5. We take the Church of Christ to be a congregation of faithful persons who lie in fellowship, and have given themselves to the Lord and to one another in cordial agreement to observe holy discipline, in conformity with the requirements of the Scriptures.

ARTICLE 6. We take Jesus Christ to be the Great Head of the church, and the only one given; the government under Him is with the body, and is the privilege of each individual member; that spiritual discipline, with an eye to the glory of God, must greatly conduce to the final prosperity and union of the churches.

ARTICLE 7. In view of the increase of fraternal love, knowledge, usefulness and efficiency, which must accrue from an association of churches in cordial union upon the principles of the Gospel, we have sought to be thus united, that by individual and collective action we may best subserve the great objects of the Redeemer's kingdom. And the concurrence of two-thirds will dissolve the connection.

ARTICLE 8. This association shall have the power to withdraw its connection from any church which shall act contrary to the teaching of the Holy Scriptures.

ARTICLE 9. New churches wishing to be admitted into this body shall petition by letters and messengers, and upon examination, if found orthodox and orderly, shall be admitted by receiving the right hand of fellowship of the moderator.

ARTICLE 10. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers,

and one additional for each twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, in excess of fifty.

ARTICLE 11. Every query sent to the association by any church in its union shall be read and put to vote by the moderator, whether it shall be debated, and if there shall be a majority in favor, it shall be taken up and debated, but if not, it shall be withdrawn; provided, always, that those be first considered which affect the union of the churches.

ARTICLE 12. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the association, unless withdrawn by the mover.

ARTICLE 13. Every member who speaks shall rise from his seat and address the moderator, and shall not be interrupted while he is speaking unless he depart from the subject.

ARTICLE 14. No person shall speak more than three times upon one subject, without permission of the body. The constitution of this body may be altered or amended by the concurrence of two-thirds of its members.

ARTICLE 15. No member shall absent himself from the association without leave of the moderator.

ARTICLE 16. It shall be the first business of this association to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to provide for the destitution of the churches and districts by missionary aid; third, to keep up a correspondence with other associations of like faith and order, that a chain of communication may be preserved among the churches; fourthly, to give the churches the best advice they can in matters of difficulty, and if communication should be broken between any of the sister churches, to inquire into the cause, and use the best means to remove the difficulty; but if the breach cannot be healed, to withdraw from such church or churches as walk disorderly, until they are reclaimed; and, fifthly, to regulate all matters pertaining to its business, to provide for printing the minutes, and appoint the time and place of the next meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. The officers of this body shall be a moderator, clerk, corresponding secretary and treasurer.

2. The moderator, clerk, treasurer and corresponding secretary shall be chosen by ballot at each session of the association, and remain in office until their successors are elected.

3. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over the

meetings of the association, and the duty of the clerk to keep the record of the proceedings and prepare a minute for the press.

4. It shall be the duty of the corresponding secretary to conduct the correspondence of the association, and make a report of the same at each regular meeting of the body. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep all the funds of the association, subject to the orders of the executive committee.

5. There shall be an executive committee consisting of the officers of the association with two members appointed by the association at each meeting of the association, whose duty it shall be to supervise and conduct all matters pertaining to this association during the year.

6. Churches wishing to dissolve connection with this body must submit their reasons during its session.

7. It shall be required of the executive committee to hold a meeting for business at each session of the association, before its adjournment.

Report was adopted as read.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

When the Home Mission Board was organized in 1845 its work seemed very simple but from the very beginning of this organized body progress has been its theme, and this organized body not separate or out of harmony of the Southern Baptist Convention, it is only one of the strong spokes in the wheel of this great and well organized Southern Baptist Convention.

Through the Home Mission Board a foundation of our strength and greatness in the newer states were laid, and thousands of our Baptist churches in the South owe their existence to the agency of the Home Board of Missions. Its missions have been greatly felt in our city churches as well as our country sides and smaller growing towns of the new and rapidly growing territory of the Mississippi valley and states beyond the river.

And in the early history of Baptist work in many of the Western states the Home Mission Board supplied the greater part of money in cooperative missions, in some instances four and five dollars were given by the Home Board for every dollar contributed by the State Board, under these conditions the Home Board gave in initiative in the employment and directing of the workers of the various State Boards, for the more effective supervision and directions of the work.

Showing the importance of this work the Home Mission Board in the last five years has spent more than \$749,000 in cooperative missions alone the results have been marvelous, and we must continue to prosecute this department of work with all possible vigor.

In cooperation with the various State Boards during the last year the Home Board reported 1,384 missionaries who supplied 7,983 churches and mission stations, and delivered 150,614 sermons and addresses, conducted 19,641 prayer meetings, made 443,165 religious visits, baptized 25,532 converts, received 50,307 additions to the churches, organized 252 churches, and 823 Sunday Schools, distributed

4,664,979 pages of tracts for which the various State Boards contributed \$549,684 and the Home Board contributed \$239,930.

This constitutes a marvel of efficiency in missionary work, for which we are profoundly grateful to God.

It would be easy to fill a volume with a brief record of the great results of evangelism through our Home Mission Board, but we appeal strongly to all the churches of the Alachua Association to make special efforts in paying the \$75,000,000 Campaign pledges and enlisting new members in this great and glorious work, this would strengthen all of our boards and give our work more efficiency.

know the Orphanage is out of debt and doing well.

There has been added a department of work to help children that cannot be taken in the home and are in need of fatherly protection.

We suggest that when we get home we do our utmost to collect every dollar that our church subscribed to the 75 Million Campaign. Solicit each member that has joined the church since our subscriptions were taken and with all subscriptions collected our orphanage will be cared for.

After song service, and prayer by Bro. Mahoney, the Association adjourned to meet at 9:30 a. m., Wednesday.

At this hour Bro. Kazee delivered the introductory sermon, Subject, "Adorning the Gospel." Scripture lesson, Ezekiel 16:10-14. Text, Titus 2:10.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

It has been said that "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world." To a great extent we know this is true. If the mothers are selfish, worldly and unchristian, under what kind of rule will the world soon find itself? It is the desire and aim of the Woman's Missionary Union to christianize, teach and train the womankind of our churches, and, through them, to reach the women and children of the world. Our graded W. M. U. is exactly suited to this work. We have the Sunbeam Band for the children up to twelve years of age, the Girls' Auxiliary for the girls of thirteen to sixteen, the Young Woman's Auxiliary for the young women, and the W. M. S. for the mature women, with literature, programs and study courses prepared for each grade. Our work has made a marvelous growth. We have now in the Southern Baptist Convention 19,485 organizations. In Florida we have 752 and in our own Association we have nine. It should be the aim of every church to have a full graded Union. Every pastor should urge every woman in his church to become an active worker in this great cause. He should also aid, at least by advice,

each organization to hold at least one Mission Study Class each year. Inspiration will come through information and the two guided by prayer and the Holy Spirit will produce consecration, and thus place us where God can use us to His honor and glory.

Bro Mahoney read report on State Missions. Discussed by Bros. Mahoney, Kazez, Mitchell and Hampton.

Report was adopted as read.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

It is a well known fact that scarcely needs to be repeated, that a building to be of any permanent value, must have a good solid foundation. Now, what that foundation is to a building, State Missions is to all our great denominational structure. It is from our Jerusalem of State Missions that we reach out in all our other agencies to the uttermost parts of the earth. If we are weak at this point, we are weak at all points. Jerusalem first, here is our foundation, our starting point. State Missions is the root from which all other branches spring. According to the health of our State Mis-

sion root, so will be found the fruit on the branches of our great denominational tree.

Florida as a State is growing. For the past ten years Florida has exceeded any other State east of the Rocky Mountains, excepting Michigan in population; and for the last twenty years any State east of the Rocky Mountains, except Oklahoma. In 1900, Florida had a population of about 600,000, today Florida has about a million.

In 1900 there were about 26,482 white Baptists in Florida. The report for 1920 gives us 64,860. Including the colored Baptists, Florida has 134,429 Baptists. This gives us nearly 20,000 more than the Methodists of Florida.

Today you can take all the Methodists, all the Presbyterians, all the Congregationalists, all the Second and Seventh Day Advents, all the Mormons, and all the Unitarians of Florida, and put them all together, and the Baptists outnumber them by 1.733. There are 24,650 Roman Catholics in Florida. The Baptists outnumber them five and a half times. There are 10,399 Episcopalians in Florida. Florida Baptists outnumber them nearly thirteen times.

If the State of Florida is increasing its population, we are glad to be able to state that the Baptists of Florida are also increasing.

Last year we had 740 churches in Florida. Of these, about 125 are pastorless.

Last year 569 churches contributed to Missions, but only 500 made pledges on the 75 Million Campaign. Some of these are not even meeting their pledges as regularly as they should. Yet, it is a source of great pride to the Baptists of Florida that while only 500 out of the 740 churches made pledges to the campaign, the Baptists of Florida raised \$225,000 last year. At this rate these five hundred churches would be raising \$125,000 in the five years over and above our quota, which is one million dollars for the five years. And yet, we still have left 240 Baptist churches in Florida that are not contributing to the 75 Million Campaign.

As Baptists in Florida we have some very serious problems to face during the next few years, and only the most loyal support to the 75 Million Campaign can bring about a victory over these problems that will be pleasing to our Master. Let me just here mention but a few of them:

First, is the problem of the unsaved in our State. On good authority we are told that about half of the population of Florida are unsaved. This certainly ought to set us thinking, and especially to praying, and to doing something definite for the salvation of those who are within our gates. Just think of it, five hundred thousand souls that we rub elbows with every day within our beautiful State

of fruits and flowers, and perpetual sunshine; a State of churches, and open Bibles, and Gospel preachers, schools and colleges. Yes, a half million souls living under a flag that has never known defeat, without God, without Christ, and without hope in the world. Yes, lost, lost, going down to an undone eternity, with the voice of Scripture ringing in their ears; "After death cometh the judgment."

Here is our first and greatest State Mission problem. In Luke 19:10 we read: "For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which is lost." And in John 17:18, we have the two missions. "As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world." Christ never lost sight of His mission. Have we lost sight of ours? No, I do not believe we have, for what Florida Baptists have already accomplished during the past few years only goes to prove what we can do, and by the grace of God will do.

The second problem, the homeless churches. We have heard of the Wandering Jew, and of the nation Israel without a country, and we have also read of Noah's dove that could find no place for the sole of its foot. Well, here in Florida we have 89 scripturally organized churches, actually without a home. Just think of what we, as a denomination are doing by not having these 89 churches in homes of their own.

The Third problem, the pastorless churches. Here in Florida we have 125 churches without pastors. 125 flocks without shepherds. 125 Baptist churches subject to the wiles of the evil one. Subject to the visitations of the wolves in sheep's clothing. Yea, a prey to our adversary whose ministers he sends forth as angels of light, these with their German submarine theology creep into these churches not sparing the flock. These while they propose to preach, and teach from the Word of God, deny the Truth, and teach the commands and traditions of men. These pastorless churches, if we are going to be loyal to our trust must be retained, and maintained as Southern Baptist missionary churches. Retard never. Advance ever.

The fourth problem, unfinished church buildings. We are informed that the Baptists of Florida have about one hundred unfinished church buildings. This is a poor advertisement for us as a denomination. I am reminded just here of the words of the Master in Luke 14:28-30, which reads, "For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first and counteth the cost, whether he have sufficient to finish it? Lest haply, after he hath laid the foundation, and is not able to finish it, all that behold it begin to mock him, saying, this man began to build, and was not able to finish." Is this to be our experience before the world in the face of the glorious achieve-

ment in connection with the 75 Million Campaign when the Baptists of Florida went about one-fourth of a million over their quota. Using words of the Apostle Paul, brethren, we are persuaded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation.

Now there are other problems that ought to be mentioned but time forbids us to speak of them now. No doubt you are more or less acquainted with them already.

In closing this report allow me to suggest at least two ways in which we as Baptists may overcome these problems we have been considering.

1. Let every church that has made a pledge to the 75 Million Campaign, make an honorable effort to meet that pledge when due.

2. Let the Executive Committee of the Association with the Deacons, Clerks, and Treasurers of the churches come together at the call of the Moderator of the Association, in order that some plan may be devised whereby every member of every non-contributing church of the Association, may be personally solicited in the interest of the 75 Million Campaign.

State Missions can more than meet these problems confronting us as Florida Baptists if we as Baptists are only true to our pledges in connection with our 75 Million Campaign.

RESOLUTION.

Resolved: That it be the sense of the Alachua Baptist Association: First, That our churches provide better for the work and support of their pastors.

Second, That we encourage the churches to call pastors for an indefinite time rather than for one year.

Third, That our small churches be advised to form suitable groups so that pastors may render better service and thus eliminate a waste of time and money.

Fourth, That the Executive Board of our Association be advised to offer help only to churches that manifest a willingness to carry out the things necessary in our judgment to a successful work for the Lord.

Association adjourned until 1:30.

Wednesday Afternoon.

Association called to order by Moderator Blizard.

After devotional exercises the Association proceeded to take up the regular program.

Bro. Gunn read the report on Laymen's Work.

After discussion by Bros. Gunn, Patten, and Boatwright, report was adopted.

REPORT ON LAYMEN'S WORK.

Your Committee on Laymen's Work submit the following report:

Churches visited and spoken to, eleven: Bushnell, Center Hill, Coleman, Hebron, Oxford, Pedro, Wahoo, Webster, Whitney, Eden, and Arue, Wildwood.

We were cordially received and heard. We spoke on Pastoral Support, the 75 Million Campaign to be paid in weekly and monthly offerings. The last subject spoken on was the Tithe, the great object now before us is tithing. Fruit seen thus far, one church north-east of the Withlacooche River is bearing fruit. The two churches and one visited on Southwest of river are blooming. We ask this Association now in session to appoint a man in Bro. S. D. Martin's place, as Bro. REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Jesus left His home in glory, came into a foreign land, that was alienated from him by its sin, and in open rebellion against his Father found it antagonistic to his thought, action and life. His love was greater than the sin of the world, therefore he endured its trials, and suffered death because of his redeeming love for lost men.

Our great denomination took up the spirit of the Christ, has tried to follow in his footsteps, and make his plan of redemption known to all the world. Others are preaching a fractional gospel, but as Baptists have a whole gospel, we feel under obligation to give it to

the whole world. This stupendous undertaking requires that we Baptists work together to this end. The members in no single church or nation are equal to this great task; therefore, we need universal Baptist cooperation in order that we may succeed in carrying out the imperative demand of our Lord and Master.

Southern, Northern, and European Baptists have tried to assume proportionate responsibility in this work, and the new mission fields of Europe have been divided between them, and Dr. Rushbrooke has been chosen as Baptist Commissioner of Europe, and many great things have already been accomplished and the kingdom advanced among a priest burdened people.

Our equipment and forces have been increased in all other foreign lands and results are coming in ever increasing ratio. Thousands of people are being saved, many have become self-supporting and some are sending out missionaries. The per capita contributions in our foreign churches run all the way from \$1.38 to \$10.19.

Southern Baptists have undertaken to give the gospel to 200,000,000 black people, 475,000,000 yellow people, 4,000,000 brown people, and 225,000,000 white people, a total of 904,000,000 people, or about nine times as many as now live in the U. S. A.

God's redemptive purpose is world-wide in its scope, his power universal in its sweep, the sacrifice of Christ all inclusive in its efficiency; therefore, only two things are lacking in fulfilling the command. First, we need many more people who will fall in line with Isaiah and say, "Here am I, send me." The Macedonian cry, "Come over and help us," has never ceased. Second, the consecration of ample means to send those who are willing to go. The Lord has a plan for gathering sufficient means. If we would pay the tithe, and then make a freewill offering we could send all that are ready to go. Let us pray for the Lord to send more laborers into the field, and that He may help his own to be honest with him in their payments of the tithe, and to give his people the grace to make an offering to Him and for His work.

The mighty tide of Baptist influence and power is swiftly rising, the low black cloud of Papal supremacy is being driven away by the high noon sunlight of gospel truth and freedom, people are coming out of their bondage, and lining up with the Baptist heralds of religious liberty that is destined to overthrow completely all religious despotism.

Our Board system, while many mistakes may be made in various ways, is capable of handling all the money and men that we can furnish, and do it with far less mistakes than any other plan that can be adopted. It has been tried out for many years, and has proven to be the best cooperative agency for our churches that can be found.

The king said, "Ramoth in Gilead is ours and we take it not." We Baptists can as truly say the world is ours and we take it not. Let us arise with our God given might, with our men and our money, and take the world for the Baptists and our Lord.

It is encouraging to note that this Association reporting 23 churches last year only two reported no Sunday Schools. Facts that we face reveal our maganimous task. In the State we have 740 churches, while there are only about 500 Sunday Schools. Facts that we face reveal our tremendous task. of the Southern Baptist Convention with a constituency of 3,199,005 reporting 20,420 Sunday Schools with 1,996,610 members. With these truths facing us we may see our opportunity for enlistment in this particular department of our work. Therefore, we earnestly entreat all of our churches and members to make the Sunday School a subject of prayer and perseverance in our Lord's cause.
