OUR CONSTITUTION

1. This body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association.
2. It shall be composed of Churches generally recognized as Missionary Baptist Churches.
3. It's session, (Legislative, Administrative, Promotional and Fellowship) shall be of regularly elected representatives of the churches composing its membership and other members of said churches who may be present and who may be accepted by the elected members on the basis of two Messengers from each church, and one additional for each twenty-five members or major fractional part thereof, in excess of fifty.
4. The officers shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, BTU, SS, WMU Directors and resident Pastors of the Association, elected annually by the vote of the Messengers.
5. The Executive Committee shall be the above named officers.
6. The Moderator shall preside over the session, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly presented and perform such other duties as are usual to such officer. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the body in session, have the same printed and distributed to the churches according to the funds provided and as the body may direct. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all monies received; pay out upon the instruction of the body and make an itemized report of same to the Association at annual session.
7. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the work fostered by the Association. It shall meet quarterly and plan for the promotion of various interests of the organized work, using its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activity of the churches, and shall make report of its work to the Association in its annual session.
8. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the body; or when necessity arises, by the Executive Committee.
9. Churches may be admitted to membership in this Association by representatives bearing a petitionary letter with statistical data; provided they are found to be orthodox by a committee appointed by the Moderator. Upon a favorable vote of the body, the Moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship on behalf of the Association.
10. The Association shall have the right and the power to withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership, upon grounds which it may deem justifiable.
11. Any Church shall the right to withdraw from the Association upon due notice to the Body.
12. Any Church failing to report to the Association, neither sending representatives or letter, twice in succession, shall be dropped from the roll of active members and put on a list of "inactive churches."
13. This Constitution may be altered, or amended by a two-thirds vote of the body in session.

THURSDAY NIGHT SESSION

The Ninety-fifth Session of the Alachua Baptist Association met with the Linden Baptist Church November 13, 14, and 15, 1941.

The Session was called to order by Bro. B. T. Lamb, Associational Supt. of S. S. On account of our Moderator Rev. Ray Smith's absence who was very ill in the hospital. After a song by the Linden Choir and devotional by Rev. E. M. Freer, Pastor, Rev. J. C. Boatwright was elected to serve pro tem in the absence of our Moderator.

Rev. Freer next gave a short address of welcome and the Moderator pro tem asked that each head bow in silent prayer for the Moderator Rev. Ray Smith.

Resume of Associational letters from the churches were next read by Rev. Bob Catledge and Rev. E. M. Freer. Motion being made and carried that messengers and members present constitute the Alachua Association.

Program Adopted

The program arranged by the program committee was adopted subject to such changes as might be needed during the session. "Some needs of our Association and how to obtain them," was introduced by Rev. J. C. Boatwright. It was brought out by Bro. Lamb that we give through publicity of our state paper "The Witness" suggestive methods and ways of doing certain things, in getting acquainted with each other etc. This was further discussed by Rev. J. M. Lewis. He called attention of laxity of church members, making an appeal to each member to attend the services of the church more regularly, giving as his motto, "Speak to the Lord first thing in the morning by reading a portion of Scripture from the Sacred Book." He further ask that we all pray for our church more.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

The Session opened with a congregational hymn, "Amazing Grace," and Rev. Bob Catledge led the devotional.

Reception of unread letters together with other delegates, and visitors recognized.

COMMITTEES APPOINTED

Reading and appointment of the three following committees were next disposed of:

Nominating committee: Rev. Bob Catledge, Bushnell; Rev. J. M. Lewis, Dade City; Mrs. Dr. Cherry, Center Hill; Mr. H. S. Davis, Inverness; Rev. J. S. Casteel, Oxford.

Memorial committee: Rev. J. T. Barbee, Dade City; Rev. E. H. Freer, Dade City; Mrs. J. L. Took; Mrs. B. T. Lamb, Brooksville; Mrs. J. H. Hughes, Bushnell; Mrs. G. W. Scofield, Inverness.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Supt. Johns of the Children's Home was recognized and given an opportunity to speak in behalf of the Home. His report of the Home was most gratifying to the Baptist people, reporting that some \$24,000 had been collected during the year. He further stated that \$75,000 had been accumulated for Trust Funds.

Arrangements were made for the Thanksgiving Offering to the Children's Home. Bro. Johns agreed to furnish each church a list of the names of the children and in return every boy and girl in the Association would have a chance to send presents to his little friend at the Home. As Mrs. D. G. Stultz is chairman of this committee and Thanksgiving comes on the Twenty-seventh of November it was moved and seconded that all donations be sent to Crum's Feed and Seed Store in Bushnell on the 24th to be picked up by truck from Arcadia on Tuesday and carried to the Home.

STATE MISSIONS

The Report of State Missions was ably rendered by Frank Morris of Inverness. The program for State Missions for the last year has been one of the best in the history of Florida Baptist. The outlook for the future is most encouraging.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Following this report, the Cooperative Program report was next given by Rev. Bob Catledge. This is a systematic plan of work developed by Southern Baptist, promoting and supporting in a more effective way all the causes fostered by them. The pastors and their helpers are expected to keep before their people the year round the claims of all agencies. We recommend the Every Member Canvass and the Cooperative Program as the best methods of supporting every phase of Southern Baptist work.

DR. C. H. BOLTON SPEAKS

Dr. C. H. Bolton our State Secretary next spoke of "The Program of My Lord" which was most inspiring, giving every one who heard it a broader vision of their duties and work along the Kingdom Affairs.

Rev. J. S. Casteel of the Oxford Church preached the Evangelistic message of "Soul Winning," which was very inspiring.

Lunch was next served by the Linden Church

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Friday afternoon Session was opened at 2:00 o'clock with a song service led by Rev. E. M. Freer, followed by prayer by Rev. H. J. Killebrew of Eden Church.

DR. J. HARRISON GRIFFIN SPEAKS

State Brotherhood was next presented very forceably by Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, our State Supt. of the Brotherhood.

He emphasized the fact and necessity of men to lay hold of the promises of God, and be strong and active in the work of the church. A few key men who know the Lord could work wonders in Kingdom Affairs. He said the churches of today are in desperate need of Teacher-ability that's found in men power. We are in need of men who know how to pray and get through to God. He urged that men get behind the Church Program. Rev. J. M. Lewis of Dade City offered his services to any church or pastor in the Brotherhood Movement.

DR. E. D. SOLOMON—"WITNESS"

Religious Literature was next brought by Dr. E. D. Solomon, Editor of the Baptist Witness. He urged that each church put the Witness in the Church Budget same as our Sunday School literature. At this time Dr. Bolton presented the Pastor's Retirement Plan, urging how necessary it is for every minister to become a member of this worthy cause.

HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

Mrs. W. M. O'Dell next gave the report of the Hundred Thousand Club. The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club is going stronger than ever. More money has come through the Club this year than any previous year since the Club started. It has paid a total of approximately \$1,400,000 of the principal of our Southwide

debts. It has stopped enough annual interest to pay the salaries of ninety-five foreign missionaries.

We recommend that the Hundred Thousand Club for a debtless denomination be kept constantly before the people, that members be urged to keep up their dues, that new members be enrolled and every effort to be made to hasten the day of a debtless denomination.

TEMPERANCE REPORT GIVEN

Motion was made and carried that the Temperance report be made by Rev. Bob Catledge. He reported that there were more saloons in the Alachua Association than all churches of all denominations combined. He further reports that seventy percent of all beverages are consumed by our young people. The saloons take in more on Saturday night than most churches per month. There has been an increase of three hundred sixty-five percent increase in arrests since liquor has been legalized.

HOSPITAL REPORT MADE

Mrs. J. H. Hughes next gave the Report of Hospitals. The Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans has paid all operating expenses during the year including \$74,267.90 for charity work, all bonds which matured and interest, and \$164,000 from current revenues was paid on new construction. During the year 15,122 patients were cared for. There are twenty other Baptist hospitals in the territory of the Convention. In all those hospitals last year there were 79,004 patients of whom 18,586 were charity patients, costing \$900,978. Value of hospital property \$14,279,730.

OFFICERS ELECTED

Next in motion was the election of officers for the ensuing year. It was moved and carried that the Association re-elect all the present officers, except Rev. J. T. Rawling who is not a member of the Association. Rev. E. M. Freer was elected in his stead. Rev. E. C. Tyner moved and it was carried that Rev. J. C. Boatwright be elected as vice-Moderator, and Rev. Bob Catledge as Treasurer.

FRIDAY NIGHT SESSION

O. K. RADFORD—TRAINING UNION

This Session was called to order by the Moderator and after singing of several hymns, and prayer by Bro. B. T. Lamb, the meeting was given to Mr. O. K. Radford who is State Director of all Baptist Training Unions. He stressed the importance of each

church electing mature people for the directors of Training Unions. He used as his subject, "Seeing Things Through." He says that every member in the church is eligible to become a member of the Training Union and that it is not confined to young people only. Training Union development and growth comes through prayer, practice and by doing. He says that thirty-five percent of the membership of the Baptist Churches are doing all the work.

ASSOCIATIONAL S. S. SUPT. REPORTS

The Sunday School report was next rendered by Supt. B. T. Lamb. He reports that the Alachua Association held twelve monthly meetings during the year. In February one day conference with workers from Nashville, which proved very helpful. Through the aid of Dr. Willian and contributions of some of our S. S. we were able to have a full time worker Miss Evelyn Doyle of Tallahassee for three months this summer in Vacation Bible Schools. He urged that each church begin sending their contributions each month to the Associational Treasurer so that by summer of next year we will have money in hand to employ a field worker for the entire summer

DR. W. W. WILLIAN—SUNDAY SCHOOL

Dr. W. W. Willian was next given to present the report on Sunday Schools. In the Reports or Letters sent up to the Association he found only fifty-seven reported baptisms. Comparing with the total membership of the Association he finds that it took thirty-six members to convert one unsaved person. "Somebody is lying down on the job," he said.

He based as reason for Sunday School from Deut.: "Gather the people together and the strangers within their gates. He gave ten points as success of a good Sunday School. Owned and controlled by the church; every member of the church enlisted; possibilities all unsaved persons; go after them; proper organization; proper kind of lesson helps; pupils should attend preaching service; strictly evangelistic; trained workers; one training class every year.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

The Saturday morning session was opened by song and prayer by the pastor of the Linden Church, Rev. E. M. Freer, after which the Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. J. C. Boatwright.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

First on report was reading of the Report on Foreign Missions by Rev. Bob Catledge. The report consisted of a general resume of the work being carried on by this department.

Quarterly Meetings

Mrs. J. L. Green next recommended that the Executive Committee of the Alachua Association of W. M. S. recommend that the Executive Committee and all pastors of Association meet together at Dade Park on first Friday of each quarter at eleven o'clock A. M. for covered dish luncheon and business session.

Visitors Recognized

Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Barbee of Dade City, who belongs to the Association and is now pastor of Indian Hill Church, together with some visitors from other Associations were introduced to the delegation. The visitors were Rev. G. A. Beavers of Pasco Association, Rev. E. C. Vining of Tampa Bay; and W. G. Brayant of Lachcoochee.

Telegram to Rev. Ray Smith

It was moved and carried that a telegram from this Association together with a contribution be designated to Bro. Ray Smith who is now ill in the hospital. Collection amounted to \$9.56
