OUR CONSTITUTION

- 1. This Body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association.
- 2. It shall be composed of churches generally recognized as Missionary Baptist Churches.
- 3. Its session (Legislative, Administrative, Promotional and Fellowship,) shall be regularly elected representatives of the churches who may be present and who may be accepted by the elected members on the basis of two messengers from each church, and one additional for each twenty-five members or major fraction thereof, in excess of fifty.
- 4. The Officers of the Association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer. Also the Presidents of the Sunday School, W. M., S. B. T. U. and Brotherhood.
- 5. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be the above-named oficers, together with all resident pastors in the Association.
- 6. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions, keep order, take a vote on all questions properly presented and perform such other duties as are usual to such officer. The Clerk shall keep record of the proceedings of the body in session, have the same printed and distributed to the churches according to the funds provided and as the body may direct. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all monies received: pay jut upon the instruction of the body and make an itemized report of some to the Association at annual session.
- 7. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the work fostered by the Association. It shall meet quarterly and plan for the promotion of various interests of the organized work, using its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activity of the churches, and shall make report of its work to the Association at its anual session.
- 8. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the body, or when necessity

arises, by the Executive Committee.

9. Churches may be admitted to membership in this Association by representatives bearing a petitionary letter with statistical data; provided they are found to be orthodox by a committee appointed by the Moderator. Upon a favorable vote of the body, the Moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship on behalf of the Association.

10. The Association shall have the right and the power to withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership, upon grounds which it may deem justifiable.

11. Any church shall have the right to withdraw from the

Association upon due notice to the body.

12. Any church failing to report to the Association, neither sending representatives nor letter, twice in succession, shall be dropped from the roll of active members and put on a list of "inactive churches."

13. This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the body session.

We suggest that each Church contribute at least 50 cents per resident member during the year and our goal will be realized.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN MUSIC

The music department and program of any church is an opportunity for service to every agency, unit, and auxiliary of church life. Music speaks to all in a language that all understand. Music has the power to teach souls gentleness and peace and to lead them onward to heroic deeds. Music can comfort the lonely and harmonize the discord of the multitudes. Music has a vital part in the ministries of revelation, regeneration, reconciliation, revival, and rejoicing.

The primary mission of the church choir is to sing for the glory of God the songs of praise, adoration, devotion, consecration, and prayer. The choir should sing real messages for the hearts of all who hear, presenting the gospel in all its truth, beauty, and power. The choir has a responsibility in keeping the congregation spiritual and reverent and in generating growing interest in music as a means of worship and testimony.

Several types of choirs are being used among Baptists. Some are made up of men and boys, others of girls and women, some are mixed, some are at various age-group levels, and others arrange their singers in ensembles. Most churches can have two choirs, one for young people and adults, another for children. Churches having a departmentized Sunday School or any other age-group organization should organize a choir at each age-group levels. Many churches are using the rhythm band or toy symphony for children under eight years of age. However, the cherub choir is the name applied to primary ages and below. The carol choir is for juniors, the concord choir for intermediates, and the chapel choir for young people. The church choir is composed largely of adults but may include fully developed people.

Some churches can have an orchestra, conduct music classes, using the books of the church music training course, provide song sermons, stimulate interest through festivals and com-

petition, and maintain a progressive program. When the music forces are organized, they can consider having some of the suggested officers, president, one to four vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a treasurer, a librarian, a historian, a parliamentarian, a wardrobe mistress, section chairmen, and group captains. Each church may elect a music committee, and a music director, organize a department of music education, emphasize congregational singing, build for the music education program, and provide an adequate music budget.

The church music departments of the Sunday School Board in Nashville and of the Baptists of Florida are urging each association in the state to have a church music organization wth a director, a pianist or instrumentalist, an Associational music education committee, a music education program within the association, publicity wthn the association, and summer music schools. Associational hymn sings are advocated for quarterly experiences of joyous fellowship among Baptist people.

It is hoped that the Alachua Association will elect a new director of music, an accompanist, and a chairman of music education. It is suggested that the church directors and heads of music in the churches met as soon as possible and make plans for hymn sings and adequate and elevating ministries in Christian music.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Through the Department of Christian Education we have kept before our people throughout the year special feature articles on many phases of Christian training and work. Stetson Sunday was observed with most of the pastors bringing Stetson to the attention of their people. The School of the Prophets of Deland and West Florida was well attended with splendid teachers and preachers. We have never had so many preachers and leaders interested and cooperating in the vast program of Christian Education. With strong preaching, teaching, reflecting through example and conduct the high principles of Christian training, something is bound to happen. As a result more sons and daughters of Baptist families are coming to Stetson. This is as it should be.

This has been a good year for the Florida Baptist Foundation. The Baptist Witness has carried many articles and special messages on the varied service of the Foundation. A series of strong articles appeared in the Witness during April, "Make Your Will Month." Pastors presented the work of the Foundation. Brochures, tracts and letters were mailed to all pastors, church leaders, prospective givers, Baptist lawyers and friends. There has been a sustained program of publicity. The Foundation has been presented to every Association of the

state with a warm response.

Many friends are being added to the Florida Baptist Foundation. Fifteen wills have been drawn, others pending. It is hard to estimate the value of these wills. Some are quite large while others are small. In the sights of God the small will may be the large will. Put God's will in your will.

REPORT OF ALACHUA W. M. U. ASSOCIATION

The Alachua Woman's Missionary Union Association has again enjoyed a year of growth, a greater knowledge of missions, State, Home and Foreign. Good fellowship manifested among the women, thus saying we have surely grown spiritually.

Executive committee meetings have been held quarterly, and well attended, our meeting place being Bushnell. Quarterly general meetings for the associational W. M. U. were held at Floral City, Sumterville, and Center Hill and Oxford.

One new society was organized during the year, Gulf Ridge

Park, the newest church in our association.

In November Mrs. J. C. Graham, Mission Study Chairman put on a Mission Study Institute, thereby teaching teachers to teach the suggested books in the Foreign Missions Study, which was well attended and greatly helped the mission study of each local W. M. S.

The State, Home and Foreign Missions season of prayer was observed through-out the association.

We have a total membership of 296, 16 societies, 74 engaged in definite soul winning, 151 tithers, 13 mission study classes, with 211 members participating.

At our Floral City meeting we had as guest speaker Miss Elizabeth Province, our state young peoples leaders, who spoke to us on "What Is That In Thine Hand?" Mrs. Gus Schultz, distric superintendent No. 1 presided over the program.

The spring meeting at Sumterville was executed by Mrs. W. T. Lamb Sr. the district superintendent of group 3. There, we had a stewardship program, compiled for us by Mrs. Waldo Wood.

At our Young Peoples Rally which convened at Center Hill, Mrs. John Lackey presented the program using the youth of, our association, Miss Lila Watson, Missionary to China was guest speaker.

Our annual meeting at Oxford was well attended. Our own women made up the program which consisted of the installation of officers. Rev. O. G. Hall moderator of the Alachua Association was the installing officer; this proved to be most inspiring and uplifting.

Mrs. Egan Jones and Mrs. W. M. O'Dell Sr., Stewardship chmn., attended the three day session of the state leaders conference at Daytona Beach.

For many months the women had planned to send a young woman to Ridgecrest during Y. W. A. week. O June 12, Miss Betty Watson from Wildwood church attended a six day session at Ridgecrest, expenses all paid by the Associational W. M. U. Miss Watson says she was glorious blessed, physically, mentally and spiritually for having gone. It was a good investment.

Each W. M. S. was assigned an apportionment to give to the Children's Home, most of these were met. 1,764 coupons were sent in, and 2 quilts from our association. This was under the leadership of Mrs. J. H. Hughes, Bushnell.

For the first time in many years we had a Margaret Fund student at Zellwood; we sent to this young man \$12.33 in cash and \$16.53 in clothing each society giving burey gift of \$1.00 to Margaret Fund. This under the leadership of Mrs. W. E. Crum, chmn.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

State Missions creates a healthy, vigorous atmosphere for Christian work. It keeps us believing in world mission by contantly revealing what missions can do at home.

A well-balanced state mission program has several wholesome effects.

(1) It puts a responsible promotional force close to the people.

(2) It gives the people mission objects close to home where they can see.

(3) It keeps the neighboring churches in touch with each other in a work that is important.

(4) It makes a small, workable group, the state convention, responsible for expansion—more churches, more converts, more tithing Christians and more missionary support."

Every phase of our work here in Florida is a part of State Missions. The various workers in all our departments are all State Missionaries. Yes, Sunday school, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, etc., are State Missions.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Last year home missionaries reported 36,290 professions of faith in response to their 99,033 sermons. The evangelistic crusade in the southeastern states led by the Department of Evan gelism of the Home Mission Board resulted in the greatest number of bantisms ever reported in the churches in the area. This consummated the first phase of evangelistic crusades by divisions of west and east. In 1952 evangelism has turned toward smaller units for crusades by districts and associations

Some statewide crusades were held in the spring of 1952.

A total of 1,170 missionaries (including 305 students) served the Home Mission Board last year. The Board has work among the Chinese, the deaf, French, Indians, Italians, Japanese, Spanish-speaking, and the service of Good Will Centers, Rescue Homes, and the Emergency Home in the field of direct mission. In other departments the Board has ministry among the Jews, the Negroes, ranchers, and migrants, Through the Department of Co-operative Missions the Board serves in mountain missions, the rural church program, and city missions. Through its Departments of Evangelism, Education, Schools of Missions, and the Outposts various types of service are rendered in many avenues, while ten general field workers spread their services over the whole Convention territory. The Chaplains Commission, the Board's radio ministry, and its Church Building Land Fund all minister to the spiritual needs of our people.

We recommend that the churches consider the budget plan of subscribing for the magazine, Southern Bapist Home Missions, and send it to all church families.

We further recommend full co-operation with the Convention plans for enlisting unaffiliated Baptists.

We recommed also that in 1953 we join with the Home Missions Board in its Five-Year Crusade emphases upon mnistering to minority groups.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Advance Program goal set in 1948 is 1,759 foreign missionaries and an annual budget of \$10,000,000. Southern Baptists had 625 missionaries on the foreign field ad a budget of \$3,782,800 at the beginning of 1948. At the beginning of 1952 we had 832 foreign missionaries and a budget of \$5,180,000.

Durig the year 1951 the foreign mission fields reported a membership of 189,225 in 1,913 organized churches. Missionaries also worked with 3,668 outstations, 22 medical units 405 schools, five publication house, three orphanages, and seven good will centers. Among the results were 18,372 baptisms, 49,271 enrolled in schools, 6,865,372 pieces of literature published, 99 orphan children cared for, and 1,766 people contacted in the good will centers.

Southern Baptists are keeping up with foreign mission advance through The Commission, their foreign missions journal. It is recognized increasingly as an indispensable and in being well informed about all of our overseas work.

The 1951 foreign mission receipts from the Co-operative Program totaled \$6,900,000. The Lottie Moon offering totaled \$2,668,051.30.

REPORT OF THE ALACHUA BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

The Association had 12 regular meetings during the year with an average attendance of 152 plus per meeting. The largest number in atendance was with the Wildwood church when the children from the Baptist Childrens Home of Lakeland were present at which meeting a special offering was taken at the meeting for the Home which was just short of \$200.00 this was turned over to Bro. Johns of the Home

The Association was divided into four groups as follows at the beginning of the year namely North Sumter, South Sumter, Citrus and Hernando. Each group with a group Superintendent whose duty is promotion in the churches in his group. There was a goal set at the beginning of the year for 800 awards which was broken down to reach 200 per group. You will note that only one group reached its goal that being the Hernando group. We congratulate Bro. Steed and his group for a job well done. Each church in that participated in reaching the goal. This was the only group that had training in all of the churches each of the other three groups had at least one church without training.

The training banquet which was held in Webster, Dec. 4th was the larest we have ever had. This banquet was attended by 148 people including our Secty., of the Sunday School Department of Florida, Bro. C. F. Barry, and Bro. J. N. Barnett of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board from Nashville. Bro. Barnett was the principal speaker. His message was a great inspiration to all who atended. All of those who attended

this banquet were of the same opinion-that this was the best banquet of this association to date.

The group schools for the year which was held in October, 1951 was a distinct success since it reached several churches for study that would not have had any study except for this class of classes. This was the first time this kind of school was tried and we feel it worthy of further use at some future date when it will be possible for even greater success in reaching more of our churches for Teacher improvement through more study.

On a whole the Sunday School work in the Association in much better than at any time hereto for since 18 of the 21 churches have studied to have improvement in their Bible teaching ministery. The planning for the Vacation Bible Schools in the association which was under the leaders of Bro. Bowen of Eden Church held a clinic.

In Floral City with a total attendance of 77 people from practically all of the churches in the association results practically all churches were able to conduct their own VBS without outside help which was furnished the year before when we had 19 VBS.

The planning meeting for the Association held in the Inverness church during the month of Sept. Where the following goals were set up for the associational year 1952-1953.

Increase in attendance 500 based in 15 per hundred church members. Training in each church during the year with a goal of 1000 awards or 250 per group.

A goal of at least 10 Standard Sunday Schools. Every church participating in January Bible Study. Every church with a VBS and at least 6 mission VBS.

Establishment of an Extension department in each church. Establishment of a Cradle Roll in each church.

REPORT ON SOUTHERN BAPTISTS HOSPITALS

A total of 31,764 patients were admitted to the hospital in New Orleans during the year. Of this number, 15,207 were bed patients, 13,202 out patients and 3,355 new born infants. A total of 125,394 Patient Days of Service were rendered. This was the largest number of patients admitted to the institution in its history.

It is interesting to note that the total number of admissions to the hospital during its 26 years of service is greater than the poulation of New Orleans.

Several years ago the hospital Board accepted the responsibility of establishing a hospital at Jacksonville, Florida in cooperation with the Baptists and other interested citizens of that city. A beautiful site has been purchased and the plans for the first buildings to be constructed are well underway.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM & STEWARDSHIP

Southern Baptists have made remarkable progress in teaching and training, in evangelism, in education and benevolence in missions, and in stewardship. They have, for example, given more for all missionary, educational and benevolent causes through the Cooperative Program during the past year than ever before in their history. But have only "touched the hem of the garment."

We need to make still further advance in all fields. But the most urgent need for advance today is in stewardship. How else shall we answer the calls of need in home mission and foreign mission fields? How else shall we meet the pressing needs in Christian education, hospitals, children's homes and state missions? The average per capita gift among Southern Baptists amounts to less than ten cents per week for missionary and benevolent causes, and less than sixty cents per week for all causes. There is room for improvement.

All Christians need training in stewardship. We have reached the point where we must make advance in stewardship or we shall go backward. For several years Baptist leaders from the twenty-two states and from the Southern Baptist Convention agencies have felt this urgency. Together they have been studying and praying. They feel that the Lord has led in the development of plans for Southern Baptist Advance in Stewardship, 1953, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention.

REPORT OF UNITED FLORIDA DRYS Fred T. Barnett

EDUCATION: Our organization seeks to promote an educational program through a monthly publication, entitled FLOR-IDA FLASHES, containing pertinent facts and figures on the liquor situation, and through the encouragement given to the teaching of a course Alcohol Education in the training schools of the churches.

We are circulating four temperance films: Vicious Circle, Liquid Lore, Public Enemy Number One, and Skid Row. Other films will be purchased as soon as they are placed on sale.

We recommend the use in study classes of Aubrey Hearn's book, ALCOHOLISM OR ABSTINENCE. It can be secured from the Baptist Book Store, Jacksonville, 84 cents in paper, with postage paid, or \$1.25 in cloth plus 8 cents postage.

LEGISLATION. We are deeply concerned over the election of Christian men to the Legislature and the appointment of fair minded men on the Temperance Committees of both Houses for the coming session, and we ask the cooperation of all Christian men and women in achieving this goal. A lot of constructive measures will be presented to the next Legislature for

adoption.

LOCAL OPTION: Two local option elections have been held during the past year. The election in Leon County, which took place on December 18, resulted in a dry victory by a majority of 406. Dr. Harold G. Sanders, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Tallahassee, led a brilliant campaign in behalf of the dry cause, and protests were received from all over the state from anxious fathers and mothers who did not want thir sons and daughters to be subjected to the temptations incident to the proposed placing of 11 liquor saloons within a few blocks of the campus of Florida State University and 10 saloons in the rural areas of the county.

The most recent was held in Gadsden County on July 22. Rev. J. Ivey Edwards, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Quincy, was the efficient and militant chairman of the Gadsden Dry Crusade, and Mr. Berell Fletcher, of Greenboro, prominent business man and Baptist layman, was the co-chairmain. The election was a sweeping victory for the drys, the vote being s follows: For Sale, 1,089; Against Sale, 2,550, and thus Gadsden County remains in the dry column. Only one precinct voted wet by majority of one vote.

We regret to report that at present no definite effort is being made by the drys to call a local option election anywhere in the state, and yet Florida has 48 wet and only 19 dry counties.

GOOD CITIZENSHIP LEAGUES: Following the dry victory in Leon County on December 18, the LEON BETTER CITIZENSHIP LEAGUE was organized, and with the cooperation of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Tallahassee, has greatly strengthened the law enforcement program in that county. Numerous raids have been made upon illegal places of sale, and a new sense of civic responsibility has been awakened in the citizenship of Leon County.

REPORT ON THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The reports, reviewig the work of the Relief and Annuity Board presented at the annual meeting of the Board in Dallas on March 12th, showed 1951 to be a year of continued progress and enlarged service to our Southern Baptist constituency.

Officers of the Board were re-elected: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. Robert S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer-investments.

Total income for 1951 was \$5,144,134.29, with total benefits paid, amounting to \$1,559,438.69. Total assets of the Board as of December 21, 1951 were \$23,333,014.10.

In spite of more intensive promotional work on the part of the several states and of the Relief and Annuity Bard, there is yet much to be done to broaden the protection of the Minist-

ers Retirement Plan. Far too many pastors are retiring without any source of income and thus adding to the burden of the relief department. In 1951, the relief department spent more in ten states than it received. The deficit in these states could only be met by drawing upon the relief reserves. The relief department cannot continue to meet these deficits by reducing the relief reserve fund. This situation can and must be corrected.

REPORT ON SEMINARIES

Southern Baptists' five theological seminaries report a total enrollment of 4,184 for the 1951-52 session:

Each of our seminaries reports increased enrollment and the need for additional buildings, faculty, student aid funds and endowment. Student tuition is provided through Cooperative Program fund by Southern Baptists. Cooperative Program money provides for current operatinal expenses and part of the building programs.

REPORT OF ALACHUA BROTHERHOOD ASSOCIATION

The first meeting of the year met at the Eden Church with Rev. Ratteree teaching the Brotherhood Guide Book. Eight churches were represented with thirty members.

The Program Planning Meeting was held in January at the Floral City Church, with six churches represented by 26 members.

The regular business meeting was held at the Coleman Church on February 29th, with five churches represented by 28 members. Coleman had charge of a very good program.

On July 18th the executive committee met at Wahoo Church with five members present.

On September 26th we had our last meeting ot the Wildwood Church, with five churches represented by 24 members. After the business meeting, at which Mr. A. B. Pressley of Brooksville was elected president, Brother E. C. Tyner of Dade City gave an inspirational address.

I pledge my full cooperation to our new Brotherhood president.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

"It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ to seek to extend the gosper to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by the Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is also expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the gospel of Christ."

The majority of the churches in our Association held revivals during the year and have experienced increases in membership. The church at Floral City has established work in the town of Holder. The Sunday School Association gives continuous support the evangelistic and missionary activities and the Sunday Schools are positively evangelistic. The Woman's Missionary Union, the Brotherhood Association, and the Training Union Association are faithfully cooperating in the program of evangelism and missions in the churches.

It is hoped that the Alachua Association will be able to have a full-time missionary working among us soon. We trust that the Committee on Evangelism and Missions will be able to work with the State Board of Missions in realizing this hope. We recommend that the budget for 1952-1953 shall include an item for the expenses of a missionary in the amount of \$300.

REPORT ON THE RADIO COMMISSION OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, at its annual meeting in Atlanta July 31-August 1, made plans for more active participation in the field of television. The Commission reaffirmed its basic policy of seeking to produce superior religious programs which television stations, would desire, and would be willing to use on a sustaining basis.

In keeping with this general policy, specific recommendations were adopted. The Commission welcomed Louis A. Howard, who joined the organization as a full-time television man the first of July. It was suggested that Mr. Howard, together with others on the staff of the Commision, conduct regional, state and Southwide radio and television conferences. Such conferences will be held at Ridgecrest and Glorietta during the summer of 1953. It was also suggested that Mr. Howard continue to create and distribute sample television formats to be used by local stations and pastors.

Approval of the group was given to the two television films

which were produced in Texas in cooperation with Howard Butt, Jack Hamm, and Frank Boggs. Other programs are planned in this series. It was also suggested that films might be made of the dramatic programs on the Christian Home, These Bonds of Love, and also a sample of the Baptist Hour. The regular weekly children's program on WSB-TV was commended by the Commission and the hope was expressed that it might continue indefinitely.

Charles Wellborn was named as Baptist Hour speaker for nine months of 1953 and Dr. Baker James Cauthen, secretary to the Orient of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, was named for July, August and September, of 1953.

New devotional programs were discussed by the Commission, and a larger transcription library was urged by the group. It was reported that a number of new 15-minute devotional programs of the Chapel Upstairs series are now being made. Twenty-four of these new broadcasts will be available for circulation within another month or six weeks.

REPORT ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their worldwide mission work. The Society serves every form of missions at home and abroad.

Bible distribution is a "must" in mission work.

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. But, in most countries of the world the income of the people is so low they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures.

Supported by gifts, the American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world. It also supplies Scriptures for the Blind in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

During 1951 the American Bible Society-

—distributed at home and abroad more than 16 million volumes of Scriptures;

—helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute 3,372,803 Scripture volumes, making a total of approximately 10 million volumes distributed in Japan since V-J Day;

-in Korea, supplied over 1 million Scripture volumes for

civilians, South Korean and other UN armed forces and North Koreans and Chinese in prisoner-of-war camps.
—aided the Brazil Bible Society to reach the largest Scripture distribution in the country's history, 1,510,712 volumes. Of these, 168,670 were whole Bibles—almost three times the average of whole Bibles distributed in recent years;
—provided 941,241 Scripture volumes for our Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to more than 10 million volumes.

CLERK'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL MEETING

Your executive committee met three times during the past year: Feb. 3, 1952 at Bushnell; Aug. 10, 1952 at Bushnell and Sept. 26, 1952 at Wildwood.

At the Feb. meeting, a calendar of events and activities was authorized, same to be made up, mimeographed and distribut-

ed; The time of the regular meeting of the Associational Executive Committee was set as the second Sunday of each second month of each quarter; the committee voted to initiate and promote an Associational Simultaneous Revival Campaign, September 7, 1952 for two weeks; The application of the Gulf Ridge Park Church for Pastoral Aid from the State Board of Missions was approved; Bro. Fred Barnett, United Florida Drys, Inc., gave a short talk; Rev. Pollock received gifts for the purpose of helping Bill Osceola, B. B. I. Student, rent an apartment that he might be with his family while in school eleven churces were represented at this meeting.

Bro. Frink was elected Vice-Moderator.

At the August meeting, the item of Simultaneous Revivals was discussed and the body voted that we do not, as an association, sponsor these meetings but let each church hold their meeting whenever they see fit; discussed the "Move Your Membership Campaign" and voted that the Association be divided into groups with leaders as follows: North Sumter: Brothers Edwards and Wade; South Sumter: Brothers Pollock and Byerley; Citrus: Brothers Tadlock and Parks; Hernando: Brothers Gambrell and Bowen. These groups are to be made up of the same churches as compose the identical Sunday School groups and with the purpose of promoting this movement; 71.6 Moderator urged churches to report to Bro. Gambrell if they were taking part in the Sunday School Enlargement Program in November; voted to give the Moderator power to appoint a committee to make up a program for the Annual Meeting; Bro, Jenkins presented Sunday School work as it affects the association; the clerk asked for and was granted permission to carry on some educational work with the church clerks in obtraining better church letters; Bro. Bowen presented an application of Stetson University for ministerial assistance in behalf of Bro. Richard Martin, Pastor of Gulf Ridge Park Church which was approved and signed for the association by the Moderator and the Clerk. Nine churches were represented at this meeting.

At the September meeting, the body approved the program for the Annual Meeting with whatever changes were found to be necessary and a committee composed of Brothers Hall, Bowen, and Stapp was appointed to draft the final program and have it printed; voted to present to the association at the Annual Meeting a plan to change the meeting sites. There were seven churches represented at this meeting.

On Sunday morning, September 14, 1952, the church clerks met with me for breakfast and a business session at the Chili Bowl Cafe in Bushnell. The problem of getting out a complete church letter and getting it out on time were the main items of consideration. These problems were discussed and settled to everyone's satisfaction and I am proud to say, that not one of

the clerks who attended this meeting, was late in getting this letter to me. After getting the problems of the local church clerk settled, I tried to present to them the problems that I have to contend with and explain to them just how they can help me with these. Everyone present said that they were helped a great deal by the session and asked that this be made an annual affair. There were eleven clerks present and just getting acquainted was worth the time, trouble and expense of the meeting.
