#### CONSTITUTION

- 1. This Body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association of Florida.
- It shall be composed of Southern Baptist Churches of the same faith and gospel order, voluntarily banded together for missionary, educational and benevolent service.
- 3. Its officers shall be a Moderator, who shall also be Chairman of the Executive Committee; a Vice-Moderator, who shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee; a Clerk and a Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve in this capacity, more than two consecutive years. The Association, in annual session, shall elect or approve all departmental heads for the ensuing year.
- 4. Each Church shall be entitled to two messengers, and shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five additional members over the first fifty, provided no Church may have more than ten messengers. These duly elected messengers who are present shall constitute the Association in annual session.
- 5. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of the following: the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Associational Sunday School, Director of the Associational Training Union, President of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Director of the Associational Music Department, together with all pastors who hold membership within the Association and one other member from each cooperating Church.
- 6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the body. When necessary, the time and/or place of any meeting may be set or changed by the Executive Committee.
- 7. The Association shall recognize the independence of Churches, and shall not in any wise seek to exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any Church found to be unorthodox in faith or practice.
- 8. Churches may be admitted into this Body by petitionary letter, provided they shall have been found orthodox and of a cooperative spirit. Each Church, before being admitted, must make application through the Moderator or the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual Associational meeting, provided however, that the Association may waive the three months period by unanimous vote of the members present. The Church making petition shall set forth in writing their doctrinal belief and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which the Association is governed. Upon reception, the Moderator shall, for the Association, extend to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
- 9. Any Church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection with the Association if desired, by giving proper notice of such intention. If any Church fails to be represented in annual meetings for three years in succession, it may be dropped from active membership.
- 10. The Association in annual session, may alter or amend this constitution by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting.

#### BY·LAWS

- All sessions of this Body shall be opened and closed reverently in duly approved form.
- 2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, present for discussion and vote all motions properly ordered, and perform all other duties usually apperlaining to this office. He shall not vote except in case of a tie. The Vice Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator on when asked by the Moderator to preside.
- Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as authority in all matters of parliamentary procedure.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep-a fair and correct record of the proceedings; prepare the manuscript for the press, have minutes printed, and distribute them to the Churches as early as possible after the annual meetings, and shall keep a complete file of minutes for the use of the Association.
- 5. The Treasurer, who also may be Clerk, shall keep an accurate record of all moneys received and disbursed, shall pay out money only upon instruction from the Body and shall make an itemized, report of all receipts and disbursements to the Association in annual session. If requested, the Treasurer shall make a quarterly statement to the Executive Committee.
- 6. The Executive Committee, which is the Association ad interim, shall have general supervision of all work in tiated and fostered by the Association. It shall meet at least quarterly to plan for the promotion of all phases of the work, the time and place of meeting to be set by the Executive Committee. It shall use its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activities of the Churches and shall report its work to the Association in annual session.
- 7. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the Body in annual session.

- 29. After a hymn by the congregation, H. R. Scarborough of North Carolina led in prayer. The Baptist Bible Institute sang. President Arthur House Stainback delivered a powerful message on training. The morning session was closed with prayer by President Stainback.
- 30. THE WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION began with singing.
  J. H. Palmer led in prayer. Leonard Halbrook gave the devotional.
- 31. On motion the report read by W. S. Wade, on the Assembly Grounds, was adopted.

- 34. On motion the report of the Nominating Committee was adopted.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

By MRS. LEON M. GAMBRELL

In 1952 the Home Mission Board had 1,274 missionaries, 362 of whom were employed for only ten weeks as student summer workers. This represented a gain in personnel of 104.

Soul-winning is the chief aim of home missions. The achievement in this field is encouraging. The reports show 30,565 conversions in the ministry of home missionaries. In addition to conversions reported by missionaries there were 11,284 professions of faith under the leadership of 425 chaplains in the armed forces. Also there were 6,626 conversions reported in crusades led by the personnel of the Home Mission Board's evangelistic staff. An inestimable number of conversions resulted from the mission radio programs.

The Church Building Loan Fund of the Home Mission Board needs enlargement. The Convention's approval was given in 1952 to a plan to borrow a half million dollars from banks at a rate of interest which would justify the Board in lending the increased funds to Churches which needed the money for building. The Board presented its needs to the Executive Committee and was given encouragement in its program to increase the loan fund in order to help more Churches. The major portion of money received in the Advance Program was transferred to the Church Building Loan Fund. Annuities are being written and other available money from time to time is being placed in the loan fund in the hope that the amount can be raised to ten million dollars within the next five years.

Definite plans were adopted by the Board during 1952 for the enlargement of Negro work in the selection of an evangelist to serve on the staff of the Department of Evangelism; the employment of a worker in the field of home counseling and juvenile delinquency; a Church ministry to members of the armed forces; and the employment of missionaries to the Russians in California and in the H-Bomb center in South Carolina.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

By FLETCHER WESTON

Southern Baptists have 911 foreign missionaries (June 1, 1953) distributed in 32 countries: Argentina 44, Brazil 180, Chile 32, China (Hong Kong and Macaó) 48, Colombia 30, Costa Rica 4, Equador 6, Formosa 26, Gold Coast 6, Guatemala 10, Hawaii 47, Honduras 4, Indonesia 16, Israel 13, Italy 10, Japan 98, Jordan 5, Korea 13, Lebanon 6, Malaya 9, Mexico 30, Nigeria 159, Paraguay 16, Peru 4, Philippines 25, Southern Rhodesia 12, Spain 6, Switzerland (seminary) 9, Thailand 15, Uruguay 12, Venezuela 8, Spanish Publishing House 8.

To maintain these missionaries and the institutions in which they serve, Southern Baptists gave in 1952—through the Co-Operative Program, Lottie Moon Offering, and special designated gifts—\$7,785,699.64.

About 29 per cent of the missionaries are ordained ministers, of whom about a third serve as pastors of Churches. Most of the ministers serve as field missionaries, extending the gospel message far beyond the cities in which they live. Along with the ordained ministers go the missionaries trained for work in religious education. All missionaries are active in Churches on the field in which they serve. They teach Sunday School classes, lead young people's and women's groups; serve on Church committees, and take an active part in the other Church activities. They join with 195,067 national Baptists, including 1,276 national pastors, in making the almost 2,000 Churches on the mission fields

dynamic Christian forces in their neighborhoods. Those Churches reach 205,901 people through their Sunday Schools, 96,099 young people through their Training Unions and missionary groups, and 47,292 women through their Woman's Missionary Societies. During 1952 the Churches baptized 18,154 new converts.

About 10 per cent of the missionaries are members of the medical profession—doctors, dentists, nurses, technicians. They work in eight hospitals, seven clinics, and eleven dispensaries maintained abroad by Southern Baptists or in buildings and institutions maintained by national Christians.

About 48 per cent of the missionaries are engaged in some form of educational work. Southern Baptists maintain 460 schools, including 17 theological seminaries and six women's training schools. Enrollment in them totals 61,705. Also classified as teachers are missionaries working in five orphanages and nine Good Will centers. In the orphanages are 136 children, and enrolled in the Good Will centers are 398 children and 116 adults.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

By E. D. BAXLEY .

The work of State Missions is carried on in Florida under six diferent heads or departments. These six departments are Cooperative Missions, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Music, Camps and Assemblies; and the Student work, and working closely along the side of these departments is the W. M. U., which is the auxiliary to the Florida Baptist Convention. All of these departments and agencies are actively engaged in promoting every phase of mission work done by our Convention.

The work of State Missions is showing results. During the past few years we can point with joy to the establishment of at least 200 new Churches. These have been organized in Florida due to the excellent work of our Churches and State Missions working hand in hand, and during this time, the number of baptisms has increased mightily. The Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., and Brotherhood enrollment has shown a vast increase. Thus you see that when you are having a part in State Missions, you are having a part in everything that Florida and Southern Baptists do.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

FOR MARCH 1, 1953 - SEPTEMBER 1, 1953

FOR ALACHUA, MARION AND PASCO ASSOCIATIONS, DISTRICT 7.

We wish to report the following work in these Associations: Made 34 visits to missions, 14 committee meetings, 23 Associational meetings, 7 pastors' conferences, 3 state meetings, attended all of the Southern Baptist Conventions, held 3 revivals on this field, preached 88 sermons, visited 294 Churches, attended 2 South-wide meetings, 31 other meetings and delivered 14 addresses. Attended prayer meeting 20 times. Traveled 20,000 miles.

We have two missions started. One revived and three more in the process of making. We find 15 places where at least a mission Sunday

School or a branch Sunday School should start. Several of these should have a Church. We find three of our Churches taken away by other groups not of us.

We are happy to report the finest cooperation and good fellowship with our pastors on this field. Also the Associational officers. It has been a great pleasure to work with the state leaders. We are very happy in the work, but for the burden on our hearts because of so much we see that needs to be done. We need your prayers. We need your continual cooperation in the work. We desire that you keep us on your mailing list when you announce your meetings in the Association. It is my desire to work with and for every Associational officer, and every pastor and Church. You are the leaders.

#### REPORT ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The world must have the Bible. It is the one source of knowledge of Christ. It is the missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of missionary work. The Bible itself is a missionary, it goes where human missionaries cannot go, stays where they must leave. It keeps on working in man's heart.

Giving the Bible to all peoples in their own language is a missionary task. Someone must translate it, publish and send it, making it available at a price people can pay. The American Bible Society is that someone. It also supplies Scriptures for the blind in raised-letter systems and Talking Records.

During 1952, the Society distributed 13 million Scripture volumes, helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute 3 million volumes, a total of 13 million Scriptures since V-J Day, aided the Korean Bible Society in supplying Scripture volumes to civilians, UN forces and prisoners of war. The American Bible Society provided 904,753 Scriptures for our armed forces, a total of 11 million since 1940.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their world-wide missionary service. It serves every form of missions at home and abroad. Southern Baptists can lead in providing enough Bibles for world needs now. In 1952 Southern Baptist Churches gave \$102,872 to the American Bible Society. We were second only to Methodists who gave \$125,552.

Help from every Southern Baptist Church is needed. Every Church can give something. Country and village Churches can give \$10 to \$25. Churches in small cities can give \$25 to \$100, and larger Churches more. All gifts are to be sent to Baptist Headquarters, Baptist Building, Jacksonville, Florida, marked "For the American Bible Society."

#### REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE

Baptists believe in the positive approach to problems. We want to supply the readers with Christian reading matter so they will not have to read that which is wrong in moral ideals. Last year, the Baptist Sunday School Board published more than 50 million copies of its periodicals, plus 200 million tracts and nearly 31/2 million books. Publications of various agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have a total circulation of 770,099 copies per issue.

Baptist state papers reported 1,044,819 circulation. This is the first time they have gone beyond the million mark. The Florida Baptist Witness, our Baptist paper, had a net increase of 3,494 this year, making the total number of copies sent out each week, of 33,244. They have a goal of 36,000 before the Convention meets in St. Louis next June. One of the finest investments a Church can make is to send the WITNESS to every home in its membership where it will be read. This can be done through the budget plan and paid in easy monthly installments.

Our Association is requested to elect an Associational Witness Representative to help enlist our Churches in more widely using the paper, and who may be able to counsel with the editor in increasing the attention in this Association.

#### REPORT ON CHURCH MUSIC

Music is truly congenial to the nature of man; it is a language of delightful sensations, it breathes to the ear the clearest intimations; touches, and gently agitates the agreeable and sublime feeling of love, tenderness and joy; by its powerful charms the most discordant passions may be harmonized, and brought into perfect unison.

Our pastors and leaders have become cognizant of its power to lift the mind and heart to celestial things when employed in singing hymns of love, praise and gratitude to the Master in preparation for reception of the message from His throne of grace.

Due to this awakened interest, which has grown in the past year as never before in the Alachua Association, Florida and the Southern Baptist Convention, much talent has, and is being discovered and utilized; many Churches are planning a training program, and the music department of the Sunday School Board is meeting this challenge by preparing study course books.

It is the desire of this director that this Association hold a simultaneous study course not later than August of next year.

The quarterly hymn sings, of which we had three this year, are growing in popularity, and it is desired that these continue, and possibly increase in frequency through the year.

So far as I know only one Church had a school of music the past year; my hope is that all Churches take part in the simultaneous study contemplated for next year, and whoever is elected director consider this program.

#### REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation was designed and incorporated to handle investments of Christian stewards. It is an agency of the State Convention, to serve any person who wishes to contribute to any Baptist Institution or Agency by gifts of money, stocks, bonds or property or by bequests through wills.

The Florida Baptist Foundation offers to Baptists and friends opportunities to make living investments in Baptist Institutions and Agencies. Stetson University, the Florida Baptist Children's Home, World Missions, Camps and Assemblies make a great appeal. Investments in institutions that minister to the bodies, souls and minds of men, and that advance the Kingdom of Christ are living investments with an eternal significance.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This year has developed a (1.) Reversal of the trend toward lower enrollments in our colleges and universities, as well as our seminaries. (2.) Approval, by the Executive Committee of the S. B. C. of an annual convention-wide emphasis on Christian education, beginning April, 1954, and (3.) Increasing financial support from state Baptist conventions. Construction has continued throughout the year on the new campus of Wake Forest College at Winston-Salem. Furman University and Howard College announced convention-approved plans for the building of complete, new campuses. Baylor University announced plans for a ten year, \$50,000,000 campaign for funds for new buildings and additions to curriculum. The total investment in endowment and property values, as of March, 1953, was \$144,560,783—an increase of half a million for endowments and about five million for property values.

In Florida, we are happy to report encouraging news from Stetson University. Stetson was founded in 1883 and became a college in 1885. Known first as DeLand Academy, after the principal founder of the town, Henry A. DeLand, its name was changed to John B. Stetson University in 1889. Stetson now has the College of Liberal Arts, the College of Law, School of Music, and a School of Business.

In addition to State Baptist schools our Southern Baptist Convention owns and operates five theological seminaries: Southern in Louisville, Southwestern in Fort Worth, New Orleans in New Orleans, Golden Gate in Berkeley, and Southeastern in Wake Forest. The total enrollment is 4,410, an increase of 226 over the previous year's enrollment. Co-Operative Program Funds are invaluable in providing current expenses and a portion of the building programs.

#### STATE OF RELIGION AND MORALS

#### REPORT ON THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The ever-increasing load on the Relief Department of the Relief and Annuity Board has become a cause of deep concern for the Relief and Annuity Board and for the state secretaries. With so many pastors retiring who have never joined the Ministers Retirement Plan, the problem has become acute.

There are more than 7,000 pastors overlithe Southland who have refused for failed to join this plan and as they retire, they asked to be placed on the relief roll. A careful study of this problem with the state secretaries during the past several months has resulted in a drastic change in policy. After December 31st, pastors in active service who refuse to enter the Ministers Retirement Plan will no longer be eligible for assistance from the Relief Department. This plan is the method of our denomination for taking care of retired and disabled ministers. The denomination must have the cooperation of the Church and its pastor.

Fevery Church should enter the plan and urge its pastor to enroll without delay. Pastors lacking only a few years of retirement age can, with the help of the denomination, earn for themselves small annuities. Your state secretary and his Relief Committee will take pleasure in recommending that these small annuities be supplemented by the Relief and Annuity Board. An intensive effort will be made during October, November and December, to enroll all active pastors in the Ministers Retirement Plan before December 31, 1953.

#### REPORT OF THE ALACHUA BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION
