

CONSTITUTION

- l. This Body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association of Florida.
- 2. It shall be composed of Southern Baptist Churches of the same faith and gospel order, voluntarily banded together for missionary, educational and benevolent service.
- 3. Its officers shall be a Moderator, who shall also be Chairman of the Executive Committee; a Vice-Moderator, who shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee; a Clerk and a Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve in this capacity, more than two consecutive years. The Association, in annual session, shall elect or approve all departmental heads for the ensuing year.
- 4. Each Church shall be entitled to two messengers, and shall be entitled to one additional messenger for every twenty-five additional members over the first fifty, provided no Church may have more than ten messengers. These duly elected messengers who are present shall constitute the Association in annual session.
- 5. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of the following; the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Associational Sunday School; Director of the Associational Training Union, President of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Director of the Associational Music Department, together with all pastors who hold membership within the Association and one other member from each cooperating Church.
- 6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the Body. When necessary, the time and/or place of any meeting may be set or changed by the Executive Committee.
- 7. The Association shall recognize the independence of Churches, and shall not in any wise seek to exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any Church found to be unorthodox in faith or practice.
- 8. Churches may be admitted into this Body by petitionary letter provided they shall have been found orthodox and of a cooperative spirit. Each Church, before being admitted, must make application through the Moderator or the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual Associational meeting, provided however, that the Association may waive the three months period by unanimous vote of the members present. The Church making petition shall set forth in writing their doctrinal belief and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which the Association is governed. Upon reception, the Moderator shall, for the Association extend to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
- 9. Any Church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection with the Association if desired, by giving proper notice of such intention. If any Church fails to be represented in annual meetings for three years in succession, it may be dropped from active membership.
- 10. The Association in annual session, may alter or amend this constitution by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting.

BY·LAWS

- 1. All sessions of this Body shall $\mbox{\it Be}$ opened and closed reverently in duly approved form.
- 2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, present for discussion and vote all motions properly ordered, and perform all other duties usually appertaining to this office. He shall not vote except in the case of a tie. The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator or when asked by the Moderator to preside.
- 3. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as authority in all matters of parliamentary procedure.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings, prepare the manuscript for the press, have minutes printed, and distribute them to the churches as early as possible after the annual meetings and shall keep a complete file of minutes for use of the Association.
- 5. The Treasurer, who also may be Clerk, shall keep an accurate record of all moneys received and disbursed, shall pay out money only upon instruction from the Body and shall make an itemized report of all receipts and disbursements to the Association in annual session. If requested, the Treasurer shall make a quarterly statement to the Executive Committee.
- 6. The Executive Committee, which is the Association ad interim, shall have general supervision of all work initiated and fostered by the Association. It shall meet at least quarterly to plan for the promotion of all phases of the work, the time and place of meeting to be set by the Executive Committee. It shall use its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activities of the Churches and shall report its work to the Association in annual session.
- 7. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the Body in annual session.

OCTOBER 19 - 20, 1955

- 1. The One Hundred Ninth Annual Session of the Alachua Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Leon M. Gambrell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Brooksville. The Association sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," led by E. S. Anderson, accompanied by Mrs. E. S. Anderson.
- 2. S. V. Proctor, Summerfield, read the 46th Psalm, and led in prayer.
- 3. On Motion of Wayne W. Oeffler, clerk, the Alachua Association was organized with messengers as listed on letters from the churches.
- 4. On motion of J. Parker McLendon the program was adopted as printed, subject to changes necessary.
- 5. The Moderator named the following committees: Budget: Wayne W. Oeffler, Chairman, Perry Edwards, Sam Gaston; Christian Education: Roger Weaver, Chairman, Richard Parker, Perry Edwards; Children's Home: Mrs. J. H. Hughes, Chairman, Mrs. F. P. Newell, Mrs. Mae Townsend; Christian Literature: James Johnston, Chairman, L. Glenn Stephens; Nominations: J. Parker McLendon, Chairman, D. D. Townsend, Dwight Rushing; Obituaries: E. S. Anderson, Chairman, Dwight Rushing, Mrs. Fannie Scofield, Mrs. Stillman Smith; Resolutions: Perry Edwards, Chairman, S. M. Gaston, W. C. Townsend.
- 6. Rev. E. C. Tyner, Pastor First Baptist Church, Dade City, brought the morning Bible Study on "The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit." John 14: 16-23.
- 7. A warm welcome was extended to the Association by L. Glenn Stephens, Pastor Webster Baptist Church. W. E. Crum responded to his welcome.
- 8. New Pastors in the Association were presented by the Moderator: D. D. Townsend, Bushnell; S. V. Proctor, Adamsville; H. R. Linhart, Sumterville; James Johnston, Floral City; W. C. Townsend, Linden; Howard Long, Center Hill.

- 9. The following visitors were recognized: Dr. John Maguire, State Executive Secretary; Rev. T. M. Johns, Superintendent Florida Baptist Children's Home; Rev. Don Miley, Plant City, representing the Florida Baptist Foundation; Rev. E. C. Tyner, Dade City; Rev. Vernon Clyatt, Oklawaha Baptist Church; Rev. Cumbley.
- 10. James D. Johnston moved that the report on Christian Literature as printed in the Summary of reports (see page 18) be adopted. Dr. John Maguire spoke to the report.
- 11. E. S. Anderson led the Association in singing "Come Thou Almighty King," accompanied by Mrs. Anderson.
- 12. W. E. Crum read the Treasurer's report (see page 28). Motion prevailed that report and recommendations as follows be adopted: (1) that all bills be approved by department heads before being paid by the Treasurer, (2) that the year of business for the Association close on September 30.
- 13. Report of Auditing Committee was given by E. S. Anderson (see page 29). Motion prevailed that report be adopted
- 14. On motion by Perry Edwards the report of Budget Committee (see page 29) and recommendations as follows were adopted: (1) that Moderator call a meeting of the Executive Committee and they appoint a Publicity Committee who will represent all units of Association and will publish a monthly NEWSLETTER. (2) that the amount of \$75.00 be paid to the Moderator for his services, and that \$75.00 of the amount in the Budget for the Clerk be paid for his services and \$50.00 for expenses. Amendment to this motion prevailed that Clerk be authorized to draw on miscellaneous fund for Program and minutes.
- 15. On motion, report on American Bible Society given by Glenn Stephens was adopted.
- 16. J. Parker McLendon moved that report on Evangelism as printed in Summary of reports (see page 25) be adopted. Brother McLendon spoke to the report.
- 17. Motion carried, by J. Parker McLendon, that Rev. Clyde Harless be given time for Missions report since program is ahead of schedule.
- 18. Clyde Harless gave report on Missions. Report was adopted.
- 19. Motion by B. F. Brooks adopted that Association appoint Pastors of Hernando County as Committee of one to look into feasibility of starting Mission in Masaryktown and report to Association in one year.
- 20. E. S. Anderson led Association in singing "Glory To His Name," accompanied by Mrs. Anderson.

- 21. Motion by D. D. Townsend carried that report on Baptist Foundation as found in Summary of reports (see page 18) be adopted.
- 22. Rev. Don Miley gave an informative address on the Baptist Foundation.
- 23. Closing prayer and blessing was given by T. M. Johns before adjourning to dinner.
- 24. THE AFTERNOON SESSION was opened by singing "Holy, Holy, Holy," led by L. Glenn Stephens, accompanied by Mrs. Grace Gideons.
 - 25. D. D. Townsend read the Scripture and led in prayer.
- 26. E. C. Tyner brought the afternoon Bible Study on "The Holy Spirit's Conviction of Sin."
- 27. The Moderator appointed the Committee on Time, Place, Preacher: Glenn Stephens, H. R. Linhart, James Johnston.
- 28. Mrs. Hughes made motion that carried that time alloted in program for Children's Home report be given to speaker, and that report be incorporated in the minutes.
- 29. The Moderator called for the Training Union report.
- 30. Motion by George Scotield carried that Brotherhood report be accepted as given in Summary of reports (see page 20). He spoke to the report.
- 31. Motion by George Scofield that Assembly Grounds report be adopted. The Associational Clerk read a ecommendation from the Executive Committee of the Association that the Association rescend the action taken at last meeting, i. e., that the grounds not be sold at this time. D. D. Townsend made a substitute motion that this body accept the recommendation of the Executive Committee. Carried.
- 32. Motion by J. Parker McLendon carried that the Moderator and Vice-Moderator of the Alachua Association be nominated from the floor in this annual meeting.
- 33. Motion by J. P. McLendon that Moderator appoint a committee of three (3) to report back to the next annual meeting of the Association with a stated procedure for the election and duties of all Associational officers, such procedure to become an amendment to the by-laws of the Association. Motion carried.

- 34. Motion prevailed that Church Music report be adopted. Mrs. Wayne Oeffler sang "Try Jesus, Man of Galilee," accompanied by Mrs. Clyde Harless.
- 35. Motion by Perry Edwards carried that report on Christian Education be adopted as given in Summary of Reports (see page 23). Dr. Jimmy Parrish, Riverside Baptist Church, Miami, addressed the report. Leon M. Gambrell spoke on Baptist Bible Institute.
- 36. The afternoon session was closed with prayer by Dr. John Maguire, and the Association adjourned to meet at the Eden Baptist Church for a barbecue supper prepared for the Association by the Brotherhood of the Eden Church.

- 67. "In Memorium" of our beloved dead was led by Dwight Rushing. E. S. Anderson sang "Rock of Ages." Bro. Rushing led in prayer.
- 68. The Moderator called for the Training Union report. No report. Motion by Wayne Oeffler carried that report be prepared to be published in minutes.
- 69. Digest of Letters given by Wayne Oeffler. Motion carried that report be accepted as given. (See table in index).
- 70. The report of the Committee on Time, Place and Preacher given by James Johnston was adopted. Time: Tuesday, October 16 and Wednesday, October 17, 1956. Place: Tuesday Coleman; Wednesday Pleasant Hill. Preacher: Doctrinal Dwight Rushing, alternate J. H. Palmer; Missionary D. D. Townsend, alternate Wayne Oeffler.
- 71. The report of the Resolutions Committee given by Perry Edwards was adopted. (See page 29).
- 72. The Clerk asked to be authorized to obtain a tax exemption number for the Association. Motion by E. S. Anderson carried that Clerk be authorized to obtain same.
- 73. Motion by J. P. McLendon carried that the incoming Moderator and heads of departments serve to draw up a calendar of activities in time to get in printed minutes:
- 74. Motion by D. D. Townsend carried that Clerk or Moderator be authorized to secure funds from budget to cover expense of mimeographing reports for next year.
- 75. The Clerk reported 255 registered messengers for the Alachua Associational meeting.
- 76. The retiring Moderator, Leon M. Gambrell, presented the gavel to the incoming Moderator, E. S. Anderson.
- 78. Clyde Harless installed the officers for the ensuing year. He read Ephesians 6: 10-24, Hebrews 12: 1-2. The Association stood as he led in prayer of dedication.
- 79. The Association adjourned with the singing of "Blest Be the Tie."

SUMMARY OF REPORTS

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

During the thirty years the Cooperative Program has been in operation Southern Baptists have contributed \$266,000,000.00. With the dollars you give through the Cooperative Program you literally "go into all the world." You preach, teach, minister to the sick and needy, train church leaders and missionaries, and give the gospel to all races in our country and around the world.

Statistics reveal that Southern Baptists are growing in their stewardship more rapidly than any other major denomination in America. However at the present time the gifts of Southern Baptists through their churches are less than 3% of their estimated income.

There is increasing gratitude for the scriptural methods, the insignificant cost and the remarkably efficient results of the Cooperative Program. Thirty years experience has proved that the Cooperative Program is by far the best way for Southern Baptists to support all the work in all the world. No other method has produced such results

STATE MISSIONS

With appropriate celebration and with a history making page and clearly outlining the First Century growth, the Florida Baptist State Convention last November, closed the Convention's first hundred years and launched a second Century of mission work in this great and challenging state of Florida. The Second Century began with 1,038 cooperating missionary Baptist Churches.

One of the most far-reaching and wise steps ever taken by Florida Baptists was the adoption of the New Work Revolving Fund

The field of State Missions is not being overlooked at the expense of any other phase of work. Florida has a balanced program of activity. It begins at the home and extends to the ends of the earth. What we need is full cooperation from every member of our churches and from every church in our Convention in a great program of world missions, beginning here in favored Florida. What we are asking is that every church and every individual in every church be given an opportunity to understand our mission program and urged to have a part with us in reaching our own state. The future of Florida is as bright as the promise of God. What we need is more laborers, better cooperation more faith, and greater vision. Let's move together, for Baptists go forward when they go together.

HOME MISSIONS

A summary of the work done by missionaries of the Home Mission Board during 1954 indicated a total of 1,324 missionaries, 370 of whom were summer student missionaries serving 10 weeks, or 954 regular missionaries. There was a gain of 21 missionaries during the year. Conversions reported by missionaries numbered 35,843 and the number added to churches was 31,527. Missionaries assisted in the constitution of

359 churches and opened 401 new missions.

In 1954 the Board consummated its Five-Year Crusade, reporting for the period 167,247 professions of faith, 1,440 new churches, 2,974 missions and 131,524 additions.

Church building loan funds have been very active in helping churches to build. The Board was authorized to borrow \$3,000,000 to

lend to churches

In preparation for the Southern Baptist Convention sesquicentennial celebration in 1959, the Home Mission Board has inaugurated its Four-Year Conquest for Christ with emphasis in 1955 on evangelism and conservation; in 1956 on church extension and revitalization; in 1957 on reaching the minority groups, language groups, and underprivileged; and in 1958 on rural work, city missions, and missionary education.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

For the first time in the history of the Southern Baptist Convention, the number of missionaries on foreign fields has reached the one-thousand mark. Since January 1, 1954 a net gain of 93 missionaries has been reported. During the seven years of the Advance Program for Foreign Missions a total increase of 377 was reported.

Mr. Bill B. Cody was elected to the staff of the Department of Missionary Personnel as assistant secretary, student representative. He will visit all colleges and other schools throughout the Convention territory to work with young people who feel called to dedicate their lives to

oreign missions.

Of the \$10,739,123 contributed through the Cooperative Program last year, \$4,772,123 went to Foreign Missions. In addition Southern Baptists contributed \$1,539,230 in designated gifts and \$3,600,765 through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

In April of last year Dr. Everett Gill, Jr. passed on to his eternal home. Dr. Frank Means of the Department of Education and Promotion was elect-

ed to succeed him.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The Southern Baptist Convention is noted among Protestants for the literature that it produces. We should take greater advantage of this fine material.

The Sunday School Board published and distributed a total of 54,-145,087 copies of its various periodicals last year. The Broadman Press produced 3,914,880 books while our foreign mission magazine, The Commission, went to 86,535 subscribers and Home Missions Magazine to 119,790.

Our State paper, The Florida Baptist Witness goes into 40,119 homes. Each home in each Church should have the opportunity to decide whether

they desire this wonderful paper,

BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation was established in 1947 and is serving the interest of our people in a splendid way in handling the funds entrusted to it for the benefit of our various Institutions. Florida is one of nineteen States in the Southern Baptist Convention having a Foundation. These were created for the purpose of assisting our people in

their longe-range stewardship plans and thereby support, strengthen, and undergird every Baptist cause in the Southland and around the world. Upwards of a million dollars have been received during these years the Florida Foundation has been in operation.

It should be said that the Foundation not only assists in Will making but receives bequests of other type for investment in trust. For instance, should a Bible Class or smaller group in any of our Churches want to establish a fund to which they could periodically add other amounts for the assistance of students or missionaries, the Foundation is prepared to assist in such projects.

THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION

The Baptist Hour has proved itself over and over again. It stands as a bulwark of evangelical strength in the airways of America when other aims and less worthy programs threaten Christian principles. The Baptist Hour is now broadcast by 380 radio stations all over the nation.

The pilot film for the TV series was released in October of this year. The response was immediate and enthusiastic. However, due to lack of finances this program is slow in its beginning.

The Radio and Television Commission has moved during the year to Fort Worth, Texas, where it can carry on all current phases of the work more effectively.

MUSIC REPORT

When the Music Department of the Sunday School Board was set up in 1945 Florida was one of the first five states to establish a Church Music Department. During the intervening years, Florida has kept pace with the other states of the Convention. This development has been brought about by the promotion of Hymn-Sings in each association, Festivals on association and state levels, Schools of Music in associations and local churches, Leadership Schools, Harmony Bay Youth Music Camp and attendance at the Church Music Conference at Ridgecrest by hundreds from Florida each year. During the past ten years a complete Music Training Course has been set up with appropriate awards for the completion of each book. There were 902 awards received during the first 10 months of the church year. The goals for the church year 1954-55 were 3000 awards, 250 churches reporting and 39 associations reporting. These will also be the 1955-56 goals.

The Church Music Festival program is designed to reach every church whether large or small. Due to increase in the number of participants and the number of churches entering individuals and groups in the festivals, six festivals on the state level are being planned for 1956. The Alachua Association will meet on February 25 at the First Baptist Church of Sanford.

Every church whether large or small may be eligible to enter the State Festival but in order to do so a rating of A or B must be obtained in the Associational Festival. Our Associational Festival will be held January 29th at Brooksville.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Alachua Association of Baptist Sunday Schools met in twelve regular sessions in eleven different churches, and in the Brooksville School Cafetorium for the December Banquet meeting. This was the seventh annual banquet to be held, at which time it was announced that the eighth banquet would be held at the same place on Nov. 28.

The VBS clinic was held in the Brooksyille Church which was well attended. So far we have not received a report from all of the churches, but it is hoped that we will have had a Vacation Bible School in each church.

During the year we averaged reaching fifty percent of the churches in each of the monthly meetings. Some of these meeting were attended by 15 or 16 churches, however, we were unable to reach the remaining churches with any degree of regularity.

Group schools were held in October 1954 and the same is now scheduled for this year. We reached every church in the association for training during the year for the first time in history. We have a goal of 1725 awards for this new year. With the Group Schools and the Simultaneous Enlargement Campaign in April we hope to reach this goal. Another first realized this year was the reaching of the goal in becoming a Standard Association. Alachua Association became the eleventh Standard Association in the Southern Baptist Convention for this year.

In closing please accept my sincere thanks for all of the help given during the eight years as your Sunday School Associational Superintendent. It has been a pleasure to serve, praying the Lord's richest blessings upon the work.—W. K. Jenkins,

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

We have 23 Churches in the Association and report that we have 14 Brotherhoods, which leaves nine of our churches without a Brotherhood. From the present figures available to us there are 210 members in the 14 Brotherhoods. During the year we had two Brotherhoods organized: one at Floral City, and the other at Wahoo, whose address is RFD, Bushnell. We have held our regular meetings during the year as follows: First Church, Brooksville, February 14th, 1955. Primary object of this meeting was to sponsor our crusade and we had approximately 100 present. This was a great spiritual meeting and we feel much good resulted therefrom. The next meeting was held with Gulf Riche Baptist Church at Brooksville on April 24th, 1955, with approximately 30 members present. The third meeting was with Wildwood Baptist Church on July 1st, 1955 with approximately 32 members present. The fourth and last meeting is being held with Eden Baptist Church on October 18th as a part of our Associational Program.

We feel much good has been accomplished notwithstanding the fact that we have not reached our goal. We again urge that each Church organize a Brotherhood, as we consider it one of the best solutions to many of our problems. The primary object and purpose of the Brotherhood is to develop talents of our men and underwrite the entire program of the local church.

The following officers have been nominated by the Brotherhood and recommended to the Association for election: President, Earl F. Clay, First Baptist Church, Inverness; Program Vice-President, Richard Parker, Gulf Ridge Baptist Church, Brooksville; Attendance Vice-President, James C. Weston, Sr., Eden Baptist Church, RFD, Brooksville; Promotion Vice-President, W. A. Bulord, Eden Baptist Church, Brooksville; Secretary, V.

F. Holifield, First Baptist Church, Inverness; Chorister, W. E. Crum Bushnell Baptist Church; Pianist, Rev. Glenn L. Stephens, Webster Baptist Church; Advisory Counsel, Rev. E. S. Anderson, Wildwood Baptist Church; J. P. McLendon, Eden Baptist Church, Brooksville; and Richard Parker, Gulf Ridge Baptist Church; Brooksville.

In retiring as your President I want to thank each of the Associational officers as well as the officers of the local Brotherhoods for their co-operation and assistance. To the new officers I extend my co-operation and assistance and trust that they will each be active and continue our goal until a Brotherhood is organized in the remaining nine churches of our Association. May God's richest blessings be bestowed upon you and your days be lengthened and strengthened.—Geo. W. Scofield.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The Woman's Missionary Union of Alachua Association, acting on suggestion from the state office, omitted the October quarterly meeting in an effort to have more of the members attend the Institutes held in Ocala and Tampa. Our sixteen societies were well represented at these meetings.

Officers for the year were installed by our Associational Moderator, Dr. Leon M. Gambrell at the executive meeting held in the Brooksville Church.

The Executive Committee that each quarter one week prior to the regular quarterly meetings in the Bushnell Church.

Mrs. J. P. McLendon taught the Foreign Mission book "Pilgrimage to Brazil" in November. The Churches of the Association were well represented in this all day study, in the Wildwood Church.

The January meeting was held in the Gulí Ridge Park Church. Miss Elizabeth Province was our guest speaker.

The April meeting was held in the Coleman Church where an interesting program was presented by Mrs. W. T. Lamb, Sr.

Our Annual Young People's Rally was held in the Bushnell Church. Mrs. Egan Jones, Young People's Leader, was in charge of the program and presented a fine program with the young people of the Association. The climax of the program was the message by Marshal Ku, Chinese student from Baylor University, stressing the need for missionaries in China where he plans to go when he completes his education.

Our societies observed the three seasons of prayer: Foreign Missions in December, Home Missions in March and State Missions in September.

Two new societies have been organized this year, leaving only five of the twenty three churches in our Association without a W. M. U. organization. The final meeting of the year was held in the Eden Church. Rev. McLendon installed the officers for the coming year. The highlight of this meeting was a report by Mrs. J. H. Hughes of her trip to the Baptist World Alliance.

Formerly THE UNITED FLORIDA DRY'S, Inc.

WE ARE AT WAR WITH THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC. We as Baptists will not compromise or submit ourselves to an armistice that will degrade and destroy spiritual principalities, dethrone reasoning and lower aims and intentions.

It is certainly a detriment to, our youth regardless of what view-point you might take concerning it. For instance: IT ALWAYS TAKLS—never gives; It always HURTS MAN'S USEFULNESS TO CHRIST; It SEPARATES friends and families AND instigates murders. It makes the beauty of nature become unbearingly ugly.

WHAT IS BEING DONE TO RELIEVE THIS GHASTLY LIFE DEGRAD-ING SITUATION? In 1954 Florida recorded sales in excess of:

- 50 Million Gallons of BEER
- 5 Million Gallons of LEGAL WHISKEY
- 2 Million Gallons of WINE

This is an average of 21 Gallons for every Man, Woman and Child in our State. It is a total of 57 Million gallons at an astonishing sum of \$206 Million Dollars for degrading purposes. The tax derived from this amount is a total of \$29 Million, which will not begin to cover the damage brought about by Liquor Traffic.

Our plan of attack is a three fold program:

EDUCATION: A plan to teach and show for the danger of intoxication.

LEGISLATION: Use every means to push inactment of bans on beer advertisements. Help bring about legislation for teaching the danger of alcohol and its results in public schools. Press for definite legislation to declare Beer an intoxicant.

RECLAMATION: Help those that are in need of assistance to get a new hold on life after falling into intoxicants.

This is the plan which is being used and is showing much progress. In 1955 God's concerned people claim a great victory. Three elections were won by the Dry forces. This can continue to happen to the remainder of the "state if we, as God's people, are willing. There are still 15,000 places where intoxicants are sold. Are we going to submit to defeat—or fight on?

The only limit we have in our fight for freedom is that which you impose upon us by not appropriating sufficient funds to carry on a fight to victory. The average gift of Baptist folks the past year was two (2) pennies per Baptist. Will you answer the call for help as we plead with everyone to save our Youth?

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

EDUCATION IS POWER—power to do evil power to do good—power that is sellish, cruel, greedy, materialistic, power that is unsellish, beneficient, humanitarian—power to dominate, exploit and enslave, power to break the chains of bondage, of ignorance, of vice, of thought-control. The character of education determines the nature of the power it produces. That is why Christian Education is so important. It is education infused with and motivated by Christian aims and ideals. It seeks to develop vital Christian character and to promote and maintain a dynamic and efficient Christian order in the world. The contribution that Christian Education has made in the past and is making today to the welfare of America and its hope for the future is immeasurable.

Belief in the essential importance of Christian Education in the world is a growing conviction among Southern Baptists. Proof of this is to be seen in the fact that they have greatly increased their support of their seminaries and other educational institutions in this country and on mission fields. What they are doing now compares favorably with what other denominations are doing in their support of Christian Education.

Great strides in advancing the cause of Christian Education are being made in some of our southern states. In North Carolina, Wake Forest College is getting ready to move to a beautiful new campus of splendidly new buildings at Winston-Salen. In South Carolina, Furman University has been provided with a similar situation. In Alabama Howard College is also moving to a new campus provided by the Baptists of the State. Advances, not as striking perhaps, are being made in other states in the South.

Florida Baptists, in recent years, have greatly increased their support of Christian Education, but they still lag far behind all other southern states in this respect. There is critical need at Stetson University for new buildings—a new fireproof library building, a new Fine Arts building, a new science building, a new auditorium and Chapel, new classrooms and new equipment. There are other vital needs, which must be met if the University is to maintain its high standing among educational institutions. Denominational colleges and universities must meet required educational standards if they expect to survive. Failure in this matter is a way of committing institutional suicide with all denominational loss involved. Considering the vital importance of Christian Education in the kind of world in which we live and the needs of our Baptist Colleges, and Stetson University, the future depends to a large extent on what the churches do now for these institutions.

BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE of Graceville and Lakeland, Florida opened the 1955 session with indications of its best year. Plans have been made to continue the Lakeland division just as originally announced. The 1955 enrollment was up. Extensions are operating in Miami and Live Oak. Other extensions will be started.

Property at Graceville consists of 160 acre campus. Il buildings, two endowment building projects—namely, Hatchery and a Poultry Research project. Total Baptist Bible Institute assets now exceed \$200,000. Sincere appreciation is expressed to those churches that make possible this vital ministry by supporting the Institute through designated gifts. Baptist Bible Institute is dedicated to preparing young men for the ministry who cannot attend college or seminary.

Immediate building needs of Southern Seminary in Louisville. Kentucky, include an office wing on the administration building to accommodate a growing faculty, an adequate library, and a women's dormitory. Forty mission Sunday schools and churches have been established in the

past two years. Sixty-three students were registered from Florida during the year, forty-two of whom were graduates of Stetson University. Four new faculty members were added to the staff during the year.

Expansion is the order of the day at Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, as evidenced by an enlarged faculty and student body, a \$5,000,000 building program, and renewed emphasis on an endowment program. Eight new faculty members were added to the staff during the year. Acute needs of Southwestern are additions to the faculty, teaching facilities, a student union building, erection of a nursery, and a small clinic for first aid. Mission volunteers numbered 402 this year.

The New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, in New Orleans, Louisiana, seems to be under unusual lavor of God and men. The second session on the new seventy-live acre campus has been completed. The training of ordained or licensed ministers is the chief task of the Seminary. The School of Religious Education entered a new building in 1955, and is now ready for the finest training possibilities.

There are a total of twelve graduates under appointment by the Foreign Mission Board and sixteen by the Home Mission Board from Golden Gate Seminary in Berkeley, California. Under the Practical Activities program, six missions were started. 17 new churches were organized, and 378 rescue mission and street services were held. Construction of buildings on the new campus site will begin in 1957. The Seminary now has seventeen faculty members.

Wake Forest College has set June 1956 for its removal date. Southeastern Seminary at Wake Forest, North Carolina will then have all the campus facilities and will begin immediately to renovate and remodel. By September 1956, it is hoped that all qualified students who apply may be accepted. The needs are for student aid and books for the library. Twenty students from Florida were enrolled for the year. The Cooperative Program is the Seminary's strength and hope.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The Relief and Annuity Board sustained two great losses in the year 1954. Orville Groner, Treasurer for over 30 years, and Dr. Walter R. Alexander, Executive Secretary, both died. Even with this great loss it was a year of great change also in expansion in all departments of our work. New men elected were: Dr. R. S. Jones, Associate Secretary, to Supervisor of Investments; Mr. Owen Henley, Assistant to Dr. Jones; Mr. Fred W. Noe, Treasurer.

The Ministers Retirement Plan was closed to new members and Ministers Security Plan inaugurated in all states except N. C. as of July 1. The new Southern Baptist Protection Plan was inaugurated in all states except N. C., and the Baptist Board's Security Plan was prompted.

The Relief Department did not receive enough to meet its expenditures If this continues the Board is going to be forced to curtail relief payments in the states where relief offerings are not sufficient to care for the needs.

Probably the best news to the younger ministers is the operation of the Southern Baptist Protection Plan. The benefits are similar to, and the payments are the same as the Ministers Security Plan. However, there is no ceiling on the annuity the pastor may earn, or on the annuity his widow may draw, whether he dies before or after retirement. His annuity is based on 11/2% credit for each year of participation, the widow's a percentage of this. The plan also has a lump sum death benefit.

The member may pay on a reduced salary basis should unforseen difficulties arise. This means that he may pay dues on a much smaller salary than he actually receives.

We have a great Convention of Churches, (29,000 in all with 26,000 active pastors. Though the Relief and Annuity Board may seem to many a wealthy agency, when we think of it in relation to the size of our Convention, persons involved, money invested, and the annuity funds of other denominations, we realize that the opportunities to grow are so vast that we are only in the beginnings.

The goal of the Board is to enlist new members and enroll all Southern Baptist Churches, to keep its present membership active, to enlist understanding among our seminary students, and lead all concerned to realize the importance of the denominational retirement program.

Our goal should be to enlist every church and pastor in some one of the denominational plans so they can benefit in the days when the

pastors can no longe serve the churches profitably.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

In the Alachua Baptist Association, our records indicate the following facts:

23 churches with a total membership of 4,248,

22 churches with a total of 37 revivals, 22 churches with a total of 229 baptisms.

1 church with no baptisms,

22 churches with 501 total additions for the year.

In March we cooperated with the entire Southern Baptist Convention in conducting the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade. The following is a report of that crusade in our Association:

17 churches participated (6 churches with one week, 11 churches with

two week's meetings)

10 churches reported 105 baptisms

8 churches reported 49 additions by letter 3 churches reported 7 additions by statement

13 churches reported 285 rededications

13 churches reported a total of 446 decisions during the crusade.

The executive committee voted to promote a simultaneous crusade for our Association next March 18 - April 1. It is our hope that every church in the Association will cooperate in this effort.

It is the conviction of your chairman of evangelism that within our churches we must recapture the meaning of New Testament Evangelism with its imperative to go. To that end I wish to make the following suggestions:

1. That our pulpits be characterized by warm-hearted messages to

tell people of the power of God to save,

2. That we conduct in our churches a planned program by which we can conserve the results of our soul winning efforts, i. e., that we make an earnest effort to train and enlist the new Christians in the total program of the church,

3. That we recognize the value of our laymen as soul-winners and therefore conscientiously seek to enlist and train the men of churches to

win souls for Christ,

4. That we recognize the magnitude of our non-resident church membership problem and strive to claim the lives of these people for the service of God through our churches.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE

To the Eexecutive Committee Alachua Baptist Association

The Missions Committee has been working to reach the directive of the Association as contained in the report of the missions committee to the Association (page 15, 1954 minutes) that we work toward hiring of an associational missionary on October 1, 1955. Your committee met in Webster, Florida, on May 10, 1955, at which time the chairman was instructed to send to all pastors of the Association a letter requesting an estimate as to how much each church would be able to give toward the expenses of this increased budget. These letters were mailed to each of the pastors on May 27, 1955. At the present time, a response has come from 7 churches. The combined estimate of the 7 churches would be approximately \$590.00 toward a necessary budget of \$2500 to \$3000.

On the basis of this enquiry, it is the unanimous opinion of your missions committee that it would be unwise to attempt to secure an associational missionary at this time. We therefore recommend that the Executive Committee free the Missions Committee from the directive to secure a missionary to assume his duties as of October 1, 1955.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION HOSPITALS

Baptist Memorial Hospital - Jacksonville

The new Baptist Hospital in Jacksonville opened September 13 to receive patients. This Hospital is operated by the Hospital Board of the Southern Baptist Convention with Dr. Frank Tripp as Executive Secretary.

This new hospital when completed will be a modern 310 bed general hospital completly air-conditioned, with individual contols in each patient's room. Among the most modern features are that oxygen is piped to each room, as well as inter-communication systems installed between the patient and nurses' stations. Ten operating rooms and two cystoscopic rooms are provided which will help to bring relief to the Jacksonville hospitals' crisis. The estimated value of the Hospital is reported at \$4,250,000.

Southern Baptist Hospital - New Orleans

During the year 1954, a total of 37,585 people were admitted for all types of care. Of these 23,960 were bed patients, 13,625 were out patients, and 3,987 were newborn infants. The hospital employs 889 people to care for these patients, and Student Nurses are not included in this total.

The hospital rendered \$106,957.35 in free service to the deserving poor. Large sums of money have been spent on modernizing the original buildings of the hospital. \$120,000 was received from the Cooperative Program for Capital Improvements and \$40;113.30 was received from cooperative funds and applied on free service rendered to the poor.

The Hospital's School of Nursing had a total of 188 students in 1954. They have a full-time director of Student Activities who works closely with an excellent faculty to assure a well-rounded program of educational and recreational opportunities.

FLORIDA BAPTIST REGIONAL HOSPITALS

The Florida Baptist Regional Hospitals are nonprofit Baptist Corporations. The Corporation Charters provide the Hospital Corporation shall be a benevolent and charitable association, and that each member of the Corporation shall be a member of a Missionary Baptist Church, in Florida affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. They are owned and operated by these local Baptist organizations as provided in the Hospital Policy passed by the State Mission Board on June 7, 1946. As instructed by the State Convention and recorded on page 36 of the 1946 annual. The Officers and Board members serve without compensation. They serve as a faithful steward of God in Healing Ministry.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE

Your missions committee has worked through the year under the direction of the executive committee in an effort to bring about the will of the Association concerning our associational missions program. We were under instructions from the Association of last year to work toward the securing of an associational missionary for our Association who would assume his duties October 1, 1955. Realizing this plan would necessitate a substantial increase in our associational budget, we made enquiry of the churches to find if we would be able to undertake the the increased financial responsibility. The response indicated that the churches were not able or not willing to assume the added responsibility. We reported our findings to the executive committee, and the committee then voted to free the missions committee from the directive.

We regret to report, therefore, that we have not been able to carry out the instructions of the Association of last year. However, we have enjoyed a year of good relations with our regional missions superintendent, Rev. H. Clyde Harless, who has worked under the direction of the Cooperative Missions Department of the state convention in the Marion, Alachua, and Pasco Associations. We include a report of his activities for the year. He has been on the job for eleven months (November 1, 1954 through September 30, 1955).

334 days spent in the field; 19.727 miles traveled; 122 visits made to churches; 18 visits made to missions; 210 conferences with pastors; 16 associational meetings attended; 4 state meetings attended; 2 regional conferences attended; 1 southwide conference attended; 21 committee meetings attended; 60 prayer services attended; 17 training classes taught; 6 revivals conducted; 16,000 tracts distributed; 146 sermons preached; 12 addresses delivered; 1 group training school taught; 22 additions by baptism; 27 additions by letter.

We commend Brother Harless to the churches as a servant of our Lord who can be of great assistance in the work of the church.

We look forward with faith and hope that the coming year will record a much greater effort on our part toward the work of missions in our Association.
