

CONSTITUTION

- 1. This Body shall be known as the Alachua Bapist Association of Florida.
- 2. It shall be composed of Southern Baptist Churches of the same faith and gospel order, voluntarily banded together for missionary, educational and benevolent service.
- 3. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot, and by a majority of vote, on the first day of the Annual Meeting; but the Association may, by a unanimous vote, instruct the Clerk to cast the ballot of the body as a whole. Officers elected shall assume office at the close of the Annual Session which elects them. No person elected Moderator shall hold office for a longer period than two consecutive years, not counting an unexpired term. The Association in annual session, shall elect or approve all departmental heads for the ensuing year.
- 4. Each Church shall be entitled to two messengers, and shall entitled to one additional messenger to every twenty-five addition members over the first fifty, provided no Church may have more than ten messengers. These duly elected messengers who are present shall constitute the Association in annual session.
- 5. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of the following: the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Associational Sunday School; Director of the Associational Training Union, President of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Director of the Associational Music Department, together with all pastors who hold membership within the Association and one other member from each cooperating Church.
- 6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the Body. When necessary, the time and/or place of any meeting may be set or changed by the Executive Com-
- 7. The Association shall recognize the independence of Churches and shall not in any wise seek to exercise jurisdiction over them, vet shall have power to drop from its connection any Church found to be unorthodox in faith or practice.
- 8. Churches may be admitted into this Body by petitionary letter provided they shall have been found orthodox and of a cooperative spirit. Each Church, before being admitted, must make application through the Moderator or the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual Associational meeting, provided however, that the Association may waive the three months period by unanimous vote of the members present. The Church making petition shall set forth in writing their doctrinal belief and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which the Association is governed. Upon reception, the Moderator shall, for the Association extend to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
- 9. Any Church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection with the Association If desired, by giving proper notice of such intention. If any Church fails to be represented in annual meetings for three years in succession, it may be dropped from active membership.
- 10. The Association in annual session, may alter or amend this constitution by a three-fourth vote of members present and voting.

BY-LAWS

- 1. All sessions of this Body shall be opened and closed reverently in duly approved form.
- 2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, present for discussion and vote all motions properly ordered, and perform all other duties usually appertaining to this office. He shall not vote except in the case of a tie. The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator or when asked by the Moderator to preside.
- 3. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as authority in all matters of parliamentary procedure.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings, prepare the manuscript for the press, have minutes printed, and distribute them to the hurches as early as possible after the annual meetings and shall keep a complete file of minutes for use of the Association.
- 5. The Treasurer, who also may be Clerk, shall keep an accurate record of all moneys received and disbursed, shall pay out money only upon instruction from the Body and shall make an itemized report of all receipts and disbursements to the Association in annual session. If requested, the Treasurer shall make a quarterly statement to the Executive Committee.
- 6. The Executive Committee, which is the Association ad interim, shall have general supervision of all work initiated and fostered by the Association. It shall meet at least quarterly to plan for the promotion of all phases of the work, the time and place of meeting to be set by the Executive Committee. It shall use its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activities of the Churches and shall report its work to the Association in annual session.
- 7. The Vice-Moderator shall be program Chairman for all Annual Sessions of the Association. Upon a vacancy occurring in the office of Moderator, the Vice-Moderator shall assume all duties of the Moderator.
- 8. The Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, Historian, Chairman of of the Body in annual session.
- 9. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote Evangelism, and the Trustees of the Assembly Grounds will be nominated by a committee appointed by the Moderator.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE ALACHUA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- 1. The One Hundred Eleventh Annual Session of the Alachua Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, James D. Johnston, pastor of the Floral City Baptist Church. The Association sang "All Hail The Power" led by Gene Hitchcock, accompanied by Mrs. James D. Johnston.
- 2. On motion of C.E. Simpkins, the Alachua Association was organized with messengers, whose names appear on the letters from the churches.
- 3. On motion of Howard Long the printed program was adopted subject to changes necessary.
- 4. The Association sang "A Mighty Fortress", led by Gene Hitchcock; C.E. Simpkins led in prayer.
- 5. Thomas Tobey, Highlands Chapel Baptist Church, Ocala, brought the morning Bible Study "That The World May Know" John 3: 16.
- 6. A warm welcome was extended to the Association by T.W. Harrison, Floral City. J.W. Harris, Linden, responded to the welcome.
- 7. New pastors in the Association were presented by D.D. Townsend: T.N. Channell, Inverness; J.W. Harris, Linden; C.E. Wade, Wahoo; Josh Long, Webster; Gene Hitchcock, Wildwood; C.L. Martin, Coleman; Kenneth E. Hawkins, Gulf Ridge Park.
- 8. The Moderator, James D. Johnston, welcomed each of these, and their wives, on behalf of the Association.
- 9. The Moderator named the following committees:

- 10. Howard Long, Vice-Moderator, recognized the following visitors; Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Harless, Field Secretary; Rev. Ralph Harris, Wildwood; Rev. Dale Murray, Pastor of Ocean Park Baptist Church, Jacksonville; Dr. Paul Meigs, Secretary of Evangelism for Florida Baptist Convention; Rev. Paul Dennington, Pastor of Newberry Baptist Church; Charles Sproul, representing the Baptist Children's Home in Lakeland; and members of the Garden Grove Baptist Church.
- 11. Motion by C.E. Wade carried that the Report on Christian Literature as found in the Summary of Reports be adopted. (See page 19).

- 12. The Association sang "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" led by Harold Harlee, accompanied by Mrs. J.D. Johnston.
- 13. Motion prevailed that the Treasurer's Report as given by W.E. Crum be adopted. (See page18).
- 14. C.E. Simpkins gave the Auditing Committee Report. Motion carried that the report be adopted as given.
- 15. Howard Long read a petitionary letter from the Garden Grove Baptist Church, asking to be admitted into the Alachua Baptist Association. Howard Long moved, on behalf of the committee, that the church be admitted into the Association. Motion carried. James Johnston extended a warm welcome to the church.
- 16. Moderator James Johnston declared the floor open for nominations for Moderator and Vice-Moderator. C.E. Simpkins nominated James Johnston for Moderator. Motion was made and passed that the nominations cease and the Clerk cast a unanimous ballot for Brother Johnston. Richard Kaufman, Clerk, cast unanimous ballot for James Johnston to serve as Moderator for the 112th year of the Alachua Baptist Association. Rev. Johnston addressed the Association, expressing his appreciation.
- 17. D.D. Townsend nominated Howard Long of Center Hill to serve as Vice-Moderator. C.E. Simpkins moved that the nominations cease, and Clerk be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Howard Long to serve as Vice-Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 18. Harold Harlee read the Report of the Nominating Committee. James Johnston asked that his name be removed as Newsletter Editor, as his time will be limited. Another editor will be elected at a later date. Motion carried, that these be elected as nominated EXCEPT for Newsletter Editor.
- 19. Report on Evangelism was given by Robert M. Johnson. Motion carried that the report be adopted as given. (See page 19). Dr. Paul Meigs, Secretary of Evangelism for the Florida Baptist Convention, spoke to the report.
- 20. The Association sang, "Amazing Grace" led by Harold Harlee. The closing prayer and blessing was given by Dr. Paul Meigs before adjourning for dinner.
- 21. THE AFTERNOON SESSION was opened by the Vice-Moderator, Howard Long. The Association sang "He Keeps Me Singing," led by Harold Harlee.
- 22. The Association was led in prayer by H.E. Goodman, pastor of Citronelle Baptist Church.
- 23. Rev. Thomas Tobey brought the afternoon Bible Study, "That The World May Know."
- 24. Mrs. S.L. Lloyd gave the W.M.U. Report. Motion carried that the report be adopted as reads in the Summary of Reports (See page 23).
- 25. Motion by Josh Long carried that the Report on the Baptist Foundation be adopted as reads in the Summary of Reports. (See page 14). Rev. Paul Dennington spoke to the report.

- 26. C.L. Martin made a motion that the Report of the Bible Society be adopted as reads in the Summary of Reports. (See page 15). Motion carried.
- 27. John Perry introduced Brother G.B. Tompkins from Coleman, who is the Brotherhood President for the ensuing year. Brother Tompkins spoke concerning the Associational Brotherhood, and pledged himself to the service. No Brotherhood Report.
- 28. The Moderator, James Johnston, called for announcements, and miscellaneous business. He referred to business left from last year, concerning the change of meeting times. Motion carried that the first day be in 2 sessions, instead of 3. The first session will begin at 1:30 P.M. (See #72 of last year's Minutes.)
- 29. The Music Report was read by Harold Harlee. Motion carried that the report be adopted. The Association was treated to a special, "Count Your Many Blessings," sung by the pastors of the Association, who were present.
- 30. The Association sang "Jesus Saves," led by Harold Harlee, accompanied by Mrs. James Johnston.
- 31. Mrs. E.W. Gideons moved the adoption of the Children's Home Report as stated in Summary of Reports (See page 24). Motion carried. Charles Sproul spoke to the report, after which he answered many questions concerning the Children's Home.
- 32. Dr. Paul Edmonds, President of Stetson University, paid a surprise visit to the Association. He spoke on the influence of Christian Education.
- 33. The afternoon session was closed with prayer, led by Dr. Paul Edmonds.
- 34. THE TUESDAY EVENING SESSION was opened with the Association singing, "The Kingdom Is Coming," accompanied by Mrs. James Johnston.
 - 35. S.M. Gideons led in the evening scripture reading and prayer.
- 36. The Annual Missionary Sermon was given by Harold Harlee, pastor of Oxford Baptist Church.
- 37. Report on Regional Missions was given by Clyde Harless, Field Secretary. Motion carried that the report be adopted as reads in the Summary of Reports. (See page 21).
- 38. James D. Johnston moved that the Home, State and Foreign Missions Board be adopted as reads in the Summary of Reports. Motion carried. (See page 21).
- 39. Gene Hitchcock spoke on the Co-operative Program; then moved the adoption of the Co-operative Program Report as given in the Summary of Reports. Motion carried. (See page 22).
- 40. The Association sang "Send The Light," led by Harold Harlee, and accompanied by Mrs. James Johnston.
 - 41. The Evening Bible Study on Missions was brought by Dr. Paul Meigs.

- 42, Dr. Paul Meigs led the Association in the closing prayer.
- 43. THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION was called to order by the Moderator.
- 44. The Association sang "Marching to Zion," led by Gene Hitchcock, accompanied by Harold Harlee.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The Florida Baptist Foundation has been serving the Florida Baptist Convention since 1947 in emphasizing the wider aspects of stewardship-stewardship concerning the things we accumulate and leave behind. We believe this to be a sound basis upon which to view this over all responsibility and would commend to our people this practice. In a very significant sense ALL we have is from God and in respect of ALL we have we should plan our stewardship program.

Let us say once again that the Foundation does not primarily seek funds for its own use. The Foundation is a service arm of the Convention and the Convention graciously provides funds for its maintenance. The Foundation seeks, primarily, to assist the various Agencies and Institutions of the State

and Southewide fellowship.

Again let us emphasize the matter of "Will-Making" as a means by which the larger stewardship of possessions may be carried out. Along with the provisions made for loved ones, we may make provision for Kingdom matters by this means. When such provision is made the faithful steward may designate precisely how he wants his bequest to serve the Kingdom's interests.

We call attention again to the matter of Annuity contracts which we are able to arrange with the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. By this means an Annuitant may have the income from his purchase of such a contract for his lifetime and still have the privilege of designating the "gift portion" of the Annuity to an Agency or Institution in which his interests may lie. Beside this, the purchaser is relieved of the necessity and responsibility of investing and reinvesting his funds so as to be assured of his income. The Relief and Annuity Board through its very competent and consecrated group of investment specialists sees to all this and by its contract with the Annuitant assures him of the rate of income he

will receive.

REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

We Baptists have a zeal of God. Let us be sure that it is a zeal "according to knowledge." If our zeal is to endure and expand and win the victory, it must be zeal which is "according to knowledge." When knowledge is so readily available, then to go about in ignorance seeking to establish our own way is but to play the fool.

Let us therefore, as individual Christians who have been enlightened by the Spirit of Truth, determine that we will not knowingly allow ignorance to continue concerning the corporate fellowship and work in our churches and our denomination.

Our Baptist literature and periodicals are among the finest instruments for the dissemination of helpful knowledge to make of our people better informed Baptists that they in turn may become more fruitful Baptists.

Southern Baptists continue to step up their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as rapidly as our people will make use of the publications. Last year the Sunday School Board printed and distributed 84,160,000 copies of its periodicals, 4,200,320 books, 57,200,000 pre-printed church bulletins and millions of tracts.

Circulation of the Commission (foreign missions journal) is now 134,063, Home Missions Magazine 167,000, Home Life Magazine 781,150, Brotherhood Journal 108,000, W.M.U. publications 518,000 monthly, plus 36,000 quarterly - for record circulation on every hand.

At the 1957 Convention in Chicago, the 25 Baptist State Papers reported a combined circulation of 1,279,691 copies each issue, with three new state papers having been added in recent years.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, (as of August 1, 1957) is going into 47,589 homes in 705 different churches. Six hundred thirty-three of these churches are using the Budget Plan for at least a part of their membership. Seventy-two other churches have small Clubs of subscribers. There are still some 30,000 Baptist homes in Florida into which the churches are not sending the paper. There are yet 430 Florida Baptist churches which are failing to take advantage of the most economical medium of information which they can provide their members, namely a Budget subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

We would urge every church that now has the WITNESS going into only part of its homes to enlarge its subscription list to include every resident family, and every church which does not have the WITNESS in its budget to consider sending it into the homes of its members promptly.

The fastest and most economical help toward a better informed, more completely enlisted, more thoroughly generous, more genuinely missionary membership is for your church to send the BAPTIST WITNESS to every family in its membership through the simple Church Budget Plan, the small cost to be paid in easy monthly installments.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

IN THE ALACHUA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, OUR RECORDS INDICATE THE FOLLOWING FACTS:

- 23 Churches with a total resident membership of 3264;
- 20 Churches reporting a total of 27 revivals;
- 20 Churches reporting a total of 181 baptisms;
- 20 Churches reporting a total of 431 additions, 261 re-dedications and
- 28 dedications for full-time Christian Service;

RESULTS FROM REVIVALS INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING: Of 17 churches reporting revivals, there were 98 additions as direct

result of the revivals.

Of those churches reporting, there were 17 RESIDENT members for each baptism. We note that the 1958 plan of our Southern Baptist Conven-

tion is that we will win 475,000 convents to the Master.

The evangelism theme is "A Warm and Workable Program of Evangelism to Every Member." This means that we will need to have every member plan to be a personal winner next year. Last year the Convention had 5,260 churches which reported no baptisms. Certainly we want to lower our number of members per baptism as the result of an increased emphasis on Evangelism.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

As our children grow, we must be ready to provide for them. Florida is growing also, and we must be ready to provide for her. If, as predicted, Florida is to grow from the 13th most populated state in our United States to the 8th most populated by the mid-1960's, our State Mission work must grow to reach these people for Christ. A blessing to Florida, a challenge to Christian people is this unprecedented increase in our population. Never has there been such a sense of urgency needed as now to meet the needs of this increase in population. We must not get behind in expanding to meet the great needs of the future.

Certainly we must put great emphasis on our new work, but not forget the well-established activities within the state. Our budget for the closing year 1956-1957 was \$1,600,000. We divided this 50-50 between State and southwide causes. Out of Florida's \$800,000 of the \$1,600,00 we cared for all our work and expanded as we had means to do it. The only reason more expansion was not undertaken was because support was not in evidence.

The "Forward Look" seems to be the theme in the automotive field. We, as Christians, must have a forward look if our program is to advance. Our churches must catch a vision and join with the state office in an advanced program. Such a program of church finance is now being offered to our churches, but we must accept and follow its plans. Led by Christ and working together, we can reach the permanent population of 6,119,000 as predicted for Florida by 1970.

HOME MISSION REPORT

Reports from our Home Mission Board show that we are on the move forward in that field. At the beginning of 1957, the Board reported 1,180 missionaries, an increase of 81 over the previous year. Professions of

faith reported by the missionaries numbered 39,458, an increase of 1,983

over the previous year.

A continued emphasis on soul-winning in the churches will be pursued. Along with this, the "30,000 Program" to establish 10,000 new churches and 20,000 additional mission stations, will continue with renewed effort. In 1956 home missionaries were instrumental in starting 729 new missions and constituting 296 new churches.

The Chaplains' Commission is doing a good work among our boys in service. There are 421 chaplains reported on active duty and 11,074 pro-

fessions of faith reported in their ministry.

The Home Mission Board's work is an important one which we must never forget. They covet your prayers and support.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

"Go ye into all the world," echo the words of Jesus, and that is just what our Baptist Foreign Mission Board is doing. Missionaries moved into Tanganyika, Kenya, Pakistan, Jamaica, and Yugoslavia this last year bringing the number of countries and territories served to 38.

A mission-minded people is what is needed as we continue to reach the world for Christ. "The most desperate need we face is the need for additional nurses," says Elmer S. West, Jr., the Board's secretary for missionary personnel. He states that we need five times as many as we have prospects for appointment. Also, we need preachers, teachers, doctors, and others who meet requirements for missionary service.

We, who cannot go, can support our program with our money. Received from all sources during 1956 was \$12,733,681. Contributions for foreign missions accounted for \$12,474,638 of that amount. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for the fiscal year (May 1, 1956 to May 1, 1957)

amounted to \$5,240,745.39.

FIELD SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR DISTRICT SEVEN ALACHUA, PASCO, AND MARION ASSOCIATIONS (for the past year)

Days spent on field, 332; on other fields, 23; out due to illness 10 days,

making a total of 365 days accounted for.

I have traveled 21,585 miles in my work, visited 259 Churches and 23 Missions. Conferences with 167 pastors, attended 39 associational meetings, 8 State wide and 2 Convention wide meetings. I attended 27 committee meetings and 55 prayer meetings. Taught 37 classes, conducted 8 Stewardship Revivals (securing 432 tithers), 4 Evangelistic meetings. Delivered a total of 191 sermons and addresses, resulting in 42 additions to the Churches.

I have assisted in I Vacation Bible School, I Church Camp, shown 120 film-strips on Home and Foreign Missions, assisted in the Ordination of 3 Ministers and 10 Deacons. Also assisted in the Dedication of 2 Church

Buildings.

I distributed 11,800 tracts, mailed 431 letters and cards, moderated at 4 Church Conferences, helped to organize 1 Brotherhood and baptized 3 people.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

1956-1957

The Alachua Association held eleven regular meetings during the year, including a Training Banquet at Brooksville. In these regular meetings there was an average attendance of 94, average number of Pastors 10, average number of superintendents 8, and average number of churches represented,

13. During the past year we have had 570 training awards.

The VBS Clinic was held in the Inverness Baptist Church, and was well attended. Thus far, we have received reports from 13 churches with a total enrollment of 1086, average attendance 871, professions of faith, 11, and \$293.29 given to the Cooperative Program.

For the coming year there is a program planned for each month in a different church. The regular time for the meeting will be the afternoon

of the third Sunday of the month.

Our goals for the coming year are as follows:

 That we have 20 churches to observe January Bible Study Week (January 6-10, 1958);

2. That we have 20 VBS schools or Mission schools each year;

3. That we have 10 churches observe Preparation Week (Sept. 21-28);

4. That we sponsor 2 new Mission Sunday Schools during the year;

5. That we have a VBS Clinic April 1, 1958;

 That we strive to reach the Associational Sunday School Standard as a program of work.

STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

Mission gifts through the Cooperative Program increased nearly \$1.3 million in 1956 over 1955 throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. 1955 gifts were \$35.7 million and 1956 gifts were \$37 million. This is a 3.6% increase. Florida's increase for the same period was from \$1,584,450 to \$1,758,633, or a 11% increase.

More and more churches are finding that the best way to increase Cooperative Program giving is on a percentage of the church's total budget, including building fund. The Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Chicago last May, adopted a goal of each church increasing its percentage to missions to the Cooperative Program by 2% of the total budget (not 2% of the present Cooperative Program gifts) per year between now and the Jubilee Year, 1964. The Florida Baptist Convention meeting in Lakeland, November 8-10, 1955, voted that each cooperating church be asked to increase its gifts through the Cooperative Program by at least 1% of its total budget receipts each year.

Already destined to play a vital role in helping to increase church incomes for all causes is the Forward Program of Church Finance. 43 churches which used the Program by May 20, 1957, reported that their number of tithers jumped from 9 thousand to 17 thousand, and their weekly pledges from \$44 thousand to \$72 thousand. These same 43 churches increased their Cooperative Program gifts from \$500 thousand to \$700

thousand.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION HOSPITALS

Baptist Memorial Hospital - Jacksonville

This 310-room modern hospital was opened September 13, 1955 and is completely air-conditioned, with individual controls in each patient's room. Oxygen is piped to each room. An inter-communication system is installed between the patient and the nurses' stations. It has ten operating rooms and two cystoscopic rooms. Handled 10,432 in patients, including 1383 newborn babies, and handled 6591 out patients, for total of 17,023 patients during 1956. In patients averaged 6 days in hospital. Hospital had average of 166 in patients each day during 1956.

Southern Baptist Hospital - New Orleans

Opened in 1925, this hospital has received \$1.4 million dollars in gifts from the Southern Baptist Convention during 31 years of operation, and during this same period has rendered \$1.9 million dollars in free service to deserving poor, to ministers, and to missionaries. More than 870 missionaries have received free service at this hospital. 981 Christian Nurses have been educated and 363 Intern and Resident Doctors have received their training in Southern Baptist Hospital's Christian environment; many later going on to serve in Home and Foreign Mission Fields. During 1956 this hospital handled 24, 014 in patients, which included 4257 newborn babes, and 15, 679 out patients, for total of 39,693 patients handled. In patients averaged 6 days in hospital...Hospital had average of 427 in patients each day of 1956. Received \$120,000.00 from Cooperative Program for Capital Improvements, and \$40,053.00 which was applied on free service. During year rendered \$158,232.00 in free services.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Alachua Baptist Association met in Annual Session in the First Baptist Church at Brooksville on October 8th. Rev. Bob Johnson, pastorof the church, installed the officers for the ensuing year. Mrs. J.G. Hughes of Gainesville, taught the "Aims for Advancement."

Mrs. J.E. Johnston, Mission Study Chairman, conducted a Mission Study Institute on October 30th in the First Baptist Church at Bushnell; our foreign

mission book, "Japan Advances" was taught.

A Day of Instruction for officers and committee chairmen was held in

The First Baptist Church at Bushnell on November 1st.

Mrs. Dwight Rushing, Youth Director, held an Associational Queen's Coronation in the Floral City Baptist Church on November 12th. Three Queens were crowned; three princesses and eleven maids were recognized. A social hour followed.

First Quarterly Meeting was held in the First Baptist Church at Oxford on January 10th. Mrs. Edna Wallace, a Missionary from our Home Mission Field, taught our mission study book "Home Missions, U.S.A."

Spring Meeting was held in the Baptist Church at Eden. Mrs. J.A. Dyess

of Wildwood presented a program on "The Christian Home."

Summer Meeting in charge of Youth Director, was held in the First Baptist Church at Bushnell on August 1st. The Y.W.A.'s and G.A.'s of the association were on the program. Miss Marie Connor, one of our missionaries from Formosa, gave a talk on missions in China and Formosa.

On August 8th, Mrs. Rushing held a Sunbeam Shower at the Wahoo Baptist Church. Two Sunbeam books were taught. Leaders' Conference for Sunbeam workers was held at the same time. Luncheon was served.

The Alachua Associational W.M.U. is sponsoring an Essay Contest for the Y.W.A.'s and Intermediate G.A.'s of the Association - subject: "Evils of Alcohol." The Y.W.A. winner will have one-half of their expenses paid to Ridgecrest next summer and the G.A. winner will have one-half of expenses paid to State Summer Camp.

The Alachua Association W.M.U. has held all of the regular quarterly meetings, and an Executive Board Meeting prior to each business session. They have also be represented at all of the State conferences and conven-

tions.

The Alachua Association W.M.U. has gained this year 3 new societies, 5 new circles, 15 new auxiliaries, and 110 new members inclusive.

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

In the 39th year of service to Southern Baptists, the Relief and Annuity Board reports nearly 16,000 pastors and denominational workers enrolled in the retirement plans. During 1956 the membership increased by 1,885.

Benefits paid out in 1956 total \$1,946,654.03. Of this amount, \$320,-443.21 went to the 1,474 aged preachers and widows on the relief rolls.

To meet the relief needs, the Board can only use funds designated "relief." In 1956, this consisted of \$186,000 from the Cooperative Program and \$143,000 from gifts and special offerings. The long-range answer to the needs of relief is to prevent these needs from occurring by each church and pastor enrolling in the retirement plan of Southern Baptists.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

Since the first child came to the Florida Baptist Children's Home in February 1904, the Home has assisted more than 2500 children. During 1956, it assisted 293 children which is the largest number ever helped in a given year. This increase in assistance was made possible by the establishment of a department of social service. There are three graduate case workers on the staff, each with a Master's Degree in social work. This will enable the Home to do Foster Home placement, and provides a better counseling service for the children who need it. The Home can now help more children without encreasing the number of cottages at Lakeland. They can extend the Mother's Aid Program to the fullest and give a better service to those who must have care in private homes.

The Home at Miami was opened August 28, 1957. It is a branch of the Florida Baptist Children's Home in Lakeland and in no way is it a separate children's home. It has two cottages now occupied by children and workers. When completed, this branch will be composed of 4 cottages for children, an office, and a home for the manager. The workers and children attend

church at the Wayside Baptist Chapel in Kendall.

We wish to emphasize the importance of a continuation of your help to our children. Let us help by assisting them through the Cooperative Program and the Thanksgiving Offering.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Two events of 1957 are of great importance to Alachua Association and Florida Baptists. First, Florida Baptists now own and operate Baptist Bible Institute. The school is located in Graceville, Florida, and will be of great service to all Florida. Second, Stetson University and the Florida Baptist Convention are now closer related than ever before and the future of this mission endeavor is brighter today than at any moment in the history of the Baptist cause in Florida.

We join our hearts in prayer for these two institutions - the faculty, the student body, the officers - and pledge our support to every effort they make

toward Christian Education in Florida.

During the 1956-1957 session in our five seminaries, there were 6,196 students enrolled. We have great men of God on the staffs of our seminaries and we must support them with our prayers as well as financially. Each of our seminaries need more classrooms, and living quarters. More professorships must be endowed if we are to meet the needs of God-called men to have better training.

MUSIC REPORT

An Associational Music Festival was conducted January 29th at Bushnell, with members by groups from First Church Brooksville, Eden, Wildwood.

and four choirs from Oxford. The State District Festival was held in Orlando, but I have no report of our churches participating there.

There is to be a State sponsored Association Music Leadership Conference on Thursday, November 7th, at 7:30 p.m. at Floral City. The District Festival will be held February 21-22 at First Church in Gainesville.

One Hymn Sing was held September 29th with several churches of our and Marion Associations represented, at Oxford. We hope for a better attendance at future "sings"; those who did not attend missed a good program.

Harmony Bay Youth Music Camp is growing each year in numbers-quality of work--and spiritual results. This year 26 made a decision at the Consecration Service for Intermediate Week. Next year there will be two weeks; August 4-9 for Intermediates, and August 11-16 for Intermediates and Young People. Choir singing--classes--swimming in the bay--good food--new friends--all of this and more goes to make up Harmony Bay. Your church can recommend 5 for each week. Plan now.

The "Pastor's Chorus" has performed at several associational gatherings, and many have complimented their ability. We believe we have the

"singingest" preachers in the state.

We want to plan more musical events for the coming year, and we do beg your co-operation and help in the planning, and your church's representation in the attendance and participation. We cannot do it alone, and must have your help to have a successful work.

We want to encourage every church to concentrate on organizing and promoting choirs among our children and young people. The only sure way to improve our church music for the future, is to "grow" our choir members, starting at the beginner age with the "Celestial Choir."
