REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Records of achievement available through our State Sunday School Secretary, C. F. Barry, reveal that the churches in our association participated as follows: Total church study course awards through August, 1962, 167; in Sunday School Principles and Methods Category, 17, 41; Number churches earning awards in Church Study Course, 8. There were 6 Vacation Bible Schools. Of eleven Sunday Schools, the enrollment is 727, enrollment last year was 684, or a gain of 43.

Our Associational goals for 1962-1963 are as follows:

Vacation Bible Schools, 11. Standard Sunday Schools, 3.

Action Night Attendance, 75, with at least 8 churches represented.

Training Awards in Category, 17, 50.

Churches observing preparation week, 2.

New classes, 5, new departments, 3.

Enlist 3 churches in "Operation Home Folks."

Enlist one church to observe Harvest Day, September 22, 1963.

Make definite plans to help the churches use the Sunday School in support of the Jubilee Revivals.

Our goal for enrollment increase is 5%.

Enlist at least 6 churches to observe January Bible Study Week, January 7-11, 1963.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The theme for the Training Union activities this year was Lengthen and Strengthen, based on Isaiah 54:2:

"Enlarge the place of thy tent and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitation: spare not, lengthen thy cords and strengthen thy stakes."

"M" Night was held in the First Baptist Church of Bristol, with 127 in attendance. Six churches were represented and six pastors were present. Rev. Milton S. Overby of Baptist Bible Institute was the guest speaker.

Five of the eleven churches in the association have active Training Unions with an enrollment of 325. One new Training Union was organized this year at Sumatra.

The theme for Training Union in 1963 is: "Be ye witnesses." Acts 1:8 and the hymn, "Heralds of Christ."

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

Our Retirement Center program has been in operation one year and a half. The Lord has blessed us abundantly and in many ways. Since our last report we have built two more duplex cottages and added nine rooms to the main building. Also, all the porches have been screened, which has added much to the

comfort and security of the residents as well as to the general appearance of the building.

We now have twenty-two residents. Only two single rooms and one duplex cottage are available and we are expecting them

to be called for within a few days.

It will be necessary to continue the building program for several years because many worthy senior citizens are knocking at our doors. Almost all of the Cooperative Program funds we have received have been used in the building program and we now have property and buildings valued at more than four hundred thousand dollars, including the property which was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham. We are largely dependent on mission receipts for the building program.

The residents have enjoyed relatively good health during the year although three of them have had to spend just a few days in the local hospital in Vero Beach. Every one is also enjoying fellowship in the churches and all but two have already placed

their memberships in the local Baptist churches.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Apalachee Association has five missionary societies; 2 G. A.'s and 2 Sunbeam Bands; one nursery in the 11 churches, with a total enrollment of 87.

All organizations have been 100% in reporting.

The highlight of our work this year has been Mission Study. Fourteen Mission Study Classes have been taught with 75% of members reading a Mission Study Book.

Two Societies, Corinth and Poplar Head, have earned 350 points on the Mission Study Achievement Chart and will receive

certificates of honor.

Two Mission Study Institutes have been held.

All Societies have observed the Seasons of Prayer for Foreign, Home and State Missions.

The Study of Missions and the observance of the Seasons of Prayer have resulted in increased gifts to the Cooperative Program and the total gifts to Missions for Lottie Moon Christmas Offering: \$109.60, Annie Armstrong, \$137.36, and State Missions, \$74.00, making a grand total of \$320.96.

The Association was represented at the State Convention in Orlando, the Girls Auxiliary Advanced Leadership Course in Ocala, also good attendance at the Day of Instruction.

Our rallies have been held quarterly and well attended. February 2nd at Bristol with Miss Josephine Jones, State Executive Secretary, as guest speaker. April 10th at Poplar Head with the Rev. Dan Thomas, Regional Missionary, as inspirational speaker. The Youth Rally was held July 16th at Corinth Church with Mrs. Juanita McDaniel, G.A. Director, in charge. Missionary Message was delivered by the Rev. John C. Stevens, of Baptist Bible Institute.

The annual meeting was held with Lake Mystic Church on October 9th. Our 75th Anniversary Goals were presented by the Associational Officers. Three guests of honor over 75 years of age were presented, Mrs. Belle Sumner, Lake Mystic; Mrs.

Lula Jones, Poplar Head; Mrs. Anna Rhoden, Bristol; Rev. John R. Martin, Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Chattahoochee, was the Missionary speaker.

February 1-Lake Mystic, Miss Carolyn Burnett, State Sunbeam Director, guest speaker.

April 16th-Poplar Head. July 16th-Youth Rally, Bristol.

MUSIC REPORT

This past year on an associational level, the Associational Music Ministry organizations showed 37 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 254 churches participated in the Festivals with 507 choral groups, totaling 10,011 choir members, 145 hymn players, 47 song leaders, 6 instrumental ensembles, with a total of 18 participants. Our Association did not participate in the festival during January last year but we plan to participate this next year in January, 1963.

There is a potential in our state of 329 associational music officers in the Associational Music Ministry organizations. This past year Florida reported 329 of these officers with a percentage of 100 which is the highest in the Southern Baptist Convention for Association Music Ministry organizations.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION REPORT

FOUR PROBLEMS WE IN FLORIDA FACE IN 1962: First, the Liquor Traffic (beer, wine and whiskey): Legalized outlets, Florida—16,819; U. S.—425,000. Consumption, Florida—74,000,000 gallons; U. S.—3,000,000,000 gallons. Cost in dollars, Florida-\$450,000,000.00; U. S.-\$12,000,000,000.00. Cost in broken lives, Florida-250,000 alcoholics, 400,000 problem drinkers, 900,000 social drinkers from which the future alcoholics will develop; U. S .- 7,000,000 alcoholics, 15,000,000 problem drinkers, 45,000,000 social drinkers. This evil industry is now spending a half billion dollars per year to advertise, glamorize and promote their products in around the clock "brain-washing" to make customers and addicts out of youth and adults.

Secondly, the Gambling Traffic-now operating 17 dog tracks, 6 horse tracks, 6 Jai Alai Frontons, with \$375,000,000 legally gambled in Florida last year. Bingo, raffles and other games of chance are practiced wherever the law winks at them.

Thirdly, the Obscene Literature Traffic-with its thousands of books, magazines, movies and other "accepted" areas of entertainment literally polluting the very soul of many youth and

Fourthly, Moral Astigmatism and Laringitus (loss of ability to recognize evil and loss of voice to oppose it) on the part of far too many church members.

The basic program and objectives of U.C.A. include legislation, rehabilitation, education and prevention.

With headquarters in Lakeland, the staff is composed of two Baptist ministers, both native Floridians who served in Florida pastorates prior to entering this specialized field of Christian Action. Jack Eppes is Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Phil Padgett is Associate Director.

STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptists's way of saying "yes" to the Great Commission. When Jesus said "Go ye," He said it in the framework of a Biblical plan of finance, which is the tithe. Jesus made this very clear when he said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill." (Matt. 5:17.) Every church should give more earnest attention to the teaching of tithing as the Biblical principle of giving, and to the consistent increase in Cooperative Program giving.

Our world missions programs calls for a stronger appeal than ever before. The work we are able to do through the Cooperative Program and the added strength it receives from the regular use of the Forward Program is encouraging. But the greatest

uplift we can ever give it is prayer.

Recommendations:

We recommend:

1. That each church in Apalachee Association plan and carry out a definite program for teaching its membership to participate in the Biblical form of giving, the tithe;

2. That each church in Apalachee Association set up a system of regular monthly contribution through the Cooperative

3. That each church in Apalachee Association consider the two-plus plan; this is increasing cooperative program gifts by two percent each year;

4. That each church in Apalachee Association study and use the Forward Program in its full form, or in its intermediate or

beginner stages; and

5. That each church in Apalachee Association make a regular habit of praying for Cooperative Program causes.

REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA **BAPTIST WITNESS**

Southern Baptists have many of their best minds engaged in the writing, preparation and publication of literature which is second to none. It is sound in doctrine, easy to understand and attractive to the eye. Both its content and its appearance make it superb literature, and its reasonable cost puts it within the reach of every church.

The circulation of Southern Baptist publications continues to be expanded to meet the indicated needs of our people. Last year our chief publication agency, The Baptist Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn., printed and distributed 110,395,424 copies of its periodicals and graded literature, 5,920,177 books, 67,217,225 preprinted church bulletins, and nearly 17,000,000 tracts.

The other agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their splendid periodicals such as The Commission (Foreign Missions Journal), Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union publications."

ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

A total of \$2,879,816.24 was paid in benefits by the Annuity Board during 1961. More than \$2,654,222 of this went to approximately 4,500 ministers, denominational workers or their families who participated in one of the Board's retirement plans. The remaining amount was paid in relief benefits to 826 aged ministers and widows. During the Board's 43 years of operation, it has paid out benefits totaling more than \$37,304,916.

Total membership in all plans of the Annuity Board was 23,214 on January 1, 1962. In 1961, 1,808 new members were enlisted in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan and 789 churches were enrolled. At the end of the year, 64% of the churches in the Convention were participating in the Board's program. Of this number, 43% were paying total dues for both church and pastor. The Institution Protectical Program, for employees in colleges, hospitals, orphanages and other institutions of this type, enlisted 32 institutions in 1961. Five were new accounts. The others transferred from another plan to the new program.

The Annuity Board now has 14 field men working in 21 state conventions. Their program of education and promotion is conducted through state and associational meetings, on college and seminary campuses, in local churches and through conferences with laymen and pastors.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian education from the viewpoint of Baptists means the activities of education presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian religion. Christian education goes beyond the development of the mental, physical, and social, to include the development of the spiritual side of a student's nature. This plus quality is the justification for the existence of Christian educational institutions and the expenditure of the large sums of monies that are allocated for this cause. Baptists have been believers in education and have earnestly sought to take God into account and to present Christian truth and training.

Florida Baptist Educational Institutions

"Florida Baptists have two schools: Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, located at DeLand, and Baptist Bible Institute, located at Graceville. During the 1961-62 term,

there were 2,788 students enrolled in Stetson University, 635 of whom are Baptists. Eighty-three students are committed to some full time church-related vocation. Of these, 50 are ministerial students, 9 are mission volunteers, 7 are preparing for religious education work, and 17 are preparing for church music service.

Baptist Bible Institute offers a special training program for students who do not qualify for college entrance. Enrollment increased this past year from 187 to 224. Members of the student body come from 19 states, plus Canada, Cuba, and the District of Columbia. The institute has been engaged in a campaign to secure \$200,000 in funds for capital improvements and endowment. There are 13 members of the faculty who carry on the training program.
