

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM AND STEWARDSHIP

FOR THE APALACHEE ASSOCIATION

Missions depends on the reaction of the individual Christian to the responsibility he has been given in the Bible.

In the Old Testament one of the fundamental pronouncements had to do with our possessions. The tithe, or 1/10 of all a man had was required of him. It is the same today.

Our slogan has been "Every Baptist A Tither". In Florida, we have 16.3 % of our church members as tithers 89,538 tithers from 543,676 church members. Next years's goal is 50,000 new tithers, a 10% increase in tithers for Florida Baptists in 1965. The increasing demands of a waiting world make our attention to these matters urgent. Response to this appeal by churches of Apalachee Association, is important. We are suggesting a goal of 10% based on the church membership in 1963 Florida Baptist Annual. This would be 96 new tithers in Apalachee Association. Our new slogan "Begin to tithe in 65".

BUDGET

Our budget last year was \$205,546.50 Of this, \$114,104.48 came through the Florida Baptist Cooperative Program. The State Mission Offering to us was \$9,468.06. Designated gifts from churches and individuals came to \$31,923.64. The rest was from rentals, tuition fees, book sales, etc.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges amounting to \$175,000.00.

CURRENT NEEDS

We still need a library building, cafeteria, and student housing to include both dormitory and apartments. These are needs which we cannot put off very long.

STUDENT LOAN FUND

The student loan fund now has about \$27,000 available for students who show need.

CONCLUSION

Baptist Bible Institute is constantly working at its job, that of specializing in a field of Christian education which other Southern Baptist schools scarcely touch. We are making steady progress toward realizing the dreams of the founders. Because of the excellency of our faculty and the depth of our curriculum, students more and more seek us out. Upon graduation these men usually have pastorates; nearly every one is in demand immediately. We have no problem placing graduates.

We thank you for your love and support. As far as we are able we promise to merit your continuing cooperation. We are working with you as fellow-laborers for the King.

HELP FOR ANNUAL STATE MISSIONS REPORT

Our state executive secretary-treasurer used as the subject of his convention address one year, "Florida Is a Mission Field". There is no question about this because we must provide all types of Southern Baptist ministries to an ever increasing population. We need to constantly strengthen our present witness as well as add new missions, new churches, and new activities.

The strength of our work is dependent upon the response of the churches to cooperative giving. The hearts of men may be touched by God, but they will never be able to go unless we supply the means for going. All missions wait on our giving.

The one major project demanding our attention at the present is the Lake Yale Assembly. The GA Camp is under construction with the RA Camp to follow soon. Both of these programs should be ready for use in 1965. The State Board of Missions voted in May to proceed with the assembly program at Lake Yale, also. The first expenditure will be approximately \$500,000. When completed, the retreat will take care of some 1,000 people.

The convention has, also, voted to start a junior college program. Plans are being made by the Education Committee to bring a definite report to the State Convention Meeting in Tampa in November.

Other matters of importance will continue to claim our attention as Florida grows. One thing we should never forget, however, is the matter of winning the lost to Christ. No program is important, and no institution is necessary, when it stands in the way of evangelism in its most elementary form. Missions revolve around the command of Christ to "Go ye" to preach, and teach in order that men might be won unto Himself.

"This is home missions' most urgent hour," Courts Redford, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board, reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City. "The entire world looks to America for Christian leadership, but America cannot give what she does not continue to have."

2,299 missionaries serve in every state, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico.

More than $$6\ 1/2$$ million came from Southern Baptist for home missions. This amounted to about 62 cents for each Southern Baptist, a nickel per month.

New work and the pioneer areas received increasing support as the older and stronger states took additional financial responsibility. Two-thirds of the more than \$4 million spent by the Missions Division went to the newer states. Also most of the $$6\ 1/2$$ million loaned 479 churches in 1963 went to pioneer areas.

645 student summer Missionaries served ten weeks in every state and Panama during the year.

750 Southern Baptist chaplains presently serve in the military or with hospitals, industry, and other institutions.

46,226 professions of faith were reported by the missionary force. This was a decrease from the 48,700 reported the previous year and reflected a like percentage decrease within the convention, which reported 355,325 baptisms.

The church extension program is receiving increases emphasis in preparation its role as the major vehicle to continue the 30.000 movement. The 30.000 movement, in its climactic year in 1964, reported by January 1 that 5,884 churches and 16,016 missions had been started.

Language instruction for missionaries has been emphasized by the board in sending missionaries to study in Italy, Brazil, and special schools in the United States. A language instruction center was established for Spanish in San Antonio.

Educating church members in missions, a plan to confront every Southern Baptist with the mission story, has been developed and stressed by the Division of Education and Promotion. This plan shows the church how a year-round emphasis can be given to missions education, so the church member will have a conception that will lead to a commitment to missions, in both activities and in money.

Fourteen programs of work were adopted by the board at its midyear meeting, becoming effective January 1. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, urban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptists, evangelism, survey and special studies, and special mission ministries.

We entered the new administration building September, having occupied the new class-room building last March.

Dr. Lewis Curtis (A.B., B.D., TH.D.) has joined the faculty and will teach Biblical Theology. Miss Dorothy Wamble (A.B., M.S.M.) is the new professor of piano. Dr. E. W. Ware has resigned as professor of New Testament; Mrs. Sanders Watford resigned from the music department.

BUDGET

Our budget last year was \$205,546.50 Of this, \$114,104.48 came through the Florida Baptist Cooperative Program. The State Mission Offering to us was \$9,468.06. Designated gifts from churches and individuals came to \$31,923.64. The rest was from rentals, tuition fees, book sales, etc.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges amounting to \$175,000.00.

CURRENT NEEDS

We still need a library building, cafeteria, and student housing to include both dormitory and apartments. These are needs which we cannot put off very long.

STUDENT LOAN FUND

The student loan fund now has about \$27,000 available for students who show need.

CONCLUSION

Baptist Bible Institute is constantly working at its job, that of specializing in a field of Christian education which other Southern Baptist schools scarcely touch. We are making steady progress toward realizing the dreams of the founders. Because of the excellency of our faculty and the depth of our curriculum, students more and more seek us out. Upon graduation these men usually have pastorates; nearly every one is in demand immediately. We have no problem placing graduates.

HELP FOR ANNUAL STATE MISSIONS REPORT

Our state executive secretary-treasurer used as the subject of his convention address one year, "Florida Is a Mission Field". There is no question about this because we must provide all types of Southern Baptist ministries to an ever increasing population. We need to constantly strengthen our present witness as well as add new missions, new churches, and new activities.

The strength of our work is dependent upon the response of the churches to cooperative giving. The hearts of men may be touched by God, but they will never be able to go unless we supply the means for going. All missions wait on our giving.

The one major project demanding our attention at the present is the Lake Yale Assembly. The GA Camp is under construction with the RA Camp to follow soon. Both of these programs should be ready for use in 1965. The State Board of Missions voted in May to proceed with the assembly program at Lake Yale, also. The first expenditure will be approximately \$500,000. When completed, the retreat will take care of some 1,000 people.

The convention has, also, voted to start a junior college program. Plans are being made by the Education Committee to bring a definite report to the State Convention Meeting in Tampa in November.

Other matters of importance will continue to claim our attention as Florida grows. One thing we should never forget, however, is the matter of winning the lost to Christ. No program is important, and no institution is necessary, when it stands in the way of evangelism in its most elementary form. Missions revolve around the command of Christ to "Go ye" to preach, and teach in order that men might be won unto Himself.

"This is home missions' most urgent hour," Courts Redford, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board, reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City. "The entire world looks to America for Christian leadership, but America cannot give what she does not continue to have."

2,299 missionaries serve in every state, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico.

More than $$6\ 1/2$$ million came from Southern Baptist for home missions. This amounted to about 62 cents for each Southern Baptist, a nickel per month.

New work and the pioneer areas received increasing support as the older and stronger states took additional financial responsibility. Two-thirds of the more than \$4 million spent by the Missions Division went to the newer states. Also most of the $$6\ 1/2$$ million loaned 479 churches in 1963 went to pioneer areas.

645 student summer Missionaries served ten weeks in every state and Panama during the year.

750 Southern Baptist chaplains presently serve in the military or with hospitals, industry, and other institutions.

46,226 professions of faith were reported by the missionary force. This was a decrease from the 48,700 reported the previous year and reflected a like percentage decrease within the convention, which reported 355,325 baptisms.

The church extension program is receiving increases emphasis in preparation for its role as the major vehicle to continue the 30.000 movement. The 30.000 movement, in its climactic year in 1964, reported by January 1 that 5,884 churches and 16,016 missions had been started.

Language instruction for missionaries has been emphasized by the board in sending missionaries to study in Italy, Brazil, and special schools in the United States. A language instruction center was established for Spanish in San Antonio.

Educating church members in missions, a plan to confront ever. Southern Baptist with the mission story, has been developed and stressed by the Division of Education and Promotion. This plan shows the church how a year-round emphasis can be given to missions education, so the church member will have a conception that will lead to a commitment to missions, in both activities and in money.

Fourteen programs of work were adopted by the board at its midyear meeting, becoming effective January 1. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, urban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptists, evangelism, survey and special studies, and special mission ministries.

A REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The breakup of homes and the desertion of children has become altogether too common in our society. The sense of responsibility, if indeed many of our people have been taught any, has fled, and hundreds of children are deserted by one or both parents with little or no remorse for what they have done. The number of applications to our Children's Home during the spring and summer, indicate a turn for the worse in family relationships.

The Children's Home has four case workers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their business to counsel with children and parents, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, to keep them together. Their success is shown by the fact that 94 applications were withdrawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near relatives. 75 children were admitted to the homes in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 188 in residential care and 64 assisted through the Mother's Aid program. 1,094 counseling sessions were held with children and 682 with relatives.

It is the right of every child to have his own home. It is the responsibility of every parent to care for his child to the best of his ability. In fact, when children are admitted to the home, parents are asked to pay toward support of their children if at all possible. When parents are unable to care for their children, it becomes the privilege of an institution such as ours, to help. Many excellent men and women have spent some time or have been reared in our Children's Home. Those who are so unfortunate as to need help because of the breakup of their own home, should be given assistance if possible

If the members of our churches would give 2 cents a week for child care, we could double the number we are now helping, and who knows but that some of these children might be ours.

We trust you will place the poster for the Thanksgiving offering in a prominent place in your church so that those who wish to help in the care of our children, may be prepared when the offering is taken.

Southern Baptist now have missionaries under appointment to 54 political entitles. Southern Baptist Foreign Missions reached out to two additional countries in 1963, and one in early 1964.

Our mission work is carried on through a number of institutions on each mission field, churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, good will centers. Southern Baptists have 2,822 national pastors, and most of the churches have Sunday Schools, and many have other organizations. In 1963, the 3,943 churches and 6,999 chapels reported 540,849 enrolled in Sunday School, 41,147 baptisms, and 523,603 church members.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for Foreign Missions amounted to \$21,431,202.10 during 1963. Funds from the 1963 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$10,949,857.35.

The 1,076 Baptist Schools, which enroll 170,536 students, are served by 6,160 national and 328 missionary teachers. Among the schools are 39 theological institutions with 1,470 students and 6 women's training schools with 509 students. We have had 8 new educational schools started in 1963.
