THURSDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1890.

The Florida Baptist Association this day convened with Ebenezer Church, Jefferson County, Florida.

The introductory sermon was preached at eleven o'clock A. M. by Elder H. M. Friar, from Mathew, 5th chapter, first clause of the 14th verse.

After an intermission for refreshments, the Association was called to order by Elder H. M. Friar, former Moderator.

After reading the scriptures by the Moderator, Elder A. M. Manning led in prayer.

The former Clerk being absent, W. W. Campbell was elected Clerk pro tem.

Letters from the churches were called for, handed in, read, and names of delegates enrolled.

On motion, Elder A M Manning was received as a delegate from Centerville Church.

On motion, Bro. J. W. Hines was received as a delegate from Indian Springs Church.

On motion, Elder H. M. Friar was re-elected Moderator, and

Bro. W. W. Campbell, Clerk. Invited visiting brethren to seats with us. Accepted by Elders N. A. Bailey, Assistant Corresponding Secretary Florida

Baptist Convention; J. C. Porter, State Evangelist; J. B. Chevis, from Monticello Churca.

Called for correspondents; none.

Called for petitionary letters. Mt. Eanon Church presented a letter, and, on motion, was received as a member of this body, and the right hand of fellowship extended to her delegate by the

The Moderator appointed as a Committee on Preaching pastor and deacons of Ebenezer Church, Jefferson County.

The Monticello Church having sent up more delegates than she was entitled to, on motion, three were received.

On motion, adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock A. M., to-morrow. Benediction by Bro. N. A. Bailey.

SECOND DAY

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 31, 9 O'CLOCK A. M.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

The Moderator read the 24th Psalm, and Elder J. C. Porter led in prayer.

Renewed the call for and enrolled the names of delegates.

Elder E. Trice, Missionary, sent in his report, which was read and received.

Renewed the call for correspondents.

The Moderator appointed the following committees:

On Sabbath Schools-Bros. J. D. Taylor, Joseph Dorcy and H. A. Hawk.

On State of the Churches-Elder J. E. G. Campbell, and Bros. W. F. Cowen and G. E. Blair.

On Nominations—Elder F. M. Wells, and Bros. J. E. Harring and J. G. Shepard.

On Missions—Elders A. M. Manning and J. E. G. Campbell, and Bro. J. W. Day.

On Temperance-Bros. A. DeLaughter, G. W. Young and I. N. Barrs.

On Finance—Bros. J. W. Day, J. L. Warren and Joseph Dorcy.

On Deceased Ministers and Deacons-Elder F. M. Wells, and Bros. J. W. Hines and C. A. Bradley.

On Periodicals—Elders F. M. Wells, A. M. Manning and J. E. G. Campbell.

On Ministerial Education—Elder S. M. Provence, and Bros-A. Lacy and W. D. Lee.

On Woman's Work-Elders J. E. G. Campbell, W. T. Newberry and Bro. A. Lacy.

The following named brethren volunteered as delegates to the State Baptist Convention, viz: Elders S. M. Provence, A. M. Manning, F. M. Wells, J. E. G. Campbell, J. G. Connel, H. M. Friar, W. T. Newberry, and Bros. C. S. Harby, J. B. Fletcher and Joseph Dorcy.

On motion, the delegates were permitted to choose their own alternates to the State Baptist Convention.

On motion, our order of business was amended, and Elder S. M. Provence elected as delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention, and Elders A. M. Manning and H. M. Friar elected as alternates.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Elder A. M. Manning reported on the compiling of the history of the churches of this Association, and requested that this body take the work in hand.

The Committee on Preaching reported Elder J. C. Porter to preach at 11 o'clock A. M.

The Association then adjourned for preaching. Bro. Porter went immediately into the pulpit, and preached from the 35th verse, 8th chapter of Acts, after which a collection of \$11.40 was taken up, to aid Brewer Lake Church in building a house of worship.

The Moderator then announced that the Association would stand adjourned till 2 o'clock P. M. Benediction by Bro. Porter.

EVENING SESSION-2 O'CLOCK P. M.

Met persuant to adjournment. Bro. J. E. G. Campbell led in prayer.

On motion, the following named brethren were appointed as a committee to take in hand the work and complete the compiling of the history of the churches comprising this Association and have the same published in pamphlet form. viz: Elders F. M. Wells and A. M. Manning, and Bro. W. W. Campbell.

On motion, Elder H. M. Friar was added to the committee. Called for reports of committees.

Report of Committee on State of the Churches was read and discussed by Elder N. A. Bailey, which was adopted.

REPORT ON STATE OF THE CHURCHES.

We find, from best information at hand, some improvement in a few of our churches composing this body, in such work as better salary to pastors, more interested in Sunday-schools, better co-operation with State work, and some advance in associational interest in general, but, sad to report, some of our churches furnishing no evidence of improvement in any of the work pertaining to the building up of our Master's kingdom upon the earth.

But, brethren, more deplorable still, quite a number of our churches have made no report for years to this body from causes which likely grieve them as much as ourselves, therefore we commend such to your sympathy and earnest prayers, and request that one or more copies of the minutes of this associational meeting be furnished them through our present Clerk. We ad-

vise that all our churches take a forward movement in co-operating with our State Board.

All of which we respectfully submit.

Report of Committee on Periodicals was read and discussed by Elders J. C. Porter, N. A. Bailey and S. M. Provence, which was then adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Reading is a great means of grace and should be carefully considered. If our people read good books and periodicals, they will form good characters and glorify God; but if vile, pernicious literature is spread before them, they may read it, to their eternal ruin. In view of the importance of this subject, we would earnestly recommend to our churches and Sunday schools the Kind Word Series, and also the Lesson Helps of the American Baptist Publication Society. We would urge all our people to take our State paper, The Baptist Witness, and read it. It is our denominational organ, and no one can be a wide-awake, aggressive Baptist without perusing its pages weekly. We would recommend the Home Field, Foreign Mission Journal, The Baptist Basket and Christian Index as valuable aids in our religious work. But above all we would insist upon our people reading and studying the Bible.

Report of Committee on Sabbath-schools was read and discussed by Elders Porter, Bailey and Wells. Elder A. M. Manning offered an amendment to the report on Sabbath-schools, which, on motion, was adopted with the report.

REPORT ON SARBATH-SCHOOLS

"And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men who shall be able to teach others also." Teaching Gospel truths by short, pointed methods has been authorized by the Lord since the leading of his ancient Israel from under Egyptian bondage, and as their national bondage typified spiritual bondage, how much greater the need of such teaching—not to the child only but to the parent also, who need this for their own strength against sin, and for aggreesive warfare against error in general; and, too, that they may be prepared to teach by precept and example their children, as none other with equal qulifications can.

While we have fuller reports of number and work done by Sabbath-schools in teaching the Gospe!, yet strive to progress should be our motto, until no isolated part of our large territory should need opportunity for religious training. We advise our brethren in this work to press upon those by whom they are surrounded to aid in getting lesson papers or question books, libraries and even suitable newspapers for encouraging this no-

ole work.

WHEREAS, The Sunday-school work has assumed such pro-

portions as to claim our special attention, therefore

Resolved, That this Association recommend its Executive Committee to organize a Sunday-school Convention at once, which shall meet four times a year to discuss the best methods of carrying on this important department of our church work.

The report on Ministerial Education was read and discussed by Elders S. M. Provence and N. A. Bailey, and then adopted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL: EDUCATION.

That men called of God to the office of the Christian ministry should prepare themselves for that work by the best intellectual training within their reach, is beyond question.

There are diversities of gifts, but the same spirit, and while men of every order of mental endowment are set apart to the work of preaching, the humblest and highest alike have need of such training and development as will put them into possession of their own powers. There has been in recent years a wider spread revival of interest in the proper education of ministers of the Gospel. It has come to be conceeded on all hands that he who would engage in this highest of all callings should study to show himself a workman that needeth not be ashamed. To this end he should be taught how to study. He should be put into possession of the facts and principles which constitute the means and furnish the stimulus to intellectual growth.

We are glad to report that in our State provision is made in part, at least, to meet this requirement. The John B. Stetson Univerty, at DeLand, already has three young men studying for the ministry, and two others are expected soon. This school has no theological department, but it proposes to give an adequate literary preparation, so that young men may enter the theological seminary with advantage, or may, when a theological course is impossible, receive valuable preparation for their work.

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, at Louisville, is peculiarly adapted to the genius of our churches. Men of all degrees of preparation meet in the same classes and are mutually helpful.

We heartily commend these schools, and we lay upon the hearts of our brethren the duty of providing for those who need help to obtain a liberal education.

To the Florida Baptist Association :

Dear Brethren—I am truly sorry that circumstances are such I cannot be with you at this session. I can say to you I have performed my duties as missionary to the best of my ability; have been blessed to get our church edifice at Carabelle near enough finished to worship in. I cannot express my joy when first we met in our new house to worship.

We have collected and used on the house about five hundred dollars; it will take about three hundred more to finish the house.

The brethren and sisters would have paid more on my salary if it had not been they were obliged to contribute all they could to build the house. These dear people need the assistance of the Association one more year, and I think when they finish their house they will become self-sustaining, and also help others. The following is my annual report as missonary of the Florida Baptist Association, for the year commencing October 1st, 1889, ending September 30th, 1890:

Weeks of labor rendered, 26; churches supplied, 1; sermons delivered, 62; addresses, 5; prayer and other meetings attended,

25; Sunday-schools organized, 1; miles traveled, 1396; received into fellowship of the church, 17; by baptism, 7; restoration and letter, 10; church houses near enough complete to use, 1: tracts distributed, 500; collected for Foreign Missions, \$20.50; for State Missions, \$20.00.
