The Florida Baptist Association this day convened with the Aucilla Baptist Church, Jefferson County, Florida.

The introductory sermon was preached at eleven o'clock, A. M. by Elder J. E. G. Campbell, from Hebrews, 13th chapter and 1st verse.

After an intermission for refreshments, the body reassembled. The former Moderator and Clerk being present.

The Moderator read the 10th chapter of John. Elder A. M. Manning led in prayer.

Letters from the churches were called for, handed in, read, and names of delegates enrolled.

Permanently organized by re-electing Elder H. M. Friar, former Mod-

erator, by acclamation, and Bro. H. B. Gibson, Clerk, by ballot.

Invited visiting brethren to seats with us. Accepted by Blder N. A. Baily of Wekiva Association, in the interest of the State Board of Missions; Elder J. C. Porter of Alachua Association, in the interest of Florida Baptist Witness; Elder J. G. Connell of the Florida Baptist Association.

### SECOND DAY.

WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 30, 9 o'clock, a. m.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

Sang the Hymn, "Come ye that love the Savior's name."

Elder S. J. Revel led in prayer.

Read and approved the minutes of vesterday.

Renewed the call for and enrolled the names of delegates.

Renewed the invitation to visiting brethren.

Renewed the call for correspondents.

On motion that the regular order of business be suspended that communication be received from Monticello church.

#### COMMUNICATION.

The Monticello Baptist Church, to the Florida

Baptist Association, Greeting:

DEAR BRETHREN:- We, the Monticello Baptist Church, feel impelled by a solemn sense of duty to enter this our formal complaint before your body against certain action of the Ebenezer Church of Jefferson County, Fla., to-wit:

First, The said Ebenezer Church has disregarded the comity which exists among Baptist churches, and has broken fellowship with the said Mon-

ticello church and all orderly Baptist churches.

Second, The said Ebenezer Church, having broken fellowship as aforesaid, continues to disregard the obligation of church comity and interchurch fellowship.

Third, The said Ebenezer church has violated "Gospel order" as it is

understood and practiced among Baptist churches.

The foregoing charges are more specially set forth in the following statement of facts, to-wit: 1st, On the 10th day of December, 1890, the Baptist church at Monticello, Jefferson county, state of Florida, in a regular and orderly way, and by a unanimous vote, excluded from her fellowship, after previous citation to trial, for certain acts of immoral conduct, a certain member, the said member being at the time a minister of the Gospel.

In a short time thereafter, without the consent of said Monticello church and without consulting the church in any way, the Ebenezer church received the said excluded member into her fellowship, whereby church com-

ity was violated and inter-church fellowship broken.

Second, On another certain day thereafter, the said Ebenezer church, without the consent of the said Monticello church, by letter 'or otherwise, received another certain member into her fellowshig, the said member being at the time a member of the said Monticello church, in good and regular standing; thus subverting church order, destroying the fellowship theretofore existing between the said churches. And it appears further:

That the said Ebenezer church in receiving the said excluded member as aforesaid, did not undertake to refute the charges upon which he had been excluded, but assumed and acted upon the theory of church polity, that a minister of the Gospel can be properly excluded only upon the advice of a council of ministers, which theory is subversive of the order of one of the fundamental principles of Baptist churches, since it is clearly taught in the New Testament that in church standing and order every member is of equal rank with every other.

Theretore, the said Monticello church in the spirit of the Gospel represents and sets forth that the aforesaid acts of the said Ebenezer church are destructive of the harmony and fellowship of our churches, opposed to the precedents of the Association, and against the peace and dignity of the

Same.

On motion Elder J. L. D. Hillyer was elected as a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention, to convene in Atlanta, Ga., on Friday before the 1st Lord's day in May, A. D. 1892., and Elder J. P. Roberts, alternate.

Divine service at 7 o'clock, p. m. by Elder J. L. D. Hillyer, from John 12th chapter, 42nd and 43d verses.

On motion adjourned till to-morrow 9 a. m. Elder J. L. D. Hillyer pronounced the benediction.

## Third Day.

## MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, OCT. 1st., 1891.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Sang the hymn, "How sweet the name of Jesus sounds," &c.

Elder J. T. Farnell led in prayer.

Read and approved the minutes of yesterday.

On motion the item of unfinished business was postponed to take up reports of committees.

Report of Committee on Missions was read, and discussed by Elder N. A. Bailev and other brethren, which was adopted.

### REPORT ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions beg leave to submit the following repert:

The Lord has a people on earth whom He has redeemed by His blood.—
This people He leaves on earth to serve Him. The general direction which
He gives to them in regard to that service is "Go ye into all the world and
preach the Gospel to every creature." Churches organize Associations,
Associations organize Conventions, and in these Southern States, Churches, Associations and Conventions have organized The Southern Baptist
Convention, in order that the Lord's commandment may be better obeyed.

The Southern Baptist Convention has assigned its missionary work to two Boards. One located at Richmond, Va—has charge of the foreign missions. One in Atlanta, Ga—has charge of home missions, to assist these Boards, and better to look after home destitution, The State Convention has organized the State Mission Boards, and our Association has its Executive Committee for the same purpose within the bounds of this Association.

We commend all the work of each of the Boards. We specially commend the Centennial Memorial of the revival of modern missions, which all Baptist churches in all the world are asked to take part in next year, and in pursuance of the request of the S. B. C. we recommend the appointment of a committee in this Association to work up our share in that memorial service.

We recommend the special effort to raise \$500.00 in Florida by the 1st of December, 1891, to help pay for the Baptist Chapel in Cuba. The work of our Executive Committee should be approved; we are especially pleased with the giving of assistance to the work at Tallahassee, and we recommend that that work be continued, and enlarged if possible. And we earnestly request the State Board and Home Board to assist us in maintaining the preaching of the pure Gospel in the most important city in Middle Florida.

We do, in conclusion, most earnestly urge upon the notice of our brethren, the wide spread destitution throughout our bounds, and appeal most warmly to our Pastors and churches to put forth a larger liberality in behalf of the cause of our Master in our own midst and in the region beyond. #### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Your Committee on Periodicals beg leave to report that we have taken under the consideration the subject of periodicals and believe that reading is a great means of grace, and should be carefully considered. It our people read good books and periodicals they will form good characters and glorify God; but if vile, pernicious literature is spread before them, they may read it to their eternal ruin. In view of the importance of this subject we would earnestly recommend to our churches and Sunday schools the Kind Word Series, and also the Lesson Helps of the American Baptist Publication Society; The Baptist Witness—read it, and the Pastors of the

several churches are requested to make it special matter of interest to work. The Baptist Witness in their churches in the month of January of each year. It is our denominational organ, and no one can be wide-awake, aggressive Baptist without perusing its pages weekly. We would recommend the Home Field, the Foreign Mission Journal, The Baptist Basket and Christian Index as valuable aids in our religious work; and still recommend our people to confine themselves to the Bible as their Leader at home and in their Sunday Schools. #### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The Committee on Ministerial Education respectfully submit the following report on that subject: A careful examination of the letters from the different churches composing this Association shows that no amounts have been reported as raised during the past year for this purpose, except from a single church. It may be that this item has been overlooked in making up the statistics for the year. Your committee trusts that it has been and that the great duty of assisting young men, who are ready to consecrate themselves to the great work of the ministry, to properly fit themselves for usefulness has not been entirely neglected. The large increase in the school privileges of our people, the establishment of higher grades of

schools in the different counties, the organization of Seminaries and a State University, all at the public expense have perhaps, to some extent, relieved the churches of a part of the responsibility of educational work. But there is an important part of the ministerial training beyond the teaching of the college curriculum; the Theological school should be opened to these students, whether they have enjoyed all the advantages of alliberal education or not, and it is often the case that at this stage of the work of preparation the student most needs financial help. We all recognize the value and importance of a ministry thoroughly educated and trained. We must have scholars whose knowledge of the arts and sciences and languages will enable them to fight error in all the protean shapes it assumes. But there is a large field of usefulness in many parts of the vineyard of the Lord open to some who are called by the Master without opportunity for preparation which is permitted to others. We shall never know till the lass great day how much good has been done by sincere, earnest Christian brethren who have entered the ministry without a college degree or university training Thousands and tens of thousands of souls have been saved through the knowledge of the Truth, which has reached them through such instrumentalities. God speed these brethren in their great and grand efforts, and upon all such good brethren who may follow them. It is encouraging to see many of our ministers who commenced their work without the advantages of a liberal education and special preparation and improve themselves in the great school of life and activity and develop and broaden into usefulness and fill the highest positions in the ministry, and become influential in their communities as efficient workers in the churches. Such brethren are among the earnest friends of Ministerial Education, and unite in the belief that the time has come when we should make an advance in our educational work and improve the opportunities of those who enter the Baptist min-

Your Committee believe that greater efforts should belimade in ithis direction, that pious young men called by God to this work should be sought out by the churches and encouraged to prepare themselves for the ministry, and if necessary aided to obtain an education. And the results should be reported in the annual letters from the churches to the Association. It is gratifying to know that the Baptists of Florida have laid the foundations broad and deep for accomplishing much in this direction in the future. By the liberality of brethren living beyond the State the J. B. Stetson University was founded at DeLand. Contributions have been made by our Florida brethren to aid in completing an endowment fund .--Mr. Stetson has, during the present year, made arrangements for erecting another building for the purposes of the University, and it will not be long before all the departments will be in working order. The President, Mr. Forbes, an accomplished scholar and a gentleman, of excellent executive capacity, has made a good commencement and his preparatory department is sending out its classes of well trained students. Mr. Forbes hopes soon to have the collegiate department in good working order and we havelreason to hope that the J. B. Stetson University is on a permanent foundation. The Baptists of Florida should give this institution aid and encouragement in every possible way. A Theological school should be established, a basis for one has already been formed; and systematic efforts should be made to aid needy and indigent students. We believe that this University offers to the Baptists of Florida the means of advancing the cause of Ministerial Education in our beloved State, and we commend it to our breth ren throughout the Association. S. Pasco, Chairman.

The report of the Committee on Deceased Ministers and Deacons was read and adopted.

ERPORT ON DROP GED MINISTERS AND DEACONS.

Since our last Associational meeting Elder Paul Hornaday, Pastor of Madison and Greenville churches, has been called to his reward. He was a consecrated, zealous and talented young brother, full of promise of great usefulness in our Master's service. He came from Atlanta, Ga. to Florida in hopes that our genial clime would restore him to health, but He who "doeth all things well" willed it otherwise, and after a brief period of service he was taken from us. We record his death with unfeigned sorrow on account of the needs of our State for more workers like him; but we believe that the work and the worker are alike directed of the Lord, and that Helis wise and good, both when He gives and when He takes away. We recommend that a page be inscribed in our minutes to his memory.
