## PROCEEDINGS —OF THE— FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

### FIRST DAY.

CONCORDIA, GADSDEN COUNTY, FLA., }  
TUESDAY, September 27, 1892. }

The Florida Baptist Association this day convened in the Concordia Baptist Church, Gadsden County, Florida. The introductory sermon was preached at 11 o'clock a. m., by Elder F. M. Wells. Galatians, 6th Chapter, 9th verse.

### AFTERNOON SESSION—11.30 O'CLOCK P. M.

After an intermission of one and a half hours for refreshment the body re-assembled. The former Moderator and Clerk being present.

The Moderator read the 24th Psalm.

Elder J. E. G. Campbell led in prayer.

The roll of churches was called and letters handed in. The Moderator appointed Elders A. M. Manning and F. M. Wells a committee to read the letters, and the names of delegates were enrolled.

The Association permanently organized by re-electing the former Moderator by acclamation.

Invited visiting brethren to seats with us.

On motion, the committee appointed to compile the history of the churches of the Association was granted more time.

The Committee on Preaching reported that Elder J. P. Roberts preach at night.

On motion, the Association adjourned till tomorrow, 9 a. m. Elder S. J. Revel led in prayer.

### SECOND DAY.

#### MORNING SESSION—9 O'CLOCK A. M.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. The Moderator read the 4th chapter of 1st. Epistle of John.

Elder J. G. Connell led in prayer.

The Minutes of yesterday, were read and approved.

Renewed the call for and enrolled the names of Delegates.

M. Wells and J. E. G. Campbell, for one fourth of this time, at a salary of \$10.00 per month. The latter declined to accept. Brother F. M. ## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The true and proper aim of education is to put one in command of his own powers. In no field of human endeavor is there greater need for wide intelligence and for correct mental processes than in the Christian pulpit. The greatest educating power and the mightiest moral leverage known to men is the pulpit. The deepest things of men are religious. The most important things of men are religious. He who is called of God to the high and holy office of religious teacher needs the best qualifications attainable for his work. If there ever was a time when the education of the ministry might be safely neglected, that time is long since past. We live in an age full of activity along every line of inquiry. The word of God is studied under the fiercest light of our times. It is more than ever a living oracle. He who attempts to expound its teachings to others needs to study to show himself to be a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. If he offends the cultivated taste of our children, who are taught the proprieties of the English tongue, he robs himself at the outset of an important element of strength. If he cannot answer intelligently the questions arising in the minds of the brightest young men and women who hear him, he invites their indifference.

Our Lord gave to the first preachers of the Gospel three years of careful training for their work. They were not the unlettered men that many have supposed them to be, as their writings abundantly show. The Apostle Paul was thoroughly taught in the schools, and after his conversion gave himself for a considerable time to special preparation for his work. His epistles to Timothy and Titus show that he had no patience with a young preacher too lazy to study.

In our times no young man can show any good reason for seeking to enter the ministry without preparation. Our Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, not only provides free instruction for every young man who will come and receive it, but also makes arrangements to pay board (wholly or in part as may seem best) for those who are unable to pay for themselves. The seminary also has courses of study in the English language for those who have not had previous collegiate training. For those who desire collegiate training the John B. Stetson University, at DeLand, offers excellent facilities. Tuition is free to students for the ministry, and arrangements are made privately for other expenses, if the student gives proof of usefulness.

It is a matter of grave concern that no young preacher in our association is seeking these advantages. The field is "White unto the harvest," the laborers are few and toilsome. Not only that, many of them are entangled with the affairs of this world, and others are trying to cut with a dull blade. We earnestly commend them to the churches of our Lord. "Pray ye, therefore, to the Lord of the harvest that He may send forth more laborers into His harvest." And when they come, we entreat them to come as leaders of men and wise, to win their souls.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PERIODICALS.

DEAR BRETHREN—Your Committee, being interested in the cause of Christ, and in the furtherance of His Kingdom, would urge upon Christians the necessity of storing their minds with Bible truths, that all may be prepared to give to every man that asketh us a reason for the hope that is in us. The truths are found unadulterated in the Bible, and it is, therefore, the standard by which all other classes of religious literature, is to be tried; and we would suggest that Christians act on the Savior's advice, to "search the scriptures," adopting some daily Bible reading, in order to increase our knowledge of Christ and His methods, that we may intelligently walk in His way. Then we should, next to the Bible, read religious books and papers, to serve

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as help to a more pious life. Baptists should take a Baptist paper, and if we would learn what our brethren are doing in other sections of our State, we should take the Florida Baptist Witness, published in Ocala, Fla.—placing ourselves in communication with earnest workers of our State. The Christian Index is a good paper as an educator, and deserving of our patronage.

For our Sunday-schools we would recommend the Kind Word Series, a good, healthy Baptist publication. We would also recommend the American Baptist Publication Society.

The Committee on Missions would submit the following report: The field is the world; the command is, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." That missions in nearly all lands are prospering and increasingly successful.

In Cuba and Mexico God has wondrously blessed missions and mission workers, and as we turn our eyes to all fields, there comes encouraging reports. Yet we, as an association, have fallen behind our former contributions. This should not be. The Centennial year is upon us, and the Brotherhood is putting forth increased effort to raise increased contributions. We would earnestly recommend the system to all our churches, and would commend the plan of giving ten cents per member per month.

Your committee appreciates the effort of the State Board to supply the needs of Tallahassee, and heartily commend a continuance of the work there, believing that persistent effort alone will be crowned with success.
