# MINUTES.

Aucilla Church, October 2, 1900.

The Florida Baptist Association met with the Aucilla Church, Jefferson county, Fla., this day at 11 a.m. After devotional services Stephen Crockett preached the Introductory Sermon. Text, Neh. 4:9.

### WEDNESDAY-Morning Session.

The Fort Braiden Church presented a petitionary letter and was by vote received into fellowship with the Association.

J. A. Gandy volunteered to attend the State Convention.

Stephen Crockett was elected a messenger to the Southern Baptist Convention.

The chairman of the Committee on Temperance read the report of the committee as follows:

#### Report on Temperance.

The pernicious effects of alcoholic liquors are too self-evident and familiar to require discussion here. Your committee is unable to ascertain whether or not their use is perceptibly decreasing. We should wield every possible influence looking toward their abolition, going at it with the faith, enthusiasm and determination evinced by Nehemiah in rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem. But temperance, in its broadest sense, would exclude opium, tobacco and other narcotics and also prohibit over-exertion, both physical and mental. While we would not distract attention from the stress generally placed upon abstinence from intoxicants, still we think it is time we were considering the importance of refraining from all excesses, thereby making our bodies fit dwelling places for the Holy Spirit and fulfilling the Biblical injunction which calls upon us to "Be temperate in all things."

### Report on Woman's Work.

The sphere of labor known as Woman's Work consists of societies and bands organized in the churches and controlled by them. This work was begun twelve years ago and last year their contributions for foreign missions amounted to \$31,756.65 and a much larger amount for home missions. Few of the societies are large and many are quite small, yet by steady, systematic work they have been instrumental in sending the Gospel to the lost. The meeting together of the women and children for mission study is productive of spiritual good in our churches, proving the passage of Scripture which says: "Give and it shall be given unto you." We therefore commend Woman's Work to the churches of our Association. Believing that all our earnest efforts of organized labor for God will meet with his approval, we ask the churches to encourage the sisters in this work by helping them as far as they can.

### Report on Ministerial Education.

As civilization advances, the need of educated preachers becomes of greater importance. Stetson, the founder of Stetson University, who are willing to give of their gains that others may know more of God; for such Christian teachers as Dr. J. F. Forbes, who are desirous of preparing men that they may be better prepared to break the Bread of Life to starving souls; and for the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, of Louisville, Ky.

Our Association has a worthy young man in Stetson University preparing for the work of the ministry and we would urge all the churches to stand by him with their prayers and their means. Respectfully submitted.

### Report on State of the Churches.

Your committee finds that the churches report thirty-four baptisms during the year. Many churches report no accessions. Many report no contributions for the general work of our people. Such churches, we are constrained to believe, are neglecting a plain duty, and should be admonished by the Association to inquire into their own spiritual condition.

Your committee deems it appropriate to report to the State Board our appreciation of the work done in Tallahassee by their missionary, Brother S. M. Provence. We now have in the capital city a beautiful and commodious house of worship, a credit to our denomination, and the prospect for our brethren there is more hopeful than ever. The Tallahassee church offers the Association the privilege of paying for a memorial in the new building to Elder W. W. Childers, long a missionary of this body. We recommend that the offer be accepted.

In a majority of our churches there are no Sunday schools, a fact greatly to be deplored.

The reports from the several churches indicate a healthful spiritual condition. These are contributing to the objects of our denomination, and the divine blessing rests upon them. The prevailing sickness has no doubt in large measure decreased the contributions and the representation by delegates this year.

Your committee suggests a more earnest co-operation among the churches and renewed efforts to enlist the interest of our people in missions and education.

### Foreign Missions. i

During the past year the work on some of our foreign fields has been seriously interrupted. Many of our stations in China have been temporarily abandoned. While we thank God that none of the missionaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have perished in the troublous times in China, we also thank Him that He has enabled our martyred brethren to stand firm unto the end. The sneer of unbelievers that the Chinese converts are "rice Christians" (i. e., Christians for the sake of rice), and that the missionaries are adventurers, has been forever put to silence by the death-throes of Chinese martyrs and the undaunted spirit of the missionaries, who have suffered the loss of all things for the sake of the Gospel. As soon as the political difficulties are adjusted our missionaries will return to their fields and many more will be needed. Our work will be established on a firmer basis than ever.

A great field has been opened in South America and our work is very hopeful there. In Italy, Japan and Mexico are many signs of promise. The missionaries of the Gospel have risen to be a recognized factor in the world's progress. They have commanded the universal respect of men. Everywhere they are full of courage.

Let our churches increase their contributions to this work. It is this which gives the reason for our being.
