Report on Temperance was read, and after addresses were made on the subject by brethren King, Timmons, Hall and Bailey the report was adopted:

On Temperance.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to submit the following report: There is no influence opposing our church work in this State so disastrous in its tendency, as that of the inordinate use of alcoholic drinks. Its sad results are manifest in the thickening of drunkard's graves, in the tattered garments of orphan children and in the lamentations of grief-stricken mothers. It is an evil that grows with our growth and strengthens with our strength. How can we stop its onward march of ruin and death? is a question that lives in the heart of the philanthronist and the Christian. How can we stop its onward march of ruin and death? Is a question that lives in the heart of the philanthropist and the Christian. About every ten years of our history some new plan is discovered that promises to hold in check this monstrous evil. In many individual cases those plans have succeeded; but they have all been found inadequate to accomplish their desired end. Holy men and women have inquired for the cause of the failure of these plans. Whatever answer may be given, your Committee are sensibly Impressed with the conviction that this temperance work is peculiarly a church work, and one that demands immediate, earnest and consecrated effort. We therefore recommend that the pastors of the churches of this Association, the Sunday-school Superintendents and teachers urge the importance of this work, by exalting the standard of personal piety among the people, and thus cultivate a healthy sentiment in favor of prohibition.

The Order of business was resumed, being the discussion of the report on missions, by brethren King, Beeks, Bailey and Hall, and the report was adopted, after being amended, as follows:

Report on Missions.

Your Committee on Missions beg leave to make the following

report:
The subject assigned us is a large one, and as important as it is large. It embraces the work of missions in all its departments, Associational, State, Home and Foreign. Let us look for a moment

Associational, State, Home and Foreign. Let us look for a moment at these four divisions of the one great work, for it is one.

It appears from former Minutes of the body, that the first department of this great work, (Associational missions,) has been entirely neglected, at least for the past two years. There are several important points within our bounds that ought to be occupied at once. Able ministers to labor at these destitute places are greatly needed, but this need could be easily supplied if we had the means to support the laborers. Whether this body is able of itself to put one or more missionaries in the field, is a question that ought to claim the immediate attention of our churches and that ought to claim the immediate attention of our churches and the Executive Committee. This work is near our homes, and ought to be near our hearts. Brethren, let us "rise up and build" these waste places of our Zion.

The last meeting of the State Convention appointed a State Board of Missions to look after the work of supplying, at least for

the present, the important points in the State needing aid. Of this Board your nonored Moderator is the Corresponding Secre-

tary. From him we are gratified to learn that there have been during the year, six missionaries under appointment, and supported in whole or in part by this Board. At the last meeting of the Board, they were able to settle in full with all the missionaries with a surplus in the treasury. This was far better than the most sanguine of the friends of this movement had hoped for, and we now feel that we have every reason to "thank God and take courage" for the success attending this new effort to enlarge the activities of our people. We cannot too strongly urge upon the churches the importance, yea, the necessity of giving this Board our hearty and practical support.

Of the work of the Home Board, located at Marion, Alabama, and of which your Moderator is a missionary for the State at large, we can mention only one or two points of special interest to our-

selves, to-wit:

First, this Board has been giving more attention to this State, and has had under commission more Missionaries in it, than in any other State within its jurisdiction. The tide of immigration into our borders within the last year or two, has impressed the Board with the importance of supplying the State with the pure gospel and building up the churches of Christ as the foundations of the truth.

Second, The work among the Indians of the West has been greatly blessed. Especially would we make mention of the fact that the Levering School, the long cherished scheme of our vet-eran Missionary, Dr. H. F. Buckner, is a grand success. This school is under the control of, and belongs to, the Home Mission

Board.

We would also be delighted to dwell upon the bright prospects opening up for Catholic New Orleans, but we have not the space. Suffice it to say, that the work of this Board has strong claims upon our prayers, sympathies and contributions. Let us meet our obligations as Christians.

The Foreign Mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention is constantly enlarging, thereby calling on us for enlarged gratitude to the God of Missions as well as enlarged contributions to meet the growing work. New fields are being occupied, and new missionaries are being sent out. China, with its teeming millions, has claimed our attention for years, and God has signally blessed the work there. Africa has likewise stretched out her hands to us for the gospel, and our response has received the benedictions of heaven. For a few years past our thoughts and offerings have been given to Italy, Catholic Italy, and God has smiled upon the work. Brazil is now occupied by the Board, and brother Bagly and his wife are laboring in that empire to lift the dark curtain of ignorance and superstition Roman Catholicism has fastened upon that people. Mexico, too, has one or more missionaries within her borders. But while the work is growing, has grown, upon our hands, how much remains yet to be done? "To us is committed the word of reconciliation," not to keep back, but to give to others who have it not. Have we filled, as the stewards of God, the measure of our responsibility in this respect? Heretofore, this State has contributed about one hundred dollars annually to the foreign work. We ought the coming year to double that amount at least. As a child grows it becomes necessary to enlarge its

clothing. So in missions, as the fields open and new laborers are called of God, and qualified to occupy them, new drafts are made upon us by Him who is Lord of all, for enlarged contributions to meet the exigencies.

A new department of mission work among the heathen, is now claiming our attention, namely the sending of female missionaries as physicians. This gives them an influence over heathen women which they could not otherwise have. Male missionaries, though skillful physicians, cannot have access to heathen families, while female physicians are readily admitted. It becomes us as Christians, to lay every available means under tribute, to bring the lost to the knowledge of the Son of God. Let us obey the calls He makes on us, and rejoice that He counts us worthy, putting us in position whereby we may serve and honor Him with our substance as well as with our hearts.

The Report of the Committee on Sunday-schools was read, and after addresses by brethren Pack, Timmons, Perry and Gordon. was adopted:

Report of Committee on Sunday-Schools.

Your Committee on Sunday-schools beg leave to make the following report:

First, That we are glad to say that the majority of the churches are sustaining Sunday schools, and that from their reports there is

a progressive interest manifested.

Second, That as we deem the Sunday-school as being the greatest agency the church can employ for bringing the young unto a knowledge of the Lord, and as the prosperity of the church depends greatly upon the interest it sustains in the Sunday school, we would recommend that those churches which have not hitherto sustained Sunday-schools, enter without delay into such organiza-

Third, That for a lack of proper information on the part of our Sunday-school officers and teachers, and the want of a general organization in this and all the other Associations of the State, our Sunday-school cause is at a low ebb.

We recommend that the Sunday-schools and churches of this Association appoint delegates to meet at Micanopy, on Friday before the third Sunday in February, for the purpose of organizing an Associational Sunday school Convention.

We would heartily recommend the Sunday-school periodicals of the American Baptist Publishing Society and Kind Words, to all

our Sunday-schools.

We also promise our hearty co-operation with brother Pack, our Sunday-school Missionary, in the glorious work he represents. Respectfully submitted,

Report of Committee on Religious Periodicals was read, and after an able discussion of the subject by brother King, was adopted:

On Religious Periodicals.

Your Committee on Religious Periodicals, in making their report, would mention two facts, and call the attention of our brethren to their significance.

1. The general diffusion of education. There is a new and quickened interest in education among our people. In Florida, as in the entire South, indeed, formerly it was the more wealthy of the whites who were educated, while our colore people, then our servants, were thought to be better without it; but now, in the new order of things, the blacks are being educated, and the whites

are more generally and better instructed.

2. The position and influence of the public press. Every interest and every enterprise is represented and advocated in some department of the secular press. The slang of the tramp, and the inaugural of the President, the wit of the clown and the speech of the senator, are given to our people and children in its daily issues. Now, if our people become a reading people, the question for us is, what shall they read? Shall we not see to it that our Religious Periodicals furnish religious reading and instruction.

Your Committee heartily recommend THE CHRISTIAN INDEX, of Atlanta; and Kind Words, of Macon, Ga.; but your Committee cannot close this report without urging the imperative necessity of

a State paper.
