The Micanopy Church, through her messengers, requested a letter of dismission for the purpose of entering a new Association, in case such an one as contemplated is organized. The Clerk was authorized to give the letter.

The letter from the Tabernacle Church was read and the names of the messengers enrolled.

The report of Committee on Missions was read, and was discussed by brethren Waugh, Leavitt, Bailey and Chaudoin. Pending the discussion the hour for preaching arrived, and the body took a recess to hear the Missionary Sermon, which was preached by the Moderator, from 2 Cor. ii. 24: "For by faith ye stand."

After the sermon a collection was taken, amounting to \$42.53.

Adjourned one hour for dinner.

2 P. M.—Association called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by B. H. Damon.

The report on Missions was adopted without further discussion, as follows:

#### MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work of this Association is carried on in connection with the Southern Baptist Convention, through the Board of Missions of our State Convention, hence our report is based upon the report of our Secretary Bro. Chaudoin.

The Treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention reports for last year's work \$80,465.87, of this sum our State has contributed \$514, of this amount this Association has contributed.....

Bro. Walker and his wife, on account of failing health, have been compelled to leave Tung Chow, China. Dr. George B. Taylor, of Rome, has been greatly bereaved in the death of his wife.

Let us make a survey of the foreign field. In Africa we have four American Missionaries and three native assistants, holding five stations. Three others left this country last September to join them. In Africa there are 196 members; baptized last year 31. In the schools there are 196 pupils.

In Brazil there are three stations, held by four American Missionaries and one native assistant. Membership 70; baptized 20.



In China we have 58 missionaries and native assistants, occupying 17 stations. Membership 611; baptized 65. China is beginning to help in the great work. She raised \$677.39.

*European Missions.*—In this field we have 12 stations, and three American Missionaries and ten European helpers. Membership 220; baptized 25.

In Mexico we have five American Missionaries, one native pastor and six native assistants. Miss Tupper, daughter of Dr. Tupper, the Secretary of the Foreign Board, will also go to Mexico soon. Membership 117; baptized 52.

The past has been a prosperous year to this Board. God blesses and the people heed, and are saved. The work is great, the laborers are few. Florida will raise \$800 this year for the Foreign work. Won't you, each, help?

#### HOME MISSION WORK.

This work, like the Foreign, is carried on through our Convention Board with the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The importance of this work cannot be overstated, since our State stand so intimately associated with it. This Board comprises our States and Territories—the destitute portions of several States and the Indians. Under the appointment of the Home Board we have in our State 28 Missionaries visiting the destitute places and doing a good work for the Master. This Board received last year \$66,414.47, of this sum our State contributed \$2,363.27, of which this Association gave \$374.24.

The Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has given back to us one dollar for every dollar given. This is a great fact to be noticed. The needs of the Board are heavy. New fields are opening, demanding our help. Its needs for the present year are \$100,000. Brethren, to the rescue; doing each his part. Respectfully submitted.

Lawton, of the Tabernacle Baptist Church of Jacksonville, who, in the office of deacon, purchased to himself a good degree and great boldness in the faith; also, Brother James Baldwin, of Eliam Church, whose consecrated piety and pure benevolence causes his memory to be most tenderly cherished by all who knew him, together with Brother W. N. Buchanan, of Waldo Baptist Church, whose Christian life was to his brethren a constant inspiration and great source of Christian encouragement. Respectfully submitted.

#### PUBLICATIONS.

Your Committee on Publications beg leave to submit the following: The religious press has a work to perform which none other agency can perform, in that it combines the minds of the learned and the masses that could not be reached by any other source, for when the people can sit down and, in a considerate manner, read what good things the Lord is doing in the hearts and souls of other men all over the land and country, and especially the benighted heathens, who are bowing down to stocks and stones, the workmanship of their own hands. We would therefore call the attention of all our brethren and sisters to the necessity of distributing, gratuitously, our denominational literature among the masses, with solemn prayer to God that he may give them the understanding heart and convert their souls. We are not partial to any Baptist publishing houses other than our own State papers, *The Baptist Witness* and *Kind Words*, and all Sabbath School literature published under the auspices of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We would also call attention to the *Heathen Helper*, published at Louisville, Ky., in the interest of Woman's Mission Work, which work your Committee holds to be one of the grandest that can be performed by any sect, for what is society without the influence of woman, with her modesty, meekness and forbearance? Report on Temperance read, and discussed by Brethren Leavitt, Bailey, Gordon, Hall, Farmer and Stanaland, after which it was adopted :

## TEMPERANCE.

We have reason to be thankful to Almighty God for the advance in sentiment and the progressive effort in the church, in society and even in the State, in favor of total abstinence from intoxicating drink, and the universal prohibition of the general liquor traffic. It is a matter of the deepest regret, however, that the monster evil, Intemperance, is largely on the increase. In view of this fact, your Committee would recommend increased effort, earnest and persistent, upon the part of the churches in the use of proper means to promote the cause of Temperance in their bounds. We would recommend further, that no member be retained in the fellowship of the church who hinders, by word or example, the advancement of the principles of sobriety and virtue, so necessary to our temporal and eternal interests. Report on Sunday Schools read and adopted :

## ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on 'Sunday Schools submit the following report : There are twelve churches represented in this Association, and, upon examining their letters, we find that eight of them have established Sabbath Schools; that one church participates in a union School; one works in the School of another church of the same faith, and two make no report as to Sunday Schools. The eight Schools have a total membership of 564, and take 322 copies of periodicals. One School takes denominational papers, and uses more copies than any other School in this

Association. Judging from the statistics of the Schools, it is evident that some of them have not a sufficient supply of papers. One School, with a membership of 95, reports only twelve papers taken, and no library. While we take pleasure in stating that some of our Schools have made considerable progress, and others are prospering moderately, yet we think there is great need of improvement. The principal workshop of a church is the Sunday School; and any church neglecting this important department of Christian labor, is unfaithful to the high trust committed to her charge. Personal observation has led us to the unhappy conclusion, that many church members regard the Sabbath School as an institution for children only, in which the adult members are not specially interested, except to attend occasionally as visitors. This mistaken view, coupled with indifference on the part of a large proportion of professed Christians, greatly impairs the effectiveness of our churches and Sunday Schools. There is but one scriptural body—the church—and the Sabbath School is, properly and truly, the church engaged in teaching and studying the *Holy Word*; therefore, every member of a church is also a member of her Sunday School, and should be expected to attend and take some part in the work of that School, for the same reason that requires attendance upon any preaching or prayer service. The majority of accessions to our churches come from the Sabbath Schools, and Zion will prosper in proportion to the prayerful efforts made to lead the children in the way of righteousness and peace. Your Committee would make the following suggestions to our churches :

1st. That they supply their Schools with a sufficient number of papers to give each scholar, weekly, religious reading matter.

2nd. Our distinctive principles, as Baptists, demand that our Sunday Schools use the papers and lesson-helps published in the interest of our denominational work. We can but consider it detrimental to the cause of truth, to trust the religious training of our children to the, so-called, undenominational teachers, who edit and publish union periodicals.

3rd. That the churches be prompt in furnishing the means to procure the papers and lesson-helps needed in the Schools, so it may not be necessary to use the contributions of the children for that purpose.

4th. That all Christians should esteem it a privilege, as well as a duty, to attend the Sunday School; and they should make as great efforts, to say the least, to have some active part in sustaining the nurseries of our churches as they put forth to be present at preaching services. Brethren, let us manifest greater earnestness in the Sabbath School cause. There are children in nearly every community who are without religious instruction; and each one of us can do something towards bringing these young hearts, that our now susceptible to truth, into the society of Christians, where they may learn to follow their Saviour, who said, "Suffer little children to come unto me."

Report on Woman's Work was read, and after addresses by Brethren Leavitt, Bailey, Gordon, King, Timmons and Chaudoin, it was adopted:

WOMAN'S WORK.

Your Committee would report that Ladies' Missionary Societies are branches of work which should be organized in all our churches. In all the past history of the Christian Church women have occupied a conspicuous place, but their opportunities for usefulness were never so great as to-day. In the foreign and home fields they are lifting up the degraded of their own sex, and thus preparing the way for a greater spread of the gospel. No nation will rise above the type of its womanhood, whose influence will either elevate or lower the standard of social life. This is true also of our churches. The tone of piety will be healthy or sickly in proportion to the interest in the cause of religion manifested by the sisters in any church. In Temperance Societies, Sunday School work and other departments of Christian labor, they take the lead in numbers and efficiency. The zeal of women in our National and State Temperance organizations is creating a more profound sentiment throughout the country than was ever known before in the cause of Temperance. Some years ago our Foreign Missionaries found that they needed the aid of women to introduce the gospel into heathen homes. Women's Missionary Societies then began to be established, and the interest in the cause of Missions was quickened all over this country. They now have periodicals, papers and helps for all departments of work, both for adults and children. So efficient have these Societies become that no missionary enterprise can dispense with their services without suffering great loss in resources, and other substantial aid. Besides aiding the parties and increasing the funds of our Societies, they are the most efficient agency in producing activity and diffusing intelligence in our churches. Let us, then, by all means encourage Societies in all our churches in this Association, and assign the women a place in our annual meeting for presenting their reports and furthering their work.

to the members of Eliam Church and the citizens of Melrose, for their generous hospitality during the session of the Association. Also, to the railroads and steamboat on Santa Fe Lake for reduced rates given to the messengers.

The following resolution was offered by Brother King, and adopted:

*Be it resolved*, That this Association request the pastors of the churches to use their influence to have all the churches fully represented by messengers in our State Convention.

On motion, the Association adjourned *sine die*.

After sermon and singing, and prayer by S. K. Leavitt, the Moderator's gavel fell, and this delightful session was closed.

# FINANCE REPORT.

CASH RECEIVED BY THE STATE BOARD DURING THE YEAR.

CASH SENT TO ASSOCIATION.
