#### MINUTES.

October 25th, 1892.

The Santa Fe River Baptist Association met to-day with the Ochwilla Church, at 10:30 A. M. The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. G. T. Leitner, from text Acts ix. 6. Adjourned to 1:30 P. M.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association called to order by the Moderator at 1:30 p. m. Prayer by Rev. G. S. Crosby. Letters of the churches were called for and read by Rev. G. W. Riles and Thos. E. Bugg, and names of messengers as follows:

Called for Petitionary Letters, and responded to by letter and delegation from Hampton Church, and, on motion, received into the fellowship of the Association by Moderator extending right hand of welcome to Rev. N. G. King and B. S. Beasly as Messengers. The First Baptist Church of Starke also presented letter and Messengers, and at which time P. W. Corr offered the following resolution:

Whereas, The Starke Church has not a letter of dismission from the New River Associations, and whereas the precedent set by the Association ought to be a safe one for churches to follow, therefore be it Resolved. That we refer the Starke Church to the New River Association for a letter, assuring her, the Starke Church, that she shall be received into full fellowship, in this Association, as soon as she presents a letter of dismission from the New River Association.

Resolved, That the delegates of Starke Church be received as fraternal delegates, and, as such, be invited to seats with us and to par-

ticipate in our discussions.

These resolutions were discussed by P. W. Corr, Thos. E. Bugg and lost by a unanimous vote, except P. W. Corr, who requested that the resolutions be entered upon the minutes and his name recorded against said motion to receive. The Starke Church was then received into the full fellowship of the Association by Moderator extending right hand of welcome to Thos. E. Bugg and Rev. Rob't Keith, Messengers.

On motion, the constitution was changed to read that no two members of same church shall be members of the Executive Committee.

Proceeded to the election of officers, which resulted as follows: R. B. Weeks, Moderator; Rev. J. H. Crosby, Clerk; and Rob't McClellan, Treasurer.

The following Committee on Devotional Exercises was appointed: T. W. Thompson, F. F. Paulding, with Pastor and deacons of Ochwilla Church, and reported that Rev. D. B Farmer preach to-night at 7 o'clock. Adjourned to meet 8:30 A. M. to-morrow, in prayer meeting, by Rev. G. S. Crosby.

#### WEDNESDAY, Oct. 26th, 1892.

The Association met, pursuant to adjournment, in prayer meeting by G. S. Crosby. Called to order by the Moderator at 9 a.m. Prayer by P. W. Corr.

Reading of minutes, corrected and approved. Proceeded to the regular order of business. On motion the Messengers from Mt. Sinai and Campville be recognized and seated. On motion Bro. Leitner, Bros. H. M. King, Robt. Keith and P. W. Corr be appointed a committee to draft a constitution and report during this session of the Association. Visiting brethren were invited to seats with us, and responded to by Rev. L. D. Geiger, Secretary, B. M. R. A., G. S. Crosby, of Marion, and M. A. Dentzler, of Harmony Associations.

Correspondence—D. B. Farmer, of Alachua, S. S. Proctor and W. H. Woodall, of Beulah, and J. S. Geiger, Marion, S. E. Timmons, St. Johns.

Preaching Committee report that Rev. L D. Geiger preach missionary sermon at 11 a. m.

Treasurer made his report and on motion it was referred to Finance Committee.

Report of committees being in order, the Committe on Letters and Queries made their report and it was discussed by Robt. Keith, G. T. Leitner, S. S. Proctor and adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Letters and Queries have carefully examined the letters and are thankful that all the churches report pastors, excepting LaCrosse and Waldo, which is encouraging, showing spiritual life. Two new churches received by letter, one of which, Hampton, asked that the next session of this body convene with them, which request we refer to Committee on Nominations. Beulah church asked for a letter of dismission, which we recommend be granted and pray God's continued blessing upon the church and Association with which she may unite. Rochelle asked the Association for assistance to pay the salary of her pastor. We believe that the Association can do no greater work than assist our weak churches to have regular preaching and

Association called to order by Moderator at 1:30 p. m; prayer by D. B. Farmer. Committee on Preaching reported that Rev. J. S. Geiger preach to-night at this church at 7 p. m. and that N. T. King preach at Baldwin school house at the same hour.

Committee on Publications made their report which was discussed by L. D. Geiger, and D. B Farmer, and adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Publications would report that it has had the same under consideration, and would press upon the attention of our denomination the importance of a sound Baptist literature for the dissemination of our denominational principles and as a great aid in inculcating the doctrines of the Bible as taught by us. The mental activities of our day, and the sharp competition in the presentation of sectarian systems, and infidelic and heretical ideas should be a stimulus to our denomination to forge to the front with the truth, and keep abreast of the times on all the lines of thought affecting Christian sentiment. As a weekly visitor to the home and fireside the Witness of our own State is recommended and such support given to it that the entire denomination of the State can take hold of it as "our paper." In the line of Sunday School literature and helps, the publications of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the American Baptist Publication Society, are recommended as both highly meritorious, and furnish abundant facilities for supplying at a reasonable cost everything needed in this line. It is also recommended, as a furtherance of the missionary interest, that the Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal be liberally patronized to the end that the Baptists may be educated in the great work.

On motion the report for special hour be withdrawn. Committee on Constitution made their report and it was adopted as follows:

#### CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.

2. This Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches of which they are members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and who must present letters from their respective churches, certifying to their election as messengers.

3. The object of this Association shall be the re-union of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of

Bible truth.

4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect by bal ot a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.

5. Any Baptist church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery, by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from which it comes.

6. This admits the right of anyone of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council and shall treat the churches comprising it as independent bodies in all matters of self government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and shall have power to fill vacanices.

The Associational Mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee; and all missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them or whenever called upon so to do.

10. All churches shall be entitled to two messengers for the first fifty members and one additional messenger for each twenty-five members after the first fifty and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association; but only by order of the Asiociation or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

Your Committee on Woman's Work beg leave to make the following report. Woman standing last at the cross, seeing the suffering of her Lord was drawn closer to him and from that day to this she has felt moved by her love to Jesus to do what she could to bring others to the way of salvation. In our churches the pastors always finds in her a willing helper in every good work. Paul acknowledged her devotion when he said, "help those women." 'Tis our women that have thrown life and energy in the great centennial movement, which is stirring our people this year on the great forward movement for Jesus. Though she may only have a hand full of meal and a cruse of oil, she will give it to the Lord, and when the final reckoning comes, it will be revealed that she hath done her part well. We would say to our pastors encourage the women and help them, for when Jesus said "ye are witnesses of mine," women were included, and leaving the tomb she bore to the disciples the joyous news, the "Lord hath risen." We notice with pleasure that our women seek not to lead, do not demand to work in separate organizations, but are contented to do her work as the Lord would have her through the churches. Where a church can have a woman's missionary society, by all means organize one. But we would say let them work for Jesus, whether it be in organization or as individuals, remembering she was present when Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, &c.," praying that heaven's richest blessing may rest upon the efforts of our Christian women.

We recommend to parents the duty of selecting Christian teachers for their children. The day has come when the world, as well as Baptist success, demands an educated ministry. This Association has two young men in College, studying for the ministry; men full of promise, zeal and piety. We recommend to the churches of this Association the heartiest and most substantial support to the cause of Ministerial Education. We recommend that the question of Ministerial Education be referred to the Executive Committee, to lend such support to it as the Committee in its judgment deems best.

Committee on Spiritual Condition of Churches made their report, and adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on the Spiritual Condition of the Churches find that the letters from the churches, composing this Association, indicate a healthy spiritual condition. We would call attention to the fact that several churches have requested the prayers of this body for their further spiritual advancement. In view of the fact that the trend of the times, in civil and denominational life, is towards ostentation and show and centralized power, we are gratified to make the above report; and further, as there is a disposition in the world, and in some instances among Baptists, to bring in unconverted people into the Church, we recommend that, as pastors and people here assembled, we resolve to keep prominent the Scripture qualifications to Church membership—"Ye must be born again"—before our churches. Reading of minutes of yesterday's proceedings and approved. The subject of Temperance, which was being discussed when the motion of adjournment was made, was again taken up and discussed by J. E. Waugh, H. M. King, H. B. Mizell, G. T. Leitner, R. B. Weeks and J. C. Porter, especially that part that referred to church members signing whiskey petitions, &c., and adopted as follows:

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to submit the following: As there have been reports made, at all our annual meetings, in regard to the great evil of Intemperance, and but little done to suppress this evil, we would recommend and urge that each and all of the Ministers of this Association preach more against the appalling danger of Intemperance in all things, and to see to it that this recommendation be put into practice in each of their fields of labor. We fear that former recommendations on this subject have not been taken hold of by our ministers and messengers as they should have been. We further recommend that the churches enforce a prompt discipline on members who sign petitions for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Committee on Sunday Schools made their report and it was discussed by L. D. Geiger, H. M. King, G. T. Leitner, J. C. Barrington, J. H. Crosby and adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Sunday Schools in offering to you a report on the interests of that work, note with pleasure, that almost without exception the letters report schools in all the churches, and so far as we can judge these schools are fairly prosperous. These favorable conditions are greatly the results of the influence of our Sunday School Convention. To make them more efficient and useful is now the matter to which special attention should be directed.

1st. The churches as such, should keep the school strictly a department of church work, give it careful supervision and feel a direct responsibility with regard to it, should see that the teachers are capable, pious and sound in doctrine.

2nd. In the school, careful instruction in all the facts and doctrines of the Bible must be imparted and accurate and complete missionary information ought to be given.

As helps in doing this your Committee earnestly recommend the publications of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, published at Nashville, Tenn., and suggest that when any literature is needed not supplied by the Sunday School Board that it be secured from the American Baptist Publication Society.

Committee on Missions make their report and it was adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Missions would report that we have endeavored to scrutinize as closely as possible the spirit of the letters brought up to this Association by the messengers from the churches composing the same, and we are very much gratified to know that the spirit of missions permeates all of them, we are glad that our churches are fully awake to this important branch of our work. All consecrated Christian workers in our great denomination are agreed on this primal principle that the mission spirit is the spirit of God, and that it will lift all men, who will conform to its broad and divine teachings, from earth to heaven. We therefore recommend that this Association make its mission work more prominent than heretofore by helping weak and struggling churches in this Association before reaching beyond its limits, as we believe a little help now will enable them to become strong and useful, so that in the near future they may become sharers in the work and honors of building up the destitute places. We recommend further, that all pastors and zealous lay men of this Association make frequent and earnest endeavors to foster more substantially our mission work by their often appealing in their churches for funds for this purpose. We recommend further, that the churches at Windsor, Campville and Rochelle be tendered financial aid during this Associational year.
