HAMPTON, FLA., Oct. 24, 1893.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Missions, beg leave to submit the following:

There has been much said and a great deal done, yet from general observation we would infer that the command of our Lord and Master, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," has not been fully observed and performed in deed and in truth; while we commend and endorse many of the general plans and operations heretofore presented by our faithful brethren for the spread of the Gospel, yet there remains much to be done. The field is still white unto the harvest. Therefore we would recommend that the ministers of the Association do more preaching to individuals, as our Master did to the woman of Samaria, going from house to house, urging them to the duty of giving to the support of the Gospel as one of the fundamental duties of a Christian.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to make the following report:

Christians have their foes to meet. In all ages intemperance has been one of the great foes found arrayed against the children of God. Our Government, both State and National, seem to array themselves on the side of the monster evil. The licensed barroom, the legalized sale of whisky, the effort of the political and social world to make it respectable gives power to the demon. The Christians need to marshal all their forces, to educate their children to look with horror and dread upon all who would encourage intemperance. This is an age when the great cause of temperance calls upon all of God's workers to "Go forward." Our churches should be the friends of temperance and the most bitter foe of intemperance: For intemperance casts a blight over our land more ruinous than the plagues of Egypt. For none is the monster willing to spare. Our young men are snatched from the manly path of virtue and truth and hurled into a drunkard's hell. Our mothers robbed of their peace and children left crying in our streets for bread. What shall be done to stay the monster demon, intemperance, and to place temperance, crowned with the chaplet of victory as conqueror, proud ruler of our land? We answer: Let Christians "touch not, taste not the unclean thing" but totally abstain from it, thus showing to the world "For me to live is Christ" by true devotion to the principles of Christ and showing that we are anxious to do them good. "And woe be unto the man that puts a bottle to his neighbor's mouth," thunders forth in no uncertain sound God's holy word. Down with intemperance, unfurl the banner, in for the war! Destroy by public sentiment the jug trade and the blind tigers. These things are lude. Keep their luteness before the people. "Redeem the times, because the days are evil." Onward! the enemy retreats! Shouts from the field of battle call us "Onward." Let us pray God to help us, save our Nation and spare our churches. By His help and through Him we can gain the victory.

This should stimulate us to endeavor to place in our home, and the homes of our neighbors, sound literature, such as the Florida Baptist Witness, our own state paper, the Home Field, the Foreign Mission Journal, and for our Sunday Schools the literature published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Also the publications of

the American Baptist Publication Society. All of which we do most heartily recommend to all the brotherhood as being sound in doctrines and principles of our denomination.

We can but feel a sadness of heart when we hear that some churches report a lukewarm state prevailing among them. We would affectionately recommend to such a serious consideration of the Scripture in Revelation, which pronounces against such the dread penalty of being "spewed out of the mouth" of the Lord. And we would further recommend a zealous watch, care and examination of the material offered for church membership as to whether or not it be possessed of such qualifications as are demanded in the word of God, which declares that "Except a man be born again he cannot see the kingdom of God."

Committee on Education made the following report, which was discussed by D. B. Farmer and A. F. Randall.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We, your Committee on Education, beg leave to report as follows:

The ideal education includes physical, mental, moral and above all, Christian culture. Physical science and moral philosophy may prepare a young man for reputable society and temporal pursuits, but without Christ in the heart he is wholly unprepared for the greatest usefulness in this world and for the eternal kingdom of God. Literary culture is commendable, but when separated from the principles of Christianity it may be positively hurtful. Many schools and colleges are thorough in secular training, while they give very little attention to the highest end of life as taught by the Gospel of Christ. But some Christian parents will send their children to schools that offer such inducements as low tuition and cheap board, regardless of either thoroughness of instruction or religious influence. Such schools are generally expensive at any price, for the reason that they fail to properly educate the young, if they do not sow the seed of skepticism and soul-destroying doctrines of men. Your Committee, therefore, would emphasize the fact that Christian parents should do all they can to secure teachers of good moral

character for our public schools and never send their children to other educational institutions that neglect Christian training. The Baptists of Florida, through the providence of God, have an institution that fully meets all demands for thorough literary and Christian education. The John B. Stetson University has liberal courses of study, an able corps of teachers and gives special attention to the spiritual welfare of the students. It is no longer necessary for our people to send their children to other states to be educated. In fact, our school is superior to many of the older colleges and is equaled by few of them. This institution is doing a grand work in educating our young men who are called to preach the Gospel. While it is true that ministers of very limited educational advantages have accomplished much, it is also true that education is a great help to the preacher in any field and a necessity in many sections. We earnestly recommend that our young preachers, after taking a course in our University, attend the S. B. T. Seminary, when it is possible for them to do so. We would urge the churches of this Association to make regular contributions for ministerial education, especially for the benefit of our students at DeLand. We further recommend that the Baptists of Florida not only patronize our University, but also show their appreciation of what the generous Stetson, DeLand and Sampson have done for this State, by making greater efforts to pay our endowment pledge. Your Committee would not conclude this report without expressing gratitude to God for the bequest of the beloved Bro. Sampson, who recently died at his home in South Adams, Mass., giving \$70,000 for the work of enlarging and supporting our University, and in creasing the value of the property to about \$150,000.

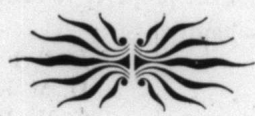
On motion, we stand adjourned to meet at Eliam Church, at Melrose, Fla., on Tuesday after the 4th Sunday in October, 1894.

A Short History of the Baptists.

By Henry O. Vedder. 12mo, 245 pp. Price, \$1.00.

This volume is well written and with scholarly accuracy, and should be owned by every Baptist.

The Ancient British and Irish Churches,

Including the Life and Labors of St. Patrick. By William Cathcart, D. D. 12mo, 350 pp. (about). Price, \$1.50.

In this work Dr. Cathcart has shown a vast amount of research. He has gone as far as may be to the fountain-head of information, and has overturned many popular conceptions concerning the Irish patron saint. He claims him conclusively as a Baptist, and shows that Rome had nothing to do with the founding of the ancient churches of the British Islands. It is emphatically a standard work.

Lessons on the Life of Jesus.

By Rev. O. S. C. Wallace. 16mo, 192 pp. Price, 90 cents.

This is a series of lessons prepared for young people, and in conjunction with the Young People's Baptist Union. The book is especially adapted for class-room work, and can be cordially recommended to our young people who want to pursue systematically such a course. At the same time it is well fitted for individual perusal.
